On rural mail route Son replaces father

Lloyd W. Fry retired May 11 as Rural Substitute Carrier of Record serving the Hahira Post Office. Official records go back to June, 1946, but his actual service goes back to 1941, when he began working as substitute for retired carrier Cary Mathis, giving him a total of 32 years service.

During one period of time, Mr. Fry was the substitute carrier for both Mr. Mathis and the late Bob Passmore. He recalls some of the problems created by this double duty, particularly when both carriers wanted to be off the same day. Back then, the routes were much shorter than they are now, averaging 60 miles each per day in contrast to today's 115 miles, and the carrier's day was much shorter.

The 64-year-old carrier is

being replaced by his son, Larry. Larry competed for the carrier position held by his father for 32 years, and passed the examination with one of the highest grades ever received by anyone in this area, according to Norwood Miley, postmaster.

Born in Ruso, North Dakota, Mr. Fry is the son of Mrs. Clara Fry and the late Mr. Lawrence Fry of Hahira. He moved with his family to Miles City, Montana at an early age where he grew up and attended school. The family later moved to Tampa, Florida before moving to Hahira in 1925. He is married to the former Jewel Register, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. W.O. Register of Hahira. An only child, Larry, retired from the Air Force in February

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Argument at bar

Cook man charged in Hahira shooting

Two Cook County brothers have turned themselves in to Hahira Police after one was charged with murder in the shooting death of a 30-year-old Valdosta man during an argument at a bar here Monday night.

Police Chief David L. Webb said Clarence Jackson, 23, and his 22-year-old brother, Donald Jackson, were waiting at the waiting at the city jail Tuesday morning after the shooting incident in which Roy Hart of 705 E. Cummings Street in Valdosta was killed.

Webb said Mary Anne Butler, of Cecil, was also shot in the incident but required only emergency treatment before being released.

The older Jackson brother, for whom warrants had already been sworn, was also grazed in the shoulder by a bullet and required medical treatment at Hahira Doctor's Clinic and transferred to Lowndes County jail to await trial.

Webb stated that the shooting took place in Lucas' Bar in Hahira around 10:30 p.m.

The Chief stated that according to reports Hart was in the bar with the Butler woman and when the Jackson brothers came in Clarence said something to Hart in an attempt to start an argument. At this time Mark O. Lucas, operator of the bar, was reported to have told one party to go out the back door and one party to leave out the front because he didn't want any trouble at the bar.

It was reported that Hart and the Butler woman started toward the front door when Clarence Jackson ran around in front of them, blocking the door. At this time, according to

witnesses, Jackson pulled a 38 caliber pistol and started firing at Hart, knocking him and the Butler woman to the floor.

Webb stated that, according to the report, several more shots were exchanged between Hart and Jackson with the Butler woman receiving one bullet in the left thigh. Clarence Jackson was reported to have left the scene by the front door and his brother, Donald, was seen going to the rear of the building to exit.

The Chief stated that when Sgt. Larry Carter of the local police department arrived on the scene he found a 38 caliber pistol laying beside Hart on the floor with four empty shells in the gun and one live shell. He said that four bullets had been fired from Hart's pistol and five from Jackson's. All nine bullets have accounted for, the Chief said.

Sgt. Carter stated that after he arrived and discovered the shot man he summoned an ambulance from South Georgia Medical Center in Valdosta.

Chief Webb was called to the scene and summoned Det. David Arnold of the Lowndes County Sheriff's office to assist in the investigation.

After the ambulance arrived Coroner Harold Moore arrived and pronounced Hart dead at the scene from the three gunshot wounds and ruled "murder" as the cause of death.

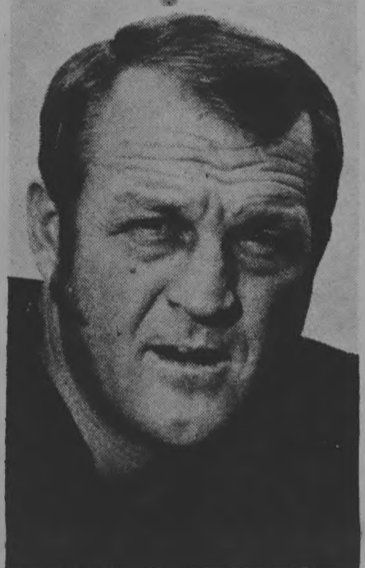
Hart was struck in the stomach, left lung, and left side of the back.

Webb said Hart's brother, David Hart, swore the murder warrants for Jackson Monday night.

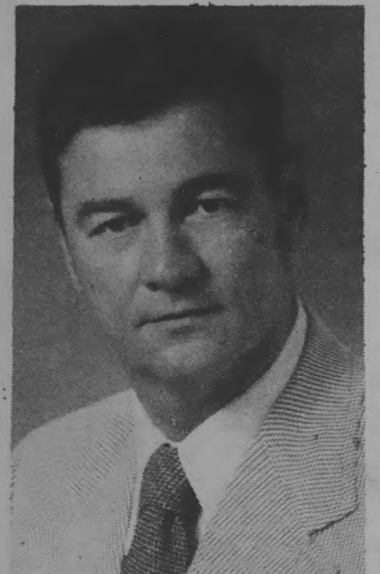
HES Parents - Teachers to meet Monday night

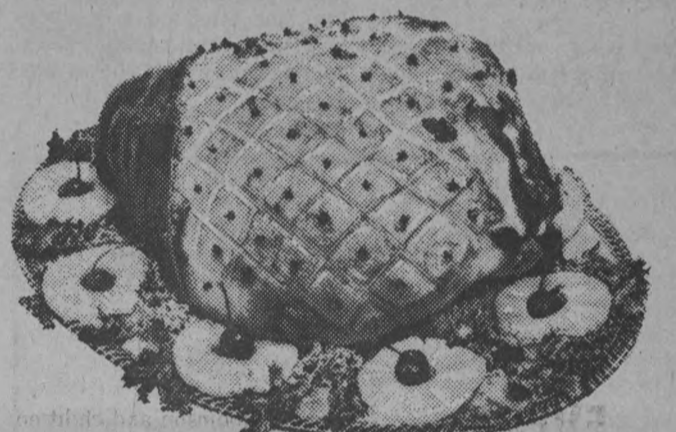

farming completely in 1960 in order to work full time with the Highland Church of Christ in Abilene, Texas. After preaching there nearly nine years he resigned the pulpit in order to devote full time to the field of personal evangelism. The three congregations that brother McKnight has worked with as evangelist have more than doubled their membership with two years from the time he began working with them. During this time he has preached in various foreign countries, toured Bible lands, produced 14 movies, written two books, been instrumental beginning and assisting many good works. His personal work book has sold more copies than any other similar works in the brotherhood. It is being used in every state in the union and in several foreign countries. The people around Hahira will remember him best from "JOURNEY TO ETERNITY"

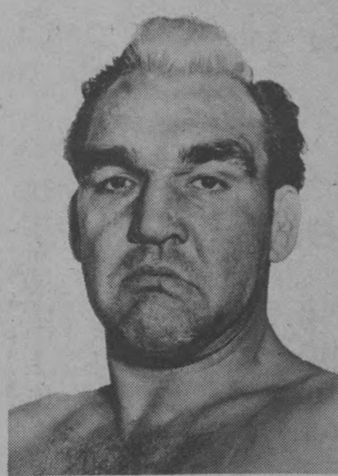

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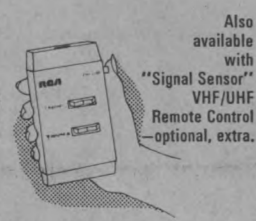

From the evidence presented, Anderson's position is untenable. Leaking the information to him was an illegal act and he was a witness. Under the circumstances the leak, like a robbery he may witness while walking home from work, does not fall under professional secrecy. He is bound to tell what he knows when asked by legitimate authority.

Too, by publishing the information which he knew was secret he became in a way an accomplice in the law violation of the informer.

Dear Father Lester: It was a blow to find out a fellow I've been working with in the same office for almost a year was a former Nazi.

Over a few beers we had quite a discussion and he says not all Nazis were bad and many of them were seriously convinced — at first, anyway — that they had the right idea. He even went to church on Sundays.

Is this possible to lead a seemingly contradictory life and be a man of good morals? — A.A.

Dear A.A.: For a relatively short time it seems psychologically possible for a person to have a clear conscience yet to be a militant atheist, Communist, Nazi or follower of some other ideology which contradicts major moral truths. However, in my opinion, over a long, protracted period his position would be challenged by an almost natural intuition.

A stand for the permissibility of murder, for instance, would be challenged by the man's instinctive reaction against murder. It seems to me that he could not keep denying these natural objections without doing violence to his conscience and thereby being immoral.

Veterans Corner

(Editor's Note: Help are authoritative answers by the Veterans Administration to some of the many current questions from former servicemen and their families. Further information on veterans benefits may be obtained at any VA office.)

Q - I want to start college in the fall, but I have limited funds and I'm told it takes two or three months after I start to get my GI allowance. Does VA have a loan fund to help me?

A - Under recent legislation passed by Congress, VA can advance (effective August 1973) as much as two months allowance to veterans who apply to VA prior to registration at school. A check for the first and second months of school can be waiting for him when he registers for classes.

Q - I am a widow who received dependence and indemnity compensation payments for a short time based on the death of my first husband who was a veteran. After his death, I remarried, and now my second husband died. May I claim benefits on my first husband's service again?

A - Yes, upon submission and proof of death of your second husband, VA benefits will be restored.

Tips for Homemakers

FACE LIFT FOR SUMMER FURNITURE

SPRING -- A time for outdoor barbecues and ice cream suppers. Prepare for the busy season ahead by examining your outdoor furniture for any needed repairs. Major types and problems include:

Redwood
Redwood furniture usually has a clear finish. At least once a year, a coat of redwood sealer is needed (underside as well as top) to seal wood against moisture, dirt and stains to restore the original color of the wood.

To refinish, remove old paint with a water-rinse paint remover. When thoroughly dry, sand away stains or marks with very fine sandpaper. (Redwood is a soft wood that scratches and dents easily.) Apply several coats of clear or lightly tinted wood stain, a waterproof penetrating finish, or a redwood preservative.

To repair a cracked or split board, pry gently apart and work in water-proof glue. Push together and reinforce with clamps or tie with strips of fabric above and below the cracked area.

Wrought Iron

Hose off or wash with suds and rinse. Retouch any nicks or chips with paint to prevent rusting. If finish is in good condition and only needs renewing, rub with steel wool or sandpaper. Wipe clean with a cloth dampened in paint thinner. When thoroughly dry, apply one or two coats of outdoor enamel.

If finish has cracked or peeled, remove with steel wool or a stiff brush. Remove all traces of rust with medium steel wool or sandpaper, then wash with a commercial metal conditioner that contains phosphoric acid. (CAUTION: Wear rubber gloves when working with this solution.) Rinse the acid away and allow to dry. Finish by coating the piece with two coats of outdoor enamel.

A metal-wax coating should be applied twice a year for general maintenance. In coastal areas, wrought iron should be cleaned frequently to prevent salt deposits.

Aluminum

Frames of chairs and tables made of aluminum may in time become dull, pitted and dirty. To clean, remove dust and dirt with a stiff brush and damp cloth. Polish using soap-filled steel wool pads. Rinse and remove residue with a dry cloth. Automobile paste wax may be used to restore luster.

If surface has discolored, wash with phosphoric acid metal conditioner (same as for wrought iron). Rinse well and polish with fine grade steel wool. Wipe clean with a cloth dampened in paint thinner and coat with a clear, non-yellowing acrylic lacquer.

Wicker and Rattan
Both wicker and rattan absorb dirt easily and tend to fade. To clean, first vacuum to remove dust. Scrub with a brush, warm water and detergent. Rinse and dry thoroughly. Repair loose or broken strands with waterproof glue. Finish by spraying the surface with a coat of clear varnish. If a piece is badly stained, spray with outdoor enamel.

Plastic Webbing, Cushions, Canvas

Plastic webbing should be washed several times a year with detergent suds. Rinse and wipe dry. If webbing is worn or frayed, it should be replaced.

Plastic or canvas cushions and seats should be scrubbed with a brush and detergent suds, rinsed and dried thoroughly. Any rips, tears or holes should be patched with matching fabric using fabric cement. Ripped seams may be repaired with heavy cord.

Plastic or canvas that is badly faded can be restored with fabric coating, use the aerosol spray for plastic and the brush-on kind for canvas.

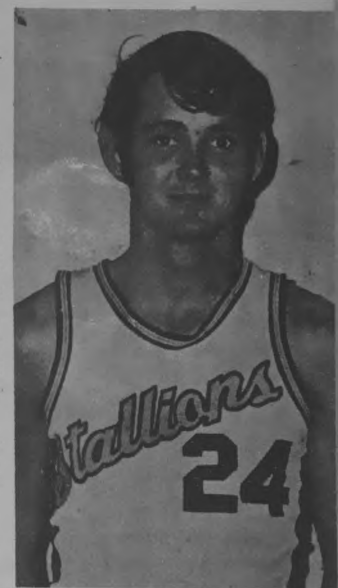

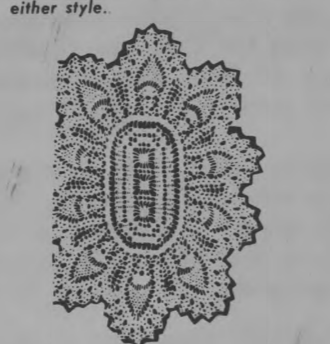

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Palmer legend embraces golf, gold and family

The nicest thing happened to Arnold Daniel Palmer on his way to the first tee.

A teen-age girl ran up to him and cried: "Oh, Mr. Palmer, thanks so much for answering my letter. It meant a lot to me."

Palmer broke stride, caught the girl's name and remembered the letter.

"Well, how's your golf game now?" he asked.

"Just fine," the girl replied, and ran off happily.

Before he reached the tee Arnie had stopped to sign half a dozen autographs and talk with an old friend he hadn't seen since about a year ago.

A few minutes earlier he

had held a locker room business conference with Jack Nicklaus, Palmer's arch foe from tee to green but his partner in the construction of two golf courses (Ironwood) at Palm Desert, Calif.

How does this 43-year-old holder of nearly 80 professional golf titles manage to splice so much into each hour of his life?

Palmer said: "I like golf and I like people. They seem to go together. So all I have to do is to fit the business activities in and there you have it. If I have any philosophy, that's it."

Some observers have said the late President Dwight D. Eisenhower gave golf its respectability and Arnold Palmer added the charm that has

made it a popular participant and spectator sport as well in the last 20 years.

Palmer agrees that Gen. Eisenhower brought to golf a stature it needed, but he won't talk about his own contribution to the game.

Other professionals, however, will tell you about this man who has parlayed a links career into a legend and a multimillion-dollar industrial hierarchy.

"Nobody has done so much for golf as Arnie," says Frank Beard, a veteran pro who one year took home \$100,000 in prize money without winning a tournament.

"Arnie's popularity with all kinds of people has built the game and attracted financial sponsors who otherwise might not have been interested.

"I figure that for every dollar I win on the tour (now offering more than \$8 million in prize money each year), Arnie is responsible for about a quarter of it."

The president of two companies which produce golf clubs and equipment and a variety of sports clothing, Palmer has a staff of five people to take some of the pressure off, give him advice and a chance to remain on the Professional Golfers' Association tour at least part of each season.

For all his travels by private jet or commercial airliner to play in a tour tournament or just tend to business, Palmer leaves plenty of time for his wife, Winnie, and their two daughters, Peggy, 17, and Amy, 14.

Mrs. Palmer travels some with her husband from their modest, white-painted home at Youngstown, Pa. She can join him more now that the girls are away at school most of the year.

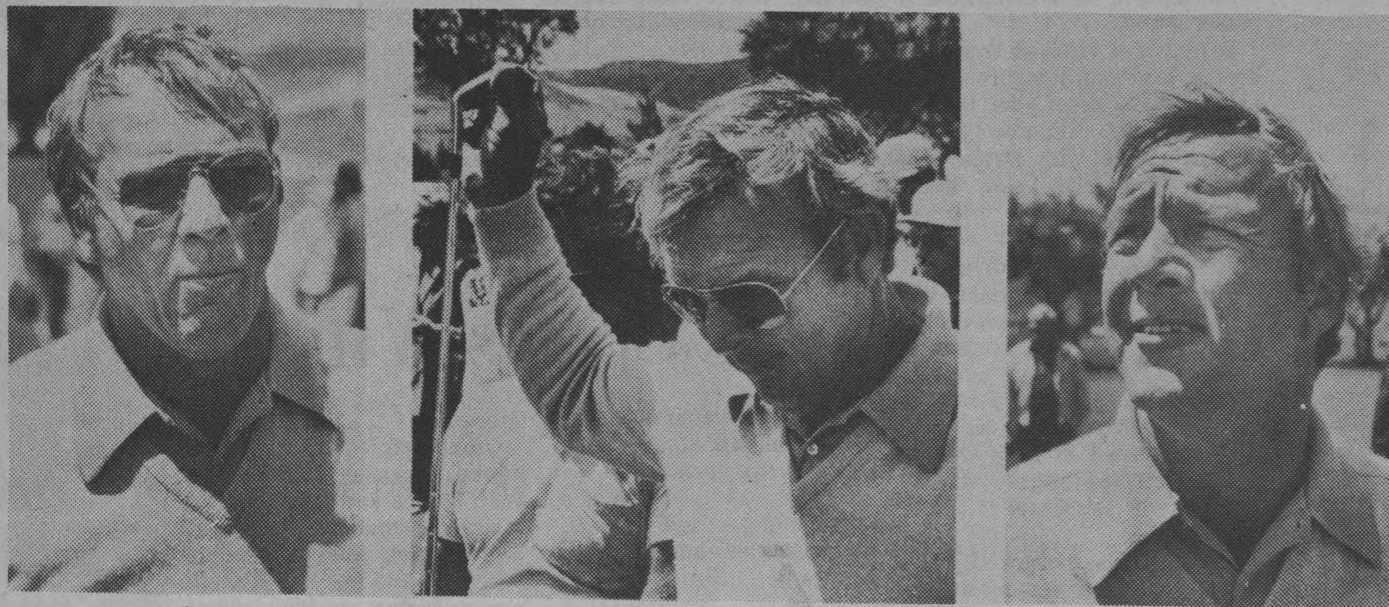
Youngstown is a village at the edge of Latrobe. Another nearby hamlet is Ligonier. And in the midst of this little valley where Palmer was born and reared lies the Latrobe Country Club.

Arnie's father, M. J. (Deke) Palmer, a golf professional for half a century, presides over these rolling hills and sand traps where the younger Palmer learned his golf from dad. Arnold Palmer now owns the course, and another one nearby, but dad still is the boss.

"Dad's 69 now, but sometimes he still breaks 80," Palmer says proudly.

REPORTS FROM THE UNITED STATES SENATE

THE UNITED STATES trade situation has generated considerable concern throughout Congress and the Administration. Foreign commerce reports and newspaper headlines continue to point out how fast we are losing ground in the world market.

President Nixon has proposed a far-reaching trade reform program meant to strengthen the U.S. position. Legislation in this area will come before the Senate Finance Committee, on which I serve, and it will have to be carefully considered by Congress. In terms of our nation's overall economic stability, its importance cannot be over-emphasized.

People don't have to look very far to see the results of the U.S. trade deficit. Driving to work, for instance, one notices an increasing number of foreign cars where, 10 years ago, there were American models. In electronics, radio and stereo shops, most of the equipment has trade names that originated abroad. Department stores are offering more and more foreign commodities, especially textile and apparel goods produced under cheap labor conditions that would be illegal in this country.

FROM A SIZEABLE trade surplus just a few years ago, the United States has dipped to a trade deficit that totaled almost \$8.5 billion in the past two years. While other nations surge ahead, the United States falls more and more behind. While West Germany revalues her mark and Japan revalues her yen, the U.S. has had to devalue the dollar twice in a 14-month period.

By way of example of what has been taking place, we slipped from a \$241 million trade surplus with Japan as recent as 1964 to a \$4.1 billion deficit last year. We fell from a 1964 surplus of \$676 million to a deficit of almost \$3 billion with Canada last year. The European Common Market also accounts for a serious U.S. deficit.

IN SHORT the United States is being out-traded, out-produced, and out-worked. We are being out-negotiated at the trading table, and the net result has been a loss of dollars and a loss of American jobs.

As we move toward trade reform legislation, the paramount goal should be to demand equality of treatment in foreign markets that they get in ours, in order to erase the trade deficit and protect the jobs of American workmen.

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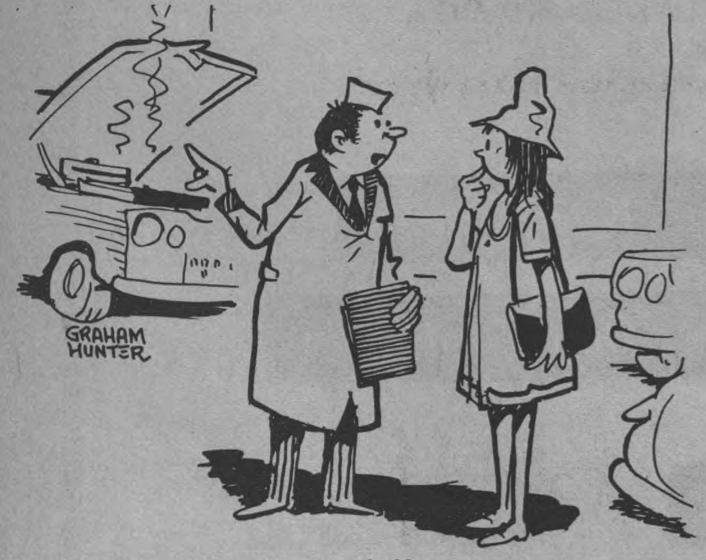

about your Social Security

One of the most important social security changes is in the tax rates. The wage base (amount taxable) had already been scheduled to go to \$10,800.00 in 1973 and to \$12,000.00 in 1974 and this part of the Law remains unchanged. But the tax rates go up. Beginning with 1973, you'll be paying \$5.85 in social security taxes for every \$100.00 of your wages, and your employer will match it. (The rate in 1972 was \$5.2 per cent and it had been slated to increase to 5.5 per cent). The rates are fixed under the Law until 1997 but the wage base could go up after 1974 if the cost of living goes up.

Security budget remains balanced.

Here's how the tax table for social security looks under the new law:

- Calendar Years - Employee Tax - Self-Employed Tax.
- 1973 to 1977 - 5.85 per cent - 8.00 per cent.
- 1978 to 1980 - 6.05 per cent - 8.25 per cent.
- 1981 to 1985 - 6.15 per cent - 8.35 per cent.
- 1986 to 1997 - 6.25 per cent - 8.45 per cent.

The Law provides that a portion of the tax goes for Medicare. So this year you'll be paying 4.85 per cent of your salary for retirement, survivor and disability protection and 1.00 per cent for Medicare. The Congress again made sure, with the tax rates, that the Social

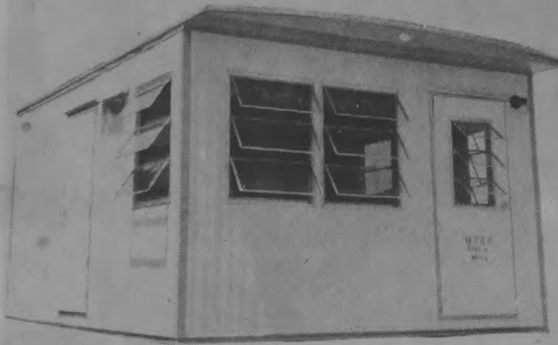
