Hahira officials have 'more than one bone to pick' with General Telephone, PSC

Want Valdosta - Hahira service

When Hahira city officials go before the Georgia Public Service Commission in Atlanta February 21, they will have more than one bone to pick with General Telephone Company, according to Hahira Mayor Gene Webb.

A recent 69 percent rate increase for business phones and

more than 39 percent increase in home phone rates by General Telephone spurred the initial protest, and now Mayor Webb and several other city officials will additionally attempt to make arrangements for toll-free service to Valdosta for telephone subscribers in Hahira.

As the system works now, most of Lowndes County is served by Southern Bell and inter-area calls are toll-free, while General Telephone serves Hahira in the northern part of

the county. To call Valdosta from Hahira on the present system, a customer must pay long-distance rates.

"We pay about \$50,000 more per year for service that people in the lower part of the county," Webb said, "and we feel that such an excessive rate is very unfair since they are able to call Valdosta toll-free and the people of Hahira cannot."

Richard C. Bobo, General Telephone's South Georgia Division Manager, said that toll-free service from Hahira to

Valdosta would mean installation of additional equipment not only on the part of General Telephone, but also for Southern Bell.

Bobo estimated that the toll-free service just for General Telephone would mean a rate increase of \$7.00 per month for each telephone subscriber, but Mayor Webb said the people of Hahira would never agree to such an excessive increase.

Nearly three inches of snow blanketed Hahira Saturday, February 10. While it was fun in Hahira middle Georgia found itself hard hit with fourteen inches of snow.

Thousands of people wiped the sleep from their eyes and replaced it with wonder last Saturday morning as they stood at frosted windows to watch the awesome beauty of a rare South Georgia snowfall.

The snow, which began coming down around midnight Friday and was still falling in plentiful and steady flakes on into the morning Saturday, reached a record 2.5 inches in Hahira, with drifts up to six inches in some spots.

By mid-morning the landscape in all sections of the county had blossomed with both youngsters and adults who took advantage of the short-lived winter wonderland by creating snowmen in all shapes and sizes and by engaging in snowball feuds.

But while the blanket of snow covering the ground and clinging to trees and shrubs reminded South Georgians of scenes on Christmas cards, the abnormal weather also brought hazardous driving conditions and cold temperatures to the normally balmy South.

Interstate 75 was closed from Perry northward and officials warned travelers on the highway below that area to drive with extreme caution and to travel only if necessary because of icy road conditions. Several bridges along north-south routes, including the one on U. S. 41 at Sparks, were also closed to traffic for precautionary purposes.

The closing of roads over the weekend left many people stranded and motels and hotels throughout this area northward

were jammed with travelers who were forced to find lodging. Local motel and restaurant officials noted that several groups of people had come from Gainesville, Jacksonville, and other Florida cities just to view the splendor of the infrequent sight.

The amount of snowfall grew heavier toward the north and fell in a band nearly 100 miles thick on a line from Columbus through Macon and to Augusta. Tifton reported about three inches of snow, and approximately eleven inches carpeted the Macon area, well above the record of 6.9 inches set in 1914. Augusta had more than eight inches, and Columbus recorded seven.

The Hahira area snowfall, evidence of which remained Sunday and even on into Monday of this week, was the first to blanket the ground since 1968 when flakes stuck for a brief period before melting. The last significant account was in February of 1958 when 1¾ inches of snowflakes came, down.

Prior to that time, 2.2 inches were reported in 1934, and other snowfalls include those in 1899, 1912 and 1917.

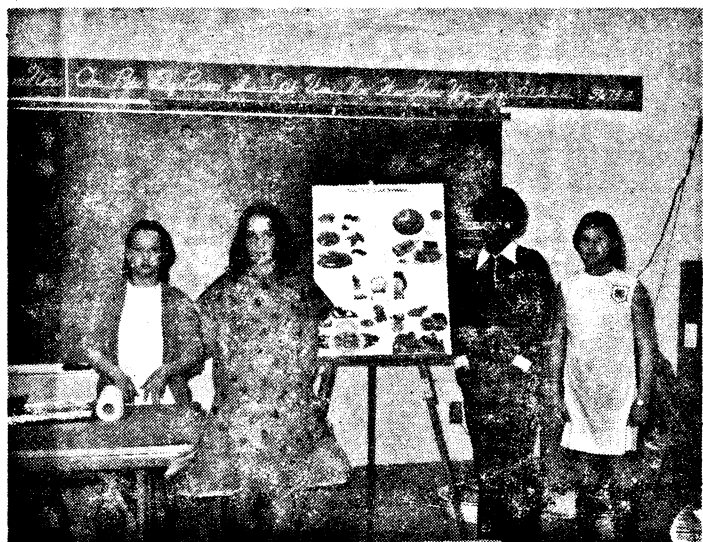

getting the toll-free service to Valdosta without any additional charges," he said. "The people here won't vote for such an outrageously high phone increase."

One of the major complaints involves the fact that there is no direct line from Hahira to the emergency areas of Lowndes County such as the sheriff's office, the hospital and other county offices. Webb stated that if a solution for a complete toll-free service could not be met, the Hahira officials would at least work toward the installation of a direct line to these areas.

"We plan to negotiate with the company in any reasonable

way," the mayor said, "but so far they haven't offered any fair and just means of helping us to solve our problems. Toll-free service to the emergency areas would be better than nothing at all, but it would still be an unfair decision on their part."

Webb also said he had no personal complaints with General Telephone, but that several people had entered criticism of the phone services the company offers in the Hahira area.

Representing Hahira in the February 21 hearing in Atlanta will be Mayor Webb, City Councilmen James Barger and J. D. Sorrell, County Commissioner Julian Lawson and City Attorney Wade Coleman.
