# Guitarist plays classic strings at arts center

VALDOSTA — From the moment an uncle placed a steel-string acoustic guitar in 12-year-old Jeff Bianchi's hands, he knew he "wanted to make music my life's work."

Twenty-three years later, Bianchi has made the re-

alization his reality.

Bianchi stops Thursday evening in Valdosta to plays a show billed as a classical guitar concert at the Annette Howell Turner Center for the Arts.

The Atlanta-based musician explained his definition of "classical guitar," or "the Spanish guitar, is simply a type of acoustic guitar with nylon strings. The classical guitar has a wider neck than a

steel-string guitar, along with a warmer sound. Also, with the classical guitar, you don't play with a pick. You play with a combination of your fingernails and flesh.

"I'd say a classical guitarist is someone who plays the classical guitar and it's repertoire; though they may be able to play other instruments and styles."

He promised the arts center audience will hear the resonance and contemplative

nature of the classical guitar.

"I'll be playing music from the Baroque period of music, 1600-1750, as well as some modern works by Heitor Villa-Lobos, Brazil; Jose Luis Merlin, Argentina; and William Lovelady, England," Bianchi said. "All of these works are very colorful in sound and will present a wide range of emotions."

Prior to discovering guitar via the steel-string from his uncle's attic, Bianchi said he'd been intrigued with the instrument as young as 6 or 7 years old.

A year after starting acoustic lessons, the teenaged Bianchi picked up the elec-

tric guitar.

"After getting a hold of an electric guitar, I put a band together. We started playing small gigs at parties and at our at school," he said. "We were starting to play clubs by the time we graduated from high school. I still play the electric guitar today. I play with a 10-piece R&B show band during the weekends when I'm not on the road."

By 16, he said he wanted to study guitar at college.

"It was suggested to that I try studying the classical guitar, as that was one way to formally study music at the college level. I had reservations at first, but I enrolled in the Hochestein School of Music, Rochester, N.Y., and tried a few lessons," Bianchi said.

"Right off the bat, I really liked the instrument. I felt it was the right path to further my education in music. In my senior year of high school, I was accepted to the music program at the State University of

New York at Fredonia. I studied with James Piorkowski who was a member of the world famous Buffalo Guitar Quartet. I received a fantastic education during my four years there."

After graduation, Bianchi moved to At-

lanta.

He played in a rock band while playing classical guitar in small venues.

He eventually got his break, playing electric guitar, touring with a country band. Bianchi learned much about being a professional musician during this period, be said

Taking what he learned on the road, he began building a solo career with his clas-

sical guitar.

"I realized it was an instrument that you could easily take anywhere and play for a wide range of audiences," he said. "I started playing small shows in Georgia and gradually started playing farther and farther away from home. A couple years later, I was playing as far away as Texas. A couple years after that, I was boarding airplanes to play shows as far away as Wyoming. It just kept snowballing after that. I enjoy giving these concerts and can see doing this permanently."

He arranged the Valdosta show while seeking a place for a stopover concert on the way to prescheduled gigs in Florida. He called the arts center and was booked.

"I've never played in Valdosta before," Bianchi said, "so I'm excited about this concert." y, July 8, 2015

# Turner Center offers bike workshop

VALDOSTA — Turner Center for the Arts hosted a Community Bicycle Repair Workshop Saturday morning with Artist-in Residence Joel Dion.

Dion's affinity for bikes goes back years to when he worked at the Tallahassee bicycle shop, Krank It Up.

"The idea was to fix bikes and get bikes to people who needed them, to educate people and to keep some of the old, rusty components to build sculptures."

Participants in the workshop learned the basics of bicycle repair and maintenance—brakes, tires, gears, chains, etc.

One of the participants who attended the workshop was Holly Roddenberry, an arts student at Valdosta State University.

"After my bike was stolen, I wanted to get another," said Roddenberry, who used her bike to get to class before it was stolen.

"I learned a lot about bikes today, things I didn't know. Now I know what I need to do: how to fix my chain, how to tighten my brakes, how to pump my tires."

# Don Penny discusses art of ages

VALDOSTA — Nearing 80, Don Penny cannot manhandle the raw clay and the massive three-dimensional ceramics as easily as he has in years

Still, he creates monolithic archetypes that impress the duality of nature's contrasting indomitable fragility within humanity's need for totemic symbols.

The motion of water etched into the fabric of an abstract baptismal font. A line of shacks on a country horizon inspires a cubist spine. The seismic geology of mind meeting nature.

He forges his work -"hot, man, hot," as Penny says, firing his rustic Lowndes County studio's kiln to upward of 2,000 degrees Fahrenheit, blast furnace heat he endures even on the hottest of

South Georgia days. Even sturdy pieces crack in such heat. They can shatter.

Yet, the idea endures for another day, for another try. If the artist endures, his work will en-

dure. If the art endures, the artist can reach some level of immortality.

Penny will discuss his life and work as an artist

next week during a gallery talk to accompany his ongoing exhibit, "Continuum," in the Price-Campbell Foundation

Gallery of the Annette Howell Turner Center for the Arts.

Mortality and the legacy of his art have been on his mind. They are part of the themes of "Continuum."

"That's really your immortality," Penny said, walking through the gallery.

An artist makes a mark on a piece of paper today. In 50 years or 100 years, when someone sees that piece of paper, the artist may be gone, but he continues speaking to anyone who sees his mark.

Penny is not finished making his mark.

Prior to the opening of the Turner Center exhibit, a rumor spread it would be Penny's last show.

Not true. As "Continuum" suggests, the arts center show is the latest exhibit. By no means his last show.

Raised in Atlanta, Penny's father drew. Son emulated dad. People complimented young Don Penny's artwork, which encouraged him. But he didn't initially consider art as

# Picking Up the Pieces

Center tells the lost-and-found story of Stockton pottery

VALDOSTA — Shimuel Timmerman and Glover Foreman approached pottery from a business perspective.

Scribbling the numeral "5" on the side of a five-gallon clay jug may look rustic chic to the modern eye, but it was as practical to late 19th and early 20th sensibilities as the "5 Gal." wording stamped on the mass-produced, plastic gas cans of the 21st century.

A reinforced neck may look aesthetically pleasing, but it ensured that the use and reuse of cork stoppers did not damage the jug. The rimmed opening of a jar may appear decorative, but it ensured a looped string would stay in place as it fastened a

piece of cloth in covering the opening.

The stamp "J.P. Cox, Madison, Fl.," speaks of some mystery from the past, but it was likely placed on a merchant jug so the vessel could be returned to the business of J.P. Cox in Madison, Fla., when its contents had been emptied.

A list of numbers reveals some arcane arithmetic down the side of one jug, but it is likely an "end of day jug" or "tally jug" denoting how many pieces had been fired on some given day between 1880 through 1910 in the two potteries once housed in Stockton in what is now Lanier County. Apparently, 504 pieces were fired on the day this tally jug was fired.

"The staff does not have the ability to go out and review, every year, 48,000 pieces of property in the county," Hill said. "If they did, the expense would be enormous and nobody would be in favor of it."

VALDOSTA — Walking into the Withlacoochee Quilters Guild show at the Annette Howell Turner Center for the Arts, a visitor almost wishes it were winter.

Large, thick, all-embracing quilts hang from the gallery walls. Despite the heat outside, the quilts tempt a visitor to curl up under one and take a long winter's nap.

Almost. It's not winter.

The temperatures outside push near 100 degrees. As much as the quilts beckon, a viewer will avoid the temptation to snuggle because it's just too hot.

Which may be why the arts center presents such an array of wonderful quilts in August every other year. The heat will keep people from wrapping themselves in the quilts.

While these quilts are indeed functional, they are presented at the arts center solely for their form. On a bed, a quilt is both art and blanket. On a gallery wall, a quilt is intended as art.

Visitors will find designs that fit the immediate expectations of quilts. Plaid works, kaleidoscopic designs, patchwork pieces of different materials, pied colors of a rainbow squared.
