



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University life inspired Hull's 'A Sip of Death',

VALDOSTA - "The Grievance Collectors: A Sip of Death" may well be the perfect read for mystery readers on a fall afternoon in a university town.

Especially given "A Sip of Death" is written by a Valdosta State University administrator who knows both the intrigue of campus politics and how to spin a great tale.

Author Karla M. Hull of Valdosta will sign copies of "A Sip of Death" Monday evening at the Annette Howell Turner Center for the Arts.

"I am intimately familiar with all aspects of university life," Hull said. "Most novels about universities are written from the perspective of a student or faculty member. I have incorporated those perspectives but added the perspective of upper administration with all of the power and political agendas that influence decisions that are made on a campus."

Hull has lived in Valdosta since 1996. She has served at VSU as a professor, chair of two Dewar College of Education departments, interim dean of the graduate school, dean of the Dewar College of Education, and interim provost.

She has been married for 39 years to Thomas Gor-

man and has two grown daughters, Teresa and Jennifer.

"Currently, I am teaching in the department of curriculum, leadership and technology, and working with doctoral students whose dissertations focus on leadership and higher education issues." Hull said.

Her fictional Harrison University isn't informed solely by her career at VSU. She has taught and been an administrator at seven universities in states including Arizona, California and Vermont. Her Harrison University is set in the South.

"A Sip of Death" centers on a newly appointed provost who has also become a recent widow following the murder of her husband. In addition to administrative problems she encounters on campus, she becomes deeply involved in a mysterious trilogy of deaths at Harrison. She creates an authentic atmosphere while developing the tension of a thriller.

Hull combined her campus experiences with her love for mysteries to create "A Sip of Death," which she said will be the first in a series of books called "The Grievance Collectors."

"I have always loved reading mysteries and several times during my academic career I encountered individuals that exhibited





sociopathic behaviors," Hull said. "Several times I thought I should write about this but I didn't. After serving as the interim provost when VSU experienced its first murder, I became acutely aware of the vulnerabilities of a campus community. Finally, I decided it might be good to share some of the slimy political maneuvers that occur in

every university. The Ivory Tower is not pure."


Still, she warns readers they should not look for VSU people as characters in the book.

"This is a work of fiction but many readers have commented that they 'know' who the characters are." Hull said. "That speaks to the universal nature of my characters.



Readers who enjoy the book can look for the return of several of the characters in the next "Grievance Collectors" volume. "Dead Day." Hull is writing the book now and hopes it will be ready for publication in summer 2016.


"The title 'The Grievance Collectors' was inspired by my observation that many professors and students collect grievances and allow those painful memories to haunt them in a way that negatively impacts their ability to function," Hull said. "And with the apparent increase in mass shootings, the FBI has added Grievance Collector as a category of killers."


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Alan Thicke coming to Valdosta for Christmas musical
