

Meet 200 talented artists competing for \$5,000 in prizes. Join the fun at the opening reception for the 17th Annual "Spring Into Art Exhibition" at the Annette Howell Turner Center for the Arts on Monday, April 12, from 6-9 p.m.

The Annual Spring Into Art Exhibition is South Georgia's premier art event, which has become a national show attracting international interest. It has become the Turner Center's primary fund-raiser, which supports the programs and exhibits for adults and children.

The exhibit will include two- and three- dimensional pieces from Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Wisconsin, New York, and New Jersey. The Turner Center has more artists participating than ever before.

The prize-winning pieces, selected by two jurors outside of the Valdosta area, will be displayed in the Best of the Spring into Art Exhibit, beginning May 17. Prizes will be awarded on that date.

Alexxandar, the curator of the Turner Center and a renowned artistic photographer, graciously donated a favorite photograph for the raffle, entitled "Acqua d'Archbordenndroneauxx." Alexxandar only reproduces one copy of his photographs, so that the owner has the only signed, framed image of the work. This increases the value of the piece itself.

"I believe this place is superlative for the arts in our community, and I am thrilled to contribute to the arts that enliven all our lives even more," Alexxandar said.





Anna C. Carlton Discovers the Art in Nature

Nature is integral to Anna C. Carlton's artwork, "Natural Interpretations," which will be on display in the Boyette Gallery beginning May 17.

Carlton grew up in Dawson, Georgia, and received a Bachelor of Science in Art Education from the University of Georgia. She has continued her study of art at Valdosta State University, Savannah College of Art and Design and in various workshops.

Carlton has taught art for the last 35 years to children with severe emotional problems. Her available time is spent in painting, basket-making, pottery, print making, clay and papier mache sculptures and masks, and collages. Am

Carlton believes the desire to create is a gift; painting is a statement of feelings, inner self, emotions, and soul. She uses art as a vehicle to fulfill her desire to share cherished places in nature and the inner energy that created them. She chooses nature's subjects and finds them to be perfect and honest designs with strength and endurance in their continuing existence.

"I'm fascinated by the process of water on the paper as the pigments mix and mingle; the interplay of the intended and the random," Carlton said.

She looks for energy and attitudes in nature. She uses strong color, and she finds nature to be strong in color, textural content and the unexpected.

"Removed from nature the images make a strong presence," Carlton said. She plays with the illusion of depth and subject on paper, with the most vital element being the discovery process. She resides in Moultrie, GA.

Greene explains that a yarn painting is a two-dimensional work in which varn is glued to a paper background with the artwork drawn.

Greene's subjects are recollections from two childhood summers, 1944 and 1945, spent at her grandparents' farm in Adel.

Greene graduated from Albany State College as an elementary education major, and received her master's in art education from New York University.

"Whatever I do I like to add humor in it, and the joke's on me," Greene said.

Greene now lives in LaGrange, Georgia.

Park received his BFA and MFA

from East Tennessee State University. On a regular basis, he exhibits his artwork of wood sculptures and different types of metal.

The main focus of Park's pieces are wood and other items found in nature, such as poplar, rosewood, bamboo, basswood, mahogany, sassafras, oak, purple heart, walnut, pecan, fossils, cultured pearls, and sterling silver.

Barnett is more comfortable with bronze than any other material. He has experimented with glass and metal sculptures but is not exhibiting those pieces yet.

"My work in this material is primarily figurative ... and more spontaneous than my work in other materials," Barnett explained.

Natalie Bridgette Brandhorst paints the inner beauty of fruits and vegetables using watercolor and oil paints. Her works will be displayed in the Price-Campbell Foundation Gallery beginning Monday, June 28, with an opening reception at 5 p.m.

Natalie graduated from State University of West Georgia College in 1990 with a bachelor of Fine Arts in Ceramics

and Surface Design. Following college, she traveled the states and became influenced by the beauty in nature and the fruits of the earth.

Immersed in the "fruitful youth" of life, Brandhorst's paintings reveal the interior spaces and textures of fruit and vegetables. The fruits "become a human figural metaphor" of inner beauty.

"Watercolors allow a more illustrative view of the interior," according to Brandhorst. In her oil paintings, she strives to understand and achieve the painstaking process of layering

conplicated glazes and putting tremendous amounts of time into one composition. Both media have been evocative of the metaphoric concept and are the vehicle for developing visual ideas.

She is mesmerized by the beauty, analogy and metaphor embodied in fruit. Fruits and vegetables are readily translated into the image of the body complete with skin, flesh, structure, and seeds. In representing the search for

eternal truths, the fruits are bisected, revealing the internal structures for literal and figurative analysis.

Influences for her work come from Renaissance painters that had the ability to render the image with tremendous accuracy and realistic detail. The process can yield a sense of dimension through the use of color, according to Brandhorst.

Brandhorst lives with her husband, John, in Atlanta, Georgia.

Fincher is an award-winning wood turning artist and painter.

Fincher was born and raised in Atlanta, but has lived in Florida for over 35 years.

He graduated from Florida State University, and his fields of interests are science

and history. His hobbies include golf, photography, reading, painting, drawing, playing guitar and banjo, and listening to music; immersing himself in the world of art.

Fincher spends his days at the lathe [a machine on which wood is spun and shaped with a cutting tool], seven days a week, in an attempt to "capture the *soul of the tree* in the wood that enraptures lives."

Using the lathe, Fincher designs, shapes, and gives these trees *new life*. According to Fincher, the soul of the tree lives in each piece.

The woods used are obtained from sustainable and sound reforestation programs of certified, reputable, environmentally sensitive timber merchants who have a strong, social, and humanitarian obligation to the earth and its resources. Most of the wood comes from the North Florida and South Georgia areas.

"When working in wood, I create functional and nonfunctional, one-of-a-kind hand-turned fine art from domestic and imported exotic wood," Fincher said.

Wendy Montgomery Runs Wild

Wendy Montgomery will exhibit her watercolor paintings of animals in the Turner Center for the Arts galleries beginning June 28.

Montgomery is a native of Gastonia, North Carolina, where she grew up horseback riding and fox hunting beginning at the age of eight.

She received a bachelor's degree in Fine Art from Sacred Heart College in Belmont, North Carolina, majoring in ceramics and jewelry. After several years away from horses and art, she renewed her love for both. Inspired by the grace and beauty of horses, hounds, and many Jack Russell terriers, she began drawing and experimenting with acrylics and watercolors.

Surrounded by a huge assortment of wildlife at her home, she is blessed with a never-ending source of subjects. She has only recently begun to paint for herself, with the luxury of using subjects of her own choosing. This has allowed her to participate in art shows and other venues of art sales such as the Wildlife Arts Show in Thomasville, Georgia, and the Turner Center's Annual Spring Into Art Exhibit.


Welcome New Board Members!
