
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

Pick-In faces uncertain future

HAHIRA — Sounds of "good ole' bluegrass music coming from the porch" entertained hundreds of fans for the last day Saturday.

Or was it the last time for The Great Hahira Pick-In? Saturday organizers were kept busy with the schedule of pickers and grinners, leaving little time to think about what may become a hard reality in 1995. Loss of corporate and grant support was the reason Hahira Bluegrass Inc. decided to clear the porch after this year, said organizer Wilby Coleman.

Hahira Bluegrass Inc. created the Pick-In 15 years ago, "not for the money, but because it is fun," Coleman said as cloggers rumbled the stage.

Coleman said most people probably came to listen to the music, not just because it might be the last time for the event.

Good music and good friends brought Sharon Dodds of Valdosta to the event for the second time. "We came for the music. But we are disappointed it may not happen again."

Hahira Bluegrass Inc. members are optimistic though. Pick-In T-shirts which sold out early in the day had the slogan "Staying Alive in 95."

Originally a contest among bands, Coleman said the Pick-In was changed to a music showcase because it was hard to get acts for a "music contest." Now, a steady stream of regulars, like the Cross Creek Cloggers and Rocky Mountain Oyster have made many return appearances.

Paul Wales, a longtime member of the Cross Creek Cloggers, got back into clogging shape and returned to the organization after leaving in May 1993 just to participate in the Pick-In.

"I thought a lot about it, that it might be gone...I still care enough to come back," said Wales who was clogging in his eleventh Pick-In this year.

"It's been one of may favorite festivals throughout the years. We've shared so much with the Colemans," Wales said.

One of the big things Wales will miss is creating a special clogging routine done only for the Pick-In and done only once. Each year, a new routine, serious or funny, is created, he said.

The Georgia Assembly enacted Senate Bill 328 in 1991, calling for the creation of Curriculum-Based Assessments (CBAs) to measure reading, mathematics, science, and social studies (health in grades 5-8) which includes process and application skills as assessed in the range of academic content, and exceeds minimum and essential skills. The CBAs are designed to measure a broad range of the state's Quality Core Curriculum (QCC), while reducing the amount of time required.

CBAs are administered in a matrix sampling format. The results are used to evaluate the performance of schools, systems, and the state in relation to the QCC. Results of CBAs are reported as scaled scores which range from 100-225. The State Goal (SG) performance level indicated adequacy.

NORM-REFERENCED TEST (NRT) RESULTS VALDOSTA CITY SCHOOLS • 1993-1994

Norm-referenced tests are administered to students in grades 3, 5, 8, and 11 during the spring in order to obtain information about their performance in comparison to the national sample, as required by the Georgia Quality Basic Education Act (QBE). The Iowa Tests of Basic Skills (ITBS), Form K is used to assess students in grades 3, 5, and 8 in the areas of reading and mathematics.

The Test of Achievement and Proficiency (TAP), Form K is used to assess students in grade 11 in the areas of reading comprehension, written expression, mathematics, social studies, and science. The state requires that a matrix sampling approach be used. Each student in eleventh grade took only one of the above tests.

Grade Equivalents (GE) are used to indicate the grade level at which schools are performing in comparison to the national sample, system, RESA, and Georgia statewide. The first digit represents the grade; the second digit represents the month.

The Georgia High School Graduation assessment was administered to eleventh grade students for the first time in the spring of 1994. Students who entered ninth grade in Georgia high schools after July 1, 1991, must post a passing score of 500 on each part of the Georgia High School Graduation Test (GHSGT) as one requirement for receiving a regular high school diploma.

The Georgia High School Graduation Test assess English/language arts, mathematics and writing. A passing score in social studies will be required in 1996 and for science in 1997. Emphasis is placed on higher order thinking skills.


