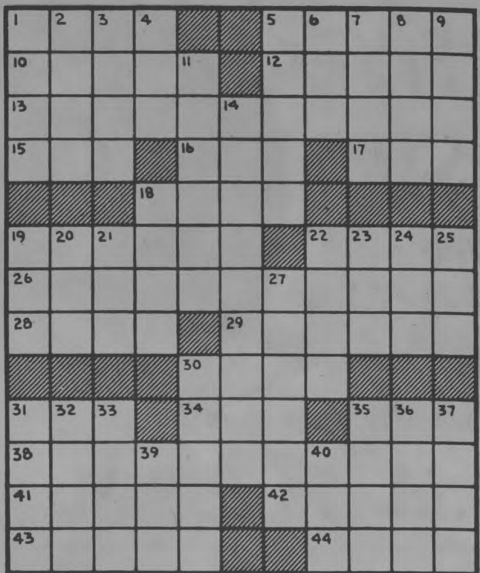
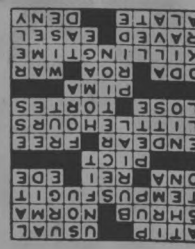

Hope to be together many more years.

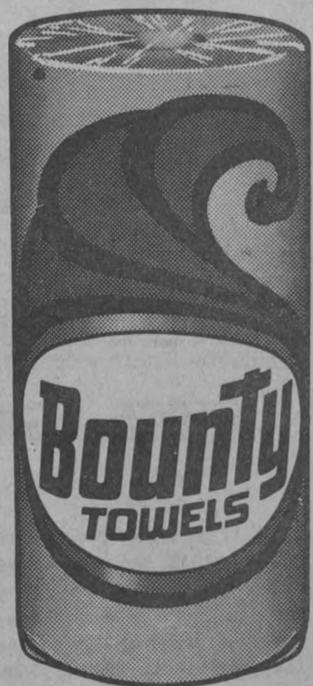

Some women feel their property is "just not worth" drawing up a will. This despite the fact that many a woman's estate — real and personal property —

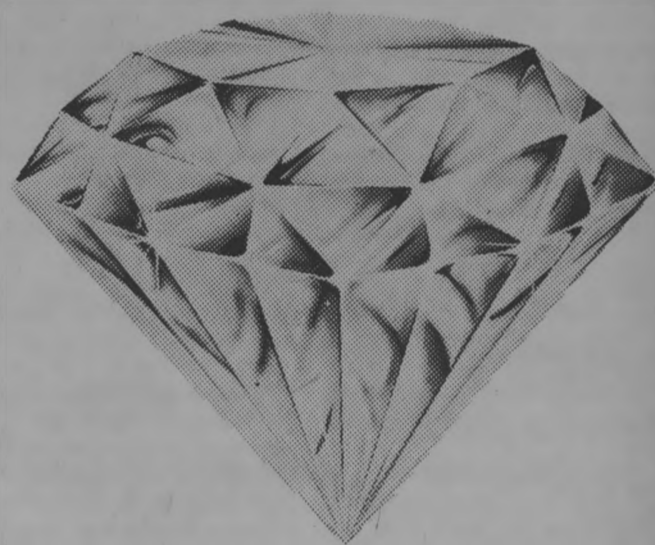
may include valuable jewels, furs, as life insurance policies, stocks, paintings and heirlooms, as well bonds and real estate.

Pride Groups Honored

ATHENS—For the past year 4-H members across the state have been working to make their communities better places to live as part of a new "Community Pride" program. Four county 4-H groups have been recognized for outstanding community achievements. The state Community Pride winners, announced this week by Harold Darden, Extension 4-H leader, are as follows:

Walton County, first place; Coweta County, second; Clarke County, third; and Lowndes County, fourth.

"Each of these groups," Darden said, "has made fine efforts in improving their community environments. During the past year, they identified key environmental problems and then took action to solve them."

The Community Pride Program is sponsored by the Standard Oil Company of Kentucky in cooperation with Extension landscape community development, conservation, horticulture and 4-H staffs.

Last summer 4-H representatives from various Georgia communities attended the state's first Community Pride workshop at Abraham Baldwin Agricultural College and the Rural Development Center. The workshop, coordinated by Darden, was designed to create awareness of community problems and to stimulate 4-H'ers to take corrective measures through community action groups.

Workshop "graduates" Pride groups and kept records of their accomplishments. Success stories were submitted in the competition for state awards.

Walton County's record book shows what it takes to capture the state's top Community Pride award. Action-minded Monroe 4-H'ers mobilized a group to tackle varied community problems. They centered their initial efforts on landscaping a mini-park adjacent to the new home of the city library. With plans provided by Extension landscape architects, the 4-H'ers planted shrubs and ground cover. Plans are now set for midsummer dedication ceremony, complete with the town's mayor.

With the park project behind them, Walton 4-H'ers concentrated on other community needs. Contacting an occupational therapist and head nurse at two local nursing homes, they made plans to brighten the lives of senior citizens. At Christmas and Easter, on Valentine's Day and Mother's Day, the group delivered cards and small gifts and made personal visits. Joining forces with local Jaycees, the 4-H'ers helped with a Monroe area trash clean-up that yielded over 70 containers of litter.

When the devastating March 31 tornado struck Walton County, 4-H members were on hand to help community volunteers in the massive clean-up effort that followed. To take the second place title, a group of Madras 4-H'ers pushed for a solid waste management system in Coweta County. They began their ecology movement with visits to the County Commissioners. To gain public support, they flooded the local newspapers with photos and news articles

stressing the need for a sophisticated disposal system. When the County Commissioner election rolled around, they contacted citizens and urged them to cast a vote favoring solid waste management. "Victory," spelled in bold letters, heads a page in their record book. This entry displays a newspaper article announcing the Commissioners' decision to invest \$100,000 in a county-wide solid waste management system.

A Madras Community Pride spokesman says, "We think we got something started."

Under the leadership of current state 4-H citizenship champion Barbara Ellard, the Athens Community Pride group, called ACT (Active Citizens Today), tackled a host of community activities for third place honors.

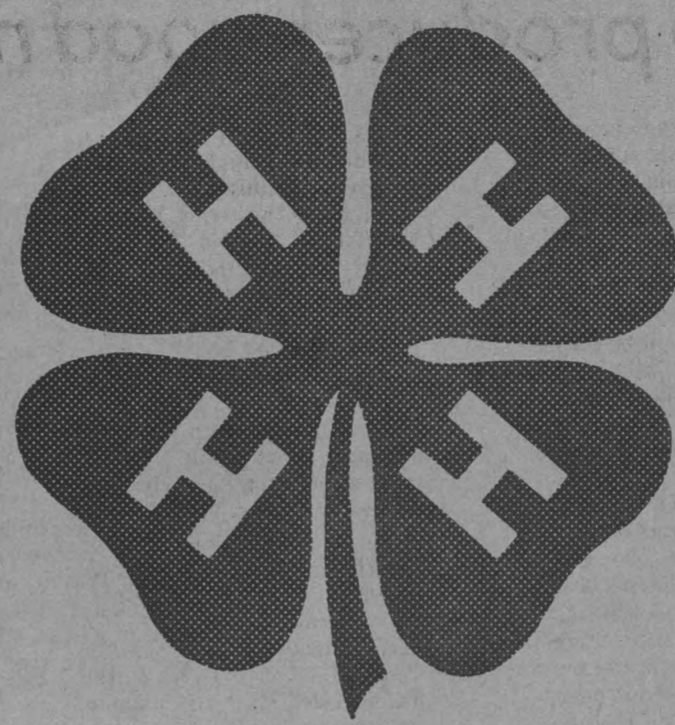
Prior to the November general election, they made and distributed hundreds of door knob hangers urging Clarke residents to vote. They established a 4-H Club at the Georgia Mental Retardation Center and participated in a 20-mile Walk-A-Thon for the March of Dimes. Totals showed the 4-H'ers contributing over \$2,000 to the March of Dimes effort.

At Christmas, they made candy favors and sang carols at a local nursing home. On Valentine's Day, they distributed cards to the senior residents. And like the Walton 4-H'ers they helped in a community clean-up following the March tornado.

To brighten up the Athens area, they planted trees at Clarke County schools and distributed over 5000 flower seeds to local residents on May Day. The latter effort, called Spring Color '73, received state-wide publicity and the Athens group hopes they set a precedent for all county 4-H Clubs.

Hahira 4-H'ers, taking fourth place honors for Lowndes County, launched clean-up campaigns along two major highways. They cleared the roadside, made arrangements for county trash collections at major intersections, provided trash containers, and erected "Keep Lowndes Clean" signs. For out of state and local motorists, the Hahira group planned and constructed a roadside mini-park. In addition, they planted flowers at the homes of handicapped citizens and conducted a workshop for local sixth grade students. The Hahira workshop was fashioned after the Community Pride format at ABAC.

Four-H Community Pride, Darden announced earlier this month, has received the go-ahead for the second year in Georgia. Ninety delegates are scheduled to attend the 1973 session, July 30 to August 3 at Abraham Baldwin.

Tips For Homemakers

BY TED PHELPS, HOME ECONOMIST

A NEW LOOK IN NUTRITION LABELING
We all are becoming aware that the Food and Drug Administration has issued some proposals concerning nutrition labeling. In the next few months we will see on our packaged foods more detailed nutritional information of great importance to people. Just "what," "how," and "when" is this new labeling to come? In 1969 the White House Conference on Food, Nutrition and Health expressed concern over the existence of poor

nutrition in the U.S. A recommendation was made at this conference that a system be set up for putting nutrition information on packaged food to help Americans eat a better balanced diet. The Federal Food and Drug Administration (FDA) directed research over a period of two years to determine: (1) if the consumers would use this information on a label, and (2) if so, what format would most customers prefer. The FDA studies showed that consumers are interested in nutrition in-

formation and want it on the labels. The studies also reveal the type of label format most preferred by persons of all ages and economic groups. The FDA submitted in January a 12-part proposal for food labeling practices. The over-all objective of the proposal of food products in the U.S. nutritional labeling will provide meaningful new information on the identify, quality and nutritional value of a wide variety of general and special foods available on the nation's market place. Labels will follow a standard format. The format and headings for "Nutritional Labeling" will be: "Serving size", "Servings per container", "Caloris content", "Protein content", "Carbohydrate content", "Fat content", "Percentage of U.S. recommended daily allowances (RDA) for protein, vitamins and minerals". This format will be required whenever nutrition labeling is used, to allow consumers to find easily the pertinent information. Amounts of protein, vitamins and minerals will be given as a percentage of the RDA as established by the National Academy of Sciences. These will replace the outdated Minimum Daily Requirements (MRD) previously used. Protein amounts will also be given by weight. Furthermore, the standard format will usually list seven important vitamins and minerals. If a food contains less than 2 percent nutrients, the manufacturer may list only those present at more than 2 percent of the RDA; however, there must be an appropriate disclaimer for the nutrients not used.

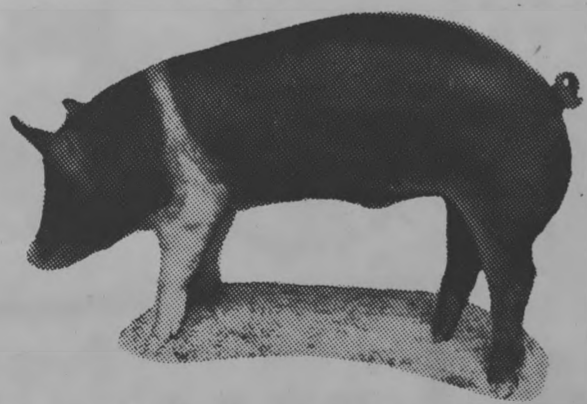
