VALDOSTA — Sun Records changed the course of music history for the second half of the 20th century and arguably changed the nature of not only American music but the nation itself

So understanding the story of Sun Records may help us better understand certain facets of the country where we live today while listening to the music produced by this iconic rock & roll label is just good American fun.

The musical "Million Dollar Quartet" centers on those yesteryears when Sun and its charismatic producer Sam Phillips discovered, recorded and introduced the world to the songs of Elvis Presley, Johnny Cash, Jerry Lee Lewis, Carl Perkins and others

The nationally touring production of "Million Dollar Quartet" is the third and final show of the Annette Howell Turner Center for the Arts 2014-15 Presenter Series. It will play Feb. 13, 2015, Mathis City Auditorium.

The Presenter Series show synopsis: "Million Dollar Quartet" is "the Tony Award-winning Broadway musical inspired by the electrifying true story of the famed recording session that brought together rock & roll icons Elvis Presley, Johnny Cash, Jerry Lee Lewis and Carl Perkins for the first and only time. 




