





Technology is a blessing – and a curse.


The help desk also works with the wireless web, which will expand this year.

## Follow the red retiree road

The Council of Staff Affairs wants you to walk all over VSU's retirees. For the past five years, COSA has been working on creating a place to honor retired faculty and staff.

On Aug. 10, that place was dedicated and unveiled. The walkway between West Hall and the Biology/Chemistry Building is now a brick walkway. On 156 bricks of the 8,000-brick walkway, are engraved retired VSU workers' names, departments and years of service.

Each dedicated brick was paid for by donation. Donors had to donate at least \$50 in the name of a retiree who worked at VSU for at least 10 years and met othercriteria.

Among the retirees at the dedication was Dr. Wayne Faircloth, former head of the biology department, who retired in 1994. Dr. Faircloth moved back to his family farm in Wigham, Ga., after retiring but said he comes back to VSU of ten.

"I still come to use the library," he said. "I came back for the dedication of the Biology/Chemistry building."

After the unveiling, retirees, their families and friends walked along the walkway looking for their names and posing for photos.

Debi Britt, contract billing officer, has chaired the

Retirement Walkway and Employee Recognition Committee for three years. She said the committee hopes to get the project endowed so that all retirees of VSU can have bricks dedicated to them.

According to Britt, COSA is largely responsible for the success of the project thus far.

"A couple of months ago, we only had 28 names," she said. "There was a major push from COSA, with letters and phone calls. We announced the unveiling."

James Brignati, vice president for business and finance, bought bricks for every person in his department who had retired since he had come to office, Britt said.

For retirees who don't meet the specific criteria for a brick, the committee hopes to create an area around the walk where contributors can purchase a bench or tree in the name of a retiree.


The math tutoring lab is open Monday through Thursday from 9 a.m. to 8

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

### Warm paws mean a warm heart

Every time I leave, I have mud stains on my pants. I'm hot and sweaty. I smell like puppies and my heart is full.

This summer I began volunteering at the Lowndes County Animal Shelter, and it proved much more fulfilling than I imagined.

I've loved animals all my life and have always been interested in doing something to help them. About a year ago I considered doing volunteer work at a shelter but one thing stopped me. I was afraid of getting attached to the animals and not being able to handle the euthanasia. However. the more I thought about it, the more I realized how selfish it was of me to hold back my love and compassion for an animal based on its unfortunate plight. If I had a friend or loved one

diagnosed with a terminal illness. I would do anything to make his or her short life full of

iov. I realized I needed the same attitude for the animals in the shelter.

I went to the shelter on a Friday afternoon to turn in my application and began volunmy teer work Saturday morning. was intro-

duced to Leroy and Eric, who showed me around the shelter. We cleaned the cat and dog cages. I gave a sick dog a bath and took several of the dogs outside in the backyard to run and play in the sun. I left that afternoon, thrilled about the entire day and sad I had waited so long to do something to help these fuzzy friends.

During my tour I saw the euthanasia room and Leroy was very honest with me about what goes on. There are a lot of misconceptions about this issue and

about what goes on in shelters. Euthanasia is used only as a last

> resort when there is absolutely no chance an animal will recover from an injury or illness and cannot become adoptable.

Sometimes I'm sad to see an animal go to the euthanasia room, and sometimes an animal's pain is so obvious relieved to know it will soon be in peace. It is a tough issue, but I feel it's my

responsibility to deal with it. I want to be around for the animals who are healthy.

Every time I go to the shelter I get to see old friends and meet new ones. It's always a thrill to learn that one of the cats or dogs has been adopted. Every visit to the shelter is rewarding because my efforts are immediately reflected by purring cats and dogs running happily in the sun. Each minute I spend with these animals makes a vast difference in their lives.

I would encourage anyone with compassion for animals to vounteer at the shelter. These animals need community support, just like people do. They are dependent on people's good will and can't speak about their desires and aches and pains.

The shelter is open for volunteer work seven days a week from 8 a.m. to around 6 p.m. The Lowndes County Animal Shelter can be reached at 245-



## Blazers ready to put expectations to rest

After an entire off season of fighting expectations, it's time to get down to business.

The VSU Blazer football team kicks off Saturday at 7 p.m. at Bazemore-Hyder Stadium on Cleveland Field against the Albany State Golden Rams. For VSU Head Coach Chris Hatcher, it's about time.

"We're tired of beating up on each other," Hatcher said of the endless scrimmages the Blazers have endured in the Valdosta heat of mid-summer. "It's been really hot here, and we're looking forward to playing somebody other than ourselves."


The Blazers trampled ASU 42-10 in the season opener for both squads last year in Albany. It was the debut of the Hatch Attack offense and University of Kentucky transfer Dusty Bonner's first game as a Blazer.

"We don't know a whole lot about them," Hatcher said of the Golden Rams. "They are a lot bigger on the line than we are. It'll be a big task. I just hope they don't come out and try to run over our 'little' boys."

VSU enters the season with high hopes, ranked No. 1 in the preseason NCAA Division II football poll released by Sports Illustrated. Along with a new recruiting class and several highly touted off season transfers, the Blazers remained almost entirely intact after a 10-2 season last year that took VSU into post season play for the first time since 1996.

But for Hatcher, many of the questions will be answered after the pigskin flies Saturday at 7 p.m.

"We won't know how good we are until we play somebody," Hatcher said. "We just have to stay focused and be ready to play."

Two of the more recognized names on the Blazer roster this season are senior wide outs Abram Booty and Michael Greer. Both transferred from Southeastern Conference schools during the summer; Booty from Louisiana State University and Greer from the University of Georgia.

With the addition of the two senior wide receivers to an already loaded artillery of weapons at wide receiver, senior quarterback Bonner could have a difficult time choosing which one to throw to.

"It's a good problem to have," Hatcher said of the overloaded receiver corps. "Both of them were sidelined a little while during the summer because of injury, but they're healthy now, and we're going to try to use them as much as possible."

The Blazers "Air Raid" offense and "Black Swarm" defense return 17 of 22 starters from last season. According to Hatcher, the offensive and defensive game plan will remain the same as well.

"We've got a scheme and we're going to stick with it," Hatcher said. "We're not planning on adding much new stuff, but if we do, you'll have to come out to the game and see it"

Blazers linebacker Ken Barnett suffered a broken finger, which required surgery. He will be out for a minimum of two weeks. Season Opener







## Library expansion underway

Odum Library, temporary home to many of the academically inclined, is going to go through some remodeling. A new wing is being added to the back of the building to compensate for the inadequate space in the main library.

According to James Brignati, vice president for Business and Finance, VSU received a \$14.2 million grant from the state of Georgia almost two years ago and the plans are just now starting to come together with the Culpepper Construction Company beginning the building process. The actual cost of building will be \$11,039,000. That is approximately \$128,000 more than the school has to spend.

The Board of Regents is making up the difference in cost to help supply students and faculty with the additional resources the library will provide. It will take approximately one to one and a half years for the building to be

completed and until then the library should function normally.

According to Dr. George R. Gaumond, University librarian, students can look forward to a 24-hour Internet café, a new computer lab, a GALILEO tech-

nology center, reading rooms and expanded study space once the library is complete. Media Services sill also gain increased multi-media and digital editing capabilities, and the new resources will help the average student create dynamic multi-media visual presentations.

That isn't the end of the list, however. The archives will triple in size and have climate-controlled areas for rare books.

Perhaps the most significant feature of the new wing will not be any of the above attributes but simply the benefit of extra space for book storage.

"I'm a three-year student assistant at Odum Library who is tired of the fact that we have books piled on the floor and in the isles because there's no space for them," Adam Rondeau, a senior telecommunications major said.

Approximately 30 women and 50 men have not yet been offered a place to live on campus, according to Joe Mattachione, director of Housing and Residence Life. To accommodate those students who are without living arrangements, Housing and Residence Life is offering ways to find a home.

"We have sent out letters to those students who received a room assignment letting them know that if they so wished, they would be released from the contract at a full refund," Mattachione said. "We also made the off campus apartment guide available online, and have lists of people searching for roommates. As long as we have students still on the waiting list, we will continue our efforts to find them a place to live."

While some are looking for a home, others are trying to make their residence hall room comfortable. The C wing renovations of Langdale are complete, and most are happy with the change, but there are a few quirks to work out. Some students have complained about the humidity of the rooms. Others have found that they are missing cables are phone lines.

"We are working with contractors and engineers to fix problems and get new equipment," Mattachione said. "The biggest complaint we have heard is about the humidity. But for the most part, everyone thinks that the rooms do look nice and are happy with them."

The next big renovation in Langdale is the A wing. Construction is expected to begin in October, and should be finished by spring 2002.

- 4.Return form to registrar
  -A withdrawal of addition is not official untill received and processed by the Office of the Registrar
- -An addition into a classrom is based on professor discretion and previously specified limitations on available classroom seating.

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## Health services available for students

That cough could be your imagination, part of the newly-away-from-home-blues. Then again, you may have just caught your first fall semester flu. Maybe you should check it out at Farber.

The Farber Health Center offers a variety of services for VSU students. Located near the Palms Dining Center directly behind Langdale Hall, the center operates when residence halls are open. Any student enrolled for four or more semester hours is eligible to use the services provided. Costs are included in the mandatory \$73 health fee per semester, which covers unlimited visits throughout the semester.

University physicians, registered nurses and a pharmacist staff the six-bed infirmary. The staff handles most short-term illnesses, but refer major illnesses and surgical treatment to South Georgia Medical Center or to the student's physician at home.

Registered nurses are on duty 24 hours a day. The center refers students needing a physician's care to South Georgia Medical Center at night and on weekends. Students needing X-rays may be referred to Radiology Associates of Valdosta. Students must pay for all referred care.

A registered pharmacist dispenses prescription and over-thecounter medications. Prescriptions written by outside physicians may also be obtained

The lab is open from 8:30 a.m. until 5 p.m. on weekdays, and simple laboratory tests that can be done in the lab are included in the student health fee. For more information, contact the Farber Health Center at 333-5886.

I wish Knight and all his followers the best of luck.



## Low-income students receive grants

Only the lucky win the lottery, but 72 VSU students won a lottery of sorts this fall when federal aid was distributed.

The Leveraging Educational Assistance Partnership is a grant administered to low-income students statewide. It is a combination of federal and state funds. The Georgia General Assembly appropriated initial funds, and then those funds were matched by the U.S. Department of Education, totaling \$1,013,712 statewide.

Funds were allocated to schools based on the amount of Pell funds distributed to each. VSU received \$43,263. The funds are restricted to the lowest income students at VSU—those qualifying for the Pell grant. From those who were eligible, a computer randomly picked students for a grant of \$600 each until funds were depleted. Students were notified via an award letter. The financial aid office is expecting

to receive another allocation next fall.

"This used to be a small grant program which L.E.A.P. has replaced. This money is based on need not academic performance like H.O.P.E. It helps low-income students so they won't have to borrow so much," Tommy Moore, director of financial aid, said.
