Chp. 5- Arthur Chandler Dickey, Jr.

In 1916, Mr. L. S. Thompson built a new school for the community. And since it was his money and on his place, we named it Sherwood School.⁶⁸ That was before L. S. Thompson gave Sherwood Plantation to Herbert L. Stoddard, Sr., when he still owned it himself. For goodness sakes, names are cheap. It doesn't cost

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anything to call a school something. For a couple of months, we actually had school in the house across Meridian Road, where Sonny Stoddard lives, while they were building the new school. There's probably some paper wads up in the attic of his house even now. That's where we used to dispose of our waste paper. We'd just throw it up in the attic. At Sherwood, Mabel Dickey was my teacher, Eddie Dickey's wife. Before the year was out, we got another teacher to help her, two teachers in a one-room school-house.⁶⁹

I helped haul bricks for the foundation at Sherwood School, in the summer of 1916. After I had missed a bunch of years, I went to school there one year, the seventh grade, from 1916 through the Spring of 1917. I then started school there in the Fall of 1917, but we still didn't have anybody to run the farm. I had been out of school for three or four years just before that, but I went to school that year. But the war was not over yet. Who ran the farm when I was in school? Sometimes I wonder. I think I ran it in my spare time. I know one thing, I went to school as late as I could go in the morning, I got home as soon as I could in the afternoon, and we kept the farm going.

In the Fall of 1917, I started school for an unprecedented second straight year, but went only a month, then dropped out to run the farm full time. So after that one year of school in the seventh grade, and just one month in the eighth, I missed two more straight years before I went off to school at Sparks. In 1918 and 1919, I didn't go to school at all. I didn't start off to high school in 1920 till I was sixteen-and-a-half. I couldn't. My older brothers were either off at school, or in the army, and while they were away, I had to work the farm. I don't regret it, it was good for me. Then I made up for it, I made use of my time.
