Names department heads

Mayor - Council vow no mixed drinks

The swearing in of new city officials and the decision to prohibit the sale of mixed drinks within the City of Hahira were the highlights of Wednesday night's initial meeting for the new year of Hahira's Mayor and Council.

Outgoing Mayor W. R. Salter spoke to the group prior to the swearing in of the new mayor, O. E. (Gene) Webb, and two new councilmen, P. L. Clanton, Jr. and J. D. Sorrell.

Webb enters the chief executive position after defeating Salter in the city election held in late October. The outgoing mayor had previously served two consecutive two-year terms in that office.

The invocation was presented by the Rev. William Oliver, Jr., pastor of the Hahira United Methodist Church.

Mayor Webb, in taking over the mayoral office, requested the cooperation from all council members and urged everyone to work as a team throughout their terms.

On a motion by the mayor, P. L. Clanton, Jr. was unanimously elected to serve as Mayor Pro-Tem. Also elected as department chairmen were James E. Barger, Taxes and Licenses and also Custodian of City Property; Danny Parham, Street and Street Lights; Leland Clanton, Water and Sewer; and Office and Records; and J. D. Sorrell, Police Department and Fire Department.

In its major business of the evening, the governing body voted to have its city attorney draw up an ordinance to prohibit the sale of mixed

Moody Commander

Col. Fox nominated for Star

Col. Cecil E. Fox, wing commander, was notified over the holiday period that he has been nominated by President Richard M. Nixon for appointment to the grade of temporary brigadier general.

The notification came in a personal message from the office of the Air Force Chief of Staff congratulating Moody's commander. Actual promotion to the new grade is awaiting congressional approval.

Colonel Fox first came to Moody in 1970 where he was assigned as deputy commander of Operations. Eleven months later he assumed the duties of wing commander following the departure of Col. (now brigadier general) Carl G. Schneider.

The 49-year-old Waco, Tex., native received his commission from the U. S. Military Academy at West Point in 1947, and holds a master's degree in industrial engineering from Stanford University, Palo Alto, Calif. He has served in the Netherlands, Korea, Germany and Vietnam, and has logged more than 5,000 flying hours as a command pilot.

He and his wife, Carol have a daughter and two sons, and reside in base housing.

Pecans said taken in Hahira Tuesday

Police Chief David Webb reported this week that warrants were issued Tuesday against a 49-year-old Hahira man who was caught "red-handed" walking away with 20 pounds of nuts he had allegedly stolen.

Webb said he arrested Fred Williams of 207 Washington Street here while the man was walking down Railroad Street with the nuts late Saturday afternoon.

According to Webb, the Negro had been picking up pecans on a lot owned by H. M. Barfield near Dadant and Sons Beekeepers Supply here.

Williams had been arrested on petty theft charges last year,

Webb said, when he caught him stealing produce from stores before early morning loads were moved into the groceries.

"He got off with city charges and more or less a warning on the thefts last year," Webb said. "We decided to press charges for the theft this time."

The chief said an employee of the Beekeeper's Supply noticed the man run away from the lot Saturday and called Webb. Williams, after being arrested by Webb, tried to tell him he had permission to pick up the nuts.

However, Webb said he checked with Barfield and learned he "definitely did not have permission."



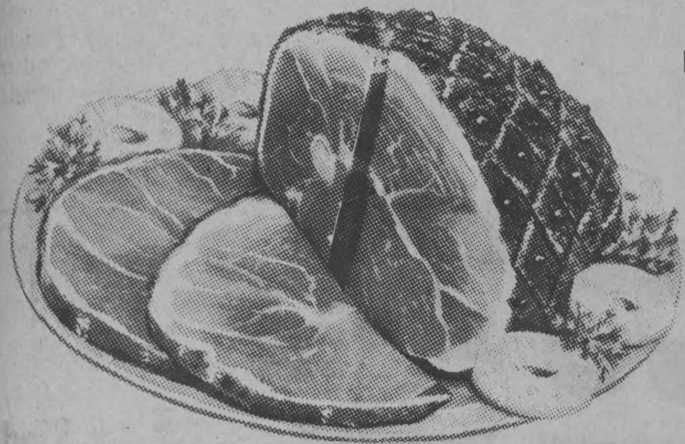
Christmas serenity

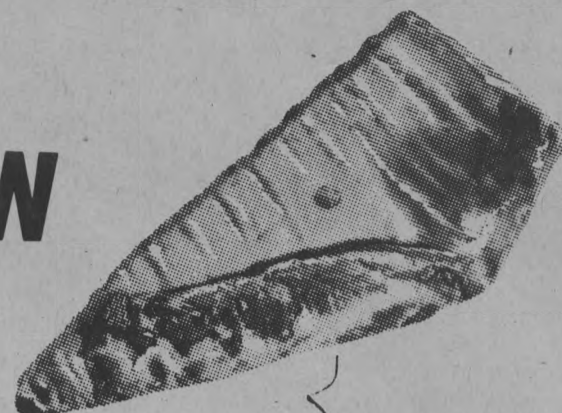

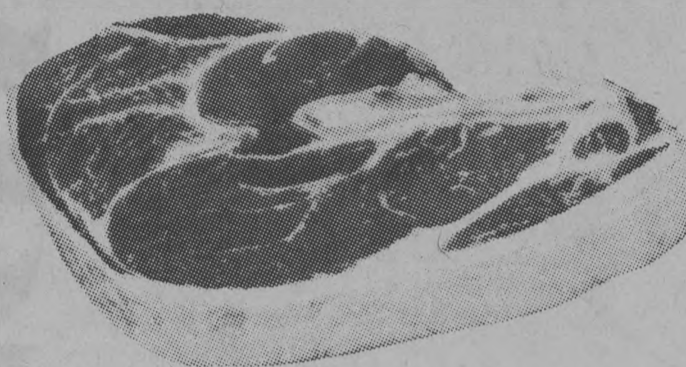

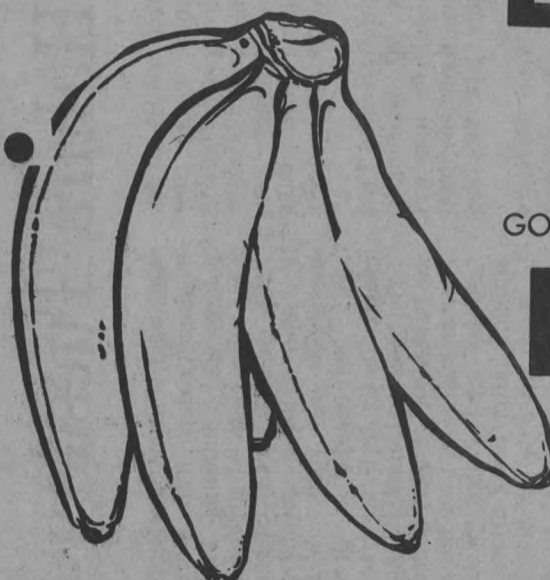

Family SHOPPING BAG

ITEM: Although women's fashions seem to hug the body more in past seasons, softness is achieved by use of ruffles, pin tucks and dainty trims.

ITEM: An iron skillet should be seasoned at least every six months, or often if in frequent use. To do this, first wash carefully, rinse and dry. Then liberally coat the side with vegetable oil or shortening and heat so that the oil permeates the surface.

ITEM: Imported beef makes up a relatively small part of our total beef. Last year the 1.8 billion pounds imported represented 8 percent of the total amount U.S. consumers ate.

ITEM: Sterling silver and sil-plated pieces, excluding hollow-handled knives and other hollow pieces that have been glued, should be washed in an automatic dishwasher. Check each piece carefully after the drying cycle; stored flatware or upturned, silver articles may have retained all pools of water that must be wiped with a soft cloth to prevent water spots.

The more you earn, the higher your total income will be. Under the new social security law, social security payments will be reduced by \$1 for every \$2 earned over \$2,100 in a year.

Previously, monthly payments were reduced by \$1 in benefits for every \$2 earned between \$1,680 and \$2,880 in a year—and by \$1 for every \$1 earned over \$2,880.

People 72 and over will continue to get their full social security benefits regardless of earnings. Under the new law, people under 72 can earn as much as \$2,100 in a year and get their full social security benefits. Different rules apply to people getting social security disability benefits if they work.

In addition, starting in 1973, full benefits can be paid for any month in which an employee's wages are not more than \$175—or he didn't perform substantial services in self-employment. Previously, the monthly limit was \$140.

Also starting in 1973, only your earnings in the months before you reach 72 will be used to figure what benefits are due for those months.

Before, earnings in the entire year you reached 72 were counted in figuring benefits due you for months before you were 72.

Another feature of the new law assures that the earnings exemption for people getting social security payments will go up automatically in future years as earnings levels increase. The first year there can be an automatic increase is 1975.

Social security pays monthly benefits to eligible retired and disabled workers and their families—and to families of deceased workers who were insured under social security.

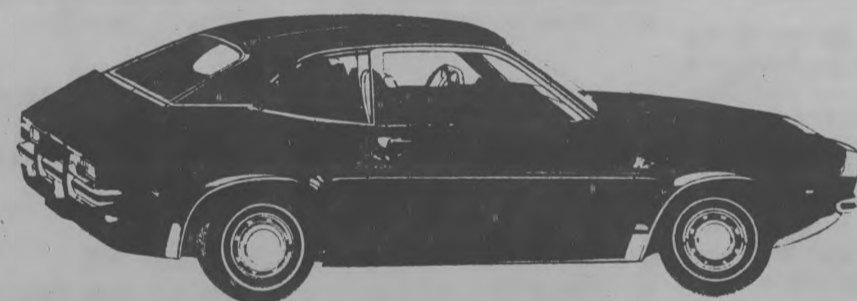

Tips for Homemakers

Weekend Beef:

With retail beef prices at their highest in years, you cannot afford to ignore weekend "specials" on meat.

If you have enough freezer space, stock up on a few weeks' supply of your favorite specials. Shopping at more than one supermarket for good meat buys may offer you greater menu variety.

To maintain quality of fresh meat, be certain to use good packaging materials, package properly and promptly freeze it. Keep it stored at zero degrees Fahrenheit or lower.

Remember to compare prices per pound and cost per serving of boneless cuts and bone cuts. Usually a boneless cut will yield three servings per pound while a bone cut nets only two servings per pound.

Consumer Credit:

Consumer credit, used widely, is a tool that allows us to enjoy goods and services while we are paying.

Kept under control, credit purchasing has many plus factors:

(1) Convenience - It's simpler to pay once a month than to carry cash for daily or weekly payments. Credit is also safer than cash and records are easier to keep.

(2) Pay-as-you-go-Credit can enable a family to use goods and services before cash is

readily available.

(3) Financial emergencies - If savings are not on hand, most people prefer to turn to credit rather than charity.

(4) Bargains - If items are a true bargain, you can save money in the long run by purchasing while prices are down.

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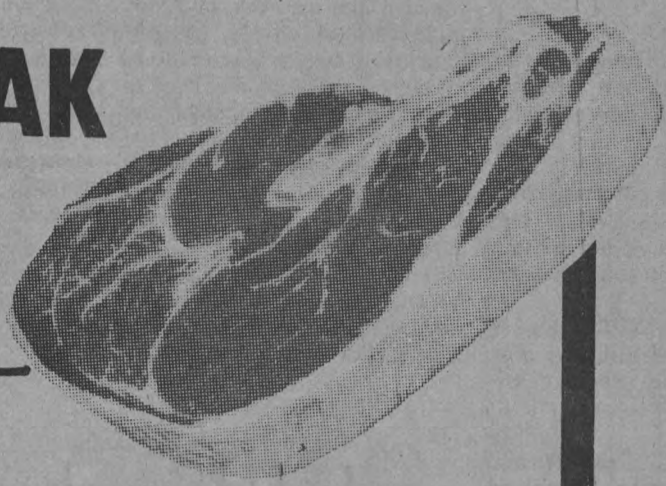

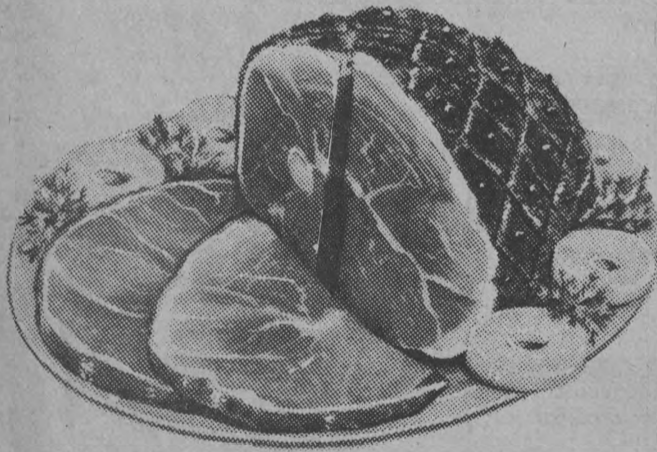

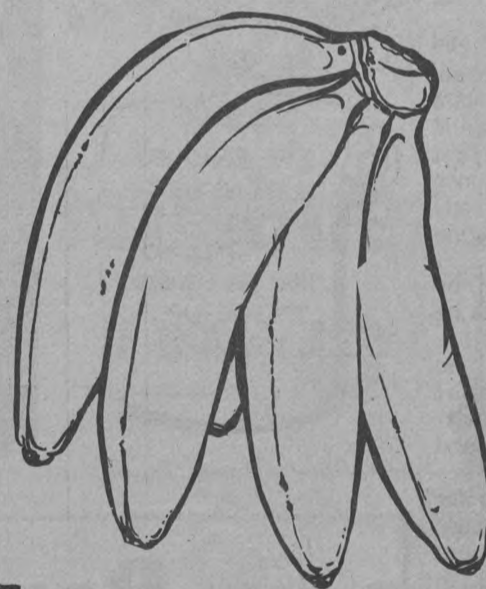
