## Local author fulfills passion

VALDOSTA — For a local author, a childhood passion is translated through literature.

During a book signing at Annette Howell Turner Center for the Arts, author Eleanor Howard shared tales of her admiration for writing while her autobiographical narrative "A Time of Love" and her children's book, "Mrs. Howard's Favorite Stories," sat on display.

"I love to write, even when I was in grade school," she said. "I used to write little stories for my sisters and me, and we'd act them out."

The love for literature directed Howard to becom-

ing a school teacher for 25 years and a reading specialist for five years.

Her first published book, "A Time of Love." depicts the memory of her time spent with her late husband, Bill Howard, in Germany following World War II "I tell stories about the relationship with Germans and Germans with the relationship with us." she said.

Bill and Eleanor Howard were stationed in Germany during the era of the Berlin Airlift when the Soviets established a blockade around Berlin, but the Americans and Brits defiantly flew supplies to the Berliners despite the Soviet blockade.

During the airlift era, Bill Howard was killed when his plane and another collided. Bill was 27 years old.

One of Howard's former second-grade students inspired her to create her children's book, she said.

"('Laura Morrow and the Green Grapes') was the first one that I wrote, and it was a story that I just told the children," she said.

During her conversation with the former student, Howard said she asked her what she remembered about the second grade.

"Without hesitation, she said 'that little book you wrote called 'Laura Morrow and the Green Grapes," she said. "I decided if that person could remember a book from childhood up to adulthood, I think I ought to write some of these stories."

"Mrs. Howard's Favorite Stories" is a collection geared toward children that features three short stories: "Laura Morrow and the Green Grapes," "Miss Daylily" and "Noche."

Illustrator Bob Brabham of Valdosta created the visual artistry to complement Howard's tales, which consists of 52 illustrations.

Having known Howard for 28 years, he said he thinks a lot of her and would agree to work with her again.

"She's a smart lady, and she likes fun stuff, and I think the book's going to be successful for her." he said.

During the signing,

taught Godwin in the second grade at Sallas Mahone
Elementary School.





VALDOSTA – Andrew Sabori has been everywhere and now he's in the Annette Howell Turner Center for the Arts.

The final days of the muralist's "Coming to America: The Immigrant Experience" are ongoing in the center's Josette's Gallery.

Sabori has designed 1960s posters touting the Grateful Dead, Jefferson Airplane, Janis Joplin for concerts at the Fillmore West. He's painted murals in Las Vegas, Los Angeles, Lake Tahoe, Reno, throughout Florida, Augusta, 1996 Olympics in Atlanta, James Brown's office, New Jersey, Asbury Park, New York, Broadway, Julliard, the Apollo Theatre.

And he resurrected a Great Depression mural that was once displayed inside of a building on Ellis Island.

Learning of the lost Ellis Island mural by artist Edward Laning, Sabori set out to copy it.

He visited Ellis Island to seek his family's American roots. He discovered a black-and-white photograph of Laning's lost mural.

Laning painted the mural in 1935, Sabori said in a 2016 interview. It was painted as part of the Works Progress Administration programs during the Great Depression.

The mural was exhibited in a portion of Ellis Island rarely visited by the public. A storm collapsed a roof, damaging the mural. By the 1950s, the mural was gone.

The photograph revealed a mural dedicated to the importance of immigrants in America.

Titled "The Role of Immigrants in the Industrial Development of America," the mural illustrated

immigrants as miners, railroad workers, going west, working in fields and foundries, getting off the boats, Sabori said.

The mural represented people from numerous nations who came to America and became part of the nation's fabric.


Based on the photograph and research, working with assistants, Sabori re-created the mural. His wife kept him inspired and ensured he stayed true to the mission.

"She would say, you're painting like you instead of Laning," Sabori said. "I had to go back and repaint the area in Laning's style."

Since its completion, the mural has been displayed in several venues.

"Immigrants have been involved in every aspect of American history," Sabori said in 2016. "The mural has a lot of history in it."

Sabori has also refurbished the three-dimensional murals in Lakeland.

### Actor likes challenge of 'Amazing Grace'

VALDOSTA — Talent, and maybe a bit of grace, has actor Jacob Shipley already playing the lead in a nationally touring musical after only graduating with a theatre degree last spring.

Shipley plays John Newton, the lead character in the tour of the Broadway show "Amazing Grace." The musical is scheduled to play South Georgia, 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, Jan. 30, Mathis City Auditorium, 2300 N. Ashley St.

The show began its current national tour last week, Shipley said in a phone interview hours before performing in the show at a stop in Muncie, Ind. He graduated in May 2017 from Ithaca College in New York State.

With only a few performances under his belt, he said he is not yet tired of the tour bus and is enjoying the challenge of playing Newton.

Before being converted and composing the beloved "Amazing Grace," Newton was a slave trader. A man who was irreverent and godless.

"For most of the show, the audience should hate him," Shipley said of Newton. "He was a bad man most of his life. It is challenging and exciting to play a character who goes through these changes and finds redemption.

"The challenge is to get the audience to hate me during the first part of the show then turn them around to liking me by the end of it."

The 2017-18 Presenter Series opened in November with "50 Years of Rock & Roll." The season concludes April 23 with the Tony Award-winning musical "A Gentleman's Guide to Love & Murder."



## Times facility home to new art

VALDOSTA — The moon now rises alongside West Central Avenue thanks to the new public art piece "Moon Motion" constructed by artist Hanna Jubran.

The moon's vertical and diagonal movement is represented through a bright orange color while the blue is reminiscent of rain.

"This is part of a series that I'm dealing with, moonlight, sun ray, celestial motion, and that's all my work, the planetary system as well as heavenly bodies and how they interact with each other," Jubran said.

The nine-foot piece was

positioned Thursday afternoon in front of The Valdosta Daily Times print facility, and it took about one month of designing, painting and welding for creation. Jubran said.

It will be stationed for one year, said Steve Lahr, public art advisory committee member.

"If we were to buy it, we'd probably relocate it because we want to build a bigger piece out there (closer to the bypass) to welcome people into Valdosta," he said.

Bruce Smith, public art advisory committee member, said the sculpture's size aided the decision to utilize it.

"This is considered one of the gateway locations to the new arts district, and so we wanted something with a little bit of mass and a little bit of color that snapped and popped and caught people's eye and this one seemed to be the most eye catching and the right scale for the location." he said.

Jubran has been making public art for 30 years, he said, including outdoor exhibition, indoor exhibition, commission and other large-scale work though this is his first public piece for Valdosta.

Lahr said the painter was one of 17 artists who submitted a combined total of 48 pieces for consideration. He became one of the three finalists after the committee voted.

Lahr said four more pieces of public artwork will be revealed later in the year, adding to the 11 sculptures that have already been placed around the city. The public art includes the red pol-heart in front of City Hall.

Jubran said he hopes the public enjoys "Moon Motion," and said he is satisfied with the new home of his masterpiece.

"It's a nice location, it's the perfect location; people coming from the highway entering into town looking at the piece. I'm very pleased with that," he said.
