

VALDOSTA STATE COLLEGE

Valdosta State College, a state-supported liberal arts institution, is located in Valdosta, a city of 38,000 in the south-central section of Georgia. Chartered in 1906, the institution was opened in January, 1913, offering two years of college credit. The institution became a four-year college in 1922 and was named Georgia State Womans College. The name was changed to Valdosta State College in 1950, when it

became coeducational. The present enrollment is approximately 4400.

More than 28 buildings are located on the beautiful VSC campuses. The 85-acre main campus fronts North Patterson Street, one of Valdosta's loveliest thoroughfares. Approximately 10 blocks north is North Campus, which houses the School of Business Administration, the Division of Nursing and the Division of Aerospace Studies. Both campuses are widely recognized for their exceptional beauty. Flowering plants include a variety of camellias, azaleas, redbud and dogwood, all located amid tall pines, palms and oaks spaced throughout the landscaped grounds.

The buildings on main campus are constructed in Spanish Mission architecture, while those on North Campus are a red brick modified form of Georgia architecture. All classrooms and residence halls are

air-conditioned, designed with the comfort and convenience of the student in mind.

The college recently acquired 25 acres to the west of the main campus and across the street from the gymnasium. This property has been developed to accommodate 1700 automobiles, plus athletic fields, tennis courts and other recreational facilities. In addition is the recently completed South Georgia Regional Education Center, which houses the School of Education and the Department of Psychology.


While most VSC students are Georgia residents, the student body represents 43 states and 20 foreign

countries. There are 230 full-time faculty members.

In recent years, under the direction of President S. Walter Martin, the objectives of Valdosta State have been enlarged to include programs leading to masters degrees in history, English, physics, mathematics and education. The College has a four-year baccalaureate degree program in nursing, a voluntary program in Air Force ROTC and offers majors in 40 areas of course work.

In 1961, Valdosta State embarked on a multi-million dollar program of construction and plant improvements, which will continue through 1975. The new facilities are costing approximately

\$15,000,000.



JAMES DOMINEY - Head Coach

After a coach obtains a certain amount of success in a season, it is important to him to continue that success the next season.

James Dominey, who is beginning his third year at the helm of Valdosta State College's basketball program, realizes this, and to him 1973-74 is a crucial year for Blazer basketball.

Dominey has enjoyed two ultra-successful seasons, winning 35 of 51 games. His first team won the Georgia Intercollegiate Athletic Conference championship while compiling an 18-8 record. Last year's squad, campaigning as an NAIA independent, won the district 25 crown and upset three-time national champion Kentucky State in the first round of the national tourney.

"The win over Kentucky State was certainly the biggest in my coaching career," Dominey said. "However, it came in the first round of the national tourney. It would have been much, much bigger if it had come in the finals."

And that is Dominey's biggest goal. A national championship.

"We made it to the national tournament last year and that is important. Most of the players from last year return and they want to go back to Kansas City. We all know what must be done to get back."


The first thing that must be done is to win the championship of the newly-formed South Atlantic Conference, a six-team league composed of medium-sized four year schools in the state. Three of the teams — West Georgia, Armstrong State and Columbus — are traditional rivals. Augusta and Southern Tech are the other teams.

"Overall, we can expect to be stronger on the boards and better defensively,"

Dominey said. "This team should be effective offensively but not necessarily a high

scoring team as was the case last season.

"A more experienced, mature and confident front line should allow us to compete with anybody inside. Our big men will carry a major portion of the load until our backcourt can become established. There will be more depth and better speed and quickness overall.

"Each team is different and must go about the game in its own way. It will be interesting to see what this team must do to be successful. I know the capability of the players returning and we recruited a couple of exciting guards. What it will take for us to become a competitive team is hard work."


Hard work on the basketball court is familiar to Dominey. He was a great high school player under Glenn Cassell at Vienna, where he captained the 1962 quintet and averaged 28 points a game. From Vienna, it was on to Norman Junior College for two more outstanding years. Then, Garland Pinholster induced the playmaking guard to complete his undergraduate work at Oglethorpe College.

After receiving the B.A. degree from Oglethorpe, Dominey attended Middle Tennessee State University and earned the Master of Education degree in 1967. One year of high school coaching preceded his joining the Valdosta State staff in 1968 as an assistant.


"I've always believed that success comes only to those willing to work hard. I'm going to work as hard as I can and I'll ask my players to do the same thing."

Dominey, 29, is married to the former Monica Moore of Vienna, and they have two daughters, Monica Leigh, 4, and Andrea Jean, 2.





DONNIE VEAL - Top Assistant



When Donnie Veal decided to join the athletic staff at Valdosta State three years ago, the continued success of Blazer basketball was further assured. Not only is the Macon, Ga., native an outstanding coach, he is also a top-notch judge and recruiter of basketball talent.


As head coach James Dominey's chief assistant, Veal spends much of his time during the season scouting high school and junior college players — a vital part of any successful cage program.

Veal came to VSC following five years of coaching at Mercer University at Macon where he was a standout basketball and baseball performer for four years. In his senior year, he captained the cage team and earned all-state and all-district honors.

At Mercer, Veal served as chief recruiter as well as top aide to the basketball and baseball mentors. At VSC, however, his only concern is his basketball duties.

Before joining the Mercer staff, Veal, 34, coached Mt. De Sales High School's baseball squad to the Class C state title and directed the basketball team to a region championship.

ROGER FLEETWOOD - Graduate Assistant



Roger Fleetwood, who solidified the Blazers' depth chart for three seasons as a player, is beginning his second year as a graduate assistant to coaches Dominey and Veal.

A native of Nashville, Ind., Fleetwood was VSC's sixth man for three seasons after playing his freshman year at Indiana State University. His senior year, he served as a co-captain and saw action in 23 of the Blazers' 26 games.

During his playing career, he picked up the nickname "Mr. Hustle" and his enthusiasm for the game spreads to players and coaches alike.

In addition to his coaching duties, Fleetwood also will spend some time scouting future opponents as well as recruiting. He was instrumental last year in the signing of freshman guard Larry Miller, who appears to have a brilliant future ahead of him at VSC.

Fleetwood is working toward a masters degree in education and his long range plans call for a career in coaching.

BILL GRANT — Athletic Director

Bill Grant joined Valdosta State's physical education department in 1959 as an assistant professor and head baseball coach. He is presently an associate professor in the department and is the college's athletic director, handling the business affairs of the athletic department.

Grant takes care of all matters pertaining to spectator control

and ticket requests should be directed to him.

A native Valdostan, Grant coached baseball at VSC for eight years and directed the 1965 team to the school's first conference title. He turned over the baseball job to Tommy Thomas in 1968 to devote full time to his duties as head of the physical education department. He was named athletic director in 1970 when Dr. Jay Arnold was brought in to head up the major program in physical education at VSC. Grant is also the Blazers' golf coach.

An outstanding high school athlete at Valdosta High School, Grant earned a scholarship to play football at the University of Georgia, but a broken ankle early in his sophomore year curtailed a

promising college career.

Grant received the B.S. degree from Georgia, and after four years in the Air Force, he attended George Peabody College in Nashville, Tenn., where he received the Master of Arts degree in 1958. He coached at Valdosta High for one year before joining the VSC faculty.

Grant, 44, is married to the former Marjorie Senkier of Poughkeepsie, N. Y.



BOBBY TUCKER — Manager

Bobby Tucker, a senior from Adel, Ga., is in his fourth year as the Blazers' manager, trainer, equipment man and anything else he is called on to do by the coaching staff and players.

The 21-year-old physical education major has done an outstanding job — a job that has not gone unnoticed. For the past two seasons, Tucker has been voted the winner of the "Blazer Spirit Award" by the players — an award he has definitely earned.

Head coach James Dominey calls Tucker the best manager he has ever been associated with. "He does a super job. He's a vital part of our practice sessions with his constant chatter and hustle. I don't know where he finds the time to do all he does and still excel in the classroom, but he does. We're certainly a better team because of him."



A FORWARD GLANCE

A new conference. A new challenge.

James Dominey and his Valdosta State College basketball Blazers find themselves in a completely new situation for the second straight year.

Last season, which was Dominey's second as head coach, the Blazers campaigned as a National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics independent. Valdosta State dropped out of the Georgia Intercollegiate Athletic Conference following the 1971-72 season, ending a 13-year domination of that league.

VSC turned out to be the class of NAIA's 25th district in 1972-73, winning the district tournament and advancing to the second round of the NAIA national tournament in Kansas City.

This season, the Blazers again enter a league — the newly formed NCAA-affiliated South Atlantic Conference (SAC), consisting of West Georgia, Columbus, Augusta, Southern Tech, Armstrong State and Valdosta State.

This year, however, VSC will be eligible only for NAIA post-season play. The Blazers will become eligible for NCAA tournaments in 1974-75.

Valdosta State lost only two players off last year's team which finished 17-8 and upset three-time national champion Kentucky State in the first round of the national tourney. But because those two players made up the best backcourt due in the state, the success of this year's team is questionable.

Lost to graduation were all-Americans Willie Oxford and Tim Dominey, who between them averaged 37 points per game a year ago. Everyone who has followed VSC basketball at all in the past three years knows replacing either Oxford or Dominey will be a tough order.

And for that reason, pre-season pollsters are picking the Blazers no better than third in the SAC behind Armstrong State and West Georgia.

VSC's strength this season will undoubtedly be on the front line where all three starters return. Kenny Alston, a 6-6 junior, Don Reason, a 6-8 sophomore, and Tiny Hodge, a 6-8 junior, have proven themselves to be as good a front line as any small college around can boast. Sophomore Mike Clyde and seniors Bob Donohoe and Jim Springfield add depth to the front

But the backcourt is the question mark. Fortunately, Donnie Wisenbaker, who sat out last season, has decided to return to school and will give Dominey the experience he is looking for. Wisenbaker has played two years at VSC and was a starter

The other guard spot is up for grabs. Two of Dominey's three recruits are guards from Indiana. Larry Miller, a 6-1 defensive specialist from Connersville, and Dave Barnett, a 5-11 long-range shooter from Fort Wayne, will battle for a starting

"There is no way we can replace both Willie and Tim at guard this year," Dominey said. "But we know Wisenbaker will give us some experience and hopefully some much needed leadership. If one of the freshmen or Tierney steps in and does a

Dominey, who has compiled a 35-16 record during his first two years at the helm, tends to believe the pre-season experts who pick Armstrong State as the team to beat in the conference.

"Armstrong State returns everybody from last year's fine team and deserves the No. 1 rating. West Georgia will be stronger than ever and I understand Columbus is loaded.

"I'd say Valdosta State and Augusta will be dark horses and Southern Tech had a great recruiting year and could be a real surprise."

Looking at the upcoming schedule, the 29-year-old coach is basically optimistic from a won-lost standpoint.

"We have an opportunity to improve on our won-lost record due to a better home schedule. Compared to seven home games last year, we have 12 at home this year.


"We can conceiveably host the SAC tournament if we are regular season conference champions.

"The new SAC is going to add a new dimension to Valdosta State basketball. Traditional rivals are now together in a conference which makes each game that much more important," Dominey said.

Also on the schedule are Georgia Southern, Valparaiso, LaGrange, Florida Southern, Baptist College, North Georgia and Palm Beach Atlantic. Four teams on the schedule — West Georgia, Valparaiso, LaGrange and Armstrong State — played in post-season tournament last year and only four teams — Georgia Southern, Palm Beach Atlantic, Columbus and Southern


The season begins Nov. 30 when the Blazers join Florida Southern, Savannah State and Armstrong State in the Shriner's Tournament in Savannah.

VSC's other tournament appearance, not including the conference tourney, will be the Citrus Invitational in Lakeland, Fla., Jan. 11-12. The Blazers will be joined by host Florida Southern, University of the South and Madison (Va.) College in

Kenny Alston is probably the key to whether or not Valdosta State has an exceptional season or a mediocre campaign. At 6-6, 185, the Dawson, Ga., native is the perfect forward.

In his first two seasons, Alston has averaged 15.6 points and 11.6 rebounds per game. His point average trailed VSC all-American guards Willie Oxford and Tim Dominey. His rebound average trailed nobody. This year, however, with much of that outside scoring punch gone, Alston must become more score conscious. He must be more productive offensively.

Alston's greatest asset is his consistency and perfect playing attitude. He is a great shooter from long range, is an outstanding jumper, and is known for making the big play offensively and defensively. His defense has improved tremendously and he gives 100 per cent at both ends of the court.

If Alston has the kind of year expected, he will deserve strong consideration for all-American honors.



With graduation taking two all-American guards, Valdosta State must gear its offense more to the inside where all three starters from a year ago return.

One of those starters is 6-8 forward Don Reason, who had an outstanding freshman year despite missing the early part of the season with a foot injury.

Offensively, Reason is a great player. He is strong enough at 205 pounds to take the ball to the basket against anyone and he is quick enough to get open for the percentage outside jumper. In a nutshell, he has the size, quickness, strength and overall talent to be as good as he wants to be.

Last season, Reason averaged over 14 points and 10 rebounds per game and was brilliant in the district and national tourneys. He has the ability to draw national attention to any program.

Although Tiny Hodge had some great games last season, he did not play with the consistency and poise that he did as a freshman. The biggest area in which Hodge did not excel was rebounding, where he averaged only eight per game after pulling down over 13 caroms per game as a freshman.

This year, however, appears to be the 6-8 junior's best ever. His attitude is vastly improved as recognized by his teammates who elected him as one of their captains. His defense has always been good and his offensive play has improved tremendously.



Donnie Wisenbaker's decision to return to school after a year's absence was exciting and welcome news to the VSC coaching staff. With an all—American backcourt lost to graduation, the coaches were faced with the possibility of starting capable, but inexperienced freshmen in the guard position.

Wisenbaker, however, brings experience and excellence to the backcourt. A Valdosta native, he has played two years for the Blazers and was a starter the last half of the 1971-72 season. As a matter of fact, Wisenbaker helped turn a break-even season into an 18-8 finish. After he entered the starting lineup, VSC won 11 of its last 13 games.

Wisenbaker is the complete player who has excellent strength and quickness plus an intense love for the game. He would live in the gym if utilities were furnished.

Much of the success or failure of this year's team depends on Wisenbaker. He must provide the floor leadership and be able to control the tempo of the game.

He may be a year away from seeing a great amount of playing time but has already added much to the program.

A BACKWARD GLANCE

A 98-81 defeat at the hands of eventual national champion Guilford College in the second round of the NAIA national tournament ended what must be called one of Valdosta State College's best basketball seasons in history.

The 1972-73 record of 17-8 is not all that impressive, but a fourth NAIA district 25 title, an upset of three-time NAIA national champion Kentucky State and two all-American selections is very impressive.

Before the 1972-73 campaign got underway, head coach James Dominey called the schedule "the toughest we've ever faced from a won-lost standpoint."

Dominey based his remark on the fact the Blazers played only seven of their 21 regular season games at home. "As an independent, we were not able to secure a good home schedule," he explained.

VSC had another schedule problem when they dropped out of the Georgia Intercollegiate Athletic Conference last season to campaign as a district 25 independent. The Blazers had been the perennial champs of the GIAC, winning it 12 times in 13 years.

After dropping the first two games on the schedule, which included such major college teams as Bradley, Florida, LSU at New Orleans and Biscayne, Dominey's crew reeled off 11 consecutive triumphs.

The streak was highlighted on Jan. 13 when the Blazers fought back from a 20-point deficit with 15 minutes left to play to knock off nationally ranked arch rival West Georgia by a 96-93 margin.

Despite a late season slump which saw the Blazers drop five of their final eight games, Dominey thought his team reached its peak at tournament time. "We played better in the final game of the season and the tournaments than we had played all year," he said.

Records fell like rain during the season when the Blazers broke several all-time Valdosta State marks. On Jan. 29 against Baptist College at Charleston VSC pulled down 71 rebounds to top the previous one game total of 67 against Albany State in 1971.

By averaging 90.9 points per game, the Blazers broke the team scoring record of 89.0 set in 1972. Valdosta State also went over the 100-point mark seven times to tie the record set by the 1972 quintet.

Willie Oxford, a living legend at VSC, established quite a few records of his own. These included most career points (1918), most free throws in a career (480) and highest career scoring average (18.5). Oxford led the team in game average (19.1), free throws percentage (.781), free throws attempted and made (114-146) and total points (440).

For his efforts, Oxford captured third team all-American honors on both the NAIA and Associated Press College Division squads. He also was named as one of the Top Ten College Players in Georgia by the Atlanta Journal.

Tim Dominey, a three-year starter for VSC and younger brother of the head coach, followed Oxford with an 18.0 average. He also became the fifth player in the history of the college to score over 1000 points in a career. He was voted Most Valuable Player by his teammates and also best defensive player on the squad for the third straight year.

Sophomore Kenny Alston led the Blazers in rebounds (265) and rebound average (11.5). He also helped out at the scoring end by averaging 15.4 points per contest.

Freshman Don Reason and sophomore Tiny Hodge were the other mainstays in the Valdosta State attack. Reason averaged 14.6 points and 10.2 rebounds per game and Hodge scored at an 11-point per game average.

The man behind it all was Dominey. For the Blazers' success last season, Dominey was picked as College Coach of the Year in Georgia by the Atlanta Tip Off Club. The Atlanta Journal also tapped him for Coach of the Year honors.




