Quitman resident assists QUOLA

The Quality of Life Association, better known as QUOLA, was founded by Dr. Amanda Brown. Her mentoring encompassed a hugely successful summer project, the Georgia Summer Teen Partnership.

The project held June 7-July 31 gave youth the opportunity and privilege of earning \$8.50 per hour. There were 14 enrollees in the program, plus two volunteers. They planted a raised garden and a contained garden at Quola Headquarters in Valdosta, coordinated and supervised by Mrs. Crouse, urban gardener. They used concrete blocks to divide the area for a planting plot and a variety of vessels for the container garden.

The participants also developed skills in chair and sofa reupholstering, painting classrooms and walls and decorating classroom spaces.

Mrs. Azerlene Williams, assistant to Dr. Brown, helped them with the Twice Nice Shop featuring vintage apparel, jewelry and housewares.

The smaller children planted herbal spices in small

tea cups. Mr. Turner Williams and Ms. Rose Lewis assisted in the project, sponsored by the WIA Youth Work experience program. WIA Staff Supervisors Ms. Brenda Thrasher and Ms. Virginia Sims supervised the South Georgia Workforce Development activity.

Participants gained valuable horticultural skills, developed positive work ethics and learned decorator skills, in addition to enjoying the program. Dr. R. Marie Horne, Quitman resident and Valdosta physician, volunteers in chronicling events for QUOLA.
