# Walker hospitals set Grady General standards

CAIRO - Grady General Hospital has built its success around the same principles set by it predecessor, the Walker Hospital.

Dr. W.A. Walker, a Grady County native, began what was known as the county's first hospital as an extension to his office about 1900. Walker's capabilities expanded greatly when he built the first Walker Hospital on South Broad Street in

The hospital featured 16 patient beds, an operating room and X-ray facilities. The second Walker Hospital, a 24-bed facility, was built on Second Avenu: S.E. and later became known as Cairo Hospital.

Grady Countians organized the Grady County Hospital Authority in 1947 to operate Cairo Hospital. The group went a step further and built a replacement hospital on Fifth Street S.E. in 1960 to better serve the community. The 31-bed facility then was named Grady General Hospital. In 1977, the hospital underwent

an extensive renovation and added new ci.nical services, a new emergency room to the south side of the hospitai, surgical suites and a 29-bed patient wing with a four-bed intensive care unit.

The 60-bed hospital became affiliated with John D. Archoold Memorial Hospital in November 1985 through a lease agreement. Since its affiliation with Archbold, Grady General Hospital has begun offering a number of new services to the citizens of Grady County.

In 1987, the hospital began using a new computer system that supports patient processing, medical records, accounts receivable, accounts payable, general ledger, payroll, inventory and quick processing of Medicare and Medicaid

Doug Arnold, Grady General Hospital administrator since 1988, explained that the radiology department has been updated more than any other department in the hospital. Renovation began in 1988 to com; lete a room for new radiography and flouroscopy equipment.

The equipment, purchased for about \$100,000, "gives Grady General Hospital capabilities similar to those found in larger facilities and has greatly added to our diagnostic capabilities," said Arnold.

Later in 1988, the hospital received an ultrasound unit that is used primarily for prenatal monitoring.

In December 1988, Grady General Hospital celebrated the addition of mammography capabilities. The mammograph allows physicians to find pre-cancerous lesions, cysts or other lumps in breast tissue sometimes two years before they would have been detected through a man-

CT scanning has been available at Grady General Hospital five days each week with Archbold's mobile scanner system.

Along with other renovations and improvements constantly taking place at Grady General Hospital, the birthing center was reopened when Daniel Bailey, M.D., an obsetriciangynecologist, joined the staff and the hospital resumed delivering babies.

All babies, with the exception of those born by Caesarean section, are born in the birthing room, not the labor and delivery room. Expectant parents enjoy a comfortable room that looks like a nicely decorated bedroom as they await the birth of their child.

The Southwest Georgia Pain and Stress Center has been at Grady General Hospital since spring 1988. Gaston P. Loomis, M.D., psychiatrist, offers biofeedback therapy, general psychiatry services, pain control and numerous other therapies to both inpatients and outpatients at Grady General Hospital.

Outpatient surgery has become a popular option at Grady General Hospital. Michael L. Haney, M.D., and Ronald Frenkel, M.D., both ophthalmologists, perform cataract surgery on an outpatient basis, and John Payne, M.D., orthopedic surgeon, recently began performing arthroscopic surgery on an outpa-

CAIRO - Dr. W.A. Walker's medical clinic made way for The Hotel Grady, an important part of downtown Cairo for half a century.

The hotel superceded a smaller frame hotel and several boarding houses often called "drummers" retreats," which served travelers and salesmen during visits to the Syrup City during the late 1880s and early part of the 20th century.

According to literature compiled by Cairo's Comfort Inn Motel. The Hotel Grady opened in 1925, its three stories built on the foundations of Walker's medical clinic at the intersection of South Broad Street and then-Monroe Street, now Second Avenue S.W.

According to the Comfort Inn compilation, when Walker built a new hospital nearby, he offered the clinic as a hotel. Other citizens joined his effort to establish "The Cairo Hotel Company," quickly

"It was chosen as additional tribute to Henry W. Grady, the post-Civil War orator, editor and Reconstruction Era leader for whom Grady County had been named when it was formed in 1906.

Parket of Size of the Specific question shout Hospital

Answering your specific question about Hospital, will advise I have inquired and the first hospital was Dr. Walker's where the present Grady Hotel is, which is on South Broad Street at the corner of Broad Street and Second Wavenue. It is the northwest corner. Then he built the brick hospital with about 15 to 16 rooms next his home on the same Avenue but a block eastward.

The County finally bought that hospital from Dr. Rehberg when he decided he didn't want to operate it longer and he sold it at a low price. It lasted from 10 to 20 years. The county operated it until they built the new one on the Tallahassee Road. The new one was built on (completed February 1960). It is publicly owned. We used federal money and you are familiar with that big program (Hill-Bufton) and nearly everybody's hospital is built with that money now, and of course is non-profit. The number of beds is 31.

And we sorely need an addition for the occupation was over 100% in 1964.

Now there was another hospital and this was built across the street on spital and this by Dr. J. E. wright. But it was built somewhat in spite because Dr. Walker wouldn't let him in his hospital, and was right across the street, but never was a success, for Dr. Wright was not a surgeon. For all one might want to say about the eccentricities of Dr. Walker, he was a very fine surgeon in my mind and was ahead of most of them an this area, for he was just naturally a doctor and surgeon.

However, Robin, when you get into these people who made their names in Cairo in the 1920's or 1930's or '40's, 50sx etc., there is any number of them that have been greatly helpful. I could give you a list of eight or ten people who came around 1905 at the time Grady County started, and a few before then, who have helped to build Cairo. The difference is they were not the pioneer families, I realize.

Frank Richter, Jr., who died in the accident, the grandson of the original Edward Richter, was a good man in pecans, and along with W. H. Robinson distributed more pecans than any other people in South Georgia, including Albany. That was in mainly the 20's and '30's. And his father, maybe grandfather to some extent, started the chicken and egg business as you mentioned. But there are others who were at about that time also and might have had a larger part in it than these men. But if you come up with your tentative draft, and as you have given me permission to, I will advise with you about these things trying to make it so everyone in the area that you cover is given credit, that is of worthwhile interest that is given. I mention this for you may decide to stop on the hospital matter with the first one. And that date will be furnished you, of course.

The old wright Hospital is now used for a doctor's office and a real estate office, and really was a complete failture for it lost money from the start. And I think the bank had the bag to hold.

Looking at your list about the Savannah article, you know about Syrup, I have commented in memo today about Collard Seed, the Wight letter mentions about Papershell Pecans. Tobacco around Calvary is a big and a main industry in agriculture, the income from it being among the leaders - maybe not as much as peanuts and hogs and one or two crops, but one of the tops ones. And around Calvary is where that shade tobacco is. The bright leaf, or cigarette tobacco is scattered all over the county where they have the aerense, but we don't have a market. It is marketed at Pelham, Moultrie, and Thomasville mainly.

Of course, we are among the leaders in hogs particularly and cattle, too, now. And among the very top in Poultry and Eggs.

I believe this answers your memo fo of May 9th and all its paragraphs.

I don't want to take anything away from the people who stayed home and sent money up there, but all the people in that picture, there wasn't over one or two that really did any work and I know some of them were skinflinting and they didn't spend much money. For political reasons, of course, they went up to get their picture taken in the signing. But their money talked, some, I know. I will read the Messenger through xxx in 1904 and 1905 and give you results of what I read and give you the names in the picture.

Also I will get the information about the schools, etc. And I thought I was nearly through but in going through my unanswered file there is quite a bit of it yet.

Re Hospitals Was 25, 1965 May 25, 1965

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About 1900, the late Dr. W. A. Walker, a native of what is now Grady county, built several rooms in connection with his office to provide limited facilities for care of his patients. Then, about 1916, he built the first Walker Hospital, a two-story brick building on South Board Street in Cairo, which provided rooms for 16 patients' beds, with some surgical facilities, in connection with which he later pioneered in the use of X-ray and radium. Then in 1927, he built the second Walker Hospital, another two-story brick veneer building on 2nd Street, S. E., in Cairo, with somewhat more modern surgical facilities, and with rooms for 24 patients' beds. His old hospital was at that time converted, with the addition of a third floor, into what has since been operated as the New Grady Hotel, with 36 rooms.

In the early 1930's, the late Doctor Walker took in partnership with him the late Dr. A. W. Rehberg, also a native of xham this county, who, upon the former's retirement in the early 1940's, acquired the second Walker Hospital, and operated it as Cairo Hospital, on a private basis, until 1947, when the Chamber of Commerce project resulted in the creation by the Grady County Commissioners of the Grady County Hospital, which acquired the Cairo Hospital and operated it as Grady County Hospital, on a so-called public basis.

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

We are therefore asking that you deliver your certificates to


