Hahira officials lay out complaints to PCS

Hahira's Gary Ard Elk's public servant

The Valdosta Elk's Aidmore Auxiliary is pleased to announce that the Public Servant of the Month Award for the month of January 1973 has been presented to Gary Ard, 106 E. Grace St., Hahira.

Seventeen year old Gary receives this award for his heroism in the December 21st incident at Day's Inn Motel when he rescued young Johnathan Parrott from two hitchhikers he and his companion Floyd O'Neal had befriended. After picking up the two Negroes, James Lee Parks, the elder of the two, pulled a gun and ordered the youths to drive to Barney. Upon arriving at Day's Inn, Parrott explained he needed gas and whipped into the service station. At this time Parks fired the gun hitting Johnathan in the chest twice. Parrott, though hit, began to wrestle with the assailant and Gary, an employee of the station and a friend of Johnathan's, accosted the younger boy who had pulled a knife. Parrott then realizing for the first time he had been hit backed off and Parks picked up the gun and fired at Gary but missed. The two then ran into the woods and were later picked

up by several Hahira men. Young Parrott has since completely recovered from his wounds, but had it not been for the intervention of Gary in his friend's behalf, at no regard for his personal safety, an even greater tragedy may have occurred.

Gary is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Alter W. Ard, 106 E. Grace St., Hahira, Georgia.

Meeting planned on one-way street

Mayor Gene Webb announced this week that a public meeting will be held Monday night, February 26 at 7:30 p.m. at the City Hall.

According to Webb the purpose of the meeting is to

discuss one-waying Webb Street south from Lawson Street to Park Avenue.

The public is cordially invited to attend the meeting and express their opinion on the subject, stated the Mayor.

A group of Hahira officials laid out a list of complaints against General Telephone Company - yesterday (Wednesday) when they went before a hearing of the Georgia Public Service Commission in Atlanta.

Hahira Mayor Gene Webb, City Councilmen James Barger and J. D. Sorell, County Commissioner Julian Lawson and City Attorney Wade Coleman of Valdosta comprised the representing group who attended the morning meeting held at the Public Service Commission headquarters on Washington Street in Atlanta.

A recent rate increase in business and home phone service by General Telephone first brought about the protest against the company, but at the meeting yesterday, the city officials put both feet in and requested that arrangements also be made for toll-free service to Valdosta for telephone subscribers in Hahira.

Mayor Webb reported that although the Commission members gave no definite approvals as a whole yesterday, he still "feels sure they'll do whatever they can to help us

solve our problems." Several Commission members even committed themselves toward giving their attention to the Hahira case, he added.

The Mayor also said that many other groups representing various cities had come to Atlanta with similar complaints to be aired at the hearing against General Telephone's rate increase. City Attorney Coleman spoke on behalf of the Hahira group.

Apparently, though, General Telephone felt their recent increase wasn't enough. Mayor Webb said company officials from General spoke first at the hearing requesting and giving reasons for another new phone service rate increase. "Hopefully, all our complaints put a stop to that," he said.

When the Hahira group left the hearing, company spokesmen were presenting their views to the Commission.

Mayor Webb said he is unsure of the time element involved in getting the results of Wednesday's hearing. "All we did was present our case," he said. "The actual solutions are still somewhere between the Public Service Commission and the Atlanta Courts."

DOT picks Moody

VALDOSTA -- The State Department of Transportation, in a briefing paper prepared by the state's airport consulting firm, has recommended Valdosta be the air carrier service point for a regional airport to serve the Valdosta, Moultrie and Thomasville areas.

In designating Valdosta as the service point, the briefing paper prepared by R. Dixon Speas Associates, under contract to the state DOT, recommends jet air carrier service should be located at Moody Air Force Base near here.

A briefing on the paper and its recommendations was held Friday at the College Union at Valdosta State College. The meeting was coordinated by Coastal Plain Area Planning and Development Commission at the request of the state DOT. Representatives from Valdosta, Moultrie, Thomasville, Coastal Plain Area Planning and Development Commission and Southwest Georgia APDC attended.

Presenting the report and leading the discussion were Bill Fish, chief of the aviation-mass transportation branch of the state DOT, and Walter Robinson of R. Dixon Speas Associates, the state's airport consulting firm. Other agencies represented were the Federal Aviation Administration and airlines.

It is recommended in the briefing paper that Valdosta and Lowndes County authorities "should initiate necessary action to effect joint use of Moody Air Force Base. Valdosta Municipal should be the air carrier service point in the Valdosta area until joint use of Moody Air Force Base can be effected."

Fish and Robinson noted the findings presented in the briefing paper are not the final word. The local communities and APDCs are to file any comments they have with Fish within 30 days.

Dr. Carl W. Fatzinger, Principal Insect Ecologist, U.S. Forest Service Southeastern Forest Experiment Station, Olustee, Florida, was recently awarded a Certificate of Merit: "For demonstrating an exceptionally high degree of scientific knowledge and capability as a Research Entomologist and for showing creativity and productivity in the development of an artificial insect food medium which provided the research work unit with a continuous source of cone moths needed for basic research studies."

Dr. Fatzinger received his B. S. degree in Forestry and M. S. degree in Forest Entomology from the University of Michigan. In 1968 he received his Ph.D in Entomology and Ecology from North Carolina State University. He holds membership in the Xi Sigma Pi Honor Society of Forestry,

Sigma Xi National Research Society, Entomological Society of America, and the Florida Entomological Society.

His professional experience includes work with the New York State Conservation Department in Catskill, New York, Forest Service Plant Pest Control Division, Albany, New York, New York State Science Service, Albany, New York, and since 1962 has been with the Southeastern Forest Experiment Station at Bent Creek, North Carolina, Research Triangle Park, North Carolina, and Olustee, Florida, where he is currently involved in research work on behavior and biological control of forest insects.

During his time with the Forest Service, and as a result of his research work, Dr. Fatzinger has written 19 publications for leading Entomological periodicals.

Dr. Fatzinger is married to the former Dianne Miley, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene W. Miley of Hahira. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. C. P. Fatzinger of Catskill, N. Y.

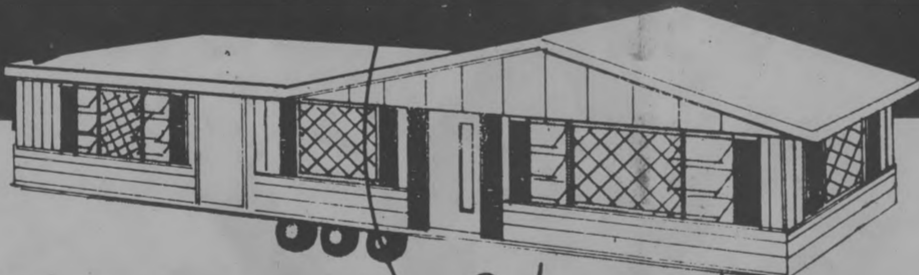

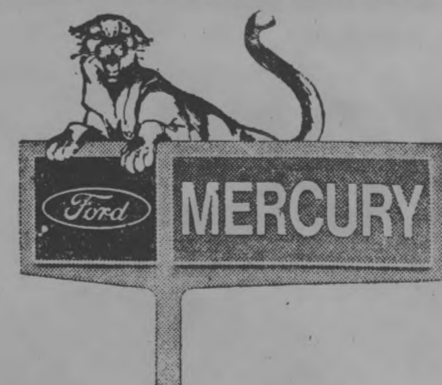

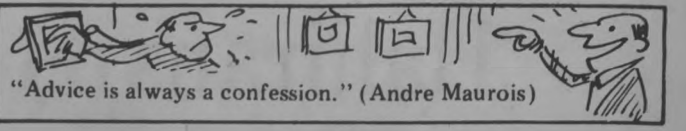

Synthetic soil is a wise choice, begin free of plant disease organisms and undesirable weed seeds. Besides holding moisture and plant nutrients well, the man-made soil is light and easy to handle.

The briefing paper presented Friday contained a statement which has been issued by Southern Airways: "Southern Airways is phasing out their M-404 aircraft and obtaining DC-9 aircraft. Southern plans to serve only one location in the area with DC-9 aircraft."

Construction costs for the five sites considered in the study, to prepare each to be a regional airport, are \$1,076,800 for Moody; \$1,880,900 for Spence; \$3,150,400 for Moultrie-Thomasville; \$3,309,000 for Valdosta; and \$5,060,800 for a new central site.

The evaluation of data for a regional airport site was predicated on Southern's being the only scheduled airline service to both the Valdosta and Moultrie-Thomasville airports and on Southern's statement it would only serve one location in the area with DC-9 aircraft.

Other data such as ground travel cost to the passenger, number of enplanements and capacities were considered in the regional airport analysis. considered in the study: the existing Moultrie-Thomasville airport, Valdosta Municipal, Spence Air Base and Moody AFB, and the fifth, a central site to be developed as a regional airport.

Four conclusions were presented in the briefing paper, based on the evaluation of the data:

- Construction of a new centrally located air carrier


The evaluation of each site as a potential regional airport indicated that of the five locations, the shortest average driving time and lowest ground travel cost would occur if all area passengers used Valdosta Municipal or a new central

Patten bill effects used auto parts dealers

ATLANTA -- Rep. Robert L. Patten of Lakeland and others have introduced a bill to require used motor vehicle parts dealers to have a sales tax number prior to licensing and prior to renewal of any license. House Bill 632 would also provide for increased fees in renewal of licenses submitted after March 31 of each year, and provides that certain records be kept for three years as to all motor vehicle parts handled or sold by dealers.

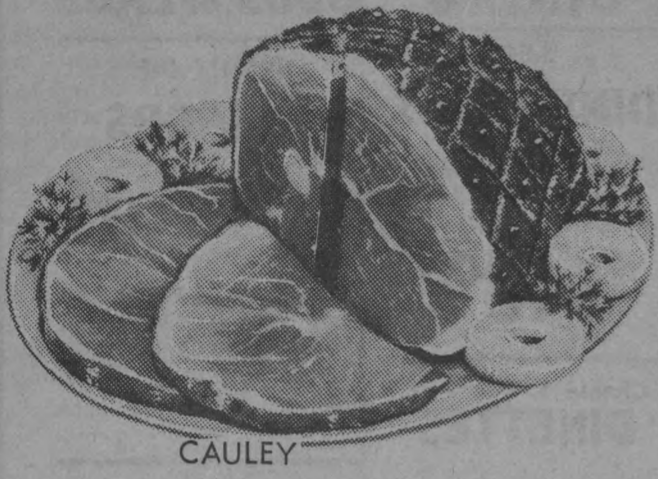
