Union members go back to work at Weyerhaeuser

The Adel plant of Weyerhaeuser Company is back in production after an informal agreement was reached by the company and members of the Woodworkers Union Local 5-356. The agreement was worked out with the aid of a federal mediator.

When workers returned to their jobs Monday it ended a 5-week strike by the union members on October 26, 1971 when agreement could not be reached on a new contract.

Only 55 of the 90 employees have been called back to work since the agreement and the rest will be called as soon as the order log is built back up, according to Plant Manager William Cooke.

Cooke said a three-shift, 24-hour a day operation is now in effect. He stated that the round the clock schedule is for only five days a week, but that will

increase as the order log is increased.

The informal agreement worked out last week gave workers an immediate 5.5 percent pay increase. That is the maximum allowed under Phase II of President Nixon's economic program without approval of the Pay Board.

A union spokesman said that under the agreements of the "unsigned contract" the union could go back out on strike by giving the company 10 days notice.

Negotiations are to continue,

the plant manager said, but no date has been set for a meeting between union and management representatives.

Union spokesmen said that workers had asked for raises which amounted to more than the 5.5 maximum and if they weren't granted they would take

their case to the Pay Board.

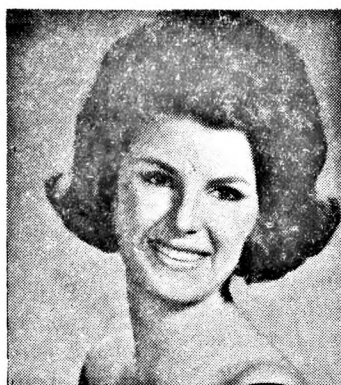
Other conditions the union was asking the company to correct were their contentions that the main plant was too cold in the winter and too hot during the summer months.

The union was also contending that there was too much dif-

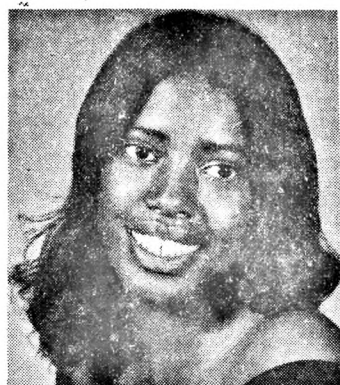

For sixteen coeds, tonight will be the end of many girls' dreams, but for one, it could be the beginning of a trip which will carry her to Atlantic city and the Miss America Pageant. For tonight is when the new Miss VSC will be chosen.

The pageant, which begins at 8 p.m. in Whitehead Auditorium, will be the most glamorous yet in its 20-year history. Along with the seventeen hopefuls, the spotlight will turn upon three young ladies who 'have been there before.' Among the beauties helping to make the Pi Kappa Phi event an unprecedented success will be Linda Reddick, the reigning Miss VSC who made it to the top ten in last year's Miss Georgia contest; Cynthia Cook, the reigning Miss Georgia who made it to the semi-finals in last year's Miss America Pageant; and Laurie Lea Schaefer, reigning Miss America who might meet her successor here at the beginning of the road she took last year.

Ms. Cook is to be Mistress of Ceremonies for the Miss VSC Pageant and will be assisted by Tom Faircloth, a Thomasville native with executive experience in all areas of the Miss Georgia Pageant Association. Ms. Schaefer is to open the pageant with "It's Today," a number described by the Miss American Pageant Association as "a really lively show opener." All of the beauties were contacted and secured by members of the sponsoring Pi Kappa Phi's.

Rounding out this year's list of celebrated pageant participants is an extremely well-qualified panel of judges. Heading the selection team is Mr. Carrol T. Sasser, the president of the Miss Georgia Pageant Association. Sasser, a Columbus resident will be assisted in the selection of the new Miss VSC by Mrs. Nancy Carr Buntin of Columbus, George K. Henderson of Cochran, Georgia and Dick Porter Jr. of Cairo, Georgia. All of the judges for tonight's affair are qualified and certified as Miss Georgia Pageant judges.

In addition to seeing Miss America perform, those attending the gala affair will have a chance to watch a fine entertainment show when the

seventeen young contestants present their assorted talent selections. While most participants will either sing or present monologues, at least one will sing and dance one will offer her own acrobatic dance routine one will perform with a baton, and one young lady will present a modern Indian dance set to jazz.

While most groups sponsoring such events would have been content at having garnered such a star-studded cast at convincing not only the reigning Miss VSC to participate but also Miss Georgia and at persuading Miss America to make her first appearance ever in the state of Georgia the opening of the pageant festivities the Pi Kappa Phi's under the leadership of Bob Hereford and Quimby Melton have gone even further in their efforts to make this year's pageant the most outstanding ever. This year for the first time one of the 17 girls competing who emerges winner of the coveted title will win more than the right to represent the college in the Miss Georgia Pageant.

Cecil Mayor, Council re-elected

Forty-five voters went to the polls Tuesday, February 1, in order to elect a mayor and five councilmen for the new year. Everett Hanks, unopposed candidate for mayor, was unanimously re-elected to fill the post for another term.

Seeking re-election for councilman were Brent Wynn, E.L. Wildes, Billy Wise, Elmo King and Staten Carter. Luther Hamilton entered the race for the

first time and was defeated by the present councilmen.

Mayor Hanks, who has served as mayor for the past four terms, succeeded Earl Harnage for mayor, who served for four terms before being replaced by the present mayor.

Votes received by the candidates were Wynn, 41; Wildes, 36; Wise, 42; King, 44; Carter, 36 and Hamilton, 20.

"We hope that each customer will fill each bag before using another, as only filled bags will be picked up," the Mayor said.

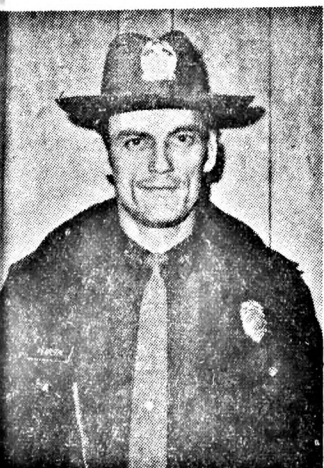
Hahira to play away

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Tips for homemakers

You don't you go ahead and rate that room that's been yesore for the past couple ears. It's not such a dif-t task. A lot of hard work frustration can be elimi-i, if a carefully thought-plan of action is underta-

efore beginning such a pro-decide on a theme for each. Think of several words would like to use in des-ing the room, such as mas-se, feminine, warm, for-casual, etc. As you make ctions, evaluate each in is of the contribution it es to the overall feeling want to create.

Use scaled paper or plain paper and a ruler to draw a di-agram of the room showing di-mensions, placement of fur-niture, positions of windows, doors and any other details. Carry this with you as you se-lect fabrics, colors and fur-nishing ideas. As samples and swatches are accumulated, a complete picture of the room will begin to take shape and costly mistakes will be elim-inated.

PANELING CARE:

Almost every recently built home in Lowndes County has at least one room with walls of wood paneling. Chances are that ease of care was an im-portant factor in this choice. Wood paneling is easy to care for, but some attention is re-quired. The following hints will help you keep your panel-ing in top shape.

In time, the finish on pan-eling may appear dingy due to an accumulation of dust. The surface can be cleaned by applying a good furniture wax and buffing to restore ori-ginal gloss.

Scratches or small scuffed areas can be minimized by rub-bing with a good quality au-to-mobile rubbing compound. It

should be applied sparingly, us-ing a damp cloth, with no more rubbing than necessary. Use very little pressure and rub with the grain. Then wipe the surface clean and use fur-niture wax to restore the ori-ginal gloss.

Pencil and crayon marks, smoke discoloration and oth-er heavily soiled areas can gen-erally be cleaned by rubbing with the grain using a dry non-abrasive cleanser on a dry cloth. Dust away dried clean-ser with a brush. Be sure to clear grooves and joints be-fore the cleanser dries.

UNSTICK:

Don't throw away those en-velopes that sealed themselves when the weather was hot and humid. There's a way to un-stick them. Put them in the freezer for a few hours, then you can open them by slid-ing a table knife under the flap. They pop right open, and the glue remains good, ready to stick again. You've saved all your "ruined" envelopes.



News from Montego Bay, Jamaica's government has increased the number of people enrolled in household registration from 1,000 to 5,000 by the end of this year.

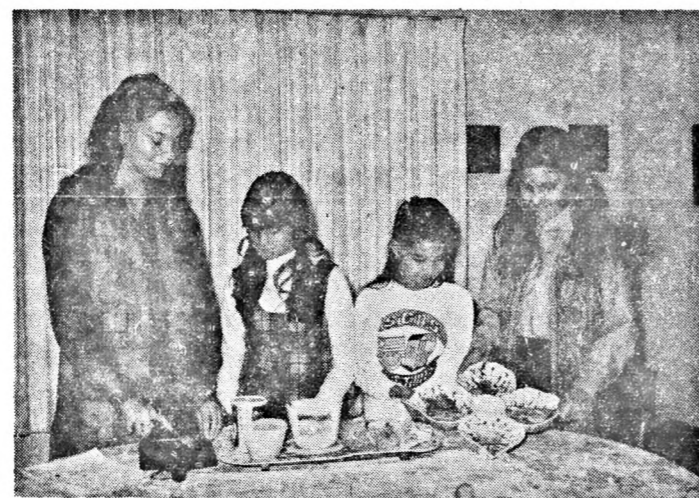
