VSC Honors Atomic Age

Valdosta State College will have open house on Sunday, Dec. 2 in celebration of the 20th anniversary of the birth of the atomic age.

On December 2, 1942, Dr. Enrico Fermi achieved controlled fission in atomic pile at the University of Chicago. This was done secretly with the Manhattan project--the code name for the atom bomb project.

Out of this project has grown the nuclear weapons program. Following the war, the new knowledge was applied to peaceful purposes as applications in agriculture, biology, chemistry, medicine and physics. Demonstration and display of work being done at VSC, its program offers trained education in atomic will be presented.

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Gloria Timmons Dies In Fla. Auto Crash

A Valdosta State College student was killed and another received minor injuries in an automobile accident near McClenney, Fla., on Nov. 18.

Gloria Timmons, a 19-year-old sophomore, died in the crash as she and her cousin Anne Timmons, a VSC freshman, were returning to Valdosta from a weekend visit with relatives in Jacksonville, Fla.

VSC officials said the car hit a hole in the highway and spun out of control.

Gloria, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Timmons of Rt. 2, Arlington, was a STAR student in high school and entered VSC in summer school of 1961. She was a biology major and lived in Converse Hall.

Sociology Club Tours State Institutions

Seven members of the VSC Sociology Club visited two state social institutions during a recent weekend field trip. The group toured the state mental hospital and the state training school for boys, both located in Milledgeville.

At the mental hospital tours were conducted through some of the wards, where the students were allowed to observe and talk with the patients. Later, patients representing different types of mental illnesses were presented to the group by the hospital's head psychologist. These patients were volunteers for the presentation.

On Saturday hospital officials explained to the students the part the trained social worker in the hospital. Job opportunities were discussed for the benefit for the club members who are preparing for social work.

The tour through the training school showed the excellent facilities of the institution. Academic and vocational training is given to the boys while they are at the school.

Rebel Businessmen Gain \$26,000 In 2nd Period Play

The Valdosta State College business management team took top honors in second competition to the Mid-America Academic Conference. Earnings of \$26,000 during the period enabled the VSC student team to move into second place in the intercollegiate league.

Besides Valdosta State only two other of the nine participating colleges showed earnings for the period, according to results re-

leased by the sponsoring Indiana University Graduate School of Business. These were Augustana College of Rock Island, Ill., with

earnings of \$14,000 and Iowa Wesleyan College at Mt. Pleasant, \$3,000.

Despite profits by these three schools, all league members still show a net loss in early play. Iowa Wesleyan with a loss of \$44,000 remains in first place, but holds only a slim lead over second place Valdosta State. The local college has a net loss of \$45,000--only \$1,000 behind the leaders.

Others in order are Wisconsin State College, loss \$69,000; Wilmington College, Ohio, loss \$81,000; Augustana, Illinois, loss \$84,000; University of Southwestern Louisiana, loss \$122,000; Denison University, Ohio, loss \$158,000; Rockhurst College, Kansas City, Mo., loss \$164,000; and Delta College, Michigan, loss, \$191,000.

Compared with the beginning of the game in October, when the students assumed imaginary management of firms reporting net annual profits of \$70,000 each, the second period results

The student activities center, which is constructed on two levels, houses a student on the ground floor and a gymnasium on the second level. A feature of the student center is background music.

Columbus College, now in its fifth year of operation, is presently conducting classes in a converted hosiery mill building.

The familiar picture of an ostrich escaping the dangers around him by burying his head in the sand comes to mind. This illustration has seen much use in describing persons who refuse to face reality. Perhaps never in history has anyone qualified for the title of "No. 1 Head-in-the-Sand Man" as has Jawaharlal Nehru, prime minister of India.

With the great emergency of independent nations in Africa and Asia, India naturally became the leader of this block of nations. Nehru had become possibly the third most powerful man in the world.

Nehru rose to power as a disciple of the late Mahatma Gandhi, leader in the Indian independence movement and originator of the non-violent resistance procedure. Mistakenly, Nehru thought that the whole world could be won through the practice of non-violence.

In the great struggle between the United States and the Soviet Union he has adopted a policy of neutrality, refusing to take sides and trying to act as mediator. He has, however, taken every opportunity to criticize the United States, while disregarding actions of the communists. Apparently the nearness of communist powers to India frightened him so that he was afraid to stand against them. So, for the protection of his country, Nehru has tried to be friends with his greatest danger.

The invasion of India by Red China must have been a shock to the prime minister. His whole set of ideals crumbled. It became necessary to call upon the United States for aid.

Even yet we do not know if Nehru has learned his lesson. If India is able to retain her independence we will be able to find out. If Nehru has shaken the sand out of his ears and wiped it out of his eyes, he should align himself with his only friends - the United States and its allies.

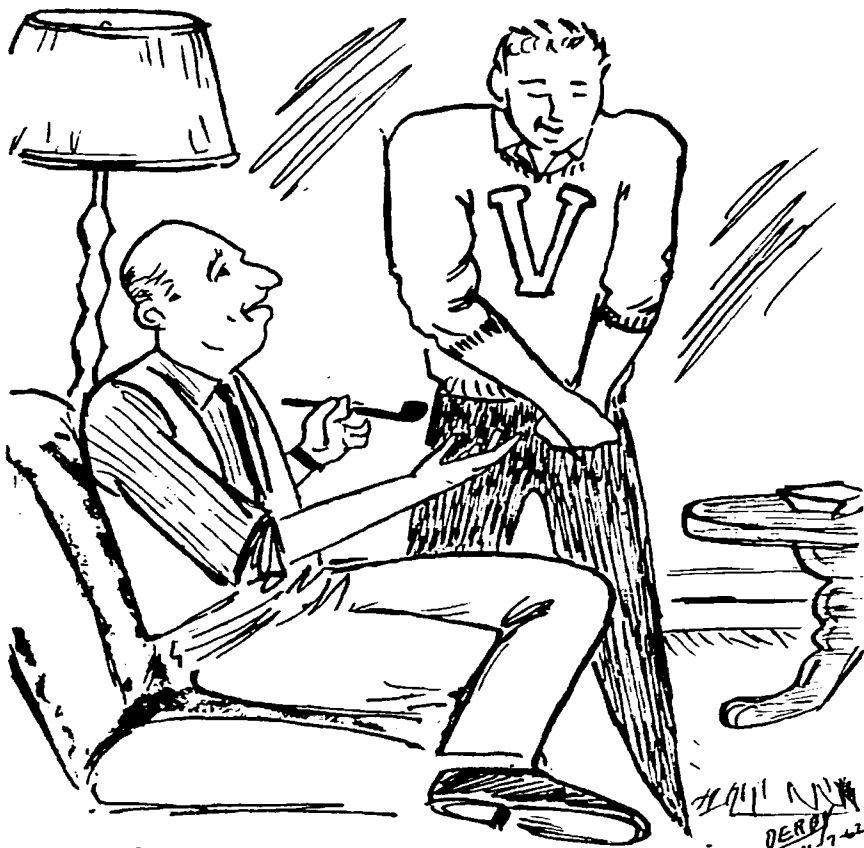

Most of the colleges found that second period decision-making was not as disastrous as the initial encounter Oct. 26 when all nine schools suffered large losses.

In predicting a business increase of about 2.1 percent for the next quarter, L. L. Waters, professor of transportation at Indiana and head of the I. U. "refereeing team", warned the students that "the prospects of this forecast materializing are no better than the prospects of any actual business forecast coming to pass".

"The crystal balls used for business forecasting, while of generally good quality from a standpoint of glass, may not be of very good quality from a standpoint of the picture", Waters added.

The next decisions are due at Indiana today, and every two weeks throughout the six-month competition.

Each two-week report--on such things as the amount allocated for research, production,

wage rates, advertising and related policy items that influence a corporation's share of the market--represents a simulated quarter of business activity.

During the conference the teachers will be given time to renew acquaintances with their friends now in college and with those who were graduated this past summer.

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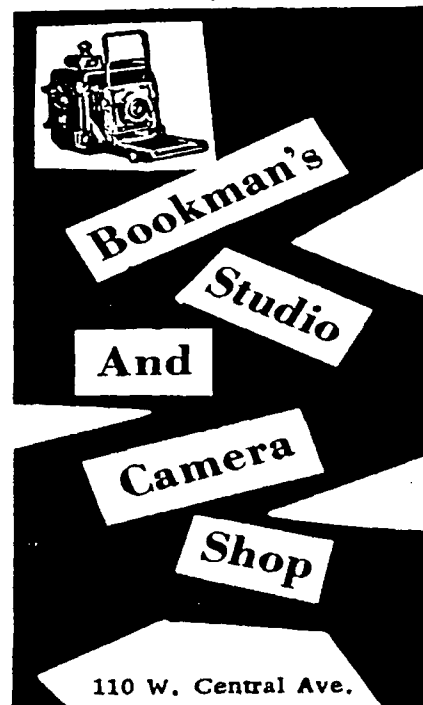
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Pine Cone Staff Work On Yearbook

According to editor John McCarty, the staff has been divided into groups, each of which is responsible for a different section of the yearbook.

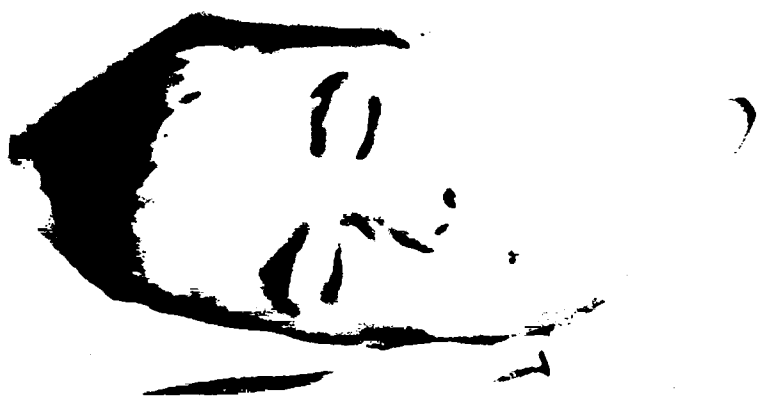

What are the prospects for another winning season and GIAC championship for the 1962-63 Rebels? At first glance, chances may seem slim. The Rebels probably have the toughest schedule they ever had. The Rampaging Rebels play in three tournaments before Christmas; the Rome Tipoff Tournament, which has already been played (the Rebels took second place); the Citrus Invitational Tournament, which is played this weekend in Lakeland, Fla.; and the Oglethorpe Tournament. They also engage Florida State University twice this season, once in Tallahassee and once in the VSC gymnasium.

The Rebels lost some big men from last year's GIAC championship team. It will be hard to find replacements for Jim Nichols, Doug Winters, Robert Bailey and Bob Anderson.

But as one takes a closer look at this year's squad and schedule things seem somewhat brighter. Several boys return from last year's team with the added experience of last season's varsity play and should be much improved this year. Coach Gary Colson's squad this year also has several promising transfers and freshman players.

Another factor in the Rebels' favor is that the first conference game is not played until Jan. 7. By this time the boys will have ten tough games under their belts. This should give the team time to mold into a smooth working unit. The Rebels have won two conference championships in a row. This should give them the initiative to strive to win again.

The student body is behind you, Rebels, to make it three consecutive GIAC championships.

Rebels Take Second Place in Rome Tournament

Valdosta State College's Rampaging Rebels took second place in the Rome Tipoff Tournament as the charges of Coach Gary Colson opened the 1962-63 season.

The Rebels took Friday night's opener by defeating Berry College 55-36. In the championship game the following night the Shorter College Gold Wave won over VSC by a score of 52-40.

In the game with Berry, Valdosta State took an early 10 point lead and were never seriously challenged.

The Rebels hit on 45.4 percent of their field goal attempts and 69.2 percent of their free throws.

The victory by the Rebels gave them the right to play Shorter, who was a 78-77 victory over pre-tournament favorite Birmingham Southern.

In the final game of the tournament Shorter used a superior free throw shooting accuracy and a tough defense to gun down the boys from Valdosta.

The Gold Wave jumped off to an early lead and at one time led by 20 points. With less than 5 minutes left in the game VSC cut Shorter's lead to only three points, but the victors rallied to win by a 12-point margin.

Each team had 17 field goals, but Shorter connected on 17 of

24 shots from the free throw line to only six of ten for VSC.

Although the tournament games will not count as conference clashes, the loss to Shorter was the first by the Rebels to a GIAC team in 26 games.

Attack leaders in the tournament for the VSC team were Mike Perry with 28 points, Wally Summers with 27, Chuck Bonovitch with 20 and Preston Hodges with 6. Other players seeing action were Bobby Speck, Bill Summerford, Angie DeVivo, Herman Hudson, Bobby Ritch and Ray McCully.

Perry joined Gordon Guin and Bill Moore of Shorter, Russel Dickey of Berry and Ralph Spurlock of Birmingham Southern on the all-tournament team.

VSC pulled ahead 8 to 6 after three minutes and fifteen seconds had elapsed in the game and never lost the lead again. By half time VSC had stretched their

lead to 37-15.

In the second half VSC continued to increase their lead. At one point VSC lead by 26 points. The entire team saw action, including the freshman players.

VSC combined good field goal accuracy and a strong defense to overrun Alabama Christian. The rampaging Rebels fired from the

field at a 44.1% clip. The Rebel's free throw percentage at 61.5% was slightly off.

The game ended a few minutes later with Sig Ep threatening again.

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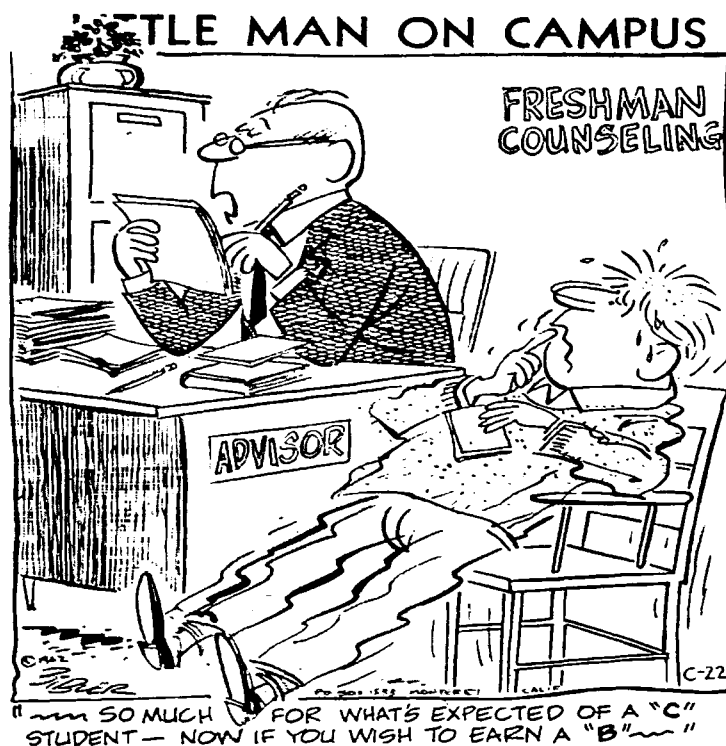
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Around Campus With Ann

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National Science Body Offers Graduate Awards

The National Academy of Sciences - National Research Council has been called upon again to advise the National Science Foundation in the selection of candidates for the Foundation's program of regular graduate and postdoctoral fellowships. Committees of outstanding scientists appointed by the Academy Research Council will evaluate applications of all candidates. Final selection will be made by the Foundation, with awards to be announced on March 15, 1963.

Fellowships will be awarded for study in the mathematical, physical, medical, biological and engineering sciences; also in anthropology, psychology (excluding clinical psychology), geography, economics (excluding business administration), sociology (not including social work); and the history and philosophy of science. They are open to college seniors, graduate and

postdoctoral students, and others with equivalent training and experience. All applicants must be citizens of the United States and will be judged solely on the basis of ability.

Applicants for the graduate awards will be required to take the Graduate Record Examination designed to test scientific aptitude and achievement. This examination, administered by the Educational Testing Service, will be given on Jan. 19, 1963, at designated centers throughout the United States and certain foreign countries.

The annual stipends for graduate Fellows are as follows: \$1800 for the first level; \$2000 for the intermediate level; and \$2200 for the terminal level. The annual stipend for postdoctoral Fellows is \$5000. Limited allowances will also be provided to apply toward tuition, laboratory fees and travel.

Further information and application materials may be obtained from the Fellowship Office, National Academy of Sciences - National Research Council, 2101 Constitution Avenue, N. W. Washington 25, D. C. The deadline for the receipt of applications for regular postdoctoral fellowships is Dec. 17, 1962, and for graduate fellowships, Jan. 4, 1963.
