



L/VAC Salutes and Spotlights **Exemplary Board Member**

Julianna Howard, board member for L/VAC and Chairman of the Children's Touring Program Committee, acquired her love for the arts at a very early age from having grown up in the rural area of Madison, Georgia where she saw an old turn-of-the-century building with its own auditorium be transformed into an art gallery. The community there also brought in a performing series very much like the Presenters Series Programs that are brought in by L/VAC. She said, "I saw first hand how those programs lifted the quality of life in our little community to a richer, higher plane; it gave us a sense of sophistication. Since then, I've wanted that for all children (not just my own). I think it's so important to have the arts associated in school curriculums. It's an interesting, hands-on way to teach that leaves a lasting impression. Artignites the imagination, elicits emotion, and brings a new dimension to the classroom. With the feeling of achievement, the need for physical aggression is diminished because the student feels important and pleased with himself. My purpose is to raise my own children and everybody else's children as best I can." She also serves on the Education Advisory Council for Lowndes County which reviews books and video tapes before they are submitted to schools, and works with the PTO and serves on the Parent Advisory Board.

Julianna, who is married to Dr. Rick Howard, a local dermatologist, holds a B.S. Degree in nursing from the Medical College of Georgia in Augusta. She and Dr. Howard are proud parents of four sons ages 11-22 of which two are students at Duke University, and two are in the 5th and 8th grades. She works part time in her husband's medical practice and says she thinks it's important to have "outlets." She says, "Our family thing is soccer. Rick is the president of the Valdosta/Lowndes Soccer Club." Together they have worked with parents to get soccer into Valdosta/Lowndes high schools. She says it provides a setting which promotes selfesteem by developing physical conditioning, self-confidence and courage.

Mrs. Howard says she is glad that so many people have found the Arts Center but doesn't think L/VAC has to be the only entity for arts programs. Mrs. Howard has served on the L/VAC board for three years and began service as a docent when the Center originated as a small group working around a kitchen table to bring in productions. She became acquainted with L/VAC's first director, Burton Bright, through the mutual friendship of their kids. She has also served as a docent for the gallery at VSU. She says that since a building has been purchased for L/VAC, there is a solid sense of permanency and security for the arts in our community. Her projection for the future is that L/VAC will develop a plan beyond the year 2000 to be the hub of the Arts for the surrounding counties.

Theatre Guild Valdosta Is Shining Example for "Mainstreet"

Now in their seventh season, the Theatre Guild has progressed from "gypsy" players to performing in their own building, The Dosta Playhouse (formerly the old Dosta Theatre), in the historical district of downtown Valdosta. After purchasing the building in 1992, their first performance downtown was in 1993, according to Joanne Griner who was the first president in 1989-91 and who is now membership/publicity chairman.

Because of generous contributions from members - one in particular, LaForrest Smith Eberhardt, a recently deceased benefactor who contributed \$300,000 - and with the help of matching grants, major renovations to their building have been made possible. Progressing from passing out blankets in winter and funeral parlor fans in summer, patrons now enjoy central heat and air. It also has enabled them to purchase the two buildings next door, restore the exterior of the building and the lobby to near its original design, and add exterior neon lighting. Other downtown projects include new apartments, restaurants and coffee shops, along with the restoration of other historic storefronts. There is ample parking with firemen and police presence - a feeling of neighborhood and community is returning to mainstreet.

Following their gala season opening in September with "A Funny Thing Happened On the Way to the Forum", they presented the suspenseful "Uninvited", the comedy "Odd Couple", and will close their regular season with another comedy, "Finishing Touches" in May. Interspersed with those programs have been two children's programs in conjunction with other downtown events. In addition, they have just successfully presented "An Evening of One-Act Plays" - five different plays with five different casts and directors.

Working towards having a dinner theatre, the Guild consists of a very diverse group and welcomes newcomers to perform or work behind the scenes in their community theatre, and they are formulating lease agreements for public use of the building. For tickets or information, call 24-STAGE.

Becoming Regionally Known.....

Lowndes County Historical Society Museum, 305 W. Central Avenue in downtown Valdosta, is now the home (at least temporarily) of "Oil Pan Harry", a huge, breathtaking metal sculpture of a dinosaur, whose head is, indeed, an oil pan. The sculpture, first on display at the Cultural Arts Center's 1995 Artoberfest Art Exhibit, graces the lawn of the museum casting a mezmorizing shadow amidst the evening lights bringing pre-history to reality. The artist, Marshall Norrris, an active member of the Southern Artists League and native of Greenville, Florida, is fast becoming regionally known, although he's been interested in art since he was a child.

Warm hearted and outgoing, Norris' artistic style on canvas is termed primitive, reminiscent of that of Grandma Moses-beautifully earthy and original. Since being temporarily blinded in an accident in 1976 and undergoing a cornea transplant in 1990, his art has taken on new meaning and passion.

Mr. Norris is a graduate of Greenville High School and North Florida Junior College in Madison, Florida, and has a degree in electronics and drafting. In 1973, he graduated from NFJC as an emergency medical technician. While pursuing a degree as nurse practitioner, he is employed as an EMT with Lafayette County Rescue.




A Local Wizard: Walter Hobbs




