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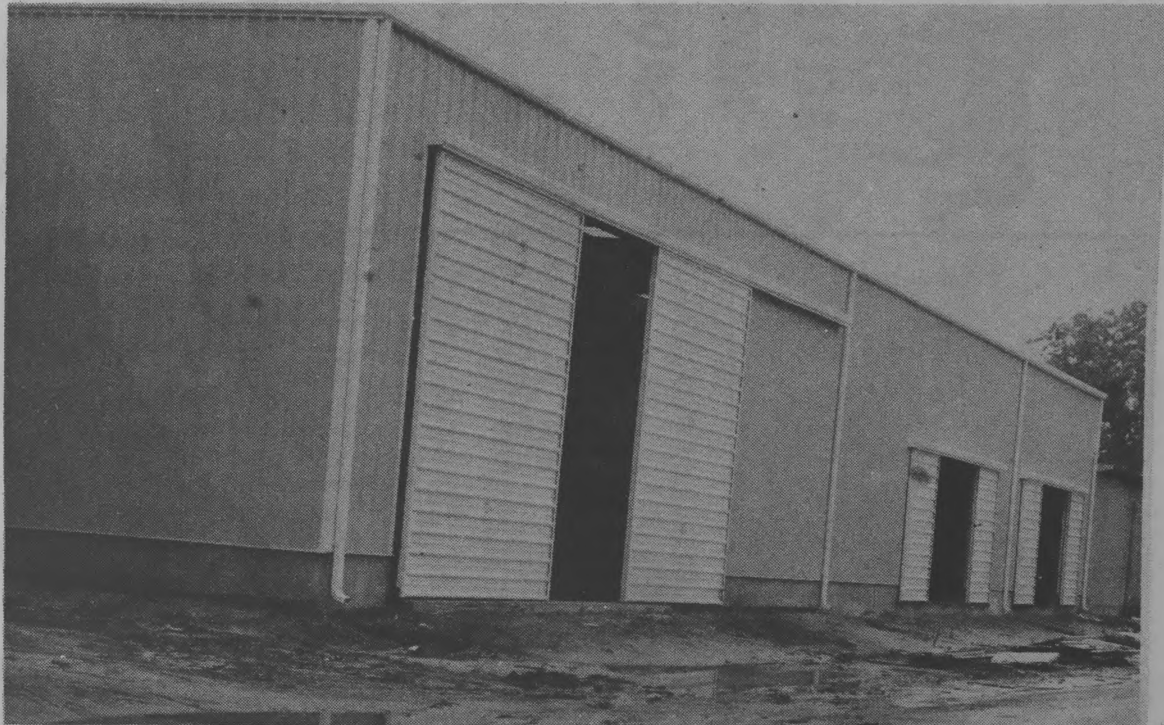

Tobacco warehouse expanding



Going to push button system

A 20,000 square foot metal addition to the Hahira Tobacco Warehouse Number Two has been under construction for the past several weeks and is scheduled to be completed July 1, according to Melvin Parker, half owner of the warehouse.

Parker stated that the addition now gives this particular house 50,000 square feet with the most modern and latest unloading equipment being installed.

He said trucks are to drive through the warehouse and be unloaded with an electric winch mounted to the top of the building. The sheets of tobacco, then are to be unloaded on a conveyor belt, using a push-button type system, Parker explained.

When sheets of tobacco need moving in the warehouse, an entirely new system is to be used.

"We are going to have small

garden tractors pulling trailers," said Parker. "It will look similar to a train, but a trailer can hold nine or 10 sheets."

Parker said the new handling type system for tobacco being installed here is to reduce labor and increase speed.

He explained that unloading tobacco at the house was conventionally done with back

muscle and hand labor.

"These unloading systems are pretty common in the Carolina's," said Parker. "But this is the first to be installed here."

Parker explained the old warehouse number two needed additional space so rather than continuing the wood structure, he and his partner, Bob Wallace, decided to use metal.

They contracted with Bax Steel of Baxley to construct the building.

Parker said the Hahira warehouses are going to sell more tobacco this season.

"Under a rotation system between one and two of buyer markets, the one set buyer markets get a change to sell 50,000 pounds more per day for each set of buyers," said Parker.

Parker was in Hahira recently to check on the warehouse construction and do some work himself.

"I just don't feel right unless I do a little of the work myself," said Parker. "Me and my floor manager, B. J. Miley, have worked here three or four weeks."

Parker and Wallace, both of Smithfield, N. C. operate the four Hahira warehouses during the summer. They have operated tobacco warehouses here for about 20 years.

Martin Funeral Home here was in charge of arrangements.

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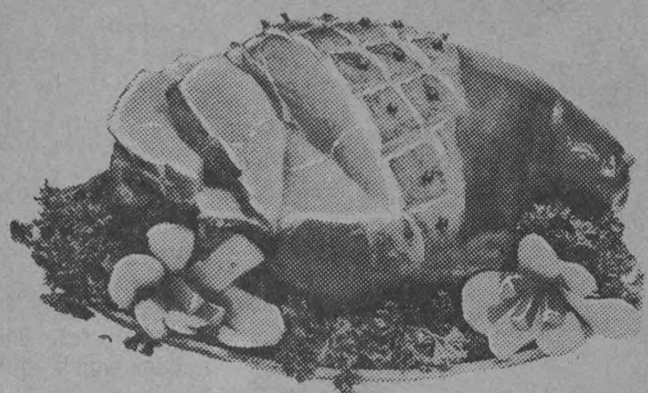
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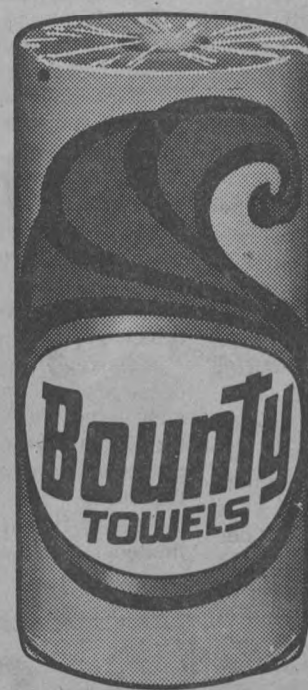
