The newspaper and controversy

Is controversy taboo to a newspaper? What about freedom of the press? Where are a newspaper's responsibilities?

Many feel a weekly newspaper should not "rock the boat" because of the closeness of the people in a small town. But is a newspaper that does not take a stand a "newspaper" or an "ad sheet."

The best argument for editorial comment we have seen lately comes from the Sturgis (Mich.) Journal. They answer the question, "Should a newspaper speak out on controversial subjects?"

Our answer is "Yes".

A newspaper is a privately-owned institution but it is oriented to the public. Regardless of the private ownership any American newspaper has a public responsibility. The responsibility includes the preaching of the American concepts, the right of the individual, honesty in government, dedication to the interests of all the people and the sponsorship of those things which are to the good of the people as a whole.

A newspaper has the obligation to seek its community a better place in which to live. Thus it is impossible to avoid controversial issues. The newspaper must encourage the things that are in the interest of the city, county, state and nation and conversely oppose those things which curtail these interests.

Despite the fact that a newspaper may be privately owned it should not uphold those things which exclusively serve its own interests. For example, a newspaper which opposes the aroused passions of the people in time of stress which will find that it can make itself momentarily unpopular through such opposition. When obstructionists seek to obstruct progress it follows that the promotion of progress creates the disenchantment of the obstructionists.

But there is a rewarding fact concerning this matter of controversy. It is generally recognized that a newspaper cannot promote the best interests of the people of this country through a policy of conformity. Conformity is the easy way for the moment but it does not command respect in the long run. With time even the conformist recognize that the spineless acceptance of conformity is shortsighted, even wicked.

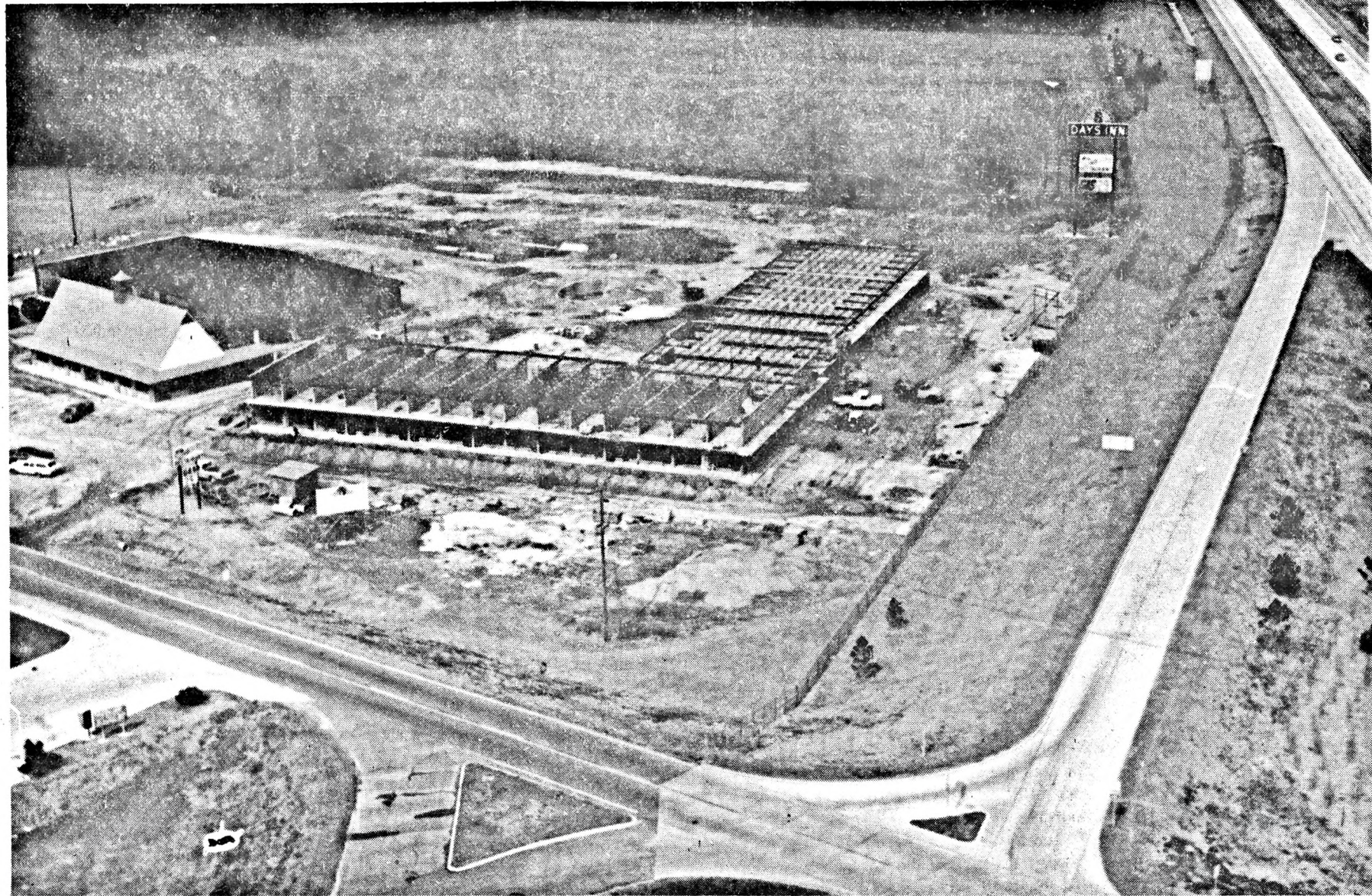
A respected newspaper usually is one that is willing to participate in controversy with the will to see the best interests of the city or county upheld. The great newspapers of the nation are the ones which are forth-right editorially. The newspapers which meekly go along with any proposition with the purpose of offending no one usually are regarded as weak newspapers.

Someone could ask, "What about the newspapers which have no commanding editorial policy but which make big profits from their large volume of advertising?" There are some American newspaper organizations in this category. But actually they are profit making organizations, not respected newspapers as such.

There are no great newspapers in Red China, Castro's Cuba or in the Soviet Union. The proof of this charge is easy. The basic concept of newspapers in totalitarian countries is not to inform the people. Freedom of information is not the goal in these countries. But in America the purpose of newspapers must be to keep the people informed and to provide some editorial guidance. No newspaper can do this if its staff is unwilling to: (1) Become involved in controversy; (2) Offend someone if it is necessary; (3) Refuse to use the editorial and news pages to serve personal goals for privileged interests.

Days Inn Tasty World owners plan formal opening April 1-2

Tobacco buyers who come to Hahira in July and August will have a place to stay this year just outside the city limits.

The pleas of many tobacco companies will be answered April 1 and 2 when the 120 unit Days Inn of American and Tasty World Restaurant opens across I-75 from Hahira.

The modern motel and restaurant has been under construction for four months since groundbreaking October 14, 1971. Stockholders of Goldleaf Investments, Inc., the owners of the restaurant are: M.B. Liles, Jr., Mrs. Jeanette Liles, H.M. Barfield, M.W. Kirkland, D.K. Hollis, Jr., and Dr. J. L. Parrott.

Water and sewer lines are now being laid by the City to accommodate the motel and restaurant and are expected to be completed within the next two weeks.

A formal Grand Opening is planned and announcement will be made later giving complete details.

Earlier this year the owners of Days Inn prepared a publicity release for a quarterly magazine printed by Days Inn of America. Though editorially written it expresses the feelings of most Hahirans as this new business comes to our town.

Realization of a long term dream began in Hahira, October 14th, 1971, when Goldleaf Investments, Inc. broke ground for their 120 Unit Days Inn of America and Tasty World. In 1961 when twenty businessmen organized for the purpose of keeping ownership and management of a local tobacco warehouse on a farm town basis, they had no idea that I-75 would be forth-coming and that one of the Goldleaf tobacco warehouses would find itself on such promising property.

But, this is progress! Hahira grew and prospered remarkably during the ten year interval between 1961 when the warehouses were purchased and 1971 when the construction of the motel facility became an actuality. As is usually the case, growth toward I-75 caused some agony for the downtown establishments; the closing of the Gold Leaf Hotel and the Wal-Dot Motel

2,695 nonfarm jobs filled in 1971

The Valdosta office of the Georgia Department of Labor, managed by W. C. Barrineau, assisted employers in this area in filling 2,695 nonfarm jobs in 1971.

Statewide nonfarm employment increased by two percent in 1971. The Georgia State Employment Service assisted employers in filling 96,886 nonfarm jobs during the year.

The average weekly earnings of insured workers in the Lowndes County area at the close of 1971 was \$103.34, an increase of \$1.86 over the 1970 figure.

Fiscal 1971, 7,352 weekly benefit payments totalling \$292,674, were made to unemployment workers in the Lowndes County area in cases of job loss resulting from no fault of their own.

The Valdosta office serves Berrien, Brooks, Cook, Echols, Lanier and Lowndes counties. It is located at 908 N. Patterson Street, Valdosta, Georgia.

This information is contained in the 1971 edition of the Department's Annual Report, which Labor Commissioner Sam Caldwell has submitted to the Governor and the General Assembly.

W. C. Barrineau said that on a statewide basis, "Georgia was more fortunate than most states." Barrineau said the national average for insured unemployment was 4.0 percent in mid-December as compared with 3.9 percent in Georgia.

Mr. Barrineau said that Georgia's more favorable situation can be attributed to two primary factors: A policy of continuing diversification with regard to industrial development, and expansion of the more successful existing manpower programs and implementation of new programs.

"The Labor Department will continue its increased emphasis on job training and special assistance to the undereducated, unskilled and handicapped," Mr. Barrineau said, "and to place them in gainful employment as soon as possible."

ATLANTA (PRN) -- What would we do without egg beaters, egg separators, egg shell punches, egg slicers, egg picks, omelet pans, souffle dishes, egg timers, and egg cups! Usually the egg gadgets in a kitchen outnumber the eggs in the refrigerator almost 2 to 1.

The ancient Egyptians had a gadget that whirled eggs at such high speeds that the internal friction actually cooked the egg within its own shell. Modern America has a better method. The Oster Corporation has perfected an electric egg cooker with thermostatically controlled heat. It has metal cups for poaching, and a rack for "boiling."

Actually the best feature of this appliance is that the eggs do not really BOIL. Boiling temperatures cause the egg's protein structure to toughen -- just like steak when cooked too long and hot. In addition, overcooking can cause discoloration around the yolk -- that greenish ring formed when the iron in the yolk combines with sulfur from the white.

Have you ever tried soft cooked or coddled eggs? Use the new automatic egg cooker to prepare your own individual 2 minute, 2½, or 3 minute specialty. These are a super treat at lunch time because their simplicity eliminates the need for messing up mixing and cooking pots.

AUTOMATIC SOFT COOKED EGGS

Prepare the unshelled eggs in the Automatic Egg Cooker as directed by the manufacturer.

or

Place unshelled eggs in a sauce pan and cover with cold water. Bring to boiling. Turn off heat and let stand 1 to 3 minutes,

depending on softness desired.

To serve: break shell through middle with a knife. With a teaspoon scoop egg out into individual serving bowl.

For an elegant, European feeling, purchase some egg cups for serving soft cooked eggs. These are available in a variety of colors and shapes.

The smaller ones are used for eating directly from the shell. You simply place the egg, large end up in the cup. Crack and cut the top ½ inch off with a knife or one of those gadgets invented for just that purpose. Eat with a spoon directly from the shell.

To use the larger cups, remove eggs from cooker and bring them piping hot to the table in the cups. Each person cracks his own and spoons it back into the cup, adding bits of toast or cheese, salt and pepper.

To round out the meal, serve the tender eggs with a bowl of luscious fresh fruit. Each person can select and slice his own -- a juicy pear, crisp, red apple, a cluster of grapes, winter oranges or tangerines.

Thin slices of hot toast or chunks of French bread lightly buttered can also be served. An assortment of low fat hard cheeses and thin slices of smoked turkey, roast beef, or cured ham complete this dieter's delight for breakfast or lunch.

Eat slowly. Enjoy every morsel. You'll love the feeling of having eaten well but slim and not stuffed.

I REMEMBER BY THE OLD TIMER

From Ethel Craig, Seneca, Missouri: Sometimes it is interesting to roll back the years and compare old methods with present day methods of manufacture.

In the early days most housewives made their own "soft soap" for all laundering purposes. Scraps of meat fat were always saved and when wood ashes were removed from the fireplace in winter, they were placed in a large, covered hopper and saved to make lye for the soap making.

A week or two before it was time to make the soap, the hopper was started. This was accomplished by pouring water in the top and letting it seep through the ashes. The liquid was caught at the bottom of the hopper, where it was in the form of lye.

The lye was boiled and then the fat was added. It turned to a dark brown liquid. This liquid, or soft soap, was then put into a barrel and kept handy for all laundering purposes.

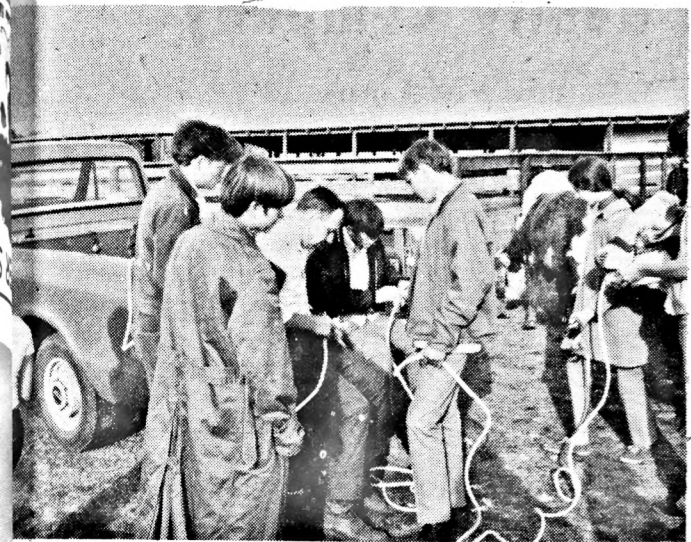

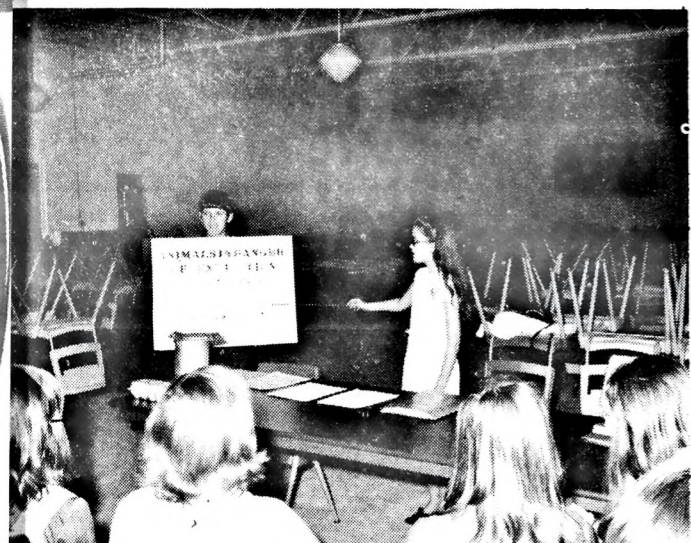

(Editor's note: We've had so many requests for information on Charley Pride, and people asking: "Do you really know Charley and his family?" or "What is Charley Pride really like, in person?" that we decided to include this bit of information as our personal tribute to Charley on winning the "ENTERTAINER OF THE YEAR" Award in 1971. I can't think of ANYONE who deserves it more!)

Yes, I do know Charley and his family, they are among the dearest friends I have in this business. I first met Charley in 1966 after his first record ("Snakes Crawl At Night") had been released. He became a part of K-Bar-T that year, and some few months later he came through Pueblo on his way to a personal appearance and stopped by to see me. I'd never met him up to this time, and my first impression of him was one of him standing at my front door, grinning at me!

I met his wife Rozene (Not Roxanne, as most news stories print it!) at convention the following year, and I met the three children and their dog Pixie in 1969! Even though we seldom get to see each other more than once a year, at convention, we do visit by telephone and by letter.

What is Charley Pride really like? Well, he is EXACTLY as you would imagine him to be from watching one of his stage shows -- warm, friendly, and humbly appreciative of his fans. He does not create any false impressions, but presents himself just as he is; CHARLEY PRIDE, American. He loves people, and he enjoys meeting the fans, but it is becoming increasingly difficult his popularity grows and the crowds at shows number into the thousands.

It is not possible for anyone to reach the utmost peak of success, as Charley has, without their lives undergoing numerous changes. Some, more than others. Some people can handle success and remain basically the same, while others allow success to effect their personal make - up, and do change, in many ways. Success not only brings fame and fortune, it also brings problems which many of us may not be aware of. For one thing, a superstar such as Charley can not live their lives as openly and freely as they might like. The public just won't let them. Family SHOPPING BAG

Ideally, what you really need is a large table top or folding surface three feet wide and six feet long. The average woman likes the cutting surface 34 to 36 inches high, although this may vary with the height of the individual. A surface 56 inches long and 28 inches wide is the very minimum for comfort- able and practical use.

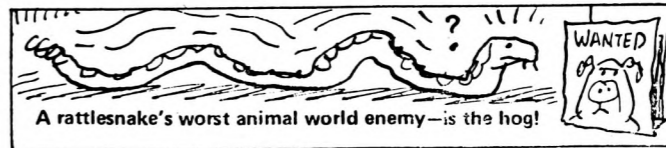

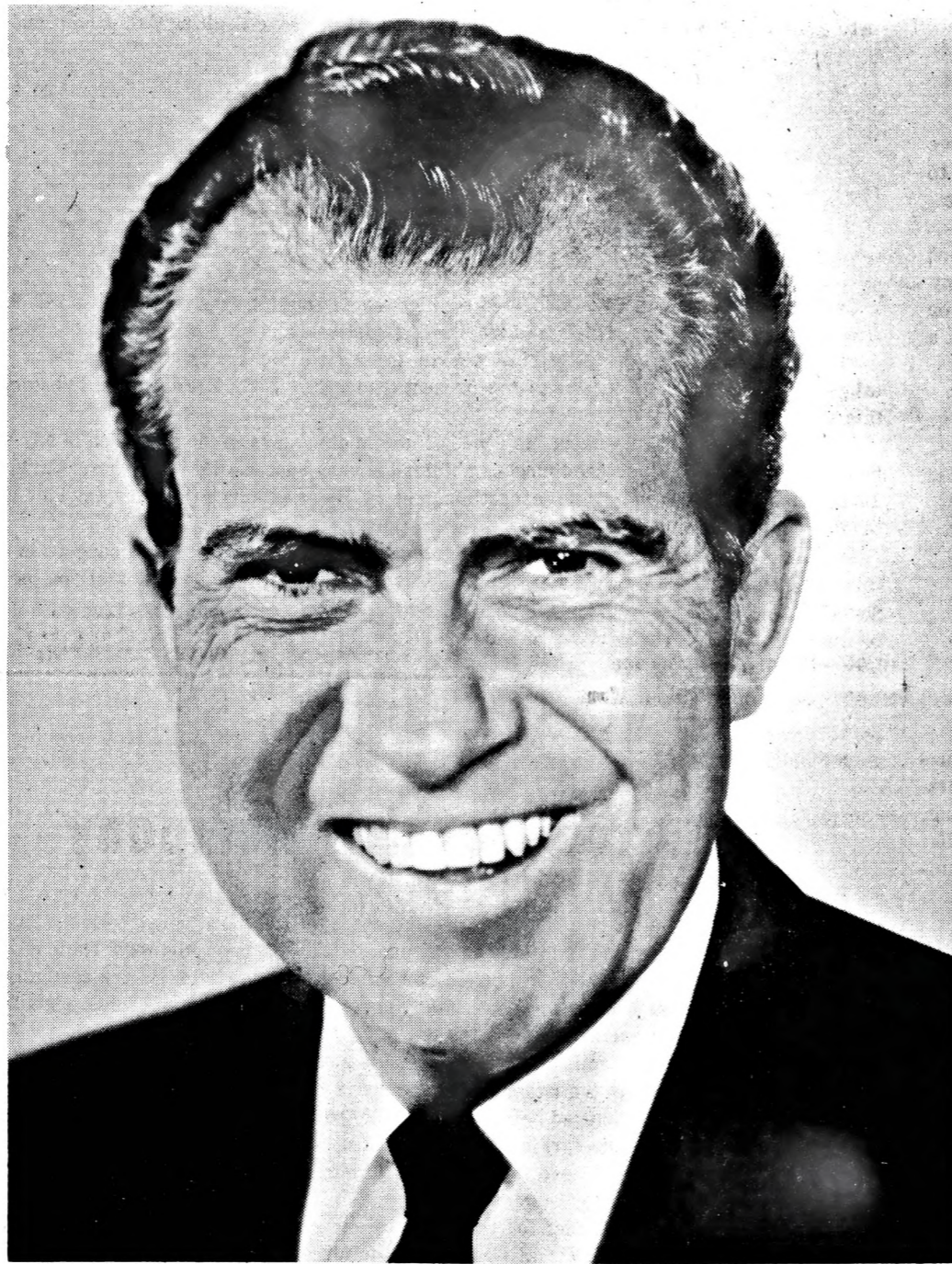
