he Lowndes/Valdosta Arts Commission opens its 1995-96 Presenter Series with Big Orange, a 65-voice barbershop vocal group performing at 8 p.m. Thursday at Mathis Municipal Auditorium.







'Five **Guys** Named Moe' coming Mathis

he Lowndes/Valdosta Arts Commission is bringing the choreographed musical "Five Guys Named Moe" to Mathis Municipal Auditorium for one night of song and dance Time magazine called "an absolutely joyful experi-

ence

Opening on Broadway in 1992, the show is still running.

Charles Augins, the show's choreographer, won London's Olivier Award for Best Choreographer, and the show won for Outstanding Entertainment of the year.

The main character, Nomax, is listening to a late-night blues show, reflecting on his romantic life, which had taken a recent downward turn after he forgot his girlfriend's birthday.

Leaping out of the radio and into Nomax's room are a quintet of guys, each named Moe, as the title implies. Wearing rainbow-colored zoot suits, the five Moes, (No Moe, Little Moe, Big Moe, Four-Eyed Moe and Eat Moe) act as singing guardian angels for the love sick Nomax

Besides the dancing, audiences get to feast

their eyes on the elaborate sets featuring stylized skylines and dancers.

Providing the music for the two dozen songs performed by the Moes and Nomax will be a five-piece ensemble performing the music of Louis Jordan. That music is an integral part of the performance, as there is little dialogue involved, just enough to connect the songs.

In fact, the musical is named after one of Jordan's songs. Maybe that's one of the reasons why they are on stage with the performers rather than out of sight in a pit in front of the stage.

Jordan's music became known as "jump blues," and he was a key figure in the development of rhythm and blues. The late Jordan and his alto sax hold the record for top 10 rhythm and blues hits, with 55.

Jordan songs like "Is You Is Or Is You Ain't "Ma' Baby?," "Let The Good Times Roll" and "Messy Bessy" fuel the performance, and the resultant mixture of dancing and music has been known to get crowds out of their chairs.

Director and Choreographer Charles Augins is a three-time winner of best choreography awards, the Olivier award, NAACP Theatre Award and the L.A. Theatre Ovation Award. Augins was also nominated for best director for the same awards. When he was 9, a recreational tap-dancing class made him an early fan of Fred Astaire and Gene Kelly. From there, he went into professional dance

Angelo Adkins (Four-Eyed Moe) has per-formed in "Law & Order," "Carlito's Way" and

formed in "Law & Order," "Carito's way and in several musical productions, including "Hair," "West Side Story" and "Oklahoma!" Thierry Laurence (Eat Moe) has toured Europe with "Hair" and "Broadway Musicals." He's also appeared on "Cosby Mysteries" and "The 1992 Miss Georgia Pageant."

Michael Shepperd (Big Moe) has been active in his hometown Chicago theater and New York theaters. He has a recurring role on ER as Larkey.

Dennis Stowe (No Moe) has played in "West Side Story," "My One and Only" and most recently on TV on the Fox series "House of Buggin.

Dennis Wilson (Little Moe) has performed in "Jesus Christ Superstar," "Hair" and "Ain't Misbehaving.

VALDOSTA — The Cultural Arts Guild is presenting "A Salute to the Music of World War II — An Evening with Botie Chitty" at 6:30 p.m. March 4 at Mathis Municipal Auditorium.

The evening will include a dinner, show and dancing. Tickets are \$40 per person with all proceeds going to support the Lowndes/Valdosta Arts Commission.

"We are here to support the arts in this community. We're trying to flood the community with art for all ages; we want to offer something for everyone."

all ages; we want to offer something for everyone." Chitty, a native Valdostan, has been a director, musical arranger and orchestra leader since the 1960s. He's had a loyal following in Valdosta and the surrounding area with the groups he's headed including The Top Hats in the 1960s, a six-piece local ensemble who were together almost 10 years; and The Singing Americans, who gave their first performance at Mathis Auditorium 25 years ago. "Our first program was for the Kiwanis Club on a July 4th weekend, hence the name of the group," said

"Our first program was for the Kiwanis Club on a July 4th weekend, hence the name of the group," said Chitty during a recent interview at *The Valdosta Daily Times* office. "Nate Adams and Herbert Ross gave us a full-house the first time we performed. They gave free tickets to the elderly and even brought in the boys from the Georgia Sheriff's Boys Ranch. "That was one of the best parts of my life because of

"That was one of the best parts of my life because of the fellowships. The group was made up of about 20 singers with a small band. We did a program for the Valdosta Junior Service League every year with proceeds going for their hearing clinic. One year we had a sell-out three nights in a row, which is unheard of. The group just hit it at the right time. We could not do that now."

Chitty said The Singing Americans stayed together 13 years, doing three to four performances a year with an encore performance in Valdosta a few years back. At the March 4 performance, some of the original member of The Top Hats will be performing along with some of the original singers of The Singing Americans.

The evening will include original arrangements by Glenn Miller, Tommy Dorsey, Harry James and Artie Shaw, hits from the 1960s, along with a rhumba and waltz demonstration by the Valdosta Ballroom Dance Association and audience participation dancing.

"Valdosta is the greatest town in the world," said Chitty. "I feel just like Dorothy in 'The Wizard of Oz' there's no place like home. The people here are the greatest, I love them, and I'm looking forward to performing for them again."







The annual exhibition of Valdosta State University Art Faculty is on display through Dec. 8 in the VSU Fine Arts Gallery. Gallery hours are from 10 a.m. 4 p.m. Monday-Thursday and from 10-3 p.m. on Fridays. Many of the works in the exhibition are for sale. For more information or tour arrangements, call 333-5980. "The main reason for the exhibition is to show the community what we're doing here, that we're being productive in our own disciplines," said Gallery Director Karin Murra. Thirty-eight recent works by 12 faculty are fea-tured, representing a diverse approach to form and content. Paintings, ceramics, sculpture, photogra-phy and printmaking are included in the exhibition. Professor Harry Ally's three works, oil and oil pas-tel and graphite are part of a continuing series entie annual exhibition of Valdosta State

tel and graphite are part of a continuing series enti-tled "Idiots and Other Figures." Besides teaching at VSU, Ally has been on the art faculty for six other colleges and universities.

Professor Stephen Andersen has four pieces in the exhibition. He uses a variety of unusual materi-als for his sculpture, including wood, glass, crab shells, snake tails and brick. His work can be found in collections in every state in America and 11 for-eign countries.

eign countries. Associate Professor Hollis Barnett has three sculptures on display, with which he tries to strike a balance between the visual and the conceptual, try-ing to make exciting objects that will inspire the



Born, raised and largely educated in Southwest Georgia, Clyde L. Edwards received a master of fine arts in painting from the University of Cincinnati, Ohio. He has two works exhibited: one is graphite and the other is oil on canvas. Dr. J. Stephen Lahr has four views of Hadrian's wall in northern England. Inspired by a recent trip to the region, the works show the artist's interests in shape, color, texture and contrast. He was raised and educated in the Mid-West, teaching and working as art consultant for the Nebraska Department of Education.

as ar consultant for the Nebraska Department of Education. Dr. Lanny Milbrandt has three ceramic pieces in the show. He is the head of the art department at VSU and is interested in computer graphics and three-dimensional media including glass, jewelry and sculpture. He is currently embracing a return to clay as a material he calls "tremendously flexible and responsive." Melody Milbrandt is a part-time faculty member at VSU and also teaches in Lowndes County Schools. Her mixed media piece is a somewhat tongue-in-cheek observation of gender bias in society entitled "They Warned Me the Flowered Dress Would Be Perceived as Very Feminine." Gallery Director and Assistant Professor Murray has owned and operated her own art gallery, direct-ed festivals and exhibitions and taught at Mississippi State University in Starkville, Miss. Two of her three works are mixed media on paper.

His three wooden sculptures are part of a series he planned this summer utilizing multicultural symbol-ism and typographical elements. 

Bosch picks up reins of family business

VALDOSTA - When her husband died, Lena Bosch was told she couldn't run the auto dealership he had built. She was told she didn't know enough about the car business.

Eleven years later, the naysayers have long since disappeared.

Ms. Bosch picked up the reins of the family business, Bosch Oldsmobile-Buick-GMC-Isuzu, after her husband John died in 1984. She's never looked back.

"I've always thought life was made up of chapters," Ms. Bosch said. "When John died, I had a feeling a whole novel had been written. But I never took the book back to the library. We keep writing in new chapters.'

She found herself at a turning point in her life, where she could either sell the dealership and live off the proceeds or she could risk taking over.

So, she bought herself a new white business suit and went down to Florida to meet with the Oldsmobile zone manager. She told him she intended to take over the dealership, despite her lack of experience in automotive retail. The dealership had been John's business since 1962, and Ms. Bosch had had her hands full raising their son, Bart. n, Bart. 199 DOI .VICV "I was an inexperienced female .VICV

in a male-oriented field," she said.

Soon after she was granted the dealership, Ms. Bosch found it difficult to find people who wanted to work for her. Few people had enough confidence in her to risk working for her.

Another hurdle facing her was the vast difference between her management style and that of her

late husband's. Ms. Bosch said she "inherited" 35 employees when she took over Bosch Olds, and soon found she would have to develop her own staff, her own crew. Little by little, she said, she built a staff she could work with and trust.

"I try to get people who are enthusiastic about their potential and then turn them loose," Ms. Bosch said. She believes the worst managers are those who so lack confidence in their employees to the point of trying to do it all themselves.

"You've got to put trust in people and let them do their jobs," she said.

The art of delegation is one Ms. Bosch feels she excels at, and her gift gives her the opportunity to get involved in the community.

Not only is she a member of the Valdosta-North Rotary Club, but she is vice-chair of the Chamber of Commerce and chair of the Lowndes-Valdosta Arts Commission. Ms. Bosch feels strongly about volunteerism and community loyalty - she doesn't see any reason why Valdosta shouldn't strive to be the best in everything. "I want Valdosta to be the great-

est place in the world," Ms. Bosch said.
