16 years on Red Carpet Committee

Hall lauded for dedicated service

The Valdosta-Lowndes County Red Carpet Committee was doing its usual thing Saturday night -- showing a splendid sense of southern hospitality and royally entertaining Moody's newest batch of student pilots.

Bob Hall, as he had done many times before, was busy throughout the evening welcoming each Moody newcomer to Southern Georgia.

But Saturday night proved to be different for Hall as the spotlight was turned on him in addition to the new arrivals. In a moment of tribute, Hall was honored for his many years of selfless contribution to Moody AFB.

Col. Cecil E. Fox, wing commander, presented a silver tray to Hall, commemorating his long distinguished service as chairman of the Military Affairs Committee. He retired as chairman after serving in that post since 1957.

During the presentation, Colonel Fox noted that Hall has been a Military Affairs leader since Moody was reactivated in 1951. When presenting the silver tray to him, Colonel Fox remarked, "Many of the programs Bob Hall helped establish here have served as guidelines for other bases throughout the Air Force."

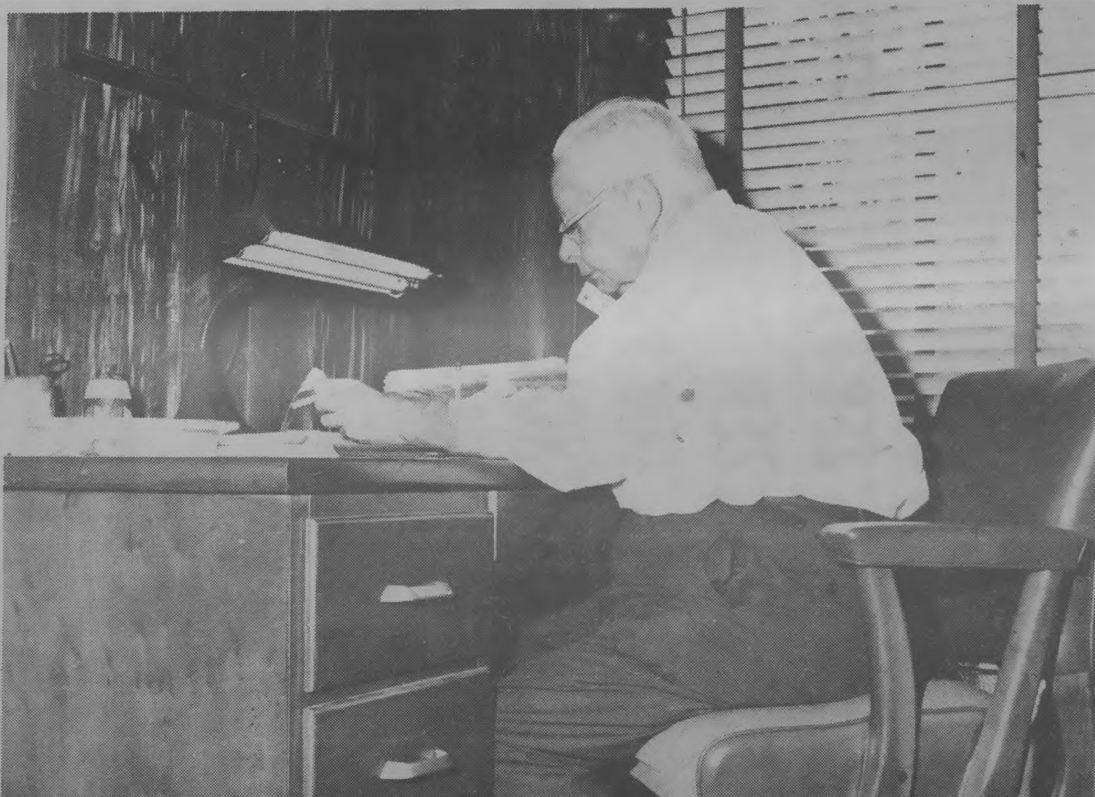
During his long tenure in office, Hall was instrumental in initiating many vital programs, including the inauguration of the Red Carpet eight years ago.

A Patten Publication

Former Quitman publisher Daniel dies

Mr. Daniel was the former publisher of the Free Press prior to the newspaper's purchase by Patten Publications, Inc., the publishers of the Hahira Gold Leaf

Royal Daniel Jr., 40 years an editor on Hearst newspapers in seven cities and also a former editor and publisher of The Quitman Free Press, died last week in Charlottesville, Virginia. He was 77 years old.

He was a native Georgian; was born July 18, 1895 at Griffin, Ga. His father, Royal Daniel, was both a big-time and small town newspaper editor. His son, Royal Daniel III, is a graduate of Yale and also The University of Virginia Law School. His wife, Dorothy Daniel, who died in July of 1968, was a newspaper woman, a woman's editor in Pittsburgh and Chicago; the author of two authoritative books on American cut and en-

graved glass; a pioneer in radio and educational television. She was one of the founders of Station WQED in Pittsburgh and its first staff member. She originated its name, WQED.

Royal Daniel Jr., abandoned an engineering course in Atlanta Tech High School and began his long newspaper career in New York. His first job was with the old New York Evening Telegram, then owned by James Gordon Bennett.

"I scarcely got my toes wet at the Telegram," he once said. "I was assigned to write a war summary each day which was translated into Italian by

S. Georgia phone crews assist in storm damage

Some 20 General Telephone Company of the Southeast repair crews have been sent to General Telephone operating areas in North Georgia stricken by this week's ice storm. District Manager J. S. Livingston announced today. Telephone customers may notice fewer Company vehicles on the streets and highways for the next week, he said.

A full evaluation of the storm damage in North Georgia in cities like Dalton, Toccoa, Canton and Chatsworth was completed late Tuesday afternoon. Damage in rural areas in particular, have been more

extensive than first thought.

Predictions of continuing freezing weather and snows which may complicate the service restoration effort may mean additional repair personnel will be sent from our area.

Mr. Livingston also noted that South Georgia had received assistance from North Georgia last year following heavy rains, high winds and lightning which accompanied the hurricane's passage through our part of the state.

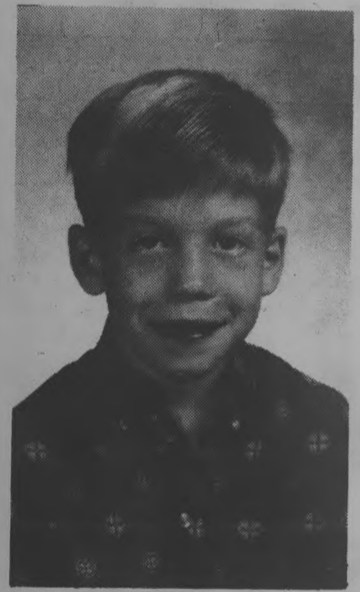
The national education funds crusade month is April, he added.

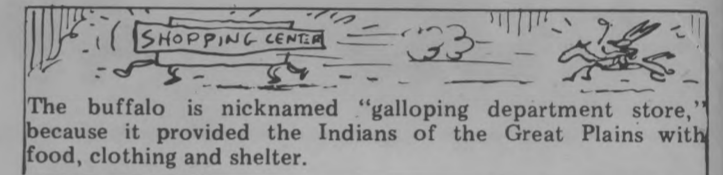
HJHS schedules basketball games

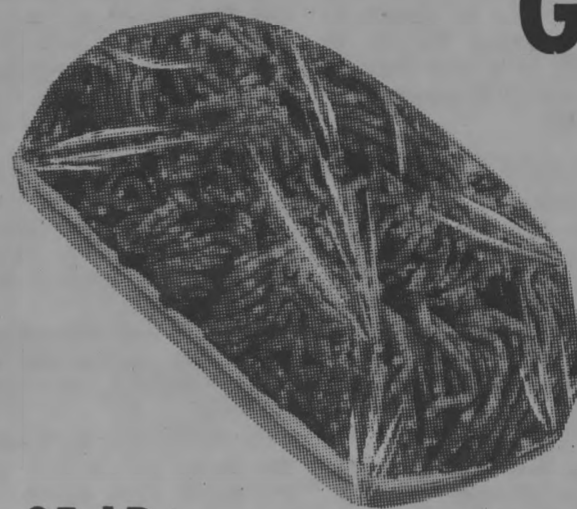

CONSUMERS' CORNER

Since January 1, 1973, there have been some new features covering household extension cords. As a result of an agreement between the Food and Drug Administration's Bureau of Product Safety and the National Electrical Manufacturers Association, extension cords now being made are subject to a voluntary standard that requires

—protective devices for each extension cord to cover up the outlets on the cord that are not being used. These protective devices, which fit into the outlet holes, can be pulled out with ease by an adult but not by a child.

—a warning statement on either the extension cord or the package that reads as follows: "Caution. Avoid hazards. Keep children away. Fully insert plugs. Cover unused outlets. Unplug when not in use."

This voluntary standard, which will be policed by Underwriters Laboratory for all its members, is in response to an FDA injury study that showed that redesign of extension cords is needed to safeguard children from burns and injuries.

Lowndes DE publishes directory

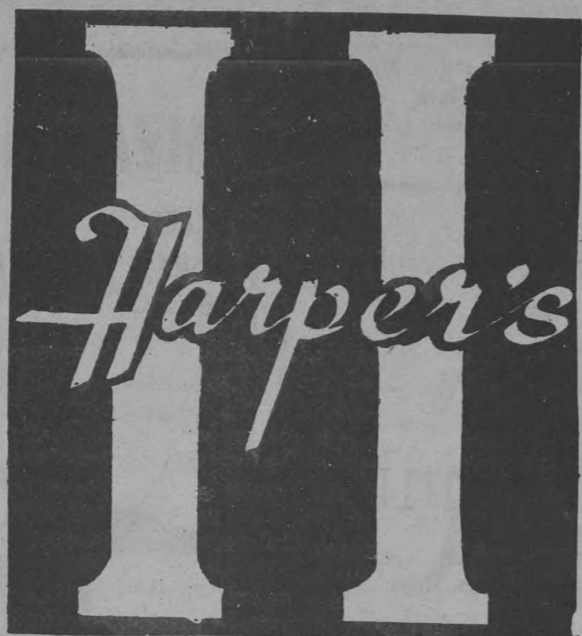

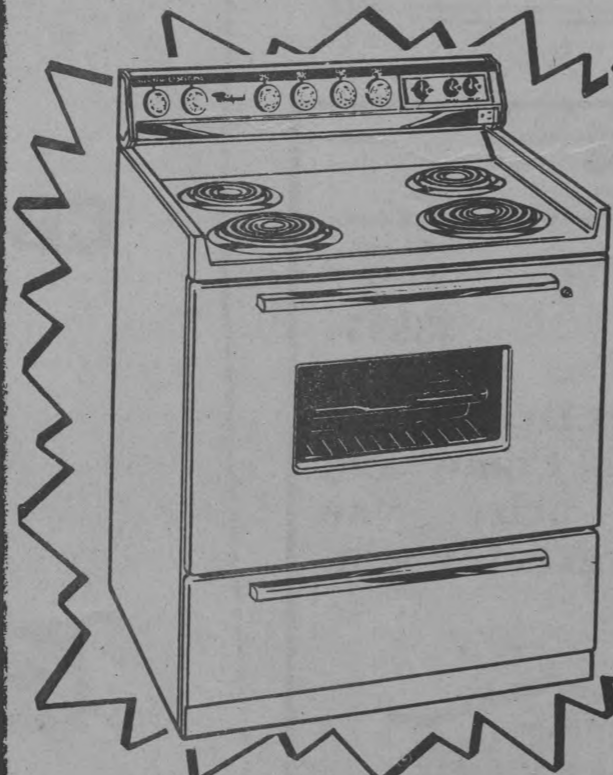

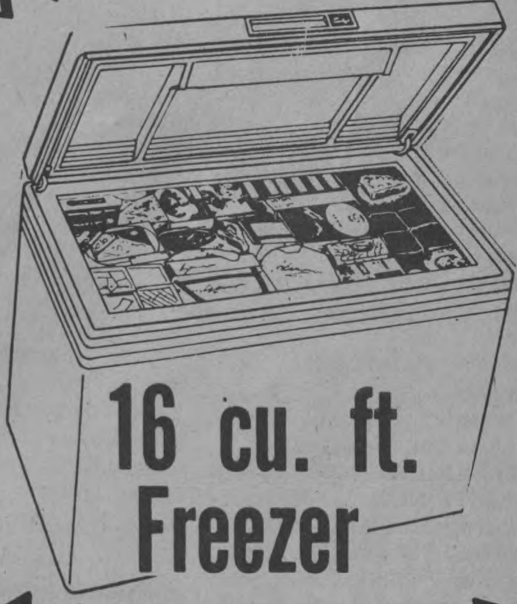

Quitman newspaperman dies

Edoardo Petri, who was director of the Metropolitan Opera's Chorus School. The war in Europe was booming and The Telegram used the daily summary to serve the Metropolis's large Italian-speaking community.

In 1915, Mr. Daniel accepted a job on William Randolph Hearst's New York American. He was Night City Editor when 22 years old. In June of 1924, Mr. Hearst established the New York Daily Mirror and personally appointed Mr. Daniel as City Editor. He soon became Night Editor.

In 1927, Mr. Hearst appointed him as Managing Editor of the old Boston Daily Advertiser. Late in 1928 he was assigned as Managing Editor of the Pittsburgh Sun Telegraph where a year previous, through a series of mergers, Pittsburgh's half dozen daily newspapers were cut to three—the Sun-Telegraph (Hearst); the Post Gazette (Paul Block), and The Press (Scripps Howard).

For the next ten years, Mr. Daniel was based in Pittsburgh but an editorial regional director or "trouble shooter" around The Hearst Circuit. Late in 1929 he was sent to Atlanta to reorganize (editorially) the daily Atlanta Georgian and Hearst's Sunday American. It was suggested since he was a Georgian he establish his home there.

"These were interesting days in Atlanta," said Mr. Daniel. The picturesque and controversial Governor, Eugene

Talmadge, was retiring from the scene. Richard B. Russell, only 33 years old and one of the most promising young men in the South, had been elected Governor. The less political and more romantic hailed Russell as "the most eligible bachelor in Georgia." As the senior U. S. Senator he was one of the most powerful and influential men in Congress, but he remained a bachelor.

In a little more than a year, Mr. Hearst and his general manager of the Hearst Newspapers, Harry M. Bitner, decided Mr. Daniel should return to Pittsburgh and undertake responsibilities on several Hearst newspapers, including the Washington (D. C.) Herald whose publisher was Mrs. Eleanor Medill Patterson. Working with or for Mrs. Patterson was regarded by many Hearst veterans as "terrifying."

"I found the legends quite contrary to the facts," said Mr. Daniel. "Never did I have a more enjoyable or productive period. To me, Mrs. Patterson was not only brilliant, but charming. She was, indeed, a gallant lady.

"One day I was summoned to luncheon with her at her Long Island home, the former W. Bourke Cochran place on Long Island Sound. I was waiting on a veranda, when her butler, Philpotts (that was his real name), stopped and said: "See that speck out there in the middle of the Sound? The swimmer is Mrs. Patterson!"

"But where is her standby boat; whose with her?" Mr. Daniel asked.

"There is no standby boat," Philpotts replied. "She is alone and likes it that way."

At the time she was 51 years old. Mr. Daniel stayed with Mrs. Patterson a little more than a year. Later she bought The Herald from Mr. Hearst. Also the Washington Times. She merged the two.

Some aspect of this deal came up before Mr. Daniel left. She was in doubt about doing something and it troubled her. How would Mr. Hearst feel about it?

"Why not telephone or wire him?" Mr. Daniel suggested. She telegraphed the question and explained to The Chief she felt as though she were between the devil and the deep blue sea. He answered:

"I insist I am the deep blue sea. Please do as you like and I'll stand by you."

Mr. Daniel was called from Washington on Easter Sunday and assigned to Chicago for 3 1/2 weeks which stretched to 3 1/2 years. He was made Managing Editor of The Chicago Evening American. This was 1932 and things were really happening. It marked the advent of Franklin D. Roosevelt on the national scene and the resignation of Jimmy Walker as Mayor of New York. The night the Democrats nominated F. D. R. found Mr. Daniel sitting with Mrs. Patterson, Arthur Brisbane and Merrill

("Babe") Meigs Mayor Cermak, of Chicago, was explaining the step by step unfolding of the scenario on the platform. Each step came exactly as he had reported in advance.

In 1935, Mr. Daniel was called back to the Sun-Telegraph in Pittsburgh, but in 1936 he was made Editor of the Detroit Times.

This assignment was to last only for the duration of the Roosevelt-Landon campaign and Frank Murphy's bid for the Michigan governorship. Murphy had been ordered by FDR to leave his present post to run in Michigan. He was a reluctant candidate but won by 250,000 in the Roosevelt landslide. He fell heir to a lot of things, including the first sit-down strikes in America. He was glad to go into refuge as a Justice of the United States Supreme Court. He died relatively young and was more of a poet than a politician.

Mr. Daniel returned to Pittsburgh from Detroit in 1937 and his travels as a wandering minstrel of journalism were about over. He took an active part in The Pittsburgh Renaissance. He was one of the pioneers of St. Edmund's Academy and for ten years was a trustee of that outstanding boys' school. He was a member of the board of directors of the Pittsburgh Symphony Society. His wife, Dorothy, was busy at WQED, was a member of the boards of The Pittsburgh Playhouse and Western Pennsylvania Historical Society, a former President of the St. Edmund's PTA.

On agriculture

Mathis blasts Nixon

WASHINGTON, D. C. -- Congressman Dawson Mathis has again blasted the Nixon Administration for its "calloused attitude" toward American agriculture. The latest Mathis criticism came following a meeting Friday, January 5, between Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butz, members of the House Committee on Agriculture, and members of the House Appropriations Subcommittee on Agriculture.

Mathis charged that the first order of business for Secretary Butz was "to request that the room be cleared of all reporters and citizens who were not Members of Congress or staff members of the two committees." Said Mathis, "I feel that the issues we were discussing need to be publicly aired, and in my opinion, Mr. Butz said nothing behind the closed doors that he has not said, or could not have said, in any public gathering."

Mathis went on, "It appears that the Administration knows that this type of double-dealing cannot stand examination in the bright light of sunshine, under questioning from Members of Congress who know as much about these programs as does Secretary Butz."

Mathis added, "These brutal attacks on rural America were not justified by Mr. Butz, but he came rather as sort of a half-hearted apologist for Mr. Nixon."

Mathis also said, "Mr. Butz told us before the election that he was going to 'fight like a wounded steer' for the American farmer, but it appears he is fighting more like a

two-day-old calf."



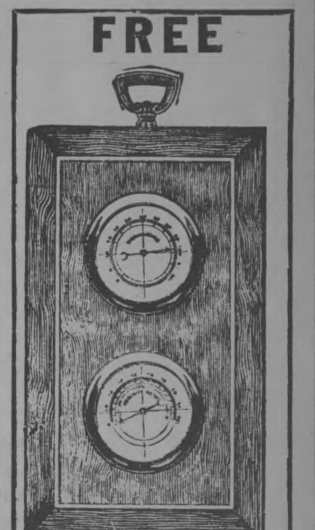

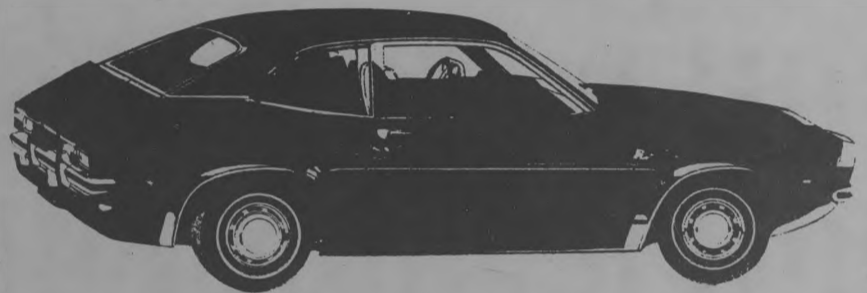
