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# Remembering Loyce Turner

Veterinarian. Public servant. State senator. Veteran. Banker. Philanthropist.

What reads like a table full of people were really some of the facets of one man.

Loyce Turner.

A man who brought a lot to the table for South Georgia for decades. He had a public career that lasted nearly 40 years.

In 1974, he was elected state senator and represented Lowndes County and surrounding counties for the next 24 years. An appointment to the state Natural Resources board followed and he served 13 years as a board member under three Georgia governors.

Turner led the board as chairman in 2005. As chairman, "Loyce guided the Board to adopt resolutions to approve the purchase of key conservation lands in the River Creek, Altamaha River/Clayhole Swamp, Dawson Forest and Crockford-Pigeon Mountain Wildlife Management Areas and Dukes Ponds Natural Areas," according to a statement from state officials in 2013.

At home, Turner may best be remembered as one of the legislators who forged what was known as the South Georgia legislative delegation of the state representatives and state senator working together; or as a founder of First State Bank & Trust; or as the man who donated the seed money and arranged the deal in honor of his first wife that turned the bank's one-time downtown headquarters into the Annette Howell Turner Center for the Arts; or as the veterinarian who checked on a farmer's livestock from before dawn to after dusk.

Loyce Turner passed away late last week. He was 93 years old.

He was an advocate for South Georgia for far more years and in many more ways than his nearly four decades as a political leader suggest. He was a friend to the region, and even in his passing, South Georgia still benefits from his achievements.

#### Loyce W. Turner

Loyce W. Turner of Valdosta, age 93, died peacefully at home surrounded by family on April 16, 2021.

Loyce was many things to many people veterinarian, farmer, banker, statesman and philanthropist but first and foremost he was a family man. Born December 2, 1927 in Turner county to George Warren Turner and Wille Mae Young Turner, he grew up in Sylvester deciding at age four to be a veterinarian. He attended Auburn University for undergraduate and veterinary school earning his degree in veterinary medicine in 1948. He was so young that he had to wait several months to turn 21 in order to receive his license to practice. He went on to serve as a captain in the U.S. Army Veterinary Corps from 1951-1953.

His marriage to Annette Howell in 1957 put a happy end to his tenure as dashing president of the local bachelor's club and they went on to raise three children. For 43 years Annette worked by his side at his veterinary clinic and at the fat cattle or feeder pig sales, often with the three kids in tow. She accompanied him on countless trips to Atlanta and stood beside him through every step of his life until her death in 2000.

Loyce was deeply committed to his community and instrumental in changes that have helped shape Valdosta. He was one of the founders of First State Bank and Trust and help shepherd the merger with CB&T which went on to become Synovus Financial Services. As Chairman of the Chamber of Commerce and active member of Rotary Club, Farm Bureau, and Christ Episcopal Church, Loyce was a clear choice when a Georgia State Senate seat opened in 1974. He ran and won and held that seat from 1975 1998 when he stepped down due to his wife Annette's illness and subsequent passing. In her memory, he and the Turner family established and provided the seed funds for the Annette Howell Turner Center for the Arts in downtown Valdosta

many anticrime bills and was recognized as an expert in tax and revenue issues. Among the



achievements he held most dear was introducing the legislation that elevated Valdosta State College to University status.

After stepping down from office, Loyce was appointed to the Georgia Department of Natural Resources where he served for 13 years. In 2005 as the Board's Chairman, he focused his attention on the purchase of key conservation lands throughout the state.

During this time, he met his second love, Ingrid Kiernan. They married in 2006 and this ushered in a chapter of travel and adventure. They enjoyed a summer home in Sky Valley, GA with time to golf and garden. Together they journeyed to South Africa on safari, walked the Great Wall of China, strolled the streets, and tasted the foods of Portugal, Germany and France.

At the end of the day, however, Loyce always loved to return to his own farm and home.

He leaves behind his wife, Ingrid Turner of Valdosta; daughter, Sally Turner Querin and former son-in -law, Bill Querin of Valdosta; son and daughter -in-law, Warren & Kelly Turner of Valdosta; daughter, Susan Turner of New York, NY; stepdaughter, Michelle McGreevy of Miami, FL, and sister Lana Jean Norris of Ponte Vedra, FL. Also surviving are several grandchildren, Jessie (Mike) Bolster, Katie Querin, Holly Querin Caroline Turner and Loyce Turner, III; step granddaughters, Kirsten McGreevy, Leah McGreevy and many nieces and nephews. He is preceded in death by his first wife, Annette Howell Turner and a sister Laverne Jeffords. The family will have a

# Former senator Loyce Turner passes

VALDOSTA — Loyce W. Turner often told the story that he discovered he wanted to be a veterinarian as a child and learned how to be a politician in the process.

"I decided to be a veterinarian at 4 years old," Turner said in a 2013 interview, adding, "I learned horse and mule trading with my daddy, which would also be good practice for the state Senate."

In addition to being a state senator, a veterinarian and a veteran, Turner was a state official, a banker and a philanthropist who

gave the initial donation to create the Annette Howell Turner Center for the Arts named for his first wife.

He was also a lifelong advocate of South Georgia.

Turner passed away Friday, April 16.

He spent nearly 40 years in public service.

He served on the state Board of Natural Resources for 13 years, well into his 80s. Prior to being appointed to the Natural Resources board, Turner spent nearly 25 years representing South Georgia as a state senator.

Shortly after his election as s

state senator in 1974, Turner and area state representatives formed the South Georgia legislative delegation, which wielded influence not just for South Georgia but throughout the state.

"Legislation is the art of compromise, and if you can't do that, you can't get anything done," Turner said.

Accomplishment may be the art of balancing dedication and sacrifice.

He served in the Korean War, with the Army Veterinary Corps, entering as a lieutenant in 1951 and being discharged as a captain in 1953.

As a veterinarian, Turner visited area farms and helped with livestock from before the sun rose til past sunset most days.

He was instrumental in founding First State Bank & Trust in Valdosta. He became a chamber president as well as a leader in many other civic organizations.

He and wife Annette raised three children and had several
