

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As Buildings Become Taller . . .


Sawdust floats in the air while hammers, saws, and bulldozers sweat to make buildings grow taller. Hammers, saws, bulldozers—these are the things which transform small colleges into larger colleges. The year 1966 has already seen the opening of many new buildings.

Hopper Hall, a two story structure costing \$800,000, has made room for two hundred girls. Lowndes Hall, the new men's dormitory provides housing for over two hundred men. This \$750,000 structure is beautifully located in Drexel Park. VSC's newest pride is the \$1,050,000 Nevins Hall, a three story building containing the administrative offices and the departments of Chemistry, Physics, Biology, and Math. It is equipped with the most modern conveniences includ-

ing a telescope and an observatory. Taking the place of the old Student Center is the sparkling new \$409,575 College Union offering a snack bar, meeting rooms, post office, and bookstore.

These new buildings meet the present demands at VSC, but the college is growing still. Construction is now under way for a \$1,500,000 fine arts building and a new dormitory to house two hundred women.

The administration has projected plans providing for several more buildings during the next ten years. This progress will be expensive, but progress is necessary; education is a must. So the sound of the hammer and the saw will be heard at VSC for many years to come. Just as it is necessary that students grow wiser, so it is necessary that buildings grow taller.




. . . the Faculty and Staff Reaches Higher . . .


Recognizing and appreciating the maturity of the young men and women they teach, the faculty of Valdosta State College are constantly adapting their methods of instruction to the high intellectual plane of their students.


. . . for New and Exciting Teaching Methods . . .

Modern equipment and a new building contribute to the teacher's efforts to stimulate the students. Nevins Hall is more than an administration building—it contains the Math, Biology, Chemistry, and Physics departments. For the first time this year improved facilities allowed the Biology Department to offer freshman biology as a lab course. Modern physics and chemistry experimental equipment permits a wider variety of experiments. In addition, Valdosta State now boasts an observatory and a planetarium, both of which are located in Nevins Hall.


Students in the art department built their own outdoor kiln—a project which helped them to appreciate the equipment they use in developing and expressing their talent.

Competent instructors coupled with new and modern equipment place Valdosta State's curriculum among the most advanced colleges and universities in the South.

















An Atmosphere for Learning Is Created . . .

. . . Pride and Loyalty Naturally Follow . . .



coming with its floats—these are only a few of the traditions that VSC students have with them.




College Freshmen Arrive at VSC




Dance Highlights Orientation Week








November 15— The Inauguration






Sidney Walter Martin: Fifth President of VSC








Rebels Win Title 6 Out of 7 Years










Academics





Curriculum Revision— Progress in Biology



The Task of Helping People Aided by Understanding

Psychology is the science of the "whys" of human and animal behavior through an understanding of the whole range of human experience. Sociology is the social science of these human relationships that seeks to solve problems in man's society.

Joey, a history major, is from Valdosta. He is a member of Tau Kappa Epsilon fraternity, the Baptist Student Union, and editor of **The Key**.




Individuality JUJU Winner



Pride of V.S.C.



In closing, we wish to pay tribute to the memory of two fellow students, Lamar Threatt and Joe Buff, who were killed in automobile accidents.

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
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
