



Collages favorite art form for local woman

VALDOSTA — Artist Vanessa Kelly's large collages will be on display at the Lowndes/Valdosta Cultural Arts Center through the end of this month — Black History Month.

Owner and operator of The Crown of Glory Salon here, Mrs. Kelly graduated from Long Beach City College in Long Beach, Calif. She has also received first place honors in the National Hair Show in 1979 in Atlanta and in 1986 in Long

Mrs. Kelly said her favorite area of art is collage. She collects pictures constantly, even though she does not know what she will use them for. She gets her collage ideas through prayer time and then, when the creative mood hits her, she begins on them immediately, although sometimes it takes her as long as a year to complete an entire project

"I especially enjoy doing collages that

express life," said Mrs. Kelly in an interview Tuesday at the Arts Center. "The big collage here is titled 'The Diamonds.' It is a collage on black men and their uniqueness. I call it that because black people originate from Africa and the natural resources of Africa are diamonds and gold. I think black men are like diamonds in the rough.

"The other collage here is titled 'God's Work' and is about the development of life. I believe babies are beautiful and pure. I particularly wanted to include all races of babies because babies have no hang-ups or prejudices like grown-ups."

Mrs. Kelly said the reason it takes her so long to complete a collage is because first, she has to get the idea; second, she immediately goes and gets books on the subject and studies them and starts collecting pictures to use; third,



she studies the pictures and organizes them into categories; and finally, she arranges them on the collage.

"Pictures come to me in the weirdest way sometimes, too," she said. "I'll be somewhere, and one will just jump out at me — like the cover of a book will do in a bookstore. It's real strange and hard to explain, but I never have to look really hard to find the right pictures.

"I have to work when creativity is flowing, too. If I try to work when it's not, it's like having writer's block nothing comes out right. When it does come out though, it's powerful!"



Mrs. Smith said there are also educational benefits for the public — that children find that art is a valued skill.


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

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

He has a total of four paintings on display at The Times building, including "Expulsion from the Garden of Eden," in oil, "People are Strange Gtraps," in oil, "Norwegian Cows (this cow was drawn), in pencil; and "Fish, Fish, Fish," in colored pencils on canson paper. "Expulsion from the Garden of Eder is of course about Adam and Eve," said Wright. "The small amount of grass and barren ground represent the wastlealand to come from this expulsion. The kudzu in the painting, which reoccurs in my other paintings, represents the chaos and uncontrollability of nature as it devours everything. "People are Strange (strange drips)" is exactly what it says. The figure in the front is very strange, even the rock is a little strange. The whole painting's purpose is to give an uneasy feeling. Once again, the barren ground is present, slowly taking over. The two stones in the background represent my son and me."

Wright said "Norwegian Cows (this cow was drawn)" was taken from a photograph that a friend of his took in Norway. He said the part of the title in parenthesis has reference to a Beatles song.

Wright was born in Atlanta and has lived in many small towns throughout Georgia. He graduated from high school in Perry and attended the Art Institute of Fort Lauderdale, Fla. After earning a degree in ad design, he decided that fine arts was his real purpose and started drawing and painting more intensely.

He said he paints most every day, that he's always in the mood to paint but doesn't always have the time. His choice of medium is oils, but he also enjoys watercolors, pencil, pen and ink, sculptures, photography and other various mediums.



Marie Postle Stewart

Marie Postle Stewart was born in San Antonio, Texas, and came to Florida in 1964. She studied at Ringling School of Art in Sarasota and at Florida International University. She finds inspiration through on-site work in the Everglades and in the words of Henry Thoreau: "In the spaces of thought are the reaches of land and water, where [we] go and come. The landscape lies far and fair within, and the deepest thinker is the furthest traveled."

"The prints and paintings of this series play the elusive shadow off against the solidness of everyday objects and hopefully suggest the quiet drama of human presence."







Southern Face, Gregory B. Saunders, powdered graphite on paper, 72" x 94"

John David Hawver




Dorothy D. Greene


Sulphur Twilight, Mark Messersmith, oil, 79" x 97"

Review: 'Heart truths' in 'One Man's Junk'

One Man's Junk by O. Victor Miller, Snake Nation Press, 159 pages, \$11

The new short story collection One Man's Junk by Georgia writer O. Victor Miller is a terrific book containing 10 masterful short stories that will make the reader laugh and cry and ask for more.

Although Miller is an English professor, his stories are not academic. In fact, most are about "good old boys" and the daily struggle to hold body and mind together in a hard and often cruel world. A major part of this life struggle is the endless fight to obtain and then co-exist with the women of their choice, and it is here that Miller especially excels. The setting is usually rural, and the language is a perfect reflection of the speech patterns, vocabulary, phrases, and dialect of South Georgia, of which Miller is a master.

The first story, "The Lost Cause," has as one of the major characters a man named Darby. Originally from Ohio, Darby works at the Firestone tire plant in Albany, where he is trying to learn "cracker," or the local dialect. In the opening scene he comes in to the working class bar called The Lost Cause and shouts the word "Mo!" Not even the natives recognize it until he explains that it means "I'm going to," and then uses it in colorful context to reveal the common technique of ellision. "Mo whip your rearend," he says gleefully, reflecting Miller's love of the language in general and "cracker" and Southern dialect in particular.

But "The Lost Cause" is about more than language. There is all the humor and sorrow of humanity here, which is Miller's main concern. The narrator, who is the bartender of the Lost Cause, is a recovering alcoholic who spends his life serving alcohol. He is hopelessly in love with Nadine, the fortysomething divorced waitress who is immensely sexual and often takes home the customers she waits on. Nadine is "showing some wear, getting long in the tooth, but lordy she can fill up a pair of jeans." Miller is not romantic but so honest and truthful it makes your teeth hurt. Another piece of comic genius is "Cockfight at Red Gulch," a story which combines the brutality of cock fighting with an enormously sad and glorious sexuality described as only Miller can.

Miller knows dogs, cock fighting, hunting, fishing and honky-tonks, but he also knows the human heart, and he explores its depths with unusual sensitivity in this wonderful book. He shows us life in the raw, and he doesn't flinch at what he sees. He treats his characters with the compassion of understanding, never judging or condemning, but allowing their natural dignity to balance whatever human weaknesses they possess. There are "heart truths here," as Yeats would say, and readers will not want to put it down.

Miller will be reading fiction at 8 p.m. Tuesday at the Cultural Arts Center, 1204 N. Patterson St., for the Valdosta State University Reading Series. Lea Pritchett, with the VSU University Relations office, will also be reading. For more information. call (912) 247-ARTS.

Hahira Pick-in April 28-29

HAHIRA — The 16th annual Great Hahira Pick-in will be held April 28-29 in Pick-in Park near Downtown Hahira.

Performances start at 7 p.m. April 28 and noon April 29 with groups from West Virginia to Florida performing in the two-day festival.

"For the 16th straight year, the Cross Creek Cloggers, backed-up by the Wacahooters band, will be performing at the Pick-in," said Wilby Coleman, one of the founders of the Pick-in and president of Hahira Bluegrass, the host musical group of the Pick-in. "This group has been to Russia to perform. They're the best there is.

"Some of the other performers returning this year are Patent Pending, an excellent group from West Virginia; Thin Ice, a local band headed by Andy Patterson; Endless Highway, an award-winning band from Gainesville, Fla.; the Rebelairs, a group led by local musician Bill Smith which performs Civil War songs in Civil War uniforms; and our group, Hahira Bluegrass."

Additional performers include Doug Cloud and County Line Bluegrass of Orlando, Fla.; Smokin' Grass, a group from Atlanta which performs almost all original material and will perform the finale April 29; Clean Break of Orange Park, Fla., which is making its first appearance at the festival; and Charlie Cline & The Lonesome Pine Fiddlers.

"All of the groups will be performing three times each during the two-

day festival except Hahira Bluegrass and the Rebelairs," said Coleman. "The Rebelairs will perform only once on Saturday night, and Hahira Bluegrass will do only one set late Saturday afternoon.

"This group consists of my children — 'Miss' Wilby Wolfson and Chris and Justin Coleman — and Andy Patterson, Reed Odom and myself."

Tickets prices are \$8 at the gate April 28 and \$11 at the gate April 29. An advance special weekend ticket for \$16 is available at Sandy Campbell Music and the Cultural Arts Center, 1204 N. Patterson St., in Valdosta and 1st American Drugs in Hahira. Children 12 and under are free with a paid adult.
