surviving tough economic times for museums. Recently there have been layoffs, budget cuts, and benefits slashed in an effort to keep our museums afloat. So, how can we as the state museum association help?

The Long Range Planning Committee met a few weeks ago and decided to survey our membership with several ideas on how we can help. One idea included having Gwen Leverette work with a variety of vendors to help get us better deals. For instance, if enough museums were interested in acquiring health insurance what types of packages rates could we get as a group? Or how about shipping rates, retirement plans, board insurance, or even SAM's Club discounts? This does not mean that every member would have to buy the same health insurance or all ship via UPS. However, if there were enough people within our organization interested in purchasing health insurance the rates would be less expensive.

Another proposal involves printing a brochure to be distributed at Georgia Welcome Centers listing all of our member museums and their locations. GAMG could help all of us in our marketing efforts. Still another proposal involved updating and reprinting the current listing of the museums which includes more detailed descriptions. The state museum directories could be made available at our member organizations.

Another thought involved becoming more active with the state legislature and governor's office. Perhaps GAMG should host receptions to help our elected officials become acquainted with our member museums.

All of these are worthy projects and deserve our attention. In order to work on the projects you value the most we are going to ask for your help. You will receive in the mail and on e-mail a questionnaire asking which project or projects you would like us to concentrate our efforts on to achieve. We need your input and it will only take a few minutes. After all, it is more productive to listen to your opinions that just to talk among ourselves. So when you get the questionnaire, don't do what I usually do and put it in the "I will get to it sometime stack." Fill it out, mail it in and you won't have to listen to me preach on the subject (I know, it will be a great relief).

Be sure and check out our new web site design. The new purple background is quite vibrant and eye catching. Travis Hutchins, David Noah and Gwen Leverette have all worked hard on keeping us linked and updated electronically. Now as much as I should be against this innovation (being from the Paper Museum) they are doing a wonderful job. Expanding on the Snake's mission to publish literature in all its myriad forms, The Valdosta Voice, Your Arts, Cultural, & Entertainment Guide to South Georgia, a monthly newspaper, began appearing on newsstands in July of 2000. Most of the writing in the paper is done by members of the Snake Nation Writers Group.





VALDOSTA — Building a home takes time, money and especially knowledge: Knowing what to do when, how, etc.

Hollis Barnett, a Valdosta State University professor and a local artist, is scheduled to explain some of the challenges during a Lowndes/Valdosta Arts Commission seminar entitled "The Art of Contracting and Building Your Own Home."

Barnett "recently completed a house that he designed, contracted and built," according to LVAC. "During this time, he often thought about how much he would like to help anyone who attempted to build his or her own house. Building a house is emotionally, financially and physically difficult. It is also very rewarding."

In the seminar, Barnett offers a public presentation "about the complexities involved in contracting labor, organizing the delivery of materials, and arranging for

Pyles discovers a colorful world

VALDOSTA — At first glance, artist Ted Pyles' paintings seem simple: starkly colorful portrayals of animals and wildlife scenes, infused with a touch of rustic humor and grace. On closer inspection, a viewer realizes that these paintings are actually intricate, full of lined details and an almost calligraphic use of the brush. And more amazingly, he keeps the colors true in all of this detail — the colors are not muddied, but brilliant. It is this faithful use of true colors that initially makes one think Pyles' compositions are simple, because often, in more intricate designs, the colors are muddied. But not in Pyles' world: in his paintings, the colors are vivid in complex designs.

In his paintings, it's as if he sees the world through stained glass, creating cathedral windows to wildlife and rustic scenes.

Pyles is the Southern Artists League's Artist of the Month for July and several of his paintings are on display in the lobby of The Valdosta Daily Times' 201 N. Troup St. offices.

Pyles came to art later in life, in his 50s; he's 57 now, but, in his artistic statement, he writes that he was interested in drawing and painting as a child. He tells a poignant story of his sixthgrade art teacher telling him in front of the class that he "had no sense of color. I had used a color on an art project that she didn't approve of, but my classmates did. After that experience, I never watercolored until a few months ago, and now I'm also doing acrylics. But once I had my paintbrush in hand, a strange creative magic took over. Ironically, my fellow artist colleagues say my unique use of colors is one of my strong suits."

Losing his wife to a stroke in 1998, Pyles began writing and painting. He's written three novels, four novellas, several short stories and dozens of poems.

"Some of my life's greatest joys come from putting words or paint on paper," Pyles says in his artistic statement. "My style of writing seems to be like my paintings — bright and bold, emotional and a bit mysterious."

While some viewers may say that Pyles' artistic style falls into the primitive category, his is a joyous style that is as brilliant as a stained glass window on a sunny Sunday morning.



ARTIST OF THE MONTH Rice's paintings focus on people

John Rice was born in Wilmington, Vermont and received a bachelor of art degree in English from Keene State College of the University of New Hampshire in 1972.

He and his wife, Debbie, have owned and operated Lawson Studios since 1994. An award-winning artist, Rice exhibits regionally and nationally and has been featured in North Light Magazine and the Colson Printing Company Calendar. "I have no set formula when it comes to choosing a composi-

"I have no set formula when it comes to choosing a composition, but I definitely prefer to paint people," Rice says in an artistic statement. "They are what interest us and encourage us to interact with the paintings. I got seriously interested in art when I started working with John Lawson. He inspired me to see what I could do. I started working with oils and that's the medium I prefer. I'm basically self taught, learning a lot from books, and interacting with other artists."

Rice is the Southern Artists League's Artist of the Month, and his work is on display, throughout April, in the lobby of The Valdosta Daily Times' 201 N. Troup St. offices.
