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New coordinator takes command of Syrupmaker defense

With the change of head coaches at Cairo High School comes change in many areas. One of those changes is at defensive coordinator, the position current head coach Steve De-Voursney held under coach Tom Fallaw. DeVoursney has named Daryl Jones as his defensive coordinator. Jones was most recently the on-campus recruiter at the University of Georgia under coach Mark Richt before coming to Cairo High School. Jones says his defense is much like Syrupmaker defensive schemes of the past with little change. "Cairo has had a lot of success on defense and we look to continue doing

the things that have always taken place. We are still running a 4-4 defense with the emphasis on running to the ball, pursuing the ball carrier and making the tackle," said Jones.

Jones likes what he sees with the 2015 defense, but admits the Syrupmakers still have a long way to go to replace the seniors that graduated last year.

"We have some key positions returning but, overall, we are working on making the transition with a new group of starters in different places on the field. We have several sophomores that will have to step up in varsity roles, so the idea is to keep the plan rather simple early on and, as we progress through the season, make things a little more complex," said Jones.


The Syrupmakers graduated two all-region linebackers and an all-region defensive tackle, and just about the entire secondary. "Everybody's working hard and learning their responsibilities, I have been pleased with their overall effort," said Jones.

The names may change from year to year to year, but the expectations remain the same. Look for the Syrupmaker defense to make a big impact once again this season.

DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR DARYL JONES works his defense during pregame warm-ups.




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According to Willis, both do a good job of taking care of the ball and managing the new offense, and both have the ability to make plays.



New running backs set for the 2015 season




"We are young at receiver and they are learning a new offense. They work hard every day to get better though, and are picking up the new system well," said coach Owens.

The Syrupmakers are confident in their new quarterback and that the offense has the opportunity to make big things happen under the Friday night lights.








Cornerback coach Steven Figueroa wants his corners to provide more production this season. It looks like he has the right players to make that happen.



Samuel Pinckney Cain, Jr. Carl Raymond Harrell Robert Lee Norman John David Pelham Jacob Arthur Reddick

SAM CAIN, JR.

Lieutenant, B-25 Bomber Pilot, U.S. Army Air Corp. He received his wings early in 1944. After considerable special training, Lt. Cain went overseas in September 1944. He completed 10 or more missions as a B-25 bomber pilot - his were dive-bombing missions, usually, and they make parachuting to safety less likely. He had been in the Mediterranean area, based on Corsica, only a few months when he was reported missing in action in the Italian area November 11, 1944. On April 20, 1945, his family was officially notified that he was killed in action November 14, 1944.

CARL HARRELL

Private First Class, Gunner in Air Corp. Pfc. Harrell was missing in action from May 1942 until May 1943 when he was officially reported to be a Prisoner of War in the Phillippines. He had been in the hands of the Japanese since fall of Corregidor in May 1942. He was drowned while a Prisoner of War when the Japanese prison ship was sunk by submarine action off Chinese coast on October 24, 1944. He had been in service since September 1939. He was declared dead June 1945.

JOHN PELHAM

Second Lieutenant. He completed training March 12, 1944 at Douglas Army Air Field, Douglas, Arizona as twin engine pilot. He received silver pilot's wings and commission. Later he took considerable advanced training in western states and became assigned to aerial photo reconnaissance duties. Lt. Pelham went overseas in Pacific. He died of injuries received in plane crash on Biak Island in the Pacific on May 25, 1945.

R. L. NORMAN

Lieutenant, Army Air Force. He signed in as Cadet in August 1942. On February 16, 1943 he received commission as Second Lieutenant Pilot. He could fly P-47 or P-51. In September 1943 he was sent overseas; reported to Eighth Air Force in England. In February 1944 he was promoted to First Lieutenant. He was shot down over France April 24. 1944. A Frenchman was first one to his plane. He must have died instantly. The Frenchman got in touch with his wife [Wilma Eubanks Norman) and he arranged for R. L. to be buried in Catholic Cemetery in France. After the war, he was moved to cemetery on coast of France. He shot down 4 or 5 German planes. He lacked 5 hours before coming home on rotation.

JACOB REDDICK

Flight Officer. Glider Pilot. U. S. Army Airborne Unit. He volunteered for service and then volunteered for assignment to an airborne outfit. He received his commission as Flight Officer at Lubbock. Texas. Later. he received advanced training at Louisville, Kentucky, and Maxton, North Carolina. He went overseas to North Africa in February 1944. Afterward, he saw further service in Italy and joined invasion of southern France shortly after it began. After liberation of France he joined in drive to liberate the Low Countries. He was reported missing in action over Holland on September 14, 1944. Official notice of death was received by his family on September 11, 1945 listing date of death as September 14, 1944. Jacob was found buried in a civilian cemetery in Holland. It was in 1947 that he was brought back to Cairo. He received the Purple Heart.



Cairo High School Class of 2021 earns more than \$1.7 million in scholarships

The Cairo High School seniors preparing to graduate in a matter of weeks kicked off the spring awards season with a big start Monday evening during the annual honors night program. Held in the school auditorium beginning at 6:30 p.m., 71 honor graduates were announced, along with the class valedictorian, salutatorian, and recipients of various scholarships and awards of excellence.

"Fields of Faith" held at Cairo High School April 21



I am proud to announce that once again, this year's Pigskin Preview is packed full of




This is an exciting time of year for all Syrupmakers! The football team, cheerleaders, and members of the Marching Syrupmaker Band are all preparing for another







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100 years of Syrupmaker Pride

School The Cairo High "Tigers" under a head coach by the name of "Eggers" played their first official football game on September 29, 1922 against the Thomasville Bulldogs, coming up short 39-6. Cairo's first win that vear came on October 20, 1922 in a home game against Havana, FL 20-6. Cairo would win one other game ESPN. that season, 12-0 over Havana, FL again, this time on November 30, 1922. With that season, Cairo High School began to build a program that has lasted another 99 years. Overall, Cairo is 659-345-37.

In 100 years of football, the Syrupmakers have had 24 different head coaches. The longest running coach is West Thomas who coached for 16 years from 1954-1969. He went 116-38-11 with three region titles. The second longest tenured coach was John Herndon who coached the Syrupmakers for 15 years, 1928-1945. He went 73-46. The third longest head coaching career in Syrupmaker history is Tom Fallaw, who coached the Syrupmakers for 12 years from 2002-20014. Coach Fallaw went 116-34-0 with 7 region titles, a state runner-up in 2007 and a state title in 2008. He now serves as a Cairo High School assistant principal and the county's athletic director.

The change from the Tiger mascot to the Syrupmakers was a slow change, gradually happening in the early 50s, until eventually the Syrupmaker name became the of-

ficial name and the Tiger mascot was dropped. The Syrupmaker name is rumored to have come about after Mr. Julien B. Roddenbery Sr., donated some rain parkas with the name Syrup Makers on the back, although Mr. Roddenbery would never take any credit for the High team in Thomasville. At the name. "The Syrupmakers" has time of going to press, the game was been named America's most unique mascot by several groups including Sports Illustrated and

Cairo has made the state playoffs 39 times in their 100 year history. In fact, Cairo has made the state playoffs every year since 2003 an interesting game. and have hosted a first round playoff game every year since 2004. The Syrupmakers have won 19 region titles in their history and three state championships, 1946 under coach Jeff West, 1990 under coach Ralph Jones and 2008 under coach Tom Fallaw. The Syrupmakers were the state runners up in 2007 in the one and only state championship game CLIPPINGS FROM the Sept. 29, played at West Thomas Stadium.
