

Dear Mr. Cooke:

In a communication of August 21 to Heads of Institutions, you transmitted an executive order of the Chairman of the Board of Regents in regard to exemption of payment of fees for children of employees of the various institutions. I am wondering if this order would include other dependents than children.

In this institution, Miss Caroline Parrish, my secretary, has been carrying her sister for the last three years, paying all her expenses with the exception possibly of one semester, when that sister paid her own expenses through her own efforts. This young woman is in her last year. Miss Parrish's salary has been very greatly reduced for this year, and is likewise subject to still further reduction in the event the income of the State will not warrant full payment. I wish you would write me about this, as it will help in this case quite as much as if Miss Parrish were actually a parent of the student.



My dear Dr. Weltner:

I believe you will be interested to learn of the work being done here in Statesboro to strengthen the spiritual and religious life of the students in the South Georgia Teachers' College. I learned with interest of your conference at Dahonoga in which plans for student welfare were discussed.

President Wells and Dean Henderson have always been active in looking after this phase of student-life but at your suggestion President Wells invited the pastors in the city for a conference at which plans for improving this service were made. This plan includes several things. Each church is to select a suitable man or woman whose duty it will be to visit the college at regular intervals and encourage closer church connection. This person is chairman of a committee to welcome students each Sunday morning to church and Sunday School. Each church will plan socials for the students so that they may become acquainted with the best people of the city and become interested in church life. Each church has special classes in Sunday School for the students. The class taught by President Wells had in attendance last Sunday more than one hundred students.

One of the ministers of the city conducts chapel exercises each week and all of them are urged to spend as much time as possible on the college campus. During the year the ministers plan special sermons of interest to students.

I have written this letter because I felt sure that you would be interested in and pleased with the efforts being made to look after the religious life of the students intelligently.

Personally, I consider it a real privilege to minister to the students in our school here and hope to be able to help them to see religion in the perspective of the new age in which they are living.

My dear Mr. Cocke:

I beg to inform you that this morning we received from Clarkesville four very small boxes of chemical supplies. Up to the present these boxes have not been opened and I am not informed as to the contents of them, but the whole outfit would not more than half fill a wheelbarrow. However, whatever the contents of the boxes may be, I am thankful to you for this, as anything in the nature of chemical supplies will be a welcome addition to our chemical department.

Now, another matter. In looking over the correspondence of this school, I find that a few years ago the State Highway Department almost pledged itself to topsoil or even pave the roads on our campus. Entering at the north end of the campus, the road curves around in front of the administration building and leaves the campus at the southeast corner. A loop, however, separates itself from the north approach, sweeps around behind the administration building in front of the dormitories, and reenters the main road just before it leaves the campus. These roads are in a miserable condition, and they cannot be kept in good condition, for dry weather affects them quite as disastrously. The dry weather powders them, and the wet weather washes off the surface sand until the road in some places has sunk beneath the level of the campus some ten or twelve inches, and a great sand bed six or eight inches deep is accumulating at the southeastern entrance. Nothing except pavement will prevent the almost constant need on our part of attention to these roadways.

Now, since this is the State's property, I am wondering if we can not get the present Highway Board to undertake to pave these roads for us. The city of Valdosta has in times past been very good to the school, but it is in no condition to help now, and as you know, the school has not a cent of money that it can devote in this way. If

the Highway Board would undertake to pave these roads, it would greatly improve the State's property and would enable the campus to make a very much better appearance than it ever will make without such treatment.

Can't you sound out Mr. Mangham and other members of the Highway Board and see what their reactions to a proposition of this kind would be? I am quite sure the whole college community, and even the city of Valdosta, would appreciate this little attention to the school.

Since dictating the above, Dr. Phelan has examined the chemical shipment from Clarkesville. He reports it to consist entirely of small amounts of chemicals which, all told, would be worth about twelve or fifteen dollars but which can be used immediately. There are no chemical apparatus at all.

In order that there be no misunderstanding, and for the reason that it is necessary that all employees of the University System be dealt with on the same basis, and that the several schools of the system be able to properly operate with the prospective reduction in State Funds, Chairman Spalding directs that the wording of letter forwarded you by this office on August 21, 1933 be strictly adhered to.

It is necessary that the temporary suspension of tuition fees be made applicable only to children of employees, who may have contracts of employment for the scholastic year, and under such contracts subject to reductions in salary on account of lack of availability of funds.

I ought to have written you several days ago acknowledging the receipt from Clarkesville of another shipment of chemical apparatus, but was not aware until yesterday that it had come. It was delivered to Dr. Phelan without being called to my attention.

Dr. Phelan gives me a list of the replacement values which amount, according to his figures, to \$100.72. Most of this we can use very nicely. Some few items, however, are comparatively useless for our purposes. On the whole, the shipment is a very desirable addition to our chemical outfit.

Dear Mr. Cocke:

I beg leave to acknowledge receipt of your letter of November 3, requesting Mr. Dusenbury and me to refigure the detailed information furnished you by Mr. Edwards covering our building program. This we have done, and are signing and returning a duplicate statement to that effect. I desire, however, to make as part of the record the following statement:

1. This institution has already exceeded its present rooming capacity, inasmuch as in most of the rooms three students are housed instead of two. In order to grow in the least, we must prepare for growth. In other words, we must release space for occupancy by students to the number of sixty or seventy-five, which we do not consider an unreasonable or an unnatural growth. Under ordinary circumstances, that increase would seem to be easy.
2. The liquidation of the amount approved for the swimming pool would depend upon our changing a student activity fee, not an academic fee, of \$5.00 per capita per year. This charge, we think, would be reasonable for the unlimited use by students of the pool, and also to defray the expense of an instructor in swimming, who would have to be constantly on duty at the pool.
3. The amortization of these various projects ought not to begin under two or three years, as not until the expiration of a period like that would we begin to realize any benefits from the various projects.

The school can not grow as it is now, since it has almost reached its full capacity, and if a very normal and conservative growth should occur each year, I see no reason why we could not liquidate these projects as indicated to your committee. Indeed, I think the very efforts we are making to accommodate increased patronage would, of itself almost, attract that patronage. At least, that has been my experience heretofore. No enterprise is going to expand until it gets ready for that expansion.

My dear President Pound:

Chancellor Weltner has asked a special committee, of which I am chairman, to secure certain data concerning the nature and extent of the personnel services now being sponsored by the several schools in the University System. In order to facilitate the gathering of this information I have prepared a mimeographed questionnaire* listing the items about which we are most concerned.

We have endeavored to make this questionnaire as objective, specific and compact as the nature of the investigation would permit. There are doubtless important items which we have omitted or for which sufficient space is not provided. We shall be very grateful if you will supplement the questionnaire along any lines that may seem appropriate to you, particularly along the lines indicated therein. The filling out of this questionnaire ought to require only a short while. Despite its length it can be filled out with less time and effort than a shorter questionnaire constructed along different lines. The committee realizes that, in some instances, very little is being done along personnel lines at present. However, since Chancellor Weltner has proposed to make this matter a topic for discussion at the next meeting of the University Council, the committee requests that it be furnished with all available data and that the questionnaire be returned to it along with any appropriate marking and general comments.

Since the data which we hope to obtain from these questionnaires needs to be assimilated, organized and presented to Chancellor Weltner at an early date, the committee will greatly appreciate as prompt and as complete information as you (or some designated person on your staff) can conveniently furnish us.
