Chaney. Below, from left, are Bouncer Smith, Clint Hutchinson and Wally Wilkins. Smith is retired in Douglas and writes and paints. Wilkins, a landscape architect, lives in Brooks. The others are deceased. Mathis worked in Valdosta some years and moved to Atlanta where he died in 1973. Chaney, 1916-1957, was an electrician by trade and worked for Mixer Electric, the Valdosta Armature, Harrell Electric and National Container Corp. McMillan, 1914-1978, worked for Lefiles Automotive before the war and afterwards was foreman and mechanic with Georgia Ace Fertilizer factory of River Street Smith was with the 28th Photograph

Squadron; Wilkins was a B-24 gunner; Mathis, a corporal in the Air Force; Chaney was in the U.S. Navy; and McMillan was with the Air Force. He once wrote his name, serial number and home address on a blue reflector of an airplane.

After the war, someone sent it to him. In the article about Judge William Evan Thomas, I made a mistake and changed to calling him W.L. Thomas. W.L. was his father and had nothing to do with my story about W.E. In the article, it was W.E. all the way. I heard from Judge Tholhas' grandson, Wilbur Warner, an Atlanta lawyer. He reminded me that he and his brother, Bob Converse, called him, "Buddy." Warner also reminded me of what an avid hunter Uncle Will was. I

then remembered seeing hunting clothes and shot gun shells at his home. In the Tebeauville/Waycross article, I should have added that even though P.C. Pendleton left Waycross in a disconsolate frame of mind, the people of Waycross saw fit to name a street for him and one for his wife's family, Pendleton Street and Tebeau Street, both of which end in downtown Waycross.

Do you know how Minnie Pearl got her stage name? Thank to Valdostan Margaret Nisbet we now know. Margaret said when Minnie first performed as Minnie Pearl, she didn't have the name. It was for the Pilot Club in Aiken, S.C., where Margaret's aunt and uncle, Mr. and Mrs. Paul Barnett, lived. The aunt was an enthusiastic member of the Pilot Club. Sarah Ophelia Colley, real name of Minnie Pearl, stayed with the Barnetts. Uncle Paul told Sarah she needed a stage name, and she agreed, but what? Uncle Paul finally came up with the solution. Uncle Paul said he had two old girl friends, one named Minnie and the other named Pearl. The night of the big Pilot Club banquet, an emcee announced, "And now for your evening's entertainment, on her way surely, to the Grand Ole Opry, here is Minnie Pearl!" The rest is history.

About the Children's Theatrical Touring Programs



In October, high school and middle school students revisited the tragic love story of *Romeo and Juliet*. This Shakespearean play, performed by Georgia Mountain Theatre, is a part of the ninth grade literature curriculum, and I wondered just what kind of student turn out we might see. The teachers at Lowndes and Valdosta encouraged their students to attend the performance and sold large numbers of tickets for L/VAC. We had a healthy gate on the night *Romeo and Juliet* was held at Mathis Auditorium for general audiences. It is a pleasure to have the support of the faculties, the students, and the community.

In November, GMT brought us the delightful tale of *The Ugly Duckling*. The characters were appealing to the young audiences, especially Nine Stripes (the cat), the Swan Queen, and of course, the Ugly Duckling. Three students were chosen to become actors at the beginning of the play. With great ease the students assumed their roles and readily joined in the fantasy. An observation I must make is that one teacher had taken our vocabulary list and copied it for each of her students. As they watched the play, they checked off all the vocabulary words they heard used. The teacher had obviously prepared her students for the play and had used the play as a tool and included it in her course of study for that week. Another unsolicited reward came through "a letter to the editor" of the *Valdosta Daily Times*. Mr. Bennett, a teacher at West Gordon, thanked L/VAC for the play and for our help in funding the production for the students. His letter is most important to me and reinforces my desire to provide student programming in our schools and for our community.

Our companies of actors from GMT Productions this fall have been professional and absolutely wonderful to work with. In spite of a leaky roof at Mathis and flooding which wet Juliet's gown and drenched shoes, the show, including the sword fights, went on. *The Ugly Duckling* group worked in such harmony that the stage was broken down, and we were ready for lunch in 20 minutes flat. Personable, friendly, and dependable, the actors brought energy and imagination to every performance; seventeen performances in six days at elementary schools in Lowndes, Valdosta, Echols, Lanier, and Clinch Counties.

"Art is a lot like music: there are many different styles, and most people have their favorites," Stephenson said.


