- Song se-VALDOSTA lection is key to the success of the ongoing "American Soundtrack" series.

While promoting "American Soundtrack Volume III: A Musical Celebration," which opens next weekend, Vegas performer Tom Jones some how enters the conversation.



Poet John Griffin returns to read from 'Meltdown' Thursday, September 10, 2015

VALDOSTA — John Charles Griffin has come a long way since making up the words to songs while riding as a child with his daddy on the family farm's John Deere tractor.

He has published a book of poetry. Saturday evening, Griffin will read from his poetry collection, "After the Meltdown." The book was published by Valdosta-based publisher Snake Nation Press.

The reading is scheduled to include father-and-son musicians Wilby and Justin Coleman and Macon guitarist/fiddler Randy Wesson playing music, Griffin said.

"I will be reading a few of my narrative and lyrical poems, telling a few stories about their origins," Griffin said, "Depending on the mood of the attendees, I might even sing a song or two. I'll go out on a limb and guarantee an entertaining evening."

Growing up on a Hahira farm, Griffin said he remembers the bookmobile traveling along Coppage Road where grandparents Howard and Carrie Mae Griffin lived.

"I was inspired by 'Robinson Crusoe' and 'Frog Went a Courtin.' Later in junior high school, I became a hippie wanna-be rock star and began listening to Bob Dylan, Jim Morrison, and Joni Mitchell who were poets, too," Griffin said. "Their lyrics left a mark and I caught the writing bug and it's been that way ever since, being around high achievers in the music industry has further evolved my drive to become an author."

A 1972 Lowndes High School graduate, Griffin left Valdosta with the military. He attended Valdosta State, graduating in 1984. He took a sales job in Atlanta and traveled throughout the Southeast.

He now lives in Macon, where he is on the board of trustees at the Allman Brothers Band Museum at The Big House.

"I've had the privilege of traveling to many of their concerts and have personally known them for more than 10 years,' Griffin said of the Allman Brothers. "I serve on the fundraising committee and help promote the museum both locally and places afar."

In his poetry, Griffin said he has been raged by singer-songwriter Steve



"Meltdown" is his first book. "Most of the poems were written during the past four or five years," Griffin

more diverse than most casual listeners, and even some long-time listeners. realize.

"The banjo is an instrument with African origins and is an integral part of any bluegrass band," Eason said. "Bill Monroe. the 'Father of Bluegrass.' loved blues music and used it in many of his recordings. There is a strong Scotch-Irish influence due to those immigrating to the Appalachians in the early 1800s. Through this event, I believe everyone will walk away learning something new about this truly American musical genre."

Bluegrass music changed Eason's life.

A few years ago, Eason joined the North Florida Bluegrass Association.

There, she learned members were presenting instructional and entertaining bluegrass programs to public school students.

The Florida experience gave her the idea for the Bluegrass Expo for Kids in Valdosta, Eason contacted Cheryl Oliver, Turner Center executive director, and the expo was born.

Yet, Eason's commitment to music and teaching music runs deeper than an annual event.

She left a full-time job to teach music part-time at Remerton music store Ben Owens Music.

"That has given me a greater desire to influence children to learn an instrument, whether it be joining the school band or taking private lessons.' Eason said. "It does take

practice and dedication. but the rewards are a lifetime of joy through music."

For the expo, participants may arrive any time during the program but Eason encourages people to arrive early for the full program.

"We will have presentations by the musicians explaining each instrument as well as playing some traditional songs as a group," she said, "and best of all, we'll have children performing during the program."

In addition to Eason, the program features South Georgia and North Florida musicians Martin Feagle, Andy Patterson. Karen Goines, Brandon Taylor, Spencer Jones and Rod Casev.

The "instrument petting zoo" means musicians allow participants to hold and try the sounds from bluegrass instruments such as the bass, dobro, guitar, banjo, mandolin and fiddle, said Mary Ann Eason, a musician and event organizer.

tunity to hold and/or strum an instrument with the assistance of the musicians," Eason said. "The upright bass will be the exception due to its size, but they can stand in front of it and pluck it. This is a very important part of the event because it gives the children a hands-on experience with various instruments, some of which they've probably never seen before."

For many of the children, the expo is not only an introduction to the instruments but to bluegrass music.

"We had an excellent turn-out for

last year's event, and the positive feedback from the parents was tremendous," Eason said. "Many children have never heard of bluegrass music, in part because it is not played on many radio stations currently, but children have access to Internet radio now. My hope is that they would want to give bluegrass a try once they've learned about it and had an opportunity to hear it."

Bluegrass is a music form far


