Superintendent Roesch retiring

VALDOSTA — Martin Roesch, Valdosta City Schools superintendent, is retiring.

His last day of employment will be May 29, according to a statement from the school sys-

Roesch announced his retirement Monday evening.

"After thoughtful consideration, I have decided to retire. I have genuinely enjoyed every level of my employment with Valdosta City Schools and have been honored

to serve as superintendent," Roesch said.

"I would like to thank Valdosta City Schools for the many opportunities I have had through-out my career. Although I am looking forward to this new stage in my life, I will miss the daily interactions I have with the faculty, staff and students of our district."

Roesch became the superintendent of Valdosta City Schools in February of 2013 and has spent his entire career working within the district.

The board of education will begin a search to replace Roesch, but has not provided a timeline for the search process.

Edward Martin "Marty" Roesch has spent nearly 30 years with the city school system.

European, Native, and African roots. The songs are story songs (ballads), gospel songs, work songs, love songs, etc., and most of them are very old, the authors unknown.

They reflect our American heritage and the continuous migration of people. And although they are old, the themes are still very relevant and alive," she said. "The dances, either contra, square, or circle dances that Elwood calls, or the percussive clogging that I do, are also ancient, and we put our own spin on those traditions. These songs and dance traditions have a wonderful way of bringing people together, reminding us of our roots, and creating community.

To perform these songs, Atwater-Donnelly are constantly researching archives and traveling to find "new" old

songs.
"We learn most of our songs, dances,

and instrumentation from the inspiration of travel and meeting individuals who sing, dance, or play the pieces that move us. We are self-taught and play by ear," Atwater said. "When we meet people who play a piece or dance we wish to learn, we ask them to show us on the spot, or we record them, or we get a CD or DVD with the piece on it. There are also many folk archives in the forms of records, tapes, CDs, videos, and downloads and we occasionally learn songs and dances that way, too. It's a very personal process and every song or dance we do has a personal story behind it.'

Folk song themes remain constants, place to place, culture to culture.

'Yes, someone just e-mailed me ... about a Mexican love song," Atwater said in a past interview. "She summarized the plot about love, honor, betrayal and murder. The stories across cultures are strikingly similar which leads me to the conclusion that human beings, no matter what culture, have the same basic needs and strug-

VALDOSTA - Accidents involving tractor trailers in Lowndes County and Cook County slowed interstate traffic to a crawl Tuesday morning, and crews were still clearing the roadways late Tuesday.

At approximately 4:56 a.m., Tuesday two semi trucks were involved in an accident at mile marker 15 southbound on Interstate 75.

A truck traveling southbound struck the other truck which was parked on the shoulder, according to

One of the trucks was carrying frozen pizzas and the other was carrying towels, according to a Georgia Department of Transportation spokesperson.

The collision blocked two of three lanes, and a crane was brought in to clear one of the trucks.

At approximately 10:30 a.m., another wreck involving two semi trucks occurred at mile marker 32 northbound on I-75 in Cook County. One of the trucks was carrying cooking oil and the other was empty. GDOT crews covered spilled oil on the roadway and exit ramp with sand, according to GDOT. One truck was traveling at 25 mph

were located at the 600 block of Copeland Road, Lake Park, and on the 5500 block of the Madison Highway, Valdosta, according to the indictment.

The indictment describes various treatments of the dogs which include "burying car axles and attaching heavy chains, which permitted the pit bulls to avoid getting tangled in the chains," "the use of a 'rape stand,' a device in which a female dog who is too aggressive to submit to male dogs for breeding is strapped down with her head held in place by a re-

straint," the dogs were "'rolled' or 'tested' ... by putting dogs through fighting sessions to determine which dogs were good fighters," etc.

This case is part of an inter-agency investigation involving federal, state and local lawenforcement authorities, including the Echols County Sheriff's Office, and animal organizations.

come down to the studio so they could get a photo w of the two for the local paper. Cash brought (wife) Vivian with him, and when they got to the studio, they found a crowded room."

Elvis had reportedly arrived earlier in a whiteand-brown Lincoln Continental convertible. A Vegas chorus girl accompanied him.

"Elvis said his hellos, then came straight over to Jerry Lee and shook his hand," Rick Bragg writes in his book, "Jerry Lee Lewis: His Own Story." "I been wantin' to meet that piano player,' he said.

"He did not act like the king of rock and roll. He acted like a good boy, with not one speck of ugliness in him. He even hugged Jerry Lee's neck, as a brother would do."

Moments later, Presley listened to Carl Perkins' new record. He reportedly said he liked it. Presley, Lewis and Perkins began jamming on the piano while Perkins' band began backing them.

Cash arrived to this scene, and he joined the musicians, though his recognizable voice is never really heard on the recordings from that day.

The story goes that no one noticed Phillips had left the room. He was

recording the session.

The songs "included Bill Monroe bluegrass tunes, some Chuck Berry rockers, a Gene Autrey number, a Hank Snow hit, and lots of gospel — 'Just a Little Talk with Jesus,' Peace in the Valley,' and 'Blessed Jesus (Hold My Hand)," Hilburn writes.

"It would become one of those rare days in the history of American music, trumpeted by Sam
Phillips as a purely accidental, spontaneous gathering of four of the true
greats in the early history
of rock and roll, even
though the truth was that
he had ginned it all up
himself, sensing its potential, manipulating the proceedings, arranging to
have it all covered and
photographed and, of
course, recorded," Bragg

writes. "It was a good day, just the same."

Hilburn writes that
"the story of that afternoon session grew into
legend as years went by,
and rockabilly fans
around the world dreamed
of hearing the 'Million
Dollar Quartet,' as it became known. They got
their wish in 1981, when
part of the Dec. 4 session
was released in bootleg

form and became an underground bestseller. Other bootleg editions were also released before RCA finally put out an authorized version in 1990."

Floyd Mutrux and Colin Escott's dramatized musical, the one arriving Tuesday in Valdosta, premiered in 2007 and debuted on Broadway in 2010.

Retrospective gathers late artist's work

VALDOSTA — Walking through the Don Pettigrew: Retrospective exhibit, one somber question keeps pounding at the forefront of the mind, a question that won't go

ay, but seems almost unspoken. Why didn't Don Pettigrew present more local exhibits

of his work while he was alive?

Granted, one or two of his pieces were regularly exhibited in the annual Spring Into Art.

His prints were popular; people bought them. It is not unusual to encounter a Pettigrew painting or illustration of a hunting dog, a cat, a landscape, a hunting scene, water, on a wall here and there throughout South

His works were an annual staple within the Colson Calendar, the yearly month-by-month expression of the abilities of the print shop where Petti-

grew worked. His work is scattered throughout the region and beyond, which may explain why there weren't more one-man shows and retrospective exhibits.

Pettigrew was a working artist for many years.
Painting and drawing wasn't only something he felt he had to do to sate his artistic spirit. No, Don Pettigrew had to paint and draw because he had made art his career. It was his job. It fed him for

He painted works that had been commissioned.

He painted works which he felt could be sold.

But seeing the retrospective exhibit now on display at the Annette Howell Turner Center for the Arts, all of that talent in one room, condensed to a few walls, one can't help but wonder what Don

would have made of this show. Don Pettigrew died in the first early days of 2014. The Valdosta-based artist worked independently for many years. He continued selling his works even after taking a job.

His friend, printer and employer Wendy Colson shared his memories of Don Pettigrew.

"Don Pettigrew had been a successful artist most of his adult life. The first time I met him, he had heard about Colson having a fine art division and decided to give us a try printing the famous

Ocean Pond Clubhouse painting. "Before this Don's reproductions were printed at Litho-Krome in Atlanta. Litho-Krome was the premier fine art printer in America and was my mentors. Don said, If you spot me the funds I am sure I can sell enough of the prints at the club's annual meeting to pay you in full. At the time I was honored that Don would trust us to reproduce his work so I took a chance and printed the edition without any upfront money.

"In three days, Don came back and paid for the edition in full.
"Don came back many times after that day and printed new editions and we developed a friendship.

"Then one day he showed up and did not want to print anything, he actually wanted a job. Imagine that, Don Pettigrew working at Colson Printing. At the time I did not have an opening but something came up later and I hired him.

"Many times our customers would come in and look at his desk plate and say, 'Are you the artist Don Pettigrew?' Don would always reply in his humble way and you would have thought some of them had met Elvis. I always loved that and Don did, too.

Until Don died he worked with us and it was a blast. "Even through chemo, Don was just like he told me in the interview. He said, You can count on me to be dependable and always

show up for work. What a great work ethic.

THE KINGS AND QUEENS OF ROAM: Daniel Wallace

With books such as "Big Fish," "The Watermelon King," etc., author Daniel Wallace seeks truths via tall tales.

Philosophically, he writes with one foot planted in our world and the other in legend. With his skills of observation and whimsy of imagination, this is a revelatory and intoxicating mix.

"The Kings and Queens of Roam" settles on two sisters. Rachel was born beautiful but blind; Helen was born far less than beautiful but sighted.

One day changes their lives and the nature of their relationship.

Helen switches their faces.

Helen claims to be beautiful. She tells her blind sister that Rachel is hideous. They are girls, children, but Helen never corrects this story. She tells her blind sister that it is impossible to leave the town of Roam.

Wallace shares the history of Roam which is built upon the deception of one man shanghaiing a Chinese man, forcibly bringing him to the States and impressing upon him to share the secrets of manufacturing silk. They

become strained friends who both love and hate each other.

Wallace populates this town built upon deception, cruelty and begrudging friendship with ghosts who cannot leave, giant lumberjacks who love disabled dogs, ancient people who have found wellsprings of immortality and more.

Yet, amidst this magical form of storytelling, Wallace writes a compelling fable of forgiveness. One should know, too, that this book is no bestseller. It was published a few years ago. Likely, for e-readers, it can be obtained in a moment. For more traditional readers of books, it takes some searching to find this volume. Like seeking the lessons of a place such as Roam, it is a book worth the search and the wait.



Julian must have fun.

Center for the Arts Presenter Series.

During this interview, Julian rode on a bus to Kentucky for a show. He's enjoyed the different venues after so many years of playing the same Chicago stage.

The role seems a natural for Julian who has played piano since childhood and worked in musical theatre as an adult. Though he admitted to being nothing like Lewis in his life.

"Million Dollar Quartet" combines elements of a tribute show with the actors performing their legendary counterparts' hits but it is also musical theatre telling a story and offering a glimpse into the personalities of these people who had acquired some fame but were still on the cusp of being rock & roll giants.

"The show captures the character and relationships of these guys," Julian said, "and how they just came together for what became the most influential jam session of all time.

Informed of a recent story in The Valdosta Daily Times where readers recalled Jerry Lee Lewis concerts in Valdosta, Julian said it is always a humbling experience meeting people who saw Lewis perform. Meeting these fans is always a reminder that Jerry Lee is still alive and still out there.

Lewis has seen past productions of "Million Dollar Quartet" and even played with the original performer to play him in the show

Julian has not met Lewis.

He said it's a big responsibility but he would love for the real Jerry Lee to see him play Jerry Lee one day.




