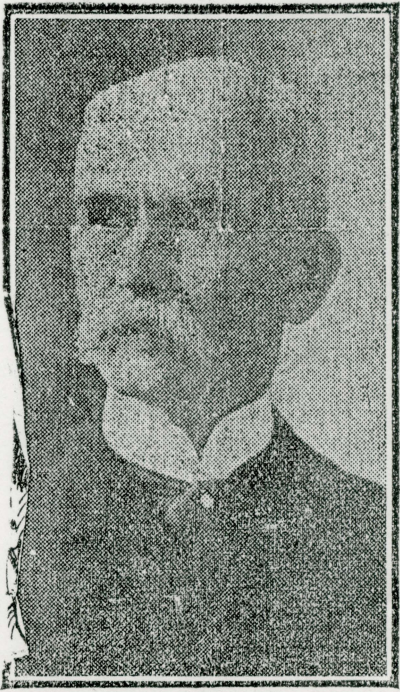

DEATH OF A VETERAN.

Forty-seventh Virginia Infantry, Stonewall Jackson's command, whose burial took place yesterday in Northumberland County, Va.

THE LATE CAPT. BROUN.

Came of Old Virginia Family and Served in Confederate Army.

Capt. William Broun, C. S. A., Forty-seventh Virginia Infantry, Stonewall Jackson's command, died in Washington on May 15. He was assistant adjutant and inspector general of Brackenbrough's Brigade, Heth's division, A. P. Hill's Corps, Army of Northern Virginia, C. S. A.

Capt. Broun came from a distinguished colonial family, having their home for about 300 years in Northumberland County, Va., to which place his remains were removed yesterday for interment, in the ancestral burial ground. He leaves a wife, Mrs. Betty Lawson Broun, whose home is also in Northumberland County, and whom he married a few years after the civil war. He also leaves a son, Cobrun Broun, now living in Indianapolis, and a daughter, Bessie, who resides with her mother at 2311 Ontario road.

As adjutant of the Charles Broadway Rouss Camp, No. 1191, U. C. V., of Washington, D. C., Capt. Broun served faithfully from the date of its organization in 1898. At the outbreak of the civil war he was a student in the University of Virginia. He left his studies, went to his home, and then immediately entered the Confederate army, in 1861. He was captured at Cold Harbor, in 1864, and sent as a prisoner of war to Johnsons Island, Sandusky Bay, Ohio, from which prison he was paroled in June, 1865.
