





dren is a pleasure at each location, McNeill told The Times recently during a phone interview from a show stop in Michigan. She can understand the youngsters' thrill to participate in this show. McNeill played a munchkin as a child in another "Oz" production.

weeks, she has been to locations throughout the U.S. She has visited places she never thought she would


see and had experiences she never believed she would have. She is all too aware of the similarities of her traveling with a touring production of "The Wizard of Oz" and
