Tomorrow's Leaders Learning The Ropes

Lt. Gov. Miller Invited To Speak

Fourteen young adults entered in this year's "Tomorrow's Leaders" program have now passed the halfway point in the two months long cram course on

local government and related activities and are now heading downhill toward a tentative "graduation" date of April 14th.

Taking part in the program are Bill Bass, Larry Bishop, Jet Cox, Chip Culbreth, Dr. Steve Floore, Lucretia Gainey, Juliane Hackney, Dexter Harrison, Mary Henderson,

John LeGette, Jr., Tim Lindsey, Barry Strickland, Patty Voyles, and Fondren Williams.

Twice weekly sessions in the Cairo-Grady County Chamber of Commerce sponsored program began Feb. 19th with the last meeting to be held on April 2nd.

Graduation exercises and a

dinner to honor the group are scheduled tentatively for April 14th and Lt. Gov. Zell Miller has been invited to speak on the occasion.

The date may be changed pending Miller's response to the invitation, a Chamber spokesman said this week. Thomas L. Lehman and Richard Van Landingham are serving as co-ordinators of the program.

Activities of the group have included attendance at a City Council session and a Board of Education meeting with a follow-up session at a later date to review the meeting and question members of the two governing bodies.

A visit to the Board of County Commissioners meeting is scheduled for next Tuesday with a similar review session next Thursday night.

The "Tomorrow's Leaders" scholars have also met with Kilgore, of the Georgia Dept. of Community Affairs staff in Atlanta, and Judge A. Wallace Cato on the judicial system; and discussed special school subjects with Washington Middle School Principal Larry Rawlins and School System Psychometrist Susan Austin.

Future sessions will include discussions of the work of the Industrial Development Authority, the ad valorem tax structure, and a meeting with local legislators to discuss the legislative process.

All participants have been assigned a project subject, their reports to be reviewed and discussed at the closing session.

Lehman said this week that this 1987 session of the "Tomorrow's Leaders" program has brought forth some very good questioning of local officials and a conscientious effort by participants to become better informed.

"But attendance has been a little spotty from time to time," he added.
