



Deadline nears for discount tickets

VALDOSTA — The deadline for discounted Presenter Series season tickets is nigh.

The Annette Howell Turner Center for the Arts Presenter Series offers three shows for the 2016-17 season. Deadline for the early bird season tickets is 4 p.m. Friday, Oct. 14, said Cheryl Oliver, arts center executive director.

The early season package is \$100. After 4 p.m. Friday, the regular season package will cost \$129; individual show, \$49 each, said Nancy Warren, Presenter Series chairman.

The arts center has scheduled three shows for the 2016-17 Presenter Series: "The Aluminum Show," Nov. 3; "With Love from Broadway," Feb. 14; "Saturday Night Fever," March 20. All three productions will be staged at Mathis City Auditorium, 2300 N. Ashley St.

— "The Aluminum Show": The season opener marks a return for the family-friendly show. The nationally touring "Aluminum Show" played as a Presenter Series show nearly a decade ago. The 2015

Synopsis: "The story centers around one man's incredible journey to a parallel universe — a futuristic planet made entirely of aluminum which comes to life right before your very eyes, transforming into imaginary, mysterious and playful characters."



Creators: 'Aluminum Show' shimmers

VALDOSTA - For audiences who attended the first "Aluminum Show" several years ago, creators claim the latest production is more like "Aluminum Story."

The first "Aluminum Show" played Valdosta in 2011. The Israeli writer and director said audiences who attended the show then can expect something new now.

"If someone has seen the show in its original version, they still can expect to be amazed by the visual, but as the former version was more about high-speed, amazing numbers, using original music with lots of percussion, this time the show has more of a plot," said Lior Kalfo, writer and director of the new "Aluminum Show."

The synopsis provided by the arts center: "The story centers around one man's incredible journey to a parallel universe — a futuristic planet made entirely of aluminum which comes to life right before your very eyes, transforming into imaginary, mysterious and playful characters."

That said, Kalfo said it is challenging explaining the show to people who have not seen it.

"The show brings the material, the music and the artists together on stage in a magical, mystery-filled creation combining visual theater, dance, and humor into an exciting, multi-sensory experience," he said. "It's definitely not puppetry. It's mainly composed of dancing and special effects. The dancers are sometimes dressed

with costumes and more often dressed with aluminum pipes, giving them life through movement and brilliant choreography by IdoTadmor – one of Israel's most famous dancers and choreographers."

All of the dancers are from Israel. The dancers find performing in the "Aluminum Show" both liberating and challenging, one dancer said.

Liran Chernov said the show is liberating because dancers are given a choreographic outline but have great latitude in developing how they perform the dances. A rare opportunity in a touring show, he said.

The production can be confining because dancers wear costumes of aluminum tubes, boxes and other accessories. In some cases, multiple dancers are inside of the same costume.

Chernov said a dancer must not only be aware of his steps and the movements of other dancers but the placement of the aluminum piece he's wearing in relation to his body and the location of other dancers in their aluminum pieces.

Chernov was speaking via phone prior to a performance in Houston, Texas. He and five other Israeli dancers are spending six weeks touring the United States. "The Aluminum Show" tours internationally

He said many audiences are surprised after the show that only six dancers create the world seen on stage. "It's a very special show, unique," Chernov said. "A fantasy show that lets audiences use their imagination. It works all over the world. Different languages do not matter."

Kalfo said, "Audiences can expect an hour of 'Alice in Wonderland'-like feeling, entering a magical and alien world, forgetting their everyday problems and awakening their inner child again, alongside with their real children beside them."

As the writer and director, he said creating a new show is always challenging but "the challenge is doubled trying to create a new version of a show which won such great reviews and the love of the audience."

Kalfo said he was an au-

dience member for the first "Aluminum Show." He said the show thrilled him.

Ilan Azriel was the original creator of the show.

"He was fascinated by those materials, searching and developing great ideas from pipes. He explored the aluminum for many years and still is exploring from the eye angle of a 6-year-old kid keeping the innocent approach to keep the inspiration flowing," Kalfo said. "That was my own connection to the project as it is the way I see the world."

As Kalfo developed his work with different materials, he met Azriel.

"I was approached by Ilan to join the journey of the new aluminum adventure," Kalfo said. "I gladly jumped on the wagon."



VALDOSTA — New musicians open a Christmas guitar concert for a man considered a guitar maestro later in the week at the Annette Howell Turner Center for the Arts.

Sam Pacetti, a St. Augustine, Fla.-based musician, returns to the arts center.

Before he takes the stage, students studying with The Hal & Jill Project will perform.

The project teaches youths 12-18 years old to play the guitar. The Hal & Jill Project is for the youth who wants to pick up a guitar but may have no other opportunity to learn the instrument, said Cheryl Oliver, arts center executive director.

Oliver founded The Hal & Jill Project this year.

The program is named for her children: Hal Johnson and Jill Johnson.

Jill was 3 1/2 years old when she died in a 1974 car wreck.

Hal died in late January. He had been diagnosed with cancer only weeks earlier. He was 47 years old.

Hal Johnson was a musician. He played music, wrote songs and performed throughout his life.

His love for music will continue Friday evening when The Hal & Jill Project students perform.

They open for another man known for his love of music, especially the guitar: Sam Pacetti.

early 2000s. In some ways, in some circles, it feels like he's still part of the area music scene.

Some musicians who either live in Valdosta or have ties to South Georgia regularly mention Pacetti in reference to his influence, talent or friendship.

Though he has received numerous stellar reviews for what is described as his American/ British songwriting and his guitar abilities, Pacetti described himself in an interview earlier this year as "a non-musician musician. A reluctant artist. I play but I never set a lot of stock in what I do. ... I stay practical about it."

Pacetti referred repeatedly to making and performing music as "the work." He applies discipline, time and effort to his craft.

He does not care for self promotion. He said he could have a bigger career. He has mostly quit touring preferring to play St. Augustine and North Florida venues.

And now, with his second concert in 2016, Valdosta.



A nnette Crosby titled her ongoing gallery exhibit "Journeys" for two reasons.

"I love to travel and often use photos of the animals and people as an inspiration for a starting point of beginning the painting," she said. "... Also it is always (a) constant journey with the layering process and how each painting is resolved."

But "Journeys" could easily describe her development as an artist.

Visit the exhibit in the Sallie & Harmon Boyette Gallery at the Annette Howell Turner Center for the Arts. Crosby's canvases explode with colors or find stark contrasts in black and white, or varying shades of grays, intricate brushwork, startling and thought-provoking compositions. She has developed an abstract, emotive style that is rhythmic in essence, complex in nuance.

The exhibit runs through Jan. 4 at the arts center, 527 N. Patterson St.

As noted in an artistic statement, "Annette Crosby's work creates visual interest by using texture and subtle variations in shape and color. When starting a painting, she begins intuitively after texturing the canvas or paper followed by making marks and lines with both paint and pencil. She uses gestural lines in her work to create active, energetic designs and organic shapes. Annette completes her works by using hand-stained and painted papers, along with other surprising pieces of her palette."

Crosby describes her painting as "intuitive abstract visual language."

She also views her approach to painting as similar to taking a journey. She has an idea of where she wants to go but she doesn't know exactly what she will find.

"Working in mixed media pencils, crayons, paint and collage, layering and reworking textured surfaces and the endless possibilities of never knowing the end result," she said. "I am always open to changes and new directions as things progress."

Her interest in art began as a

"From a very early age, I have been fascinated by and interested in art," Crosby said in an artistic statement. "The early mentoring I received from my high school art teachers encouraged me to pursue the development of my artistic talents in both undergraduate and graduate art education studies. After earning a BFA in art education from Valdosta State University, I completed my MEd in elementary education."

Crosby has won a wide array of awards for her paintings, both in the Valdosta area and in shows in other locations.

Though her work is on display into early 2017 at the arts center, patrons can regularly see Crosby's paintings at Artists on Ashley where she is a partner artist.

VALDOSTA — Hollywood was shaken Tuesday as Alan Thicke, best known for his role as Dr. Jason Seaver on the show "Growing Pains," died of a sudden heart attack.

The Canadian native's death was confirmed Tuesday evening by the LA Times who spoke with Thicke's son, singer Robin Thicke.

Thicke was an actor, writer, producer and composer who wrote several popular television theme songs including "Facts of Life" and "Diff'rent Strokes."

He'd recently starred in the premiere episode of "This Is Us" and made an appearance on the show "Fuller House," with his last tweet on the day of his death reading "Season 2 Fuller House looking good. I even like the ones I'm not in!"

Unable to meet Thicke prior to the show, my first time coming face to face with the sitcom star was midline on stage in front of a sold out auditorium.


However nerve wracking that may seem, his character seemed to perfectly reflect that sitcom dad persona that fans have come to know and love from Thicke.

I felt as though if I'd stumbled through a line, he'd have stopped the show to give me a motivational pep talk over some tea in a poorly decorate 80's kitchen.

Although I can't speak beyond my own experiences, I know that after the show, Thicke went into the lobby of Mathis City Auditorium, greeting attendees and taking photos with fans. While is may seem like

a small gesture, there was no requirement for Thicke to greet people, yet there he was: Dr. Seaver greeting the fans of Valdosta. The 69 year old is sur-

vived by his wife, three children and the millions of those who felt like children of Thicke's characters.
