

The Cairo High School eleven defeated the Boston high- football team here last Friday afternoon very handily by a score of 18-0. It was the first game of the season in the state so far as it is known here.

The locals were well in controll of the situation at all times, though the Cairo line gave way to some good gains by the visitors. It was a good exhibition of football and some pretty plays were carried out by both teams.

The following is the schedule of the locals for the remainder of the season, probably the largest and heaviest of any school

in the South Georgia area:

#### CAIRO "11" CLAIMS PASSING RECORD

Donalsonville swamped last Friday by 44-2 score, Pelham to be played today.

As a result of the completion by the Cairo High School football team of 31 of the last 42 attempts at forward passes for a total of 297 yards, the local team believes a new record has been established, at least for high school elevens. The locals swamped the heavy team representing the Donalsonville



ENTHUSIASM RUNS HIGH; REVISED SCHEDULE FOR CAIRO TEAM TO BRING FOUR MAJOR GAMES UNDER FLOODLIGHTS HERE

With enthusiasm running high among the local football fans, the Cairo High team is set to meet the Americus Panther eleven in the opening contest of the season under floodlights here tonight, Friday. The game is scheduled to begin immediately after the revival service at the Methodist Church, which will be about 8 o'clock.

Installation of lights at the local field, in the northwestern part of the city, has been in progress this week, following a campaign, led by Councilmen R. A. Bell and J. M.

Kennedy, resulting in subscriptions among local citizens calling for the necessary funds. Engineers of the General Electric Co., and the Georgia Power and Light Co., have been supervising the installation work, which was almost completed Thursday. Ten batteries of four lights will supply the illumination, which, it is said, will be the best to be found on any gridiron in South Georgia. Night football games for Cairo have been discussed for sometime because they have been quite successful elsewhere.



#### BAINBRIDGE JINX FOR CARIO GRIDERS HOLDS; GAME IS A SCORELESS TIE

The jinx which Bainbridge seems to hold for Cairo football teams arose again Wednesday night in the person of Referee Ike Cowart, and the annual Armistice Day clash between the Syrup Makers and Bearcats ended in a scoreless deadlock as a result.

Played in Bainbridge in very chilly weather, the contest was unquestionably more poorly handled as to officiating than any game in which a Cairo team has been involved. The refereeing of Cowart, who weighs a considerable portion of a ton, and who hails from Colquitt was grossly inefficient.

Cairo scored a touchdown in the second quarter only to have the play called back

on a very questionable decision by Cowart, and Cairo's longest gain of the evening went for naught similarly. Numerous other instances of unfairness toward Cairo and general inefficiency were clearly noted but need not be recited here. Call it small town stuff, if you will, or sour grapes, even, but the evidence to support the above statement is plentiful.

The weather was bad enough, and was further evidence aplenty in support of the suggestion of many that night football should not be attempted after October - but the poor officiating of Referee Cowart was an even greater mar on the annual clash of the two teams.

The powerful Cairo high Syrup Makers of Coach John Herndon swamped the Douglas High Pirates in Douglas on Thanksgiving Day, 41 to 1 to wind up their regular playing season for 1936 in a blaze of glory with a record of seven victories, two ties, and only one defeat, in ten starts. The Cairoites ran up a

total of 329 points in the season against only 33 points for opponents.

## Another Syrupmaker in the NFL

Former Syrupmaker Anthony Brown has been picked up by the NFL's Indianapolis Colts and now has a chance to play at the next level as an undrafted free agent after the NFL's draft last week.

Brown, who played for the Syrupmakers as a part of the 2008 Syrupmakers state title team, played his last two years of college football at Memphis University. Brown had 49 tackles, 74 assists for a total of 123 tackles in two years at Memphis. Brown was also named Memphis' Defensive Player of the Year

in 2013. After graduating from Cairo High School in 2009, Anthony Brown went to Northeast Mississippi Community College where he lettered two seasons. He posted 56 tackles, including 36 solo stops, in 2011 and helped his team to a 6-4 record. He was credited with 10 tackles for loss, a pass breakup and a fumble recovery. Brown led the squad with 10 tackles against Itawamba Community College in 2011. As a freshman, Brown totaled 81 tackles, 52 of which were solos, while also forcing three fumbles and registering two pass breakups.




## Masten returns as the Syrupmaker signal caller




## Offensive line looking to gain experience

## Region 1-AAAA has new faces

The GHSA realigned and reclassified the state's six classifications and regions last winter. However, some region team were not happy with their region and classification and appealed to the GHSA to be moved. Thomas County Central, citing long travel distances as a hardship on the school, asked to be moved down to Region 1-AAAA. The school noted that they were one of the smallest schools in AAAAA and suffered a financial and loss of class time burden in their present alignment. After the appeal was denied twice by the GHSA reclassification committee, the school took their appeal and the threat of a lawsuit to the full executive board of the GHSA and won, effectively moving both TCCHS and Bainbridge, who would then be isolated if they remained in AAAAA down to Region 1 AAAA. They are now the two largest schools in AAAA and will play in Region 1-

AAAA who asked to remain because of travel and financial reasons then appealed to be moved out of the region, but their appeal was denied. So now, Region 1-AAAA has 10 schools in football and 11 in other sports after the GHSA moved Cook County out of the region in football only.

In football, the region has been split in to two subregions. Side A consists of TCCHS, Cairo, Monroe, Crisp County and Albany. Side B consists of Bainbridge, West-

## CHS Touchdown Club needs you



## Stout defense is a Cairo Syrupmaker tradition that lives on






# Syrupmaker secondary coming together



**PIGSKIN PREVIEW** 

The 2013 Cairo High School Syrupmaker football season was somewhat like a crazy roller coaster ride as the Syrupmakers experienced the disappointments of losing to rivals Thomasville and Thomas County Central, losing their first region game in 24 games and the excitement of beating the Bainbridge Bearcats, setting a new single game rushing record, getting the 600th win in the program with a win over Americus-Sumter and clinching a first round playoff game with a shutout over Monroe.

The Syrupmakers faced 2013 with several new coaches after key coaches left Cairo in the spring. Defensive coordinator Jeff Littleton took the head coaching job at Bainbridge High School and took with him defensive coach Brian Hill and strength and line coach Jason Whitaker. However, the Syrupmakers seemed to adjust well to the off season changes and mounted a charge in the region as the season went on.

"You never like to lose to your rivals, or lose region games, but I thought we got better as the season went along. There were times we didn't finish drives or take advantage of opportunities, but our guys played hard all season," said Cairo coach Tom Fallaw.

Here now is a brief look back at the 2013

#### THOMASVILLE WINS SYRUP PITCHER (0-1)

After an hour and four minute delay due to a vicious line of thunderstorms that moved through the Cairo-Thomasville area, the "Battle of the Syrup Pitcher" and the 2013 season finally got under way a little after 9 p.m. on Friday night Aug. 30. The Syrupmakers wasted little time taking the lead on the Bulldogs with 6:51 to play in the first quarter when Tiakail Anderson picked up a loose ball at the Thomasville 3-vard line and scampered in the end zone to give Cairo a 7-0 lead after Taylor Donalson's extra point. The Syrupmakers extended their lead with a 26yard field goal by Donalson with 5:51 to play in the half. As the halftime buzzer sounded, it appeared the Syrupmakers were on their way to their ninth win in a row, holding a 10-0 lead and allowing the Bulldogs just 16 yards 31-yard run in the first of offense and one first down. However, the Bulldogs came back in the second half, scoring 21 unanswered points to pick up their first win over the Syrupmakers in 8 years.

#### SYRUPMAKERS HOLD OFF **BAINBRIDGE (1-1)**

It was a flashback, of sorts, to 1982 as a big goal line stand gave the victors a one touchdown win before a packed West Thomas Stadium in the annual Bainbridge-Cairo match

up. However, unlike 1982, this time it was the ondre Cooksey to give TCCHS the 21-0 win. Cairo Syrupmakers (1-1) that came up with the big goal line stand, twice, to fend off a late comeback by the Bainbridge Bearcats (1-1), and picked up a 6-0 nonregion win. The Syrupmakers scored on a 1-yard plunge by Jeremiah Hill in the second quarter, but missed the extra point. The Syrupmaker defense shut out the Bearcats and preserved the first win of the season.

#### TCCHS BLANKS CAIRO 21-0 (1-2)

#### CAIRO COOLS OFF CRISP **COUNTY (2-2)**




#### WESTOVER ENDS CAIRO'S **REGION WIN STREAK (2-3)**

However, the Syrupmaker offense, which had struggled to find points this season, answered on Hill's first score of the night, a 15vard run. However, that score was short lived as the Rams returned the ensuing kickoff 91 yards to take a 14-7 lead. Cairo tied the game again, this time on quarterback Stacy Masten's 3-yard run. With the game tied at 14-14, the Rams added a 24-yard field goal to take a 17-14 lead to the locker room. In the second half, it was more of the Syrupmaker offense as Cairo took the lead for good and outscored the Rams 42-28. Hill ended the night with three TDs.

#### CAIRO BEATS ALBANY 20-6 (4-3)

The Cairo High School Syrupmakers scored first and held on for a 20-6 over the Albany High School Indians in Albany in another important region match up. On the Syrupmakers' first score of the night, Cairo quarterback Stacy Masten connected with senior wide receiver Reese Wooten on a 58yard touchdown pass after Wooten got behind the Indian secondary on a perfectly executed play. The game remained 7-0 until late in the third quarter when Cairo's Derex Hill picked off a pass and raced 43 yards for a Syrupmaker touchdown with 2:28 to play in the quarter. Albany then responded with their only score of the night, but the Syrupmakers blocked the extra point making the score 14-6 with 6:45 to play in the game. Cairo's final score came on a 3-yard plunge by Jeremiah Hill, who finished the night with 21 carries and 157 yards.




#### STATESBORO ENDS SYRUPMAKERS' SEASON (7-4)

## Cairo High School Fellowship of Christian Athletes has new leader


It's a new year and a chapter for the Cairo high School Fellowship of Christian Athletes.




