Tips for Homemakers

Landscape Notes
Mr. T. G. Williams, Jr. and Mr. Neal Weatherly, Jr., Specialist, Cooperative Extension Service of the Landscape Department states: Grading can play an important role in the development of a landscape plan. When a new building is to be placed on a sloping lot, an attempt should be made to harmonize the building with its surroundings. The house should be designed to fit the lot. Often a long, low house will have little exposed foundation on one end and six to eight feet of concrete foundation exposed at the other end. This creates a problem in arranging plant material to relate the structure to the lot. With a steep slope, a split level house would conform to the site better. Grading should be kept to a minimum to retain the natural character of the building site. Many good trees could be saved if this practice was used in more cases. Of course, some grading is necessary on most lots. The slopes should be graded to allow flow of rainfall away from the walls of the building. Walks and drives should follow the natural contours as much as possible. If you want to save a large shade tree in an area that must have two or three feet of fill soil, a "well" of brick or stone should be constructed around the tree trunk before the soil is filled in. Build the wall in a circle around the tree leaving 12 inches to 18 inches of open space between the trunk and the wall. Drainage tile should be placed in three or more directions out from the well to insure good drainage. Tar paper should be placed over the tile. Place a two to four inch layer of crushed rock or coarse gravel over the entire area under the tree branches. Then fill in the soil to the desired grade. The roots must have oxygen. A heavy layer of fill soil buries the feeder root system too far under the ground line and the trees suffer and often die. Lowering

the grade of the lawn area around trees is also a dangerous practice if precautions are not taken to protect the roots near the surface. When a large number of the feeder roots are removed the tree is bound to suffer.

The Front Entrance

There are several points to consider when planning the front walk and drive:
1. First, make it convenient to park near the front door.
2. Have a convenient and attractive walk from the parking area to the front entrance.
3. Emphasize the entrance walk with special treatment, such as a lamp post and a low planting of evergreens, ground cover, or a flower bed.
4. Screen the service entrance from the public area by a fence, wall or hedge. If visitors don't see the rear entrance, they will more likely use the more convenient front walk.
5. Emphasize the front entrance by the use of a contrasting door color.
6. Emphasize the front entrance by planting specimen evergreen shrubs. Use texture and color to give a definite contrast to other plants nearby.
