GRAND JURY PRESENTMENTS

JUNE TERM

1973

We, the twenty-one (21) members of the Grand Jury drawn and sworn at the June Term of Lowndes Superior Court, Nineteen Hundred and Seventy-Three, respectfully submit these presentments:

We appreciate the remarks made in the charge to the Grand Jury by Judge Marcus B. Calhoun and feel that Judge Calhoun's prayer at the opening of Court was very appropriate and subsequently opened this session with a prayer for guidance and good judgement in our deliberations.

It has been a pleasure to work with District Attorney Lamar Cole and his Assistant William O. Hitchcock. The preparation of the cases presented made a more efficient operation of the Grand Jury in that area.

Our thanks go to Assistant Chief A. L. Arnold and Captain Ransom Bass, of the Valdosta Police Department, for the time and effort spent in getting background material and evidence in the cases they presented, and the effective manner in which they presented them.

We also want to thank Detective David Arnold and Detective Jimmie Norton of the Lowndes County Sheriff's Department for a professional like preparation of their cases before appearing before us.

We wish to thank the County Commissioners, W. P. Langdale, Tally Wisenbaker and Julian Lawson for appearing before this body. We commend them for the progress reported in working with City Officials toward elimination of duplication of services. We recommend that every effort be expedited and continued in this direction. We also recommend to the Commissioners that they establish some master plan with priority list to avoid haphazard expenditures that do not best serve the people. The jury feels that the proposed jail would fall in this category and that every effort should be made to build a consolidated City-County jail.

We appreciate Assistant Chief Arnold of the Valdosta Police Department and Lt. A. W. Ganas of the Lowndes County Sheriff's Department for appearing before this body and reporting on law enforcement in the community. In the areas of personal safety and protection of property an ex-

cellent job is being done.

However, we are distressed by the increase of apparent organized crime and by the embarrassment caused by the arrest and investigations of gambling made in the county by the federal and state authorities which this body feel should have been acted on by Sheriff's Department. This situation has gone unchallenged for a number of years. We instruct the Sheriff to rigidly enforce all laws.

We recommend that Mrs. Sara Crow be paid \$25.00 for stenographic work for this Grand Jury.

We appreciate the many courtesies provided this Grand Jury by the Clerk of Court, Miss Louise Dickinson.

The Grand Jury recommends that these Presentments be published in the Valdosta Times, Hahira Gold Leaf, and copies sent to the members of the Georgia General Assembly representing the Southern Judicial Circuit and to the Lowndes County Board of Commissioners.

PUBLIC BUILDINGS

This Committee has inspected certain properties owned by the county and find most of them in good repair with the following exceptions:

Courthouse
1. Leaks have been found in the offices of the tax assessors, Juvenile Court, tag office and the office of Judge Calhoun.

2. In the office of Clerk of Superior Court wallpaper around windows is hanging loose and should be fixed.

County Jail

The County Jail is in same deplorable condition as has been reported by previous grand juries over a period of about 10 years.

This Grand Jury is concerned about the obsolete condition of the County Jail, and recommends that immediate steps be taken to replace the present jail with an adequate, escape proof structure.

This Grand Jury has read a copy of a proposal submitted by a reputable and experienced firm, offering to make, for a nominal fee, a factual study of the county's need for a new jail, which was submitted to the Board of Commissioners May 2, 1973. We strongly urge that serious consideration be given this proposal.

It has been brought to our attention the present tag office

needs additional space, especially during the rush period. We recommend that this need be met.

We also recommend that the county maintenance department make an inspection of all county buildings and correct all mechanical and structural defects found to exist and do the preventative maintenance necessary.

PUBLIC RECORDS

The Committee interviewed the people concerned and examined the records with the following result:

Ordinary: We found Judge T. N. Holcombe and his staff have kept all records up to date in a very neat and orderly condition.

Tag Office: This office with a vast amount of paper work was well organized allowing for quick service to the public. There is need for additional space in the near future in order to store records and have additional windows to improve its ever increasing business.

Tax Office: Tax Commissioner Billy West Dasher has an efficient up to date operation and the staff can quickly answer any tax question from their excellent records.

Clerk Of Court: The outstanding job done by Miss Louise Dickinson and her staff

for the two (2) Courts they serve is reflected in the neat and orderly fashion that their records are kept. We found things to be current, efficiently filed and immediately available for us.

County Commission: We inspected the County Commissioners office and found the records in excellent order and kept in an efficient businesslike manner. We do recommend that the printed blank checks be placed under secure lock to prevent possible theft.

Sheriff's Office: We visited the office and commend the staff for the high quality of record keeping on a great variety of material that must be kept up to date hour by hour.

PUBLICROADS

This committee extends its appreciation to Mr. R. E. Patrick for his cooperation in our report. Considering the unusual amount of rain we have had this year we feel that the roads are in good order. We realize that the many washouts that have occurred in recent weeks has put a tremendous strain on the county facilities for road repair. We urge that the Commissioners follow thru on plans for a new modern shop building. It is needed for better efficiency in maintaining equipment.

The Citizens of the County are

asked to be patient with an overloaded county road crew who are working as diligently as possible to restore the roads to a good condition.

The problem of garbage and junk that litter our roads and countryside has increased. We urge the Commissioners to adopt a definite concrete plan for elimination of this problem. It is our understanding that the Coastal Plains Planning and Development Commission has employed Mr. Hardy Croom to work with the counties of this Commission in solving their garbage and litter problems. We urge the County Commissioners to take advantage of Mr. Crooms expertise and see what he recommends for Lowndes County. It is the opinion of this committee that the installation of a dumpster system of collecting garbage be investigated. The county would locate these dumpsters at strategic points over the county and county garbage trucks would then empty them at central sanitary landfills.

We can foresee that in the near future this could become a definite health hazard to the citizens of our county and we implore the commissioners to heed the recommendations of this Grand Jury and past Grand Juries in taking concrete steps in solving this neglected problem.

Crisp, fresh celery, now in excellent supply, is one of the world's most versatile vegetables. It's equally good raw or cooked. Celery solos as an appetizing munchable and serves as an easily prepared and nutritious hot vegetable, one which is low in calories as well. This just starts the long list of its many uses. Team it with meat, fish or fowl; with other vegetables cold or hot; use it in any salad, from apple through zucchini. It's cooked quickly enough to justify its use in convenience foods to which it gives pleasing crunch and flavor. In long-cookers, however, it holds its shape and texture in satisfactory fashion.

The authentic recipe for traditional Waldorf Salad has four major ingredients: apples, celery, walnuts and mayonnaise. To prepare Waldorf Salad coarsely dice 2 unpeeled red apples. Sprinkle them with a little lemon juice and salt. Add 1 cup sliced celery, ¼ cup chopped walnuts and mayonnaise to moisten. Heap in crisp lettuce cups and decorate with walnut halves. Yields six portions.

 1/4 cup water
 3 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce
 1 teaspoon prepared mustard
 1/2 cup celery, diced
 2 teaspoons salt
 In hot fat in Dutch oven or large skillet, saute onion; remove. In same fat, brown ribs well on all sides, about 15 to 20 minutes. Add sauteed onion, vinegar, brown sugar, catsup, water, Worcestershire sauce, mustard, celery, and salt. Simmer, covered, turning occasionally, 1 1/2 to 2 hours or until ribs are fork-tender. Serve on hot cooked rice, noodles or potatoes. Pass gravy separately. Makes 4 servings.

help — a speech therapist and a child psychologist. Either may be able to determine whether there really is a problem and the cause of it.
 You obviously want to have a sound professional person see this youngster, so the best places to go for a referral may be your little grandson's pediatrician, the family doctor, or persons in the speech or psychologists' department in the local public schools.

Q. My grandson, who is 3 years and 4 months old, is not talking much yet and doesn't seem to have any desire to talk. He says only a few words like "Mama" and "bye bye." When he wants something he just points to it, and we can't seem to get him to say what he wants. If we don't give him what he points to, he gets frustrated and cries. I feel that since he can say a few words, he should be able to say more. We try not to pressure him, and he gets a lot of affection. But something seems to be wrong, and we're worried. Thank you for any help that you can give.
 A. Although there are a few children within the so-called normal range who still don't speak when they are 3 years old, they are definitely exceptions. Most 3-year-olds are quite verbal. One study indicated they have a vocabulary of nearly 900 words.
 So your concern is probably appropriate. There are at least two main sources for

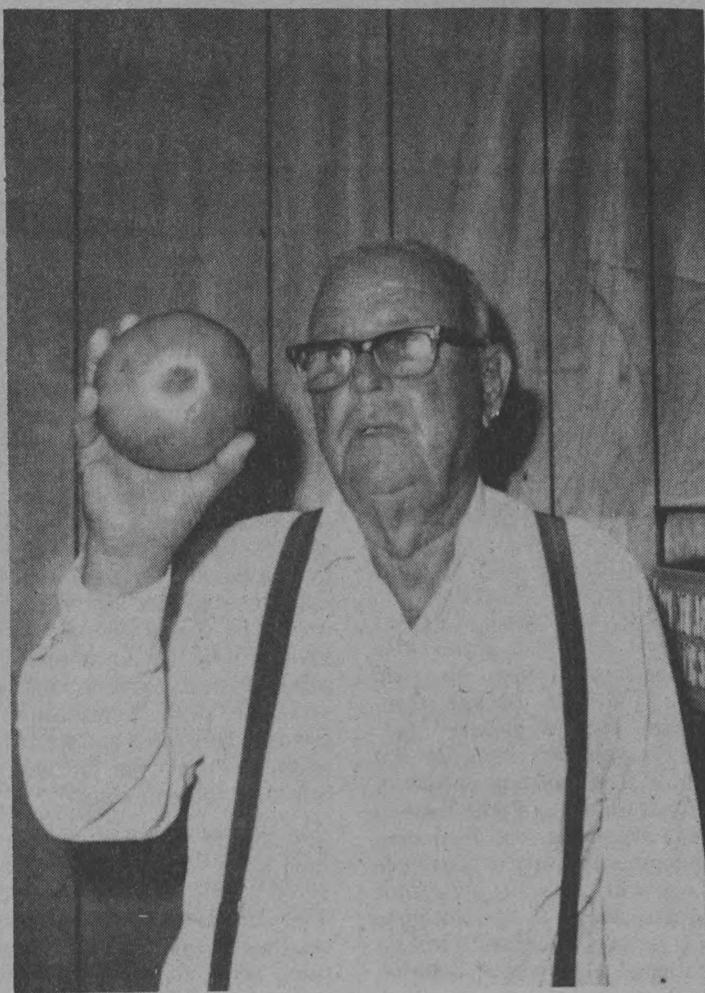

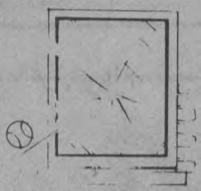

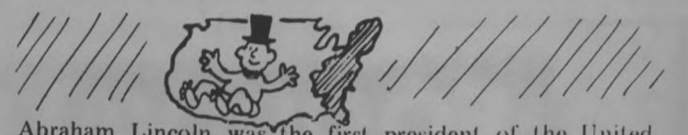

Tips for Homemakers

HELPFUL HINTS FOR FREEZING VEGETABLES AND FRUITS

You can have excellent frozen vegetables if you follow a few general rules. Use the proper varieties, harvest the vegetables at the right time (not too young or too old); prepare them adequately by grading, scalding and cooling. Then package correctly. Many frozen vegetables are fresher than those purchased on the "fresh" vegetable market. Practically all frozen vegetables may be held for one year if you keep your freezer temperature 0 degrees or below at all times.

Georgia fruits are suitable for freezing also, if the following directions are followed. Select a variety that is a good eating fruit when fresh. Harvest fruits when they are fully developed and well-colored, but before they become soft. Most all fruits are improved for freezing and eating if they are picked one day, and allowed to mellow and ripen thoroughly. To aid mellowing and ripening, spread fruits in a clean place. Peaches and plums, figs and most berries are improved by holding overnite (12 hours) in this manner, but apples and pears require holding for several days. However, when final preparation for freezing is begun it should be completed as quickly as possible - usually

within an hour. For this reason, large quantities of fruits should not be prepared in the home at one time. Select the just right fruit and do some each day. You can use a syrup (50-50 per cent) for fruit; mix one measure of sugar to the equal amount of water (cup for cup); stir until the sugar solution is clear. Heating is not necessary. Use just enough syrup to cover the prepared fruit after it has been settled in container. To settle the fruit hit the container on counter top several times to jar the fruit down. Only ridged containers such as freezer jars or plastic containers are recommended due to leakage of syrup. To dry pack, place a layer of fruit and a light layer of sugar alternating till container is filled - be sure to leave head space so as not to have lids pushed off when frozen. To keep fruits such as peaches, apples, and pears from discoloring use ascorbic acid 1/2 teaspoon (powdered) to one pound sugar; mix thoroughly, this amount is for 6 pounds of fruit.

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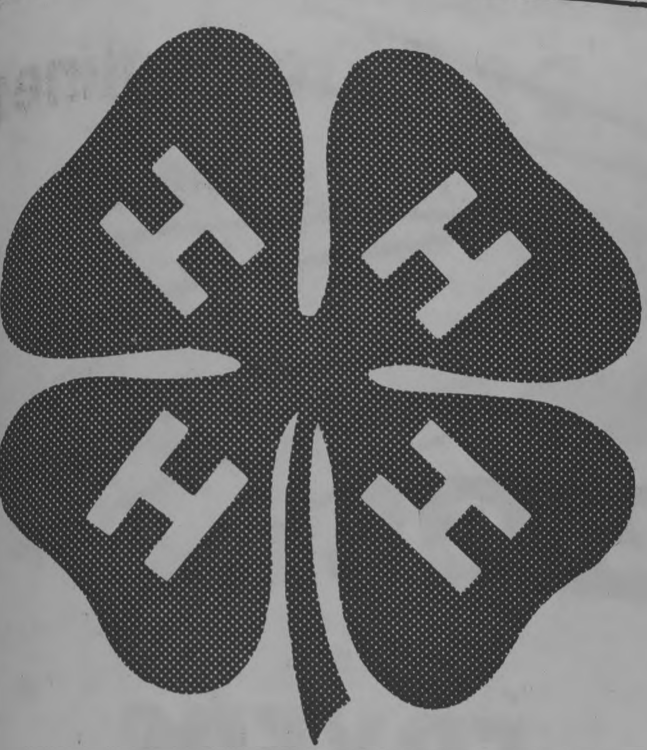

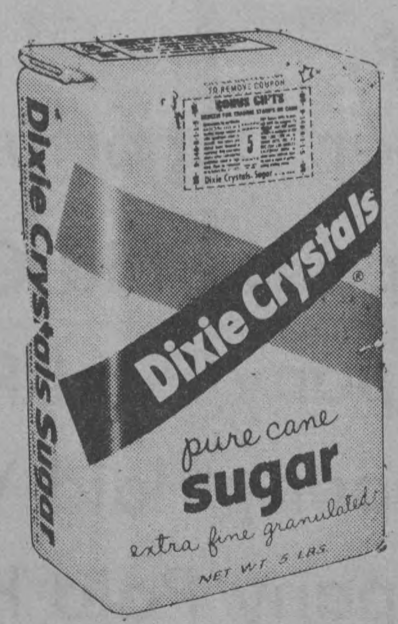
