Babcock Joins Staff Of Honors Program

Leroy E. Babcock, associate professor of mathematics at Valdosta State College, is the first VSC faculty member named to participate in the 3rd Annual Eighth District Honors Program, June 17 through August 10, at South Georgia College in Douglas.

The honors program--fin-

anced by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare --will be composed of about 150 high school students from throughout 24 south Georgia counties in the 8th Congressional District.

"In order to be selected for the honors program, a student must have an intelligence quotient of at least a 120 and be in the upper 10 per cent of his class," remarked John Reynolds, assistant director of the program.

"We have 18 full-time high school, junior college, and four-year college and university professors from Georgia, Florida, South Carolina, Alabama, and Louisiana taking part in this honors program. Mr. Babcock is the first in the history of VSC to take part in the program," Mr. Reynolds commented.

A native of Battle Creek, Michigan, Mr. Babcock holds the bachelor of science degree from Southern Illinois University, Carbondale, Illinois; and the master of science degree from the University of Illinois, Urbana. Mr. Babcock has been a member of the VSC mathematics faculty since 1950.

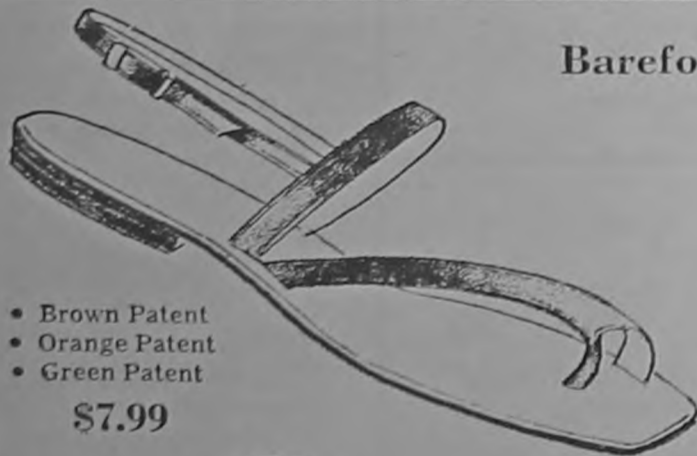

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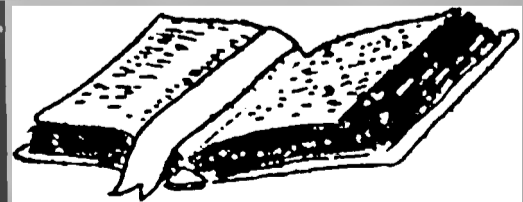
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Terry Seeks Opportunity To Carry Faith Overseas

Michael Terry, 21, a quiet, unassuming young Hoosier who looks like he might have just stepped off a Hollywood stage set rather than a basketball court, plans to dribble the ball for Christ this summer.

There's just one problem. A little matter of \$1,400. He has an opportunity to play basketball with Sports Ambassadors, from June 11 through August 10 in Japan, Korea, Formosa, the Philippines, and Hong Kong, if he can get the money to pay his transportation for the overseas tour.

A division of Overseas Crusades, Sports Ambassadors is a non-denominational organization that is sending four basketball teams and one track team to four foreign countries this summer.

"Team members put on sports and witness for Christ while in the countries," said Terry.

An All-GIAC forward for three years, he has raised

\$477 of his \$1,400 goal. Since the Sports Ambassadors program is non-profit, it is up to each player to provide money for his transportation.

"As a result of raising our own money for transportation, this shows that we are sincerely interested in going, want to do something for the cause of Christ, and are interested in other people," Terry commented.

Terry's team is scheduled to play 84 basketball games in the five countries. "During the half-time, the players will preach a short sermon, and give testimonies on their Christian experience," he said.

Throughout the tour, the American athletes will conduct worship services in churches in the host countries.

"The athletic teams provide a missionary service that many Christian churches cannot. In the countries they will visit, the main religion is Buddhism, which forbids its members to go to Christian churches," Terry said.

But, according to Terry, "the natives come by the thousands to watch the Sports Ambassadors basketball games. The preaching and witnessing the players do at halftime is sometimes the only contact the natives have with Christianity."

Terry sufficiently impressed Atlanta sportswriters enough to be named to the Atlanta Journal's All-State team, as an All-Georgia Intercollegiate Athletic performer. A native of Hammond, Ind., he is majoring in business administration.

The Century Plant Blooms

Century Plant Blooms In Front of West Hall

By now, many students and teachers on campus have noticed an unusually large stalk being produced by an unusually large plant in front of West Hall.

The plant mentioned is one of six large Century Plants in front of West Hall, and it is in the process of flowering.

This is a rather unusual occurrence for this region.

There is a widespread misunderstanding about the growing habits of century plants, and the "true story" about them is as follows: Century Plants (Agaves) are natives of Mexico, and a few grow wild in southwestern United States. Long ago, natives noticed that these plants grew slowly for a very long time. The idea was conceived that the plants would

grow for a hundred bloom, and then die.

This plant's flowering stalk should become much larger and taller, and the plant's flowering should last for several months.

It has been found that they rarely live to be a hundred. The Century Plant that is flowering in front of West is probably about 20 years old.

Dr. Hunter Joins Los Alamos Lab

This marks the "second tour of duty" for Dr. Hunter at Los Alamos. From 1965-66, he served as a staff member of the scientific laboratory there.

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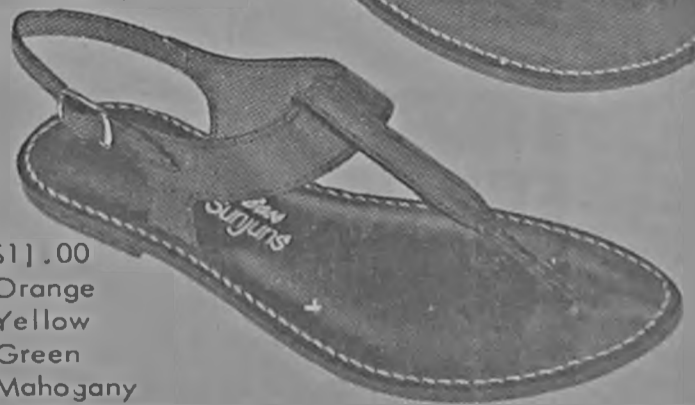


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Pi Kaps Collect For ALSAC

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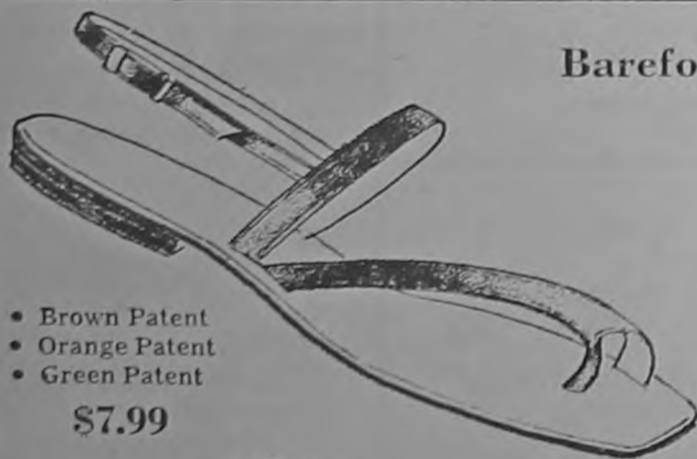
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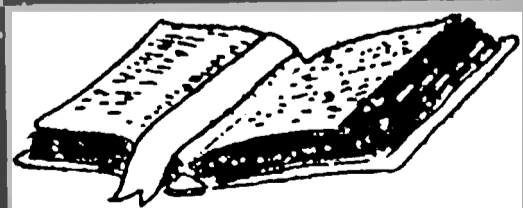
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Terry Seeks Opportunity To Carry Faith Overseas

Michael Terry, 21, a quiet, unassuming young Hoosier who looks like he might have just stepped off a Hollywood stage set rather than a basketball court, plans to dribble the ball for Christ this summer.

There's just one problem. A little matter of \$1,400. He has an opportunity to play basketball with Sports Ambassadors, from June 11 through August 10 in Japan, Korea, Formosa, the Philippines, and Hong Kong, if he can get the money to pay his transportation for the overseas tour.

A division of Overseas Crusades, Sports Ambassadors is a non-denominational organization that is sending four basketball teams and one track team to four foreign countries this summer.

"Team members put on sports and witness for Christ while in the countries," said Terry.

An All-GIAC forward for three years, he has raised

\$477 of his \$1,400 goal. Since the Sports Ambassadors program is non-profit, it is up to each player to provide money for his transportation.

"As a result of raising our own money for transportation, this shows that we are sincerely interested in going, want to do something for the cause of Christ, and are interested in other people," Terry commented.

Terry's team is scheduled to play 84 basketball games in the five countries. "During the half-time, the players will preach a short sermon, and give testimonies on their Christian experience," he said.

Throughout the tour, the American athletes will conduct worship services in churches in the host countries.

"The athletic teams provide a missionary service that many Christian churches cannot. In the countries they will visit, the main religion is Buddhism, which forbids its members to go to Christian churches," Terry said.

But, according to Terry, "the natives come by the thousands to watch the Sports Ambassadors basketball games. The preaching and witnessing the players do at halftime is sometimes the only contact the natives have with Christianity."

Terry sufficiently impressed Atlanta sportswriters enough to be named to the Atlanta Journal's All-State team, as an All-Georgia Intercollegiate Athletic performer. A native of Hammond, Ind., he is majoring in business administration.

Century Plant Blooms In Front of West Hall

By now, many students and teachers on campus have noticed an unusually large stalk being produced by an unusually large plant in front of West Hall.

The plant mentioned is one of six large Century Plants in front of West Hall, and it is in the process of flowering.

This is a rather unusual occurrence for this region.

There is a widespread misunderstanding about the growing habits of century plants, and the "true story" about them is as follows: Century Plants (Agaves) are natives of Mexico, and a few grow wild in southwestern United States. Long ago, natives noticed that these plants grew slowly for a very long time. The idea was conceived that the plants would

grow for a hundred bloom, and then die.

This plant's flowering stalk should become much larger and taller, and the plant's flowering should last for several months.

It has been found that they rarely live to be a hundred. The Century Plant that is flowering in front of West is probably about 20 years old.

Mr. Lester L. Stricklen, biology professor, is going to retire after 26 years of teaching, six of which were spent at VSC. He gave up the golf course for teaching in 1962 when he became a member of the VSC faculty.

He stated that there is one thing he challenges the college to do: "construct overhead walkways from the proposed parking lot on Oak Street to main campus. I chose this because I feel that it will be a great asset to VSC students and might even save a life or two."

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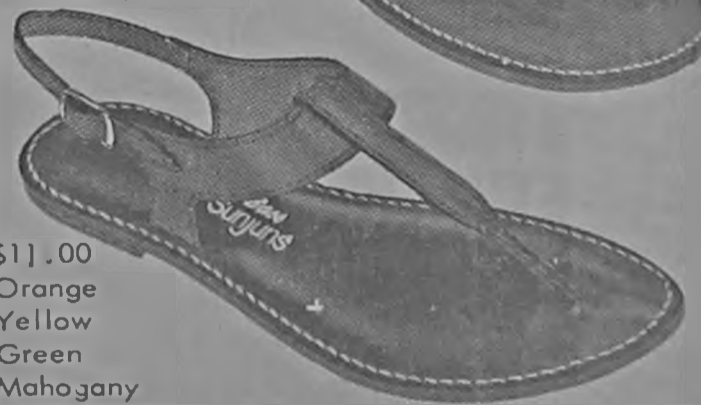


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
