## *Lowndes Cancer unit to canvass merchants*

VALDOSTA, Ga. -- If Webster is right in defining "crusade" as 'any remeial enterprise undertaken with zeal and enthusiasm,' the American Cancer Society's Lowndes County Unit business division could serve as a textbook example! On April 3 and 5, personnel at 1,152 area businesses are to be contacted by ACS EDUCATION-Funds Crusade workers.

"On those two days, 162 volunteers of our division, will call on that many business

establishments to spread the word about cancer," said Emory Davis, insurance executive and chairman of the ACS local unit's business division.

"They go armed with pamphlets explaining the need for an annual checkup and listing the seven danger signals of cancer. We hope, of course, that they will also be successful in reaching the division goal of \$4,000, but the educational objective of this drive is every bit as important."

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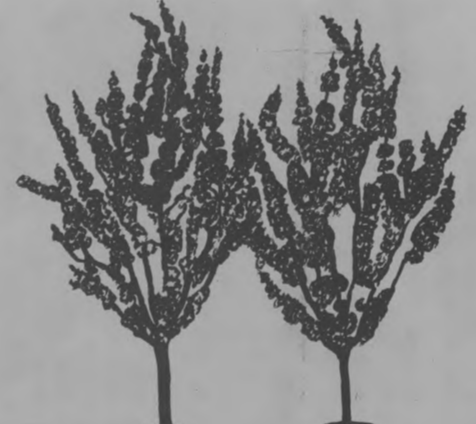
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A nurseryman can recommend planting procedures and care, but here are a few tips. Don't plant trees too close to your house. Limbs can mar siding, clog or break gutters, loosen roofing. If it's shallow-rooted or weak, the tree may fall on the house.

The root system usually requires as much area as the above-ground portion. Trees with shallow roots can break sidewalks, lift foundations and damage sewer lines.

If planting near utility lines, consider the tree's mature size. Small trees (15 to 25 feet) are safe near lines. Medium trees (25 to 50 feet) should be 30 feet from lines. Larger trees (50 feet or more) require a distance of 50 feet.

Most power interruptions are caused by limbs rubbing lines or falling on them. Pruning or removing is the only solution for established trees causing these problems. Georgia Power Company has a year-round program for trimming trees, with professional foresters to direct the special crews. With property owners' permission, trimming is done as necessary.

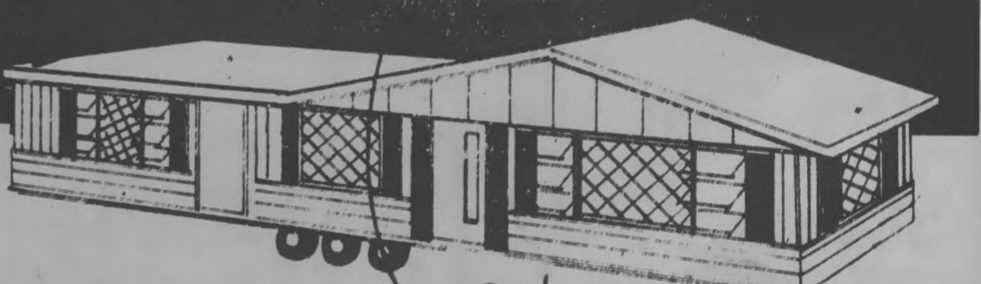

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## Thought For Food

It's not difficult to braise meat or to "prepare a pot-roast." Important steps include browning the meat thoroughly so it remains brown while cooking in moisture. Avoid using too much liquid. One-fourth to one-half cup is usually the rule. Then, make sure there's a tight cover as well as low temperature for the whole cooking time.

Here's a snappy sandwich you can have almost any time if the convenience shelf holds cans of deviled ham and the refrigerator furnishes English muffins, cream cheese and mayonnaise. Split English muffins, then toast. Top with cream cheese (three ounces) mixed with one-fourth cup each of finely chopped onion and green stuffed olives, then spread with deviled ham.

Lowndes High School Beta Club students presented a talent show Friday, March 23 at the school gymnasium.

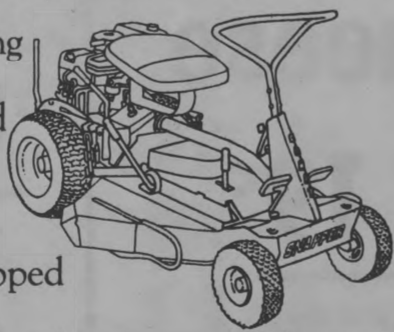

# The Living Bible 'Best-seller 1972'

"The Living Bible", a paraphrase of the Bible in modern English, was the country's best-selling book in 1972.

It tops Publishers Weekly's non-fiction list on the basis of nearly 2 million sales through Doubleday & Company, Inc. An additional 5 million copies were sold by Tyndale House Publishers. Dr. Kenneth Taylor, who paraphrased "The Living Bible," is president of Tyndale House.

Publishers Weekly credits "The Living Bible" with making the list from recorded Doubleday sales of 757,216 copies to the trade during the last four months of 1972.

That says nothing of the figures for the other eight months of the year.

Publishers Weekly reminds that the Bible is considered "always the best seller" by the industry. It seldom makes the best-seller list, says the magazine, because "bookstores often neglect to report Bibles, cookbooks and other titles they

consider staple stock."

Another reason, reports the magazine, is that the big sale for the Bible is spread widely through middle America rather than in the large metropolitan center stores that chiefly report to Publishers Weekly. This is particularly true of "The Living Bible."

In addition to Doubleday's sale to the trade, Tyndale House, which publishes the entire "Living Bible" has seven other editions -- included a children's New Testament (the last half of "The Living Bible") and a youth edition -- all in various bindings.

The prices range from \$4.95 for paperback versions to \$24.95 for elegant leather-bound editions. A green hardcover edition selling in the neighborhood of \$10 has been exceptionally well-received.

"The Living Bible" is rapidly finding its place in seminary classrooms, where many students use it for additional insight into the scriptures. It is also found frequently in study

and discussion groups where more than one version of the scripture is desired.

Part of the phenomenal success of "The Living Bible" may be attributed to the description of the Bible itself by Mark Taylor, a Duke University student who is a son of the translator, Kenneth Taylor.

"The Bible can be banned, burned, ignored or denied," said young Taylor. "But it won't go away for it is a living book with a timeless message that has bridged the generation gap for countless centuries. It still retains the power to change lives so that the unusual seems normal and only in retrospect does one observe God working."

"The Living Bible" has outsold such non-fiction books as "I'm O.K., You're O.K." (Harper & Rowe) by Thomas Harris; "Open Marriage" (M. Evans) by Nena and George O'Neill, and "Harry S. Truman" (Morrow) by Margaret Truman. Lower on the list was Ruth Montgomery's

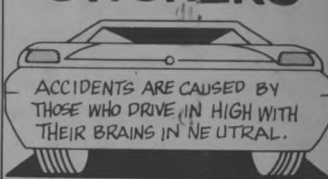
"A World Beyond" (Cowan, McCann & Geoghegan). "The Living Bible" also has outsold two cookbooks and a book on weight loss.

It has outsold the fiction list -- including Alexander two best sellers by Frederick Forsyth (Viking Press), "The Odessa File" and "The Day of the Jackal."

In fifth place on the fiction list was Irvin Wallace's "The Word" (Simon & Schuster). The book deals with the fictional discovery of an ancient manuscript in Biblical times. "Two From Galilee," Marjorie Holmes' "love story" of Mary and Joseph (Revell) ranked eighth. Lower in fiction was "My Name Is Asher Lev" by Chaim Potok (Knopf) and "Semi-Tough" by Dan Jenkins (Atheneum).

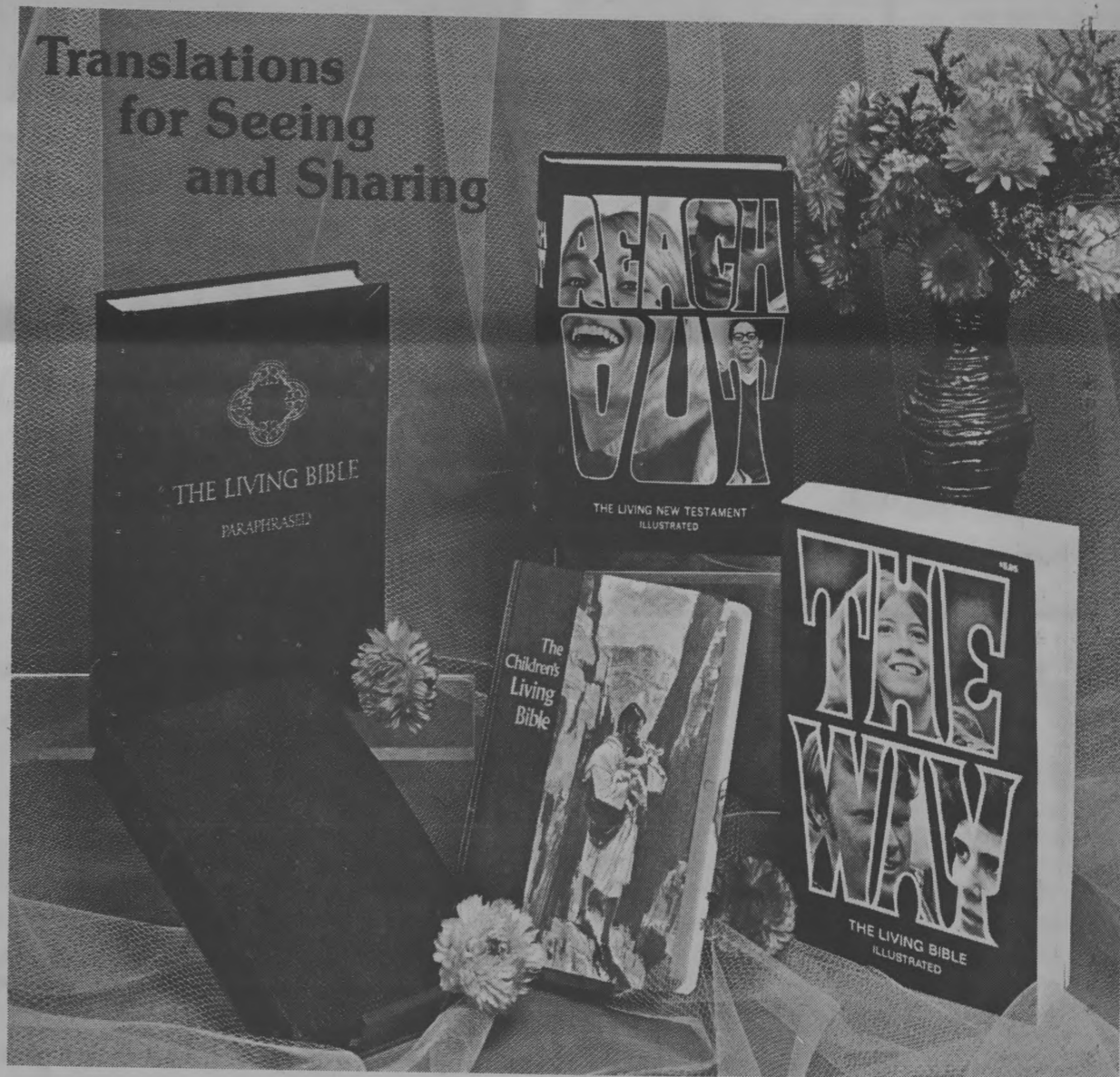

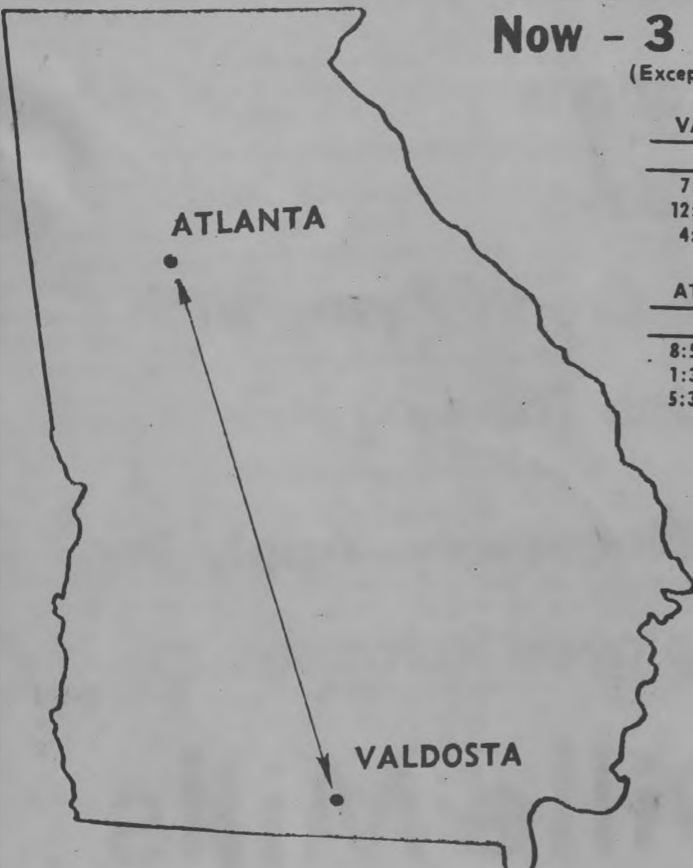

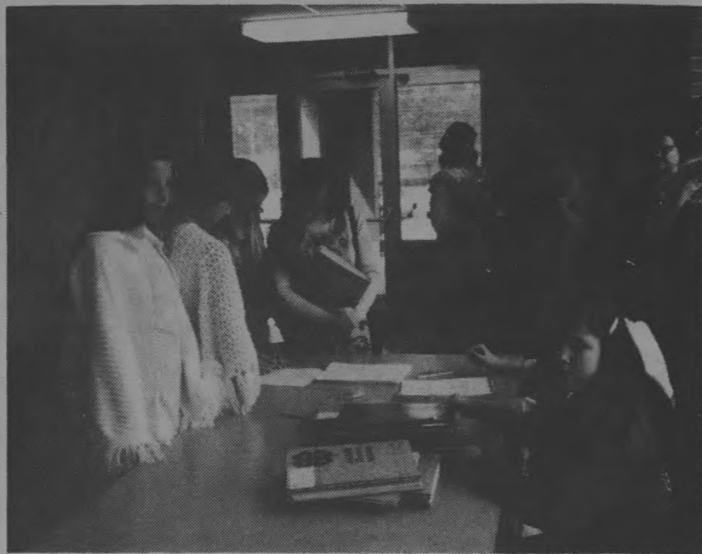

## About your Social Security

Old Father Time escorted 1972 right out the door and in its place is a brand new 1973. We all have high hopes that 1973 will bring all the success and happiness we didn't receive in 1972. We do have some information on changes in Social Security that will bring happiness to many people in Lowndes County in the form of increased social security benefits or increased social security protection. The following are changes affecting Retirement and Survivor benefits:

-Beginning in 1973 (taxable years that end in 1973), higher earnings are permitted before social security benefits are reduced. There will be no loss of benefits if the worker stays under \$2100 a year in earnings, and a loss of only \$1.00 in benefits for each \$2.00 earned above that amount.

-The worker who does not start drawing benefits until sometime after he is 65 will get a "bonus" of one-twelfth of one per cent for each month that he does not draw a benefit because of high earnings. This amounts to one per cent a year, and could mean as much as seven per cent for the person who works for high earnings up to age 72, when the earnings limit no longer applies.

-Earnings after age 72 are disregarded in determining if such a person is entitled to benefits in that year. However, be sure and file for Medicare during 3 months before age 65.

-Persons who are entitled to survivor benefits as a widow (or widower) will get a higher benefit by waiting until they are 65 instead of applying at age 62. By waiting until 65, they will get a benefit equal to what their spouse was drawing, or could have drawn. It will be scaled down for each month before age 65 that the benefit is to be paid, until it reaches 71 1/4 per cent of the spouses earned benefit at age 60. Present beneficiaries will have received any increase due them in the check dated 2-3-73.

-Persons who worked many years at low wages may get a higher benefit under the special minimum benefit provision. Benefits will be paid equal to \$8.50 for each year worked in excess of 10 years, up to 30

years of employment. This means that a worker with 30 years service could get \$170 a month. If any increase is due you, it will be included in the check you get in early April.

-Student benefits will continue through the end of the semester or quarter in which the student reaches age 22 if he has not received or completed the requirements for a bachelor's degree.

-Men who reach age 62 in 1975 will have their benefits figured exactly the same as a woman worker (this has not been true in the past.) Those who reach age 62 in 1973 will have one less year to average, and those reaching 62 in 1974 will have 2 less years to average which should result in a higher social security benefit.

-The requirement that a divorced wife (or widow) must have been receiving support from her husband in order to be eligible no longer applies. She still must have been married at least 20 years, however.

-Survivor benefits may be paid to surviving stepchildren, wives, and widows of insured workers who died accidentally or in line of duty while in service even if the marriage had been less than 3-months duration.

-A number of other minor changes were made that do not affect everyone as the ones above could. Pamphlets which go into detail on all of the changes may be requested from any social security office.
