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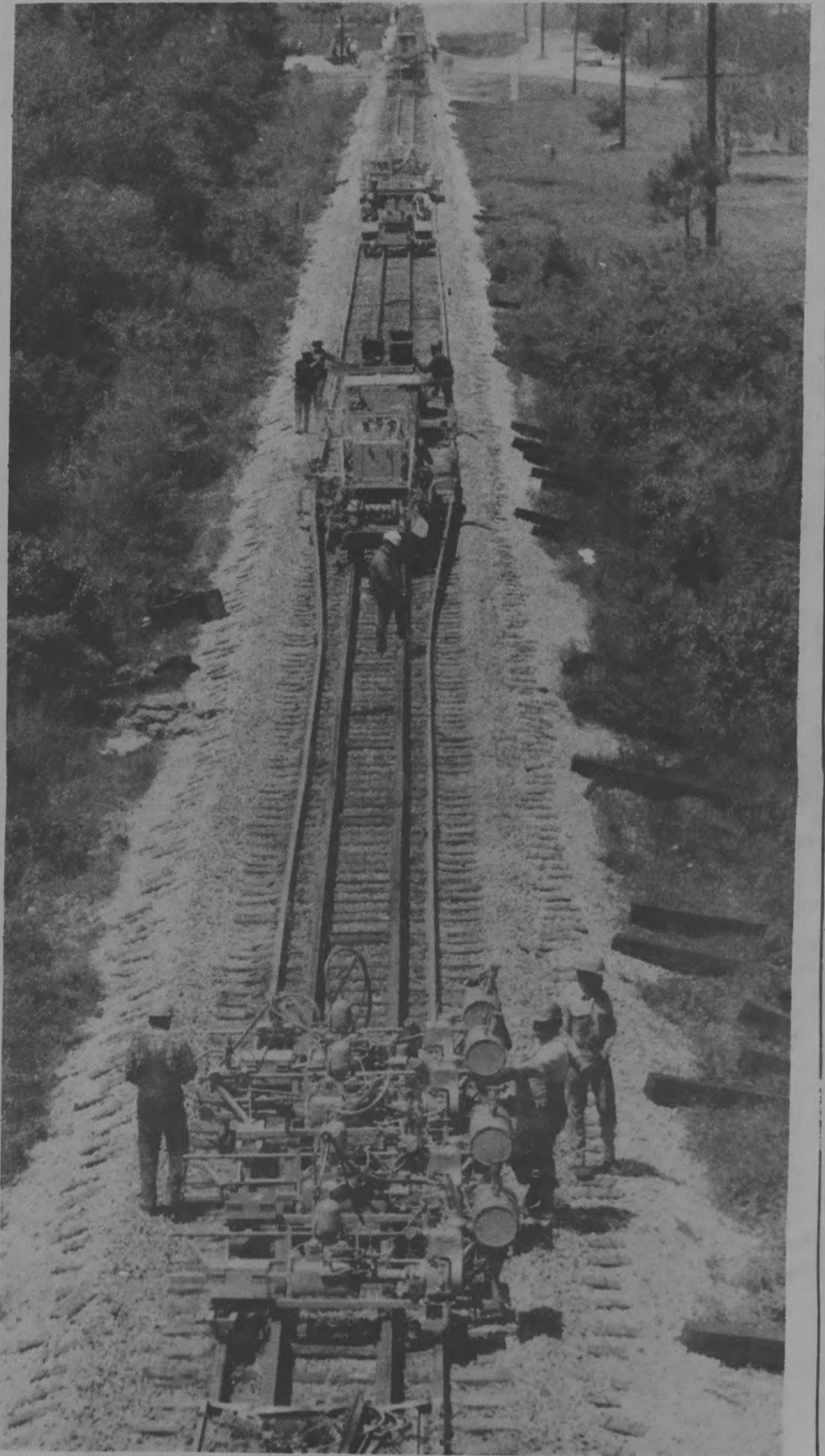

## Railroading

Ribbon rail is being laid by Southern Railway on its main line through Sparks and Adel this week. Starting in Sparks Monday morning, the crews had reached Third Street in Adel by Wednesday noon. Some streets will be closed in Adel while the rail is installed and crossing repaired. A spectacle to watch, the quarter-mile rail comes from the train (left) and laid between the existing rail. A series of steps is

taken before the new 132-pound rail (132 pounds per yard) is put in place. There are seven miles of rail on the train above, and it will be laid in two weeks. The left photo was taken from the Highway 41 overpass in Sparks looking toward Adel, and the right picture is looking north toward Sparks from the bridge. This same retracking will be done through Hahira later this year eventually going all the way to Jacksonville.

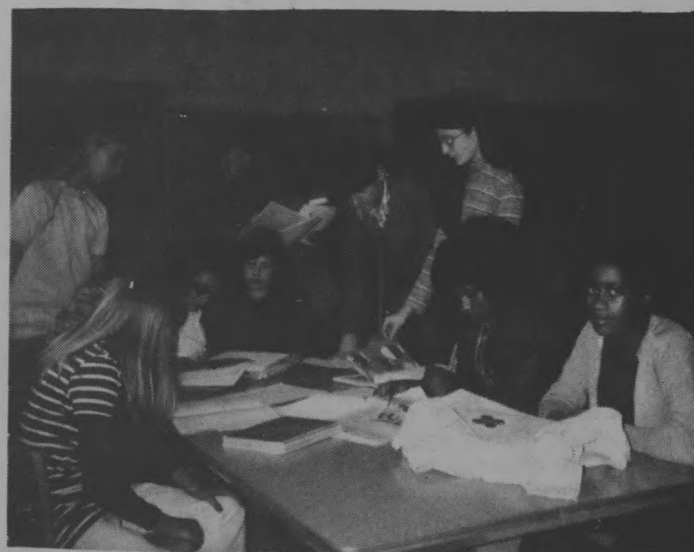

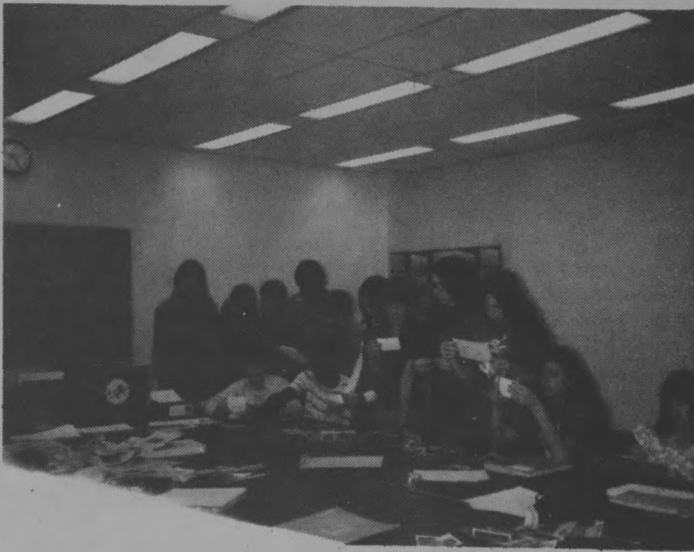

# SE cattle, egg prices lower; hog, broilers up

ATLANTA, Ga. -- Despite sharply curtailed supplies of feeder cattle and calves going to southeastern markets during the week ended April 6, prices dropped sharply lower for the second week in a row, reports the Agricultural Marketing Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Prices also were sharply lower for southeastern eggs. Lower prices were reported for some vegetables, including new-crop potatoes, snap beans, cabbage and bell peppers.

On the other hand, hog and broiler prices trended upward during the week. Soybean prices trended sharply upward recovering losses of the past three weeks. Corn and other grain prices also moved upward.

Higher prices were reported for tomatoes, squash and radishes.

Calves ranged \$68 to \$78; 300 to 400 pounds \$60 to \$72; 400 to 500 pounds \$53 to \$63, and 500 to 600 good. Yellow sweet corn brought \$3 a crate of 4 1/2 dozen ears.

Florida, the strawberry market was active and prices unchanged at \$4 a 12-pint flat.

Alabama trucklot prices were 6 1/2 cents higher at \$1.79 1/2 to \$1.82 1/2, while multiple carlot prices in Georgia gained 3 1/4 cents at \$1.78 1/4 to \$1.79 1/4.

Terminal prices were 2 1/2 to 5 1/2 cents higher with Norfolk at \$1.74 to \$1.75 1/2 and Memphis \$1.74 1/2 to \$1.79 1/2.

had little effect in halting the declining prices.

The overall demand for feeder cattle narrowed almost daily and some regular buyers did not take part in the week activities. Others proceeded with caution due to the uncertainty of the situation. Live cattle prices in the Midwest closed steady to lower, while the dressed beef trade posted sharp downturns again and most likely will result in a questionable direction for next week.

At southeastern markets this week feeder steers sold \$1 to \$2 lower, while heifers trended 50 cents to mostly \$1 lower. Calves again very uneven with steer offerings \$1 to \$5 lower, mostly \$2 to \$4 off. Heifer calves closed \$1 to \$4 lower with most sales \$2 to \$3 off.

In representative sales, Choice 200 to 300 pound steer

pond steers \$48 to \$55. Good 200 to 300 pound calves brought \$60 to \$72; 300 to 400 pounds \$53 to \$63; 400 to 500 \$48 to \$58, and Good 500 to 600 pound steers \$43 to \$50. Choice 300 to 400 pound heifer calves sold \$50 to \$60; 400 to 500 pounds \$44 to \$53, and 500 to 600 pound heifers \$42 to \$48. Prices on barrows and gilts fluctuated somewhat from area to area, with closing sales in the Georgia-Florida-Alabama direct area \$1.75 to \$2 higher and other points around the Southeast 50 cents to \$1 higher. Eastern cornbelt terminal markets closed \$1 to \$3 lower. Wholesale pork cuts trended sharply lower again.

### POULTRY AND EGGS

The undertone of the southeastern broiler-fryer market remained firm for business the week ended April 6, AMS' Dairy and Poultry Market News Branch reports. Prices trended higher in early negotiations. Preliminary F.O.B. dock equivalent prices ranged from 43.50 to 44.50 cents per pound on U.S. grade A and 44.00 and 44.50 cents per pound on plant grade.

Ready-to-cook broiler demand was mostly good with inquiries often in excess of plant capacities. Live supplies were in close balance to short of full needs. Average live weights were mostly desirable.

The southeastern market for hens was unsettled on both heavy and light type. Offerings were irregular but generally adequate for present needs. Most buyers were cautious and generally restricting purchases to immediate needs or short range commitments. Prices closed the week at 12 to 13 cents per pound F.O.B. farm on light weights and 23 to 24 cents per pound F.O.B. farm on heavy type hens.

Wholesale cartoned egg prices trended sharply lower in the southeast on deliveries to volume buyers compared to the previous week. Extra large eggs ranged from 53 1/2 to 59 cents a dozen, while large brought 52 to 57 cents and medium 49 to 54 cents. Trading closed on a firmer undertone under the stimulus of widespread retail promotions and increasing interest for Easter needs.

Snap beans trended lower on liberal supplies. Quality was good. Round green beans sold at \$4 to \$4.50 a bushel and pole beans brought \$4.10.

Sweet corn supplies increased while the quality continued

Celery prices held about steady as supplies increased. Pascal celery brought \$2.50 to \$3.25 a crate of 2 to 4 dozen.

The demand was good for cabbage at lower prices, as supplies decreased slightly. Round green cabbage sold mostly at \$3 a 3/4-bushel crate. Peppers, mostly of medium size, brought lower prices. Large California Wonder type peppers sold at \$9 to \$10 a bushel, while medium size peppers brought \$6.50 to \$7.

The demand for tomatoes was good at higher prices. Quality was good and supplies continued moderate. Green tomatoes brought \$8 a 30-pound carton of 5x5s and 6x6s.

Radish prices trended higher as supplies decreased. Red radishes sold at \$2 a carton of 30 six-ounce film bags.

Demand exceeded the light supply of best quality squash. Prices were higher with yellow squash selling at \$7 and Zucchini at \$8 a five-ninth-bushel.

Harvesting of Louisiana strawberries got underway with the market holding steady at mostly \$4 a 12-pint flat. In

Soybean bids to producers at Southeastern Virginia points were 45 cents higher with a mostly price of \$6.00; Raleigh \$6.24; Richmond \$5.60 to \$5.98; and at Wilson prices closed at \$6.14. Terminal prices were 4 1/2 cents higher at Norfolk at \$6.16 1/2 to \$6.19. Memphis posted sharpest gains of 59 to 69 cents at \$6.08 3/4 to \$6.23 3/4. Gulf port bids finished the period at \$6.21 1/2 to \$6.38.

Cash corn movement continued very slow. However, prices were steady to instances of 10 cents higher. Traders indicate corn prices just followed the lead of soybean prices. There is much concern in grain circles over the possibility of late planting.

Farm prices for corn at Southeastern Virginia points finished the week at \$1.60 to \$1.70; Wilson \$1.67 to \$1.70; South Carolina points \$1.80 to \$1.84; and Wilson corn prices

# Council issues whiskey license

In a special called meeting Tuesday night, Hahira's Mayor and Council issued a whiskey license to Mack O. Lucas and also gave their nod of approval to the erection of modular homes in the city's residential areas.

The 7:30 p.m. meeting was called following the regular April meeting held recently in which the City of Hahira still bickered with General Telephone Company.

At that meeting, the city Council voted to give Mayor Eugene Webb the authority to withhold payment on the city telephone bill until the company pays the money it owes on business licenses.

Mayor Webb stated that the city had repeatedly written to the company's main office seeking payment for the business licenses and have to this date received no reply. According to records, the company owes the city about \$3,300.

Hahira and its officials have battled on several recent occasions -- over price increases and the fact that the city residents are unable to call Valdosta, the county seat, toll free.

Hahira tried recently to

switch to Southern Bell to remedy the situation, but Webb explained that the Public Service Commission has ruled that General Telephone has a right to stay in the Hahira area if it desires.

City officials said they didn't know when or if the city telephone payment, averaged \$110 per month, will be held back, but he has been given the authority for the action and City Attorney Wade Coleman of Valdosta has contacted the company.

In other activity at the April meeting, Mayor-Council:

-- Agreed to license all professional workers in Hahira. Mayor Webb explained that doctors and other professional people, such as accountants, have never been licensed before in the city.

-- Rejected all bids on a 1969 Ford police car because they were too low.

-- Agreed to make one block of Webb Street from Lawson Street to Main Street the first one-way street ever in the city. Traffic will go south only.

-- Accepted the low bid from Langdale Ford Co. in Valdosta for a new city trash truck.

-- Agreed to purchase gar-

bage collection bags. The officials explained that 100 cartons of bags are purchased at one time with 250 in each box. The plastic bags are distributed to residents in the city to be used with trash cans.

-- Agreed to purchase an adding machine for city hall.

-- Tabled action on a request by James Rogers of Dixie Beer Co. in Valdosta and a Tifton distributor that the city pay 10 per cent of their beer tax to the distributor to handle costs of keeping extra books on the beer.

A new law went into effect recently in which stamps no longer will be placed on beer

cans, but the distributor will be responsible for collecting local taxes on each case of beer and returning the money to the local government.

The change necessitates the hiring of bookkeepers, and distributors are requesting a kickback to help cover the costs. Valdosta has refused to comply, and Lowndes County has tabled the matter until the Commissioners learned what Valdosta would do. The Mayor-Council in Lakeland decided to table the issue until May 7. Brooks Co. is the only government locally who has voted so far to pay the 10 per cent requested.

## State School head seeks increased federal money

Georgia Superintendent of Schools Jack P. Nix called for increased federal spending for public elementary and secondary education at a regional hearing of the House Committee on Education and Labor in Miami Friday.

Nix appeared at the invitation of Committee Chairman Carl Perkins of Kentucky, who has introduced H.R. 69 and H.R. 16 to extend the Elementary and Secondary Education Act for five years and to increase federal spending for education of all children.

Nix noted that the federal government now pays only about seven percent of the total bill for education. "Federal support for education should be approximately one-third of the total," he said. "I am astounded that the administration is proposing to effectively reduce federal participation in education for whatever reason."

"Some of the formulas being proposed for distribution of education funds would penalize the poorer states," he said, citing the administration proposal for revenue sharing which would allocate funds to the states on the basis of 25 percent of the average state or national current per pupil expenditure, whichever is higher. "States having a higher expenditure per pupil than the national average would receive the bulk of the money," he said.

Nix also expressed concern that Georgia would lose \$18.5 million in aid for the disadvantaged if 1970 census figures are used to allocate funds on the same basis as 1960 census figures are currently being used. The reason is that the

state's average income has risen and there are now fewer children from families below the \$2,000 poverty level figure.

In support of the extension of ESEA Title I funds for education of disadvantaged children, Nix cited impressive gains made by children receiving services under the federal program in Brooks, Gwinnett, Henry, Carroll and Bryan Counties. He submitted additional data in an evaluation report of Title I programs in Georgia.

"I would wholeheartedly endorse the funding of education for the disadvantaged at the \$3 billion level proposed in H.R. 69," Nix said. He said funds should be allocated to the constitutional authority for education in each state and "in no case should they bypass the state education agency."

"I am opposed to the administration's proposal for Special Revenue Sharing," Nix said. "This bill is a farce and a sham. Not only does it contain less money for all areas of education, it is falsely presented as general aid to education when in fact it contains more restrictions, more categorical limitations, and more cumbersome administrative provisions that the acts under which we are now operating. As an example I would point out the restriction upon use of funds for education of the disadvantaged which requires that 75 percent of the state allocation be used in the areas of reading and mathematics..."

"There just is not enough federal money appropriated to meet the needs of disadvantaged children. We need to increase the appropriation, not decrease it," Nix said.

## Two men charged

Two Hahira men have been identified by police and charged in connection with two separate attempted break-ins of a liquor store here last Saturday and Sunday mornings.

Police Chief David Webb said Roosevelt Harris, a Negro about 30 years old of a rural Hahira address, and Daniel Rawls of Hahira, a 33-year-old Negro, have been placed in the county jail on charges of burglary and destruction of private property following the incidents.

Officers of the police department arrested Rawls after finding him walking down a city street "loaded" with liquor Saturday. Patrolman Ray Smith noticed him walking up North Hall Street around 6 a.m. and stopped to talk with him.

The officer found that Rawls was carrying a fifth of whiskey and had several half-pints in his pocket, so he arrested the man on drunk charges and investigated to determine where he had gotten that amount of liquor so early in the morning.

According to Chief Webb, Patrolman Smith found the plate glass window in front of the Hahira Package Store on West Main Street had been broken out. The building is

owned by John Revill of Hahira.

After officials had run an inventory of merchandise missing, it was determined that 25 fifths had been taken. Thirteen bottles were found hidden behind Rawls' residence, the chief said, and the man later admitted the burglary.

Officers had barely gotten that incident cleared when they received a call from a witness Sunday morning that they had seen a man trying to break into the liquor store.

Cpl. Otis Camion, Ptl. Smith and Ptl. Larry Carter arrested Harris at 12:30 a.m. Sunday when he was walking down West Stanfill Street. He had tried to pry open the window next to the plate glass which had been broken out, but the two-by-four board he was using broke the window about the time the witnesses drove up in a truck.

Chief Webb stated that Harris started running away and was arrested after the witnesses identified him. He did not take any of the liquor at the store.

Rawls was charged with burglary and destruction of private property, while Harris drew attempted burglary and destruction of private property charges.

## Pre-Schooler registration to begin

Registration for children who will enter first grade at Hahira Elementary School will begin Monday, April 16, between the hours of 9 a.m. and 3 p.m., Walter W. Harrison, principal, announced this week.

Children who will be six years old on or before December 31, 1973 may enter the first grade in September, stated Harrison.

A birth certificate and im-

munization record must be submitted at the time the child is registered, the principal said. Health forms for the child's physical examination may be obtained at the principal's office, the local Health Department or from the family physician.

All parents or guardians are urged to register their pre-schoolers as early as possible.
