Hahirans have best hams, eggs at 22nd show

Hahira farmers made the 23rd Annual Ham, Egg and Barrow show a hay day by taking all the prizes in the egg division, first in hams and second in barrows.

The show, sponsored each year by the Chamber of Commerce, is an annual event for area Negro families to have their commodities judged.

John Saunders, assistant Lowndes County farm agent,

says there were fifty-four hams, fifty-three dozen eggs, and seventy-five barrows entered in the show this week.

Robert Cooper of Hahira won the grand champion ham ribbon after seven years of losses. And four Hahira women have won all classes in the Egg Division. The two leading winners were entered by a family team. Barbara Carter of Hahira had the grand champion dozen eggs and her mother-in-law Maggie Carter, won the reserve ribbon with her eggs.

The other three egg winners were Mrs. Darcus Sheppard, Mrs. Emma Butler and Mrs. Sallie Sermons.

Cooper, 51, said the last time he entered a winning ham was in 1966. This year's win makes the third time he's captured the top prize.

Don L. Crawford, a veteran winner at the show, got the reserve ham prize at the show held Tuesday and Wednesday at the Lowndes County Livestock Auditorium.

from a Yorkshire-Duroc hog. He fed the hog less protein several months prior to the show. This caused the hams to have less fat, he said.

The winning ham weighed 17 pounds. Cooper sells about 125 hogs each year from his farm near Hahira. He has entered the show almost every year since it was begun.

Thomas' grand champion barrow was a 190-pound Yorkshire-Hampshire cross. The reserve barrow was a 185-pound Duroc-Hampshire cross four months old.

The grand champion barrow sold at 60 cents per pound to the Valdosta Livestock Co. Inc. for \$114. The reserve barrow sold to First National Bank at 41 cents for \$73. The champion and reserve ham sold at \$5 per pound to the First National Bank for \$85 and \$90.

The winning dozen of eggs

went to Harvey's Supermarket for \$16 and the reserve dozen to First National Bank for \$13. The 3rd winning dozen eggs were bought by Revill's Farm Center for \$15.

The total sales for the hams, eggs and barrows were \$4,749.99.

Former Hahirans visit

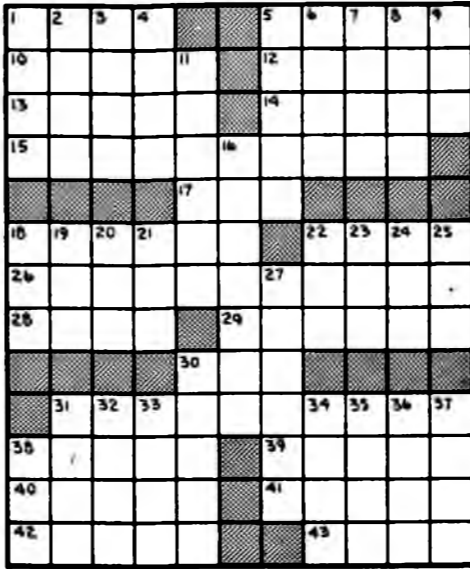

She Ripped What She Sewed

Miss Sara Maddux was our first D. S. teacher and how vividly I remember the first dish we cooked. It was called "Goldenrod Eggs" and was a "delectable dish for breakfast, lunch or dinner" according to Miss Maddux who later became Mrs. Donald Davis. Only recently we were reminding her of Goldenrod eggs and she insists she still thinks highly of them.

I'm sure you'd like the recipe so here goes. You take some sliced store-bought lightbread (in those days only the affluent and store-bought bread . . . most of us had the old fashioned homemade kind), put it in oven to toast and it invariably came out burned to a crisp. Over that you grated hard boiled eggs--and that was goldenrod eggs. Can you imagine anything more unappetizing?

I hasten to add I later learned to cook. My mother quickly saw I was not taking advantage of the domestic science classes so she got down Mrs. S. R. Dull's "Southern Cooking" and she started her own school of instruction. Mamma and Mrs. Dull were both devotees of Owen Meredith, particularly that part in Lucile "We may live without friends; we may live without seated at the sewing machine in our little alcove back of the Pink Lady desk at the hospital the other morning our attention was diverted by a racuous snicker behind our back. Turning around an old school friend greets us with YOU sewing. I don't believe it! Mending sheets!! You gotta be kidding . . . and she went on and on until she attracted the attention of several visitors and nurses. We turned our back and continued with our sewing hoping she would quiet down and leave us be, but no, she had to proclaim to anyone who would listen that she was in a domestic science class with me (don't ask what year, altho I should tell just to embarrass her) and according to her I ripped more than I sewed.

As a Pink Lady our chores are varied, lending a hand wherever needed and it just so happens several years ago the housekeeper brought out a bale of linens in need of mending. My neighbor, Dorothy Turner, and I were handy so we inherited the mending chores. If I do say we've turned into passable patchers. At least we'd had no complaints.

I never could convince her a safety pin comes in just as handy where a broken strap is concerned.

Now well I recall those domestic science classes. Now that dates me. In those days it was domestic science, then came home economics and now I believe the term is homemaking. books; but civilized man cannot live without cooks."

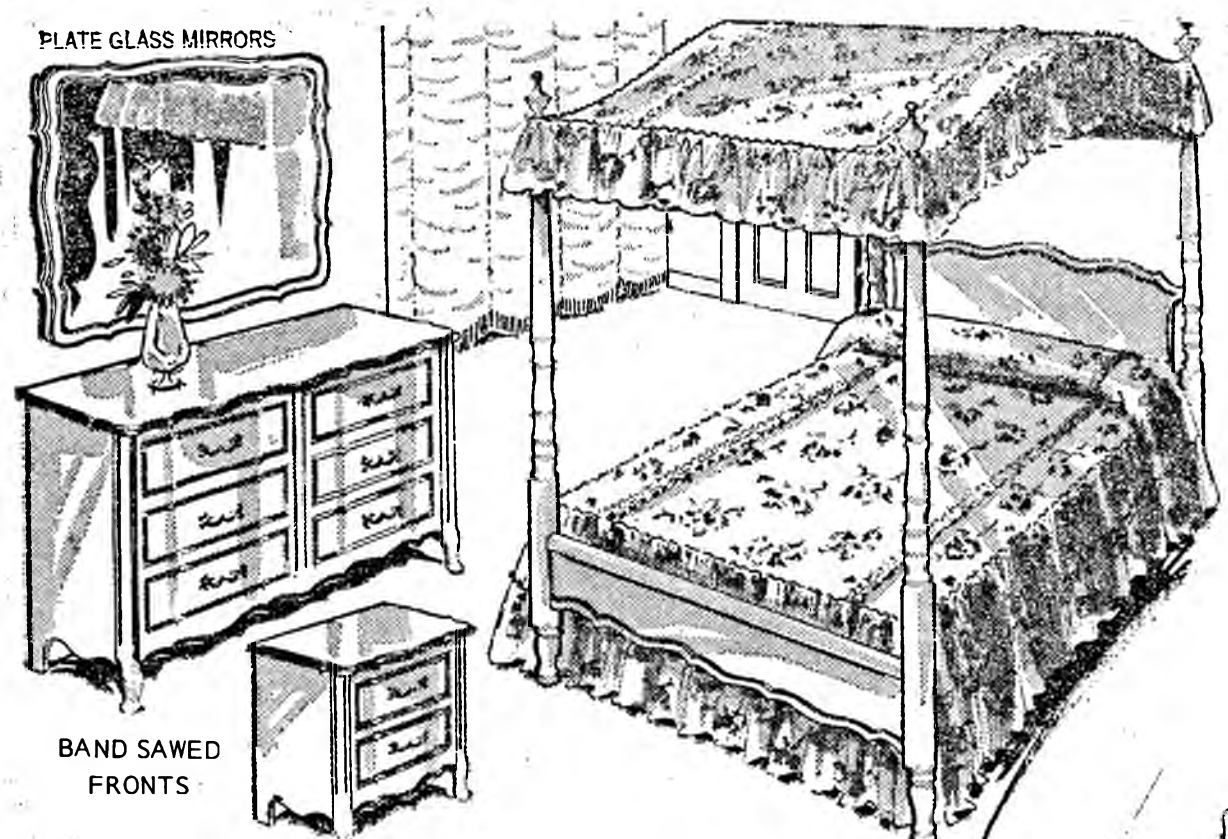

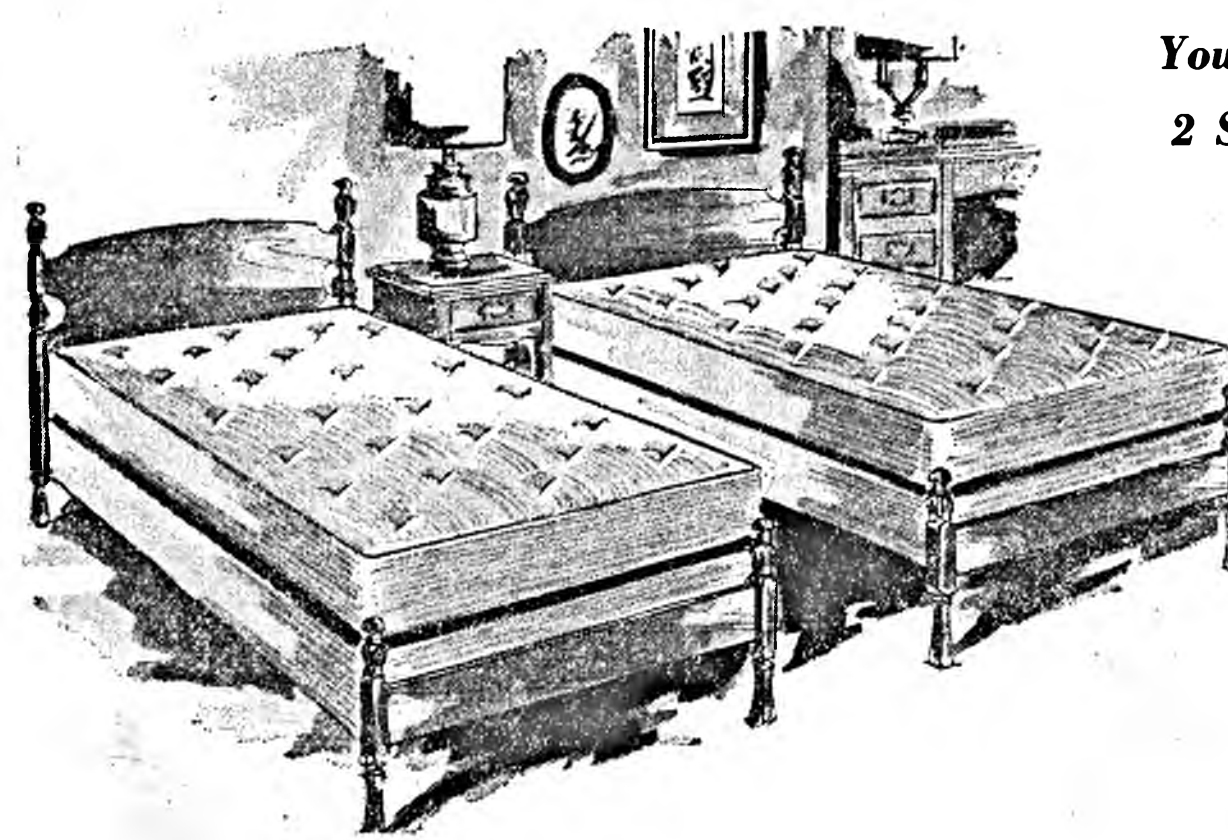

Tips for homemakers

SO SEW FOR HIM:

Traditionally home seamstresses have been sewing only for themselves and other female members of the family. Why don't you get out of a selfish rut and stitch together some home haberdashery for hubby.

Sewing for the man in your life can be rewarding and a creative "labor of love" type thing. With the wide variety of fabrics and patterns available today, making garments for the man can be fun.

Standard fabrics you might consider include warp and double knits and woven polyester cotton blends.

For first efforts, you may want to try a shirt or vest, then venture to slacks. Many women are trying blazers, suits and battle jackets.

Knits are rapidly becoming a favorite with men. When you select knits, take the opportunity to turn your man on to

color. Jacquards, stripes and solids offer a wide variety.

Fur, suede and leather are "in" looks for menswear too. It takes little time and only a few stitches to make a vest from one of these novelty fabrics.

Think of your man the next time you sit down at your machine. You can sew your way into his heart.

WHITE MEAT COSTS:

If your family prefers white meat of the turkey, they have expensive taste. The family eating only white meat pays handsomely, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture. A white meat serving of turkey from a boned roast costs about twice as much as an equal serving from the whole turkey purchased ready-to-cook. Meat from the breast bought separately costs substantially more than the same amount of meat from the whole turkey or from parts with dark meat. Packages of frozen turkey with gravy and gravy with turkey cost at least 5 percent more than a similar amount of turkey from the whole bird.

Water and fertilizer plants at the same time. Add fertilizer every third or fourth time (every two to four weeks) you water to maintain good growth. Use a water-soluble fertilizer at the strength recommended on the label. Fertilize only when plants are actively growing.

GROWING IN THE DARK:
You can grow decorative plants in your home - even in dark corners - by adding a fluorescent light to your planter. The trick is to know how much light to use, when and how to water and fertilize the plant.

To grow plants in a dimly lit area of your home, follow these guidelines:

Illuminate the plants with fluorescent lamps 12 to 16 hours daily. Give uniform illumination over a wide area, and keep the light at least six inches from the plant to prevent heat damage to the leaf.

Fluorescent lamps must burn in special fixtures. Do not try to build a frame for the lamps; mounting fixtures are available at electrical supply houses. They consist of metal frame, connectors and built-in ballast to regulate power input. A clear shield in front of the lamp will prevent plants from touching the hot lamps.

Place the planter where the temperature during the day is about 75 degrees. At night about 65 degrees. Avoid drafty locations - hot or cold.

Thought For Food

Most people have tried all sorts of toppers for baked potatoes, but here's one that may be new! Cut a cross on the top of each potato just before serving, press up, then top with deviled ham mixed with a little cheese sauce.

I REMEMBER

From John W. Hobbs, Dayton, Kentucky: I remember the feather bed and how it was produced.

Many pickings of Down from the geese were required to produce a feather bed - probably 8 or 10 pounds. Of course, it took a lot of feathers to make a pound.

Use of my own feather bed has long since been discontinued but after more than fifty years, it is now doing duty as pillows.

CONSUMERS' CORNER

Budgeting
The best way for a family to make concrete plans concerning money matters is by making and using a budget. A budget can help you get down to specifics, so that you know where your money has gone and where it should be going.

The first step in making a budget is to decide what your family needs — that is to set up goals. Some may be goals for the future; some for the present.

Step two is to estimate the amount of income you expect to have in the planning period, whether you are keeping the budget for a week, a month, or a year.

reluctant about having Social Security tax withheld from what seemed a very small paycheck. However, that small contribution added to that accrued during his 17 months of military service was sufficient to qualify him for monthly benefits as long as he remains disabled.
