

## Fill-a-Truck campaign fights regional hunger

VALDOSTA — September is Hunger Action Month and the community is working to combat hunger in South Georgia.

The Third Annual Fill-a-Truck for Hunger campaign kicked off last week hosted by Second Harvest of South Georgia and Southeastern Credit Union. Event organizers challenged the community to fill an entire truck with food donations and if achieved, Southeastern will donate a second truckload of food. "If the community is successful in meeting that fill-a-truck goal, Southeastern will donate a second truckload of food to the food bank," said Courtney Gooding, assistant vice president of marketing. "That's two truckloads,

"That's two truckloads, or 40,000 pounds of food, which will help provide more than 26,000 meals for those in need right here in our community."

Eliza McCall of Second Harvest said South Georgia suffers harshly from food insecurity, but the monthlong event aims to help.

"The primary goal for this campaign is to raise awareness, food and funds for the issue of hunger in South Georgia," she said. "People think this is a third world country or an urban problem. This is not. Rural hunger is a huge issue.

# Glass by Grace Center shows woman's collection

VALDOSTA — The Annette Howell Turner Center for the Arts has a unique show.

It features the glass works of artist Bill Slade collected by Grace Hilton.

Collection shows are not unusual. Such exhibits often feature works by several artists collected by a person.

At the Turner Center, the exhibit shares how one woman collected glassware from one artist.

Grace Bealey Halter "was quite the character and had a way of making strangers her friends," according to information provided to the arts center by her family. "Her favorite reply to have a good day was 'Every day is a good day."

Born in the 1920s in St. Marys, she loved visiting Fernadina Beach, Fla. Three of her children were born in Fernandina. She had two more children after moving to Valdosta in 1955.

But she always returned to Fernandina, especially for the Shrimp Festival, for more than 40 years.

Each festival, she visited the glass vending booth of Slade. Each year, Slade created a glasswork especially for Halter.

she collected from him were some of her most prized possessions," according to the family.

Slade recalls meeting Hilton in 1984 and developing a friendship.

"She had an eye, for objects of beauty, and for people," Slade said via an artistic statement. "She walked up to my glass display on Centre Street and

told me I make beautiful things. Juggling three or four pieces in her hands at one time, her comment was, 'I just can't make up my mind. I will take all of them.' We talked for a bit, and off she went. I don't remember who she was with. I had been Graced."

The next year she returned to his Shrimp Festival display. She asked if Slade remembered her. He hemmed a bit. Kinda ... "Two hours later, I had learned her life history, met her relatives, been given a paperclip angel, a shrimp pin and a friend dressed in purple for the next 30odd years," Slade said.

Slade said he never considered the collection of glassworks she amassed during the 30-plus years of visits.

But seeing the number of pieces in the Annette Howell Turner Center for the Arts, Grace Halter had quite the collection of Slade's glass.

"Oh by the way, Grace loved purple — the purple lady — and we always tried to make something with purple in it for her," Slade said. "Unique, one of a kind would be how I describe Grace Hilton. Thanks for taking me into a small part of your world."
