





Local artists display sculptures and paintings

VALDOSTA — Wood sculpture and the paintings of two local artists are currently on display in the Lowndes/Valdosta Arts Commission's Hall Gallery.

George King's sculptures, which he describes as "found wood sculptures," are created from pieces of wood he discovers, seeing a sculpture waiting inside of it.

"He also turns wooden bowls and vases out of 'recycled' wood — wood that others have discarded — because he likes the knots and things that give it character," according to LVAC. King "brings out the vision of what he sees in it and makes the wood say what he wants it to say."

King, a Doerun native, is a minister and employed by Smith Motors.

Working with wood since childhood, King made toys and furniture before moving to wood sculpture.

"My art puts me in a different, more pleasurable world," King says, "where I could stay for the rest of my life and never get tired of it."

Meditation is the key to local painter Vanessa Loud's creativity. She began seriously painting four years ago after she visited the LVAC Center, 1204 N. Patterson St.

"I was drawn to the environment of the center," Loud says, "and the personalities of the artists and others involved."

Owner and operator of Crown of Glory Beauty Salon, Loud works in water-

Salon, Loud works in watercolors, acrylics and oils, and "enjoys painting scenes from nature," according to LVAC. She has already placed in juried shows including the most recent selection for the 1999 Colson Printing calendar.

Winifred Richard

Born in Scotland, artist Winifred Richard came to America in 1921 and settled in Detroit, Michigan, where she attended grade school. At age 23, Mrs. Richard saw some hand-painted china at her husband's mother's home, which inspired her to take lessons to learn that practice for herself. She also took lessons in oil painting, and later when her husband retired in Delray, Florida, she took classes in watercolor. An accomplished award-winning artist, she is the youngest of 14 children, who were all talented artistically.

At age 96 (97 in October), Mrs. Richard is an inspiration! When asked about her philosophy of life, she said, "Never quit pursuing your dream. Don't be afraid to start, even if you're old. You don't have any idea what talent you have until you've tried it."

A resident of Valdosta for about five years, Mrs. Richard now resides at Langdale Place. She still loves to play bridge and is a good cook; she also still loves to dance and enjoys her family. Her husband of almost 50 years, Arthur Patrick Richard, and one of her six daughters are now deceased. Mrs. Richard, who has her own kiln, has taught classes and sold much of her art, but unfortunately none of her things in L/VAC's display are for sale.

Latrelle Ulrich

Since 1979, when she first visited Kathrine's Kraft Kottage on Williams Street in Valdosta, Latrelle Ulrich was inspired to paint. She took six lessons from Mrs. Pipkin, and although she thought of herself as having no talent, since then she has been painting everything in sight.

Latrelle has been chosen twice for Colson Printing Company's calen-

dar and has received one "honorable mention".

Gloria Raymond

Raised on a farm with clear flowing streams and stately forests, Gloria Raymond learned early about form and symmetry. She devotes much of her time to painting with oils, and it is her ambition to lift one's spirit to a more tranquil, delightful time and place by portraying the beauty of nature in the exquisite frills of a flower or the vastness of an ocean scene or landscape.

Lynalee C. Finney

Mrs. Lynalee C. Finney has spent all of her 93 years in her native Georgia. She first discovered her artistic talent with ceramics approximate thirty-five years ago and has worked under the tutelage of Lucille Slover of Jesup, Georgia. Although her work is prolific, she shrinks from competition and has entered only one juried show (at St. Simons Island) where she won a blue ribbon. Mrs. Finney uses EZ stroke paint over greenware ceramic, which is then fired and glazed. She and her husband, Jesse, deceased are the parents of seven children.

Margaret O'dell

Margaret was always the student selected for art projects in school, and she won a city-wide school competition sponsored by the Rotary Club when she was in the fifth grade. Her work has been juried for the last two years by the "Spring Into Art Exhibit" at the First State Bank in Valdosta, and her painting, "Baskets", was chosen to be printed in the 1999 Colson Calendar. Margaret has been an active member of the Southern Artists' League for several years, serving as treasurer, program chairman, and Artist of the Month chairman. She says, "I trust that some of my art pleases others, and I encourage all 'would-be's' to take the plunge."



In the Hall Gallery: George King and Vanessa Loud

In conjunction with the Colson Calendar Competition on July 13th, George King and Vanessa Loud will share the Hall Gallery.

George King: Born in Doerun, Georgia, this artist is back by popular demand for his second exhibition at the Lowndes/Valdosta Arts Commission. Residing in Valdosta for 14 years where he is a minister and is employed by Smith Motors, George and his wife, Janet, have four children.

Mr. King describes his art as "found wood sculptures". He also turns wooden bowls and vases out of spalded wood or "recycled" wood - wood that others have discarded - because he likes the knots and holes that give it character. Whether oak, cherry, walnut, or driftwood, George brings out the vision he sees in it and makes the wood speak.

Working with wood since his childhood, George made his own toys then progressed to making furniture. Creating beautiful prize winning wood sculptures for the past 15 years, he has three or four exhibitions each year. His most cherished recognition was at the "Moultrie on the Square" Exhibition six years ago where he won the \$1,300 First Place Award.

Because his creations come to him while he meditates and dreams, Mr. King attributes his success to his faith and says, "My art puts me in a different, most pleasurable world where I could stay for the rest of my life and never get tired of it."

Vanessa Loud: Like Mr. King, Vanessa also says she is most creative when she is in a state of meditation. Odds and Ends.....Roberta George

The Center stays busy! This past six months, we've had 12 art exhibits, 61 meetings, 4 readings, 35 mailings, 3 Broadway shows, 26 classes, 2 dinners, 1 luncheon, 3 weeks of night rehearsals, and 29 tours. Approximately 4,350 persons have come through the Center's doors, not including the people who attended the Broadway shows, about another 3,000, and the ones who went to the "Spring Into Art" Exhibit at the First State Bank, some 600 persons, also the students who saw our children's shows. (Thank you, Julianna Howard--article below.) The Arts are alive and well in Lowndes County.

I wish to thank Elaine Kent and Adann Alexxandar for hours and hours of hard work. And what would the Center do without Lucille White and the devoted docents? And lastly, thank-you Board and members who make us so proud and grateful for your artistic accomplishments and support.

L/VAC completed its fifth year of student programming in May, offering students and the community opportunities to see and hear Shakespeare, to be absorbed in delightful tales, and to be challenged to think about America and its diversity. High school and middle school students found it helpful to hear a play that they were studying. Younger students were entertained and learned vocabulary words related to the play. The success of scheduling plays in the schools hinges on clear communication with the schools and teachers. The intention of L\VAC is to provide programs that will enhance the curriculum. The emphasis is on working with our schools, filling their needs, and meeting their requirements.

Over 18,000 students from pre-schools, elementary schools, middle schools, and high schools became a part of an audience during the past school year, 97-98. Children with big eyes entered Mathis, or students sat in bleachers or on the floors of their school's gym. A hush always descended as the magic of live theater began. Over the years, students have learned how to respond appropriately: to laugh or to be quiet so their neighbors can hear, to be courteous to the performers and show appreciation with an enthusiastic round of applause. In the beginning, that was not always the case. Becoming an audience is a learned behavior. With the cooperation of school administrators and teachers, this experience becomes another stepping stone in the overall development of students.

Our travels during the year have taken Roberta George and me into Lowndes County and Valdosta Schools, and into the schools of our grassroots area: Cook, Lanier, Berrien, Clinch, and Echols. We have seen many improvements: new floors in gyms, fencing around campuses, new all purpose rooms, gardens and gazebos, additions of outdoor classrooms, construction on a new wing of classrooms, and fresh coats of paint in many buildings. Administrators were pleased we noticed the progress and improvements in their physical plants. They were optimistic about plans for the future. Everywhere we saw hard working teachers and students.

Going into the schools gave us a first-hand opportunity to see the rain forest mural, "under the sea" ceiling tiles, individual art by students displayed in hallways, media centers and cafeterias—planters filled with flowers trees planted on Arbor Day-student poems and prose posted on bulletin boards. The Arts are so much more visible in the schools than even five years ago. L\VAC is pleased to have played a small part of the development of the arts into the curriculum.
