Thomas Cowart killed

Thomas Cowart, 15-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Owen Cowart of Rt. 1, Hahira, was killed near here Thursday, Dec. 30, in a hunting accident that occurred around 5:30 p.m.

The youth was hunting with several companions on the farm owned by his grandfather, Roy Cowart, in the southeastern part of the county when the fatality occurred. He died instantly from a 12-gauge shotgun wound in the back of the head.

Born in Hahira September 23, 1956, the deceased was a student at Cook County High School in Adel and was a member of Fellowship Baptist Church near Hahira.

Funeral services were held Sunday, January 2 at the Fellowship Baptist Church with burial in the church cemetery. The Rev. John Hendley, pastor, conducted the final rites.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Owen Cowart of Rte. 1, Adel; two sisters, Miss Lynda Cowart of Adel and Mrs. David Cowart of Valdosta; and his paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Roy Cowart of Rte. 1, Hahira.

Thieves steal car; leave replacement

According to Chief David Webb an abandoned car found here on South Lowndes Street Friday, December 17, has been returned to the owner, Rodney Thomas Lyons of Mt. Sterling, Ky.

After a week of investigation by the local police and the State Patrol the owner was located and arrived in Hahira on New Year's Day to recover the stolen property, stated Webb.

According to Lyons his 1963 Volkswagen was stolen from

his home while he was away visiting. When he returned several days later he found a 1969 Ford LTD, also a stolen auto, parked in the place of his car. Lyons later found that the stolen Ford belonged to a friend of his and notified him of his discovery. The keys had been removed from the Ford and were later found in the stolen car belonging to Lyons which was abandoned here.

The incident is still under investigation by the FBI, who was notified by the local police.

Valdosta Wildcats No. 1 in nation

The Valdosta-Lowndes Co. Chamber of Commerce was notified last week by the National Sports News Service of Minneapolis, Minnesota, that the Valdosta High School Wildcats have been selected as the number one high school football team in the nation.

Art Johlfs, sports editor for the rating organization, said that the final judging was done by coaches from the University of Minnesota, The Minnesota Vikings, and area sports writers.

After a perfect season with a 13-0 record, the Wildcats head a list of the top ten high school teams in the country. The complete list was announced by Johlfs at noon, December 31, 1971. Mathis wants tobacco graders to fill consumer service vacancies

WASHINGTON -- Congressman Dawson Mathis said today that flue-cured tobacco graders are urgently needed to fill existing vacancies in the Consumer and Marketing Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture for the 1972 marketing season.

The Second District Congressman urges all interested and qualified Georgians to apply for seasonal employment as an Agricultural Commodity Grader

by writing to the Area Manager, Chicago Area Office, U.S. Civil Service Commission, 219 South Dearborn Street, Room 1322, Chicago, Illinois 60604.

"I would like to see as many Georgians as possible qualify for these positions," Mathis said. He pointed out that applicants must have a minimum of four seasons of experience in handling or marketing of tobacco in order to qualify.

Agricultural Commodity Graders (Tobacco) inspect and certify lots of tobacco according to United States standards, and perform other duties authorized under the Tobacco Inspection Act, including sampling, weighing, and demonstrating official standards for tobacco.

Salaries for these seasonal positions are based on an annual rate of \$6938.

D.E. for students working after school

A special program that enrolls students interested in working at jobs after school is Distributive Education, known as D.E.

44 students, juniors and seniors, are going to school every morning for 4 class periods and working half day at local retail business establishments

which are extensions and laboratories of the D.E. classroom activities.

The help from the business community has been great, according to Phillip Walden, D.E. coordinator at Lowndes High. Everyone of the students are employed and we have not had any problems yet of students

who want to enroll in D.E. and are not able to find them jobs.

The money the students earn is a great help in buying their school supplies, paying for a car, helping with family expenses, or saving for college. And most of all, they receive a unit credit for their job besides one for the academic work in D.E.

The D.E. members work as department store sales clerks, in drugstores, motels, and even as telephone operators.

All of them have been busy during the past two weeks with the holiday sales and also they have been working on surveys and marketing manuals which they are planning to have ready at the end of January to compete at the District level in February with other D.E. programs in the state.

They really used every minute of their time and they enjoy being under real working conditions which permits them to learn about the responsibilities of a job, employer-employee relations, and at the same time they are being trained in sales promotion, advertising, display, credit, and marketing management.

LOWNDES COUNTY GRAND JURY SUPPLEMENTAL PRESENTMENTS DECEMBER TERM 1971

Pursuant to the recommendations made during the regular session of the December 1971 term of the Lowndes County Grand Jury, the Grand Jury was reconvened December 28, 1971 to receive and consider a report of the committee of three, F.D. White, Travis Paine, and A.B. Sowell, appointed to study the feasibility of changing the offices of the Ordinary, Tax Commissioner, and Clerk of Superior Court from fee system to salary system.

After having received the report of the aforesaid special committee, we now file our supplemental report as follows:

After having contacted a number of counties and the Executive Director of the County Commissioners for information regarding fee vs. salary basis for the Ordinary, Tax Commissioner, and Clerk of Superior Court; we find the following:

1. It is the unanimous opinion of all persons contacted that the counties are better off on the salary basis.

2. They feel political confusion and friction are reduced and services are improved.

3. A better fiscal system is obtained by placing all funds collected in one depository and disbursements made on a systematic schedule. All fees would be a matter of public record.

4. They express satisfaction in the fact these are public officers and their workings are a matter of public record to which the voters are entitled.

This committee has noticed that the expense of every office has increased since they went on the salary system as far as actual figures could be obtained, however; not all increase cost should be attributed to the change in systems. Demand for more services along with population increase have been responsible for their share of the increase.

After considering all the facts we have found, we recommend

the offices be changed from fee to a salary basis.

We recommend the following:

1. That a salary basis be set for each office.

2. That all fees, all monies, and all revenues what so ever that is handled by these offices be deposited in the county general funds. That only funds for the Lowndes County Law Library be excluded.

3. That a budget for these offices be presented to the Grand Jury at their December meeting.

4. That any raises or changes in the salary of these offices be set and determined by the December term of the Grand Jury at the time of the budget is submitted. We submit a recommended salary of \$14,000.00 for the Ordinary, \$16,000.00 for the Clerk of Court, and \$16,000.00 for the Tax Commissioner with the stipulation that the \$4,800.00 paid the Tax Commissioner by State Law be included in his salary.

5. That an automatic raise of 5% be allowed for each term of office an office holder is re-elected to, not to exceed four (4) terms of office. That this automatic raise not be retroactive but begin when office is placed on salary basis. Each new office will revert to the basic salary.

6. That all county revenues coming into these offices be deposited and a deposit slip given to the Clerk of the County Commissioners showing that same has been done on the 1st and 15th of each month on the next banking day after this date.

We recommend that Mr. Sowell be paid for two days work, Mr. Paine be paid for two days work, Mr. DeLoach be paid for one day, and Mr. White be

paid for four days work. That this Grand Jury send Mrs. Inez Pendleton a letter thanking her for her time spent with this committee and for secretarial work and that she be paid at least \$25.00 for her services.

It is recommended that these presentments be published in the Valdosta Daily Times and the Hahira Gold Leaf.

Patrolmen said the impact caused Mrs. Martin's car to veer into the westbound lane of the highway and struck a 1968 Chevrolet driven by Sammie J. Carter, 24, of Rte. 1, Hahira.

Mrs. Martin was taken to Smith Hospital for treatment of minor bruises.

Damage to the Pontiac was estimated at \$400 and \$300 to the Chevrolet. Patrolmen could not locate the owner of the cow which was valued at \$100.

The "Action Line" system will be for public use and two lines will again be established where anyone may call free to get information concerning House activities and its members. The line will be open from 9 a.m. until 5 p.m. for answers to public inquiries.

A special filing system is being set up so that answers may be given to such questions as the status of specific legislation, what bills are being offered in broad categories such as taxes, crime and drugs, how individual legislators voted on roll call votes, how to write to legislators and the names of committee members.

Tips for homemakers

MAKE LEISURE TIME: How much leisure time do you have—when nothing is demanded of you—to do what you want to do?

Each new day brings more gadgets and push-button convenience to save time and energy. With all these devices, there should be plenty of time for leisure. Do you find it? No matter how many devices or gadgets are available to help you, minutes and hours can slip away.

The answer to having more leisure time is wise time management:

LIVE SIMPLY: Don't complicate your schedule. Today's trend is toward a comfortable, relaxed way of life. Those of you who slave all day doing house work, then take up your mending in the evening are no longer looked upon as the shining light of womanhood. The successful homemaker looks upon housekeeping as only part of her homemaking responsibility. She finds time for all activities - work, leisure, personal care, etc. Take a good look at your pat-

tern of living. Know what is important to you and your family. Recognize what standards of house-cleaning are necessary to maintain health and harmony. Do a job only as well as it needs to be done. Most important, know when to quit!

SIMPLIFY YOUR WORK: The way you work is directly related to the length of your working day and how you feel at the end of the day. Questioning your work habits is a good way to see needed changes. Don't try to improve all your housekeeping practices at once. Instead, learn to do one or two things rapidly and well. In the course of a week you may save an hour or more.

MAKE A PLAN OF WORK: Planning helps you to see a job as a whole. Taking time to plan your work saves time in the long run. Planning helps you work at a convenient and desirable time. No hard, fast rules can be set up, because you must work at your own plan. In planning, provide time for daily, weekly and seasonal tasks.

Daily schedules should include all routing work for the day. In making your schedule

allow adequate time for each task and provide for rest breaks. The best kind of rest is a short nap—even for 10 or 15 minutes. If this is impossible, look at the newspaper or listen to music.

Don't let interruptions lead you to believe that scheduling is not worthwhile. Allow a little Teeway in your schedule to permit short work stoppages.

It's a good rule to do the things that you dislike first. Discipline yourself to allot a special time for these things. When the time comes, do the task without delay! Plan some sort of reward when you finish, such as a coffee break or phone call.

Occasional tasks such as holidays and birthday parties should be planned for in daily, weekly, and seasonal schedules as the need arises.

WRITE YOUR PLAN: A written plan takes away the burden of shuffling all the jobs to be done in your head. Make it as detailed as you think it needs to be.

Write out a daily, weekly and monthly schedule in calendar FASHION. Stick to it and enjoy leisure time!

Federal Income Tax information

Albany, Ga., -- The deadline for final payment of 1971 estimated Federal Income Tax is Monday, Jan. 17, 1972, Calvin G. Lane, the local Internal Revenue Service representative in Albany, said today.

Some people whose income has changed substantially during the last quarter of 1971 should compute an estimate in the space provided on the worksheet. Other people may have to file an original 1971 declaration on Form 1040-ES if they just met the filing requirements during the last quarter, according to Mr. Lane.

Payment of the last installment or the filing of an original or amended declaration by Jan. 17 is not required if the taxpayer files his 1971 income tax return and pays all tax due by Monday, Jan. 31, 1972.

Farmers and fisherman who earned at least two thirds of their gross income from farming or fishing must follow the same rule except that if they do not file their 1971 declaration estimate by Jan. 17, they have until March 1, 1972 to file their 1971 return and pay all tax due.

Members of the Lowndes High School Distributive Education Club began work Monday with Commerce officials on its first study to determine the rate that shoplifting increases in certain periods of the year and the role advertising has on it.

President of the Club, Daniel Parker, who aided in the compiling of the questionnaires, said the interviews with the businessmen will continue for three weeks.

The Club project is the biggest undertaking in the local club marketing surveys and requires the participation of all club members, said coordinator Phil Walden. "The students will learn and the community will benefit," he added.

The survey part of the creative marketing study in the DE program at LHS is to involve two groups, the customers and the businessmen.

The first will be a random survey of the customer population in Valdosta and surrounding areas. They want to find out the public's opinion on how they feel about shoplifting in order to find a way to educate customers in how to prevent others from shoplifting.

The other group to be surveyed is to include business-

men and retail employees. "We want to determine clearly the facts involved in shoplifting to include them in the DE curriculum at LHS, then the DE students can be taught and prepared in a better way to handle the real situation."

Phil Walden said at least 500 persons are to be surveyed in the study. The Club wants to mail out the surveys to the public because it would be quicker and a more accurate sampling of the customers' opinions. The Club wants to go door-to-door to each retail business in town when it comes to surveying businessmen and employees, he explained.

He said the DE classes will work on the study as a department wide project in order to accomplish its goals in time to enter the study in state DE marketing competition in March. "We hope to have the surveys completed by the first of February and the study documented by February 18th," he added.

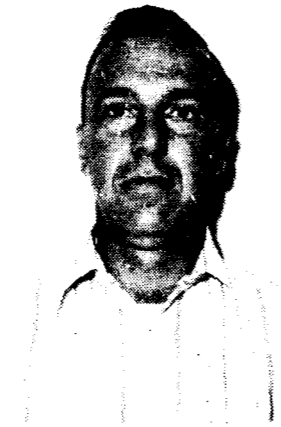

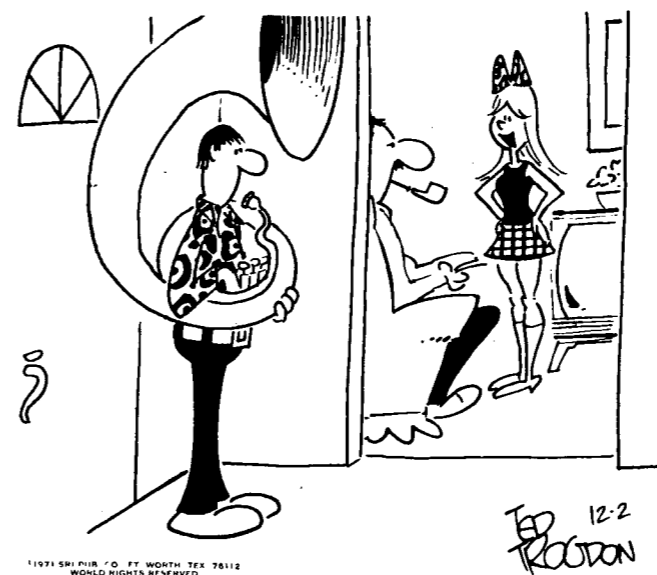
Several 4-H girls got off to a good start in selecting projects and beginning work on record books for 1972.
