




the parking game

interview with beth taylor, panhellenic presi greek week

PINE CONE: Joey, what is Greek Week? In general.

JOEY: Help me, Beth! I guess it's when we spotlight the Greek way of life—social, athletic, community interest, school spirit.

PINE CONE: Beth, traditionally, when is Greek Week?

BETH: Well, when I was a freshman, it was fall quarter. When Homecoming was moved to spring quarter, Greek Week was changed to Winter quarter.

JOEY: Actually, the main reason Greek Week was moved was deferred rush for fraternities.

PINE CONE: You're a senior this year, so that would be four years ago, wouldn't it Beth?

BETH: Yes.

PINE CONE: What were the plans for Greek Week?

BETH: Most of them didn't come off. Wednesday night was the song fest, which the Alpha Xi's and TKE's won. A dance and the chariot race, which the Delta Chi's won, were Friday night. Saturday we were supposed to have the Olympics, but we had the rain. Saturday night was supposed to be a semiformal dance, but the band forgot to show up.

JOEY: Sunday there was a Greek service at which Dean Pafford spoke.

BETH: The ADPI's and the TKE's won scholarships.

PINE CONE: How much of Greek Week is traditional?

JOEY: Oh, yes, we were going to conclude Greek Week with a Heart Fund drive, but the city wouldn't give us a solicitation permit.

PINE CONE: And that's part of your community interest.

JOEY: All Greeks did participate in spring cleanup this past weekend. (ed. note; May 3, 1969)

PINE CONE: Back to my question, what are the original and the traditional parts of Greek Week?

JOEY: Last year the charity carnival was added. Community interest was added the past few years, but most of the rest is traditional.

PINE CONE: You do the same things every year?

BETH: No, we don't have a definite routine. We can make changes. Last year we had too much going on every night and classes, too. So this year we decided to cut down a little.

PINE CONE: I think Fate helped you out a little.

BETH: Yes, we didn't want to cut down that much!

JOEY: It's a lot harder having it spring quarter, too, because so much is going on.

PINE CONE: Is Greek Week a good idea?

BETH: Yes, because it gives the Greeks a chance to compete, draws them closer together, and shows them off. It's fun and the Greeks enjoy it. It is a means of entertainment.

PINE CONE: Is that the planned part?

JOEY: For the most part, it is a good idea. Especially on the men's part it could get out of hand, but generally it is a joining not a splitting force.

PINE CONE: What about this competition?

BETH: There's lots of it, but it doesn't get out of hand. We all want the sorority to be better, but we also want the Greek system to be better.

PINE CONE: What is the effect of the four sororities using the four different wings of Ashley Hall on competition?

BETH: It has no effect on competition. It is better on the sororities. All the others like it; it makes them closer.

PINE CONE: Do you ever get too much sorority?

BETH: No, because you choose people you feel like are your kind of people. You are glad to live with them.

PINE CONE: What about the competition between fraternities?

JOEY: It would be less than honest to say that sometimes competition goes too far. For the last year and a half it has been much better. Groups are more conscious of working together, accepting defeat, and carrying victory with a certain kind of tact. As the fraternity system grows there will be less likelihood of one or two groups being able to dominate everything.

PINE CONE: How would you rate the VSC fraternities for closeness? Is it as Beth said not love of individual sorority only, but love of the Greek system?

JOEY: It is a part of the way of thinking of the fraternity man on this campus to love his group and see it do well, but he is also concerned about others. Everyone has friends in other fraternities.

on—the girls have Ashley Hall. What do you think about fraternity houses?

JOEY: Fraternity housing is in its infancy, but success is paving the way. Although there are lots of problems—people living together, finances—it is a good thing. You really can't experience fraternity living when people are all over town. You lose a lot in the athletic, social, and other areas.

PINE CONE: How do you think the Greek system has improved on this campus?

JOEY: Greeks, especially the fraternities, needed more guidance. We have jumped from a three horse to a seven horse deal in one year with rumors of eight and nine on the way. There are problems with a larger system. People are not experienced enough to deal with the new situation. A lot could have been avoided. Was it the Interfraternity Council or the administration? No one knew what to do. Panhellenic has more control over new groups.

PINE CONE: What's in the picture for the near future?

JOEY: Some think that the Greeks have outlived their function. Greeks are becoming more social minded, that is more concerned about social problems. The purpose of pledge education is to train responsible men and women. We want them to be contributors to the community.

PINE CONE: That's a good note to end on.

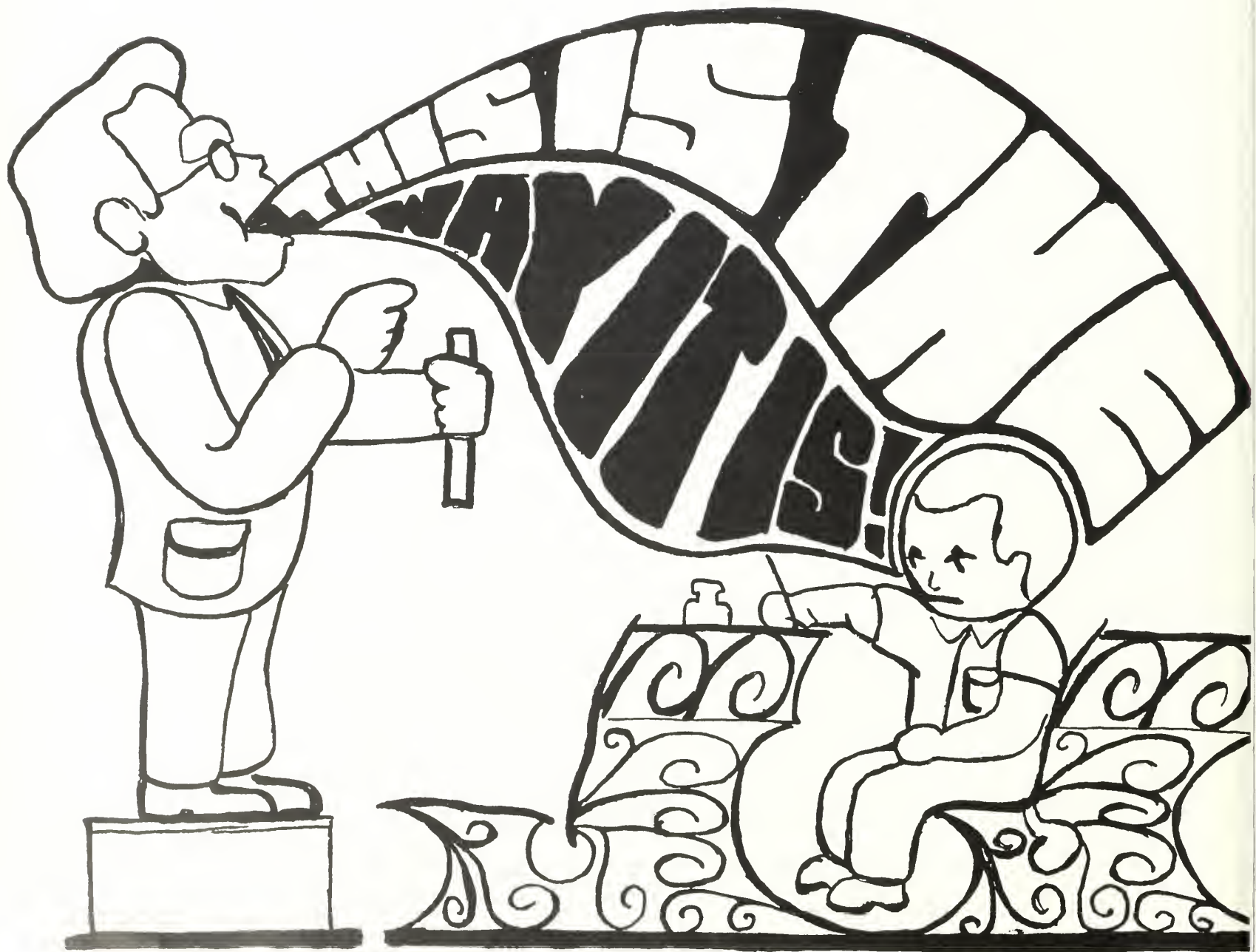

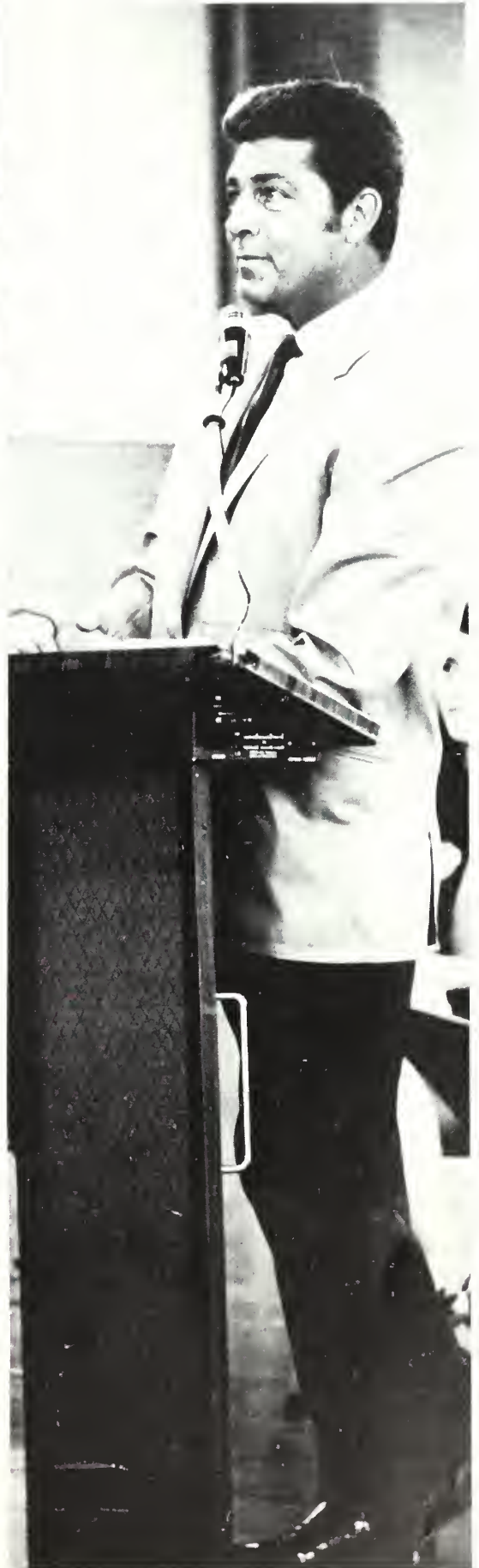

Basketball is the major sport at Valdosta State. Winning basketball teams are the rule. Winning the Georgia Intercollegiate Athletic Conference championship and the NAIA District 25 title has become a tradition. The 1968-69 Rebels wrote another successful chapter in the basketball section of the VSC sports history book.

In retrospect, 1968-69 was perhaps VSC basketball's finest hour. Jim Melvin and assistant James Dominey molded a young, inexperienced squad into champions. For his great coaching job, Melvin won Coach of the Year honors in the conference and the district.

The Rebels won their eighth GIAC crown in the last nine years with a perfect 14-0 record, then upset the field to claim their third consecutive District 25 title. Powerful Albany State fell, 70-68, in the district finals at Statesboro, and the Rebs moved on to Kansas City for NAIA's National Tournament. The season ended in the first round of the prestigious national meet, and the final record was 18-11.

The record does not tell the complete story because the Rebs won the big games. Melvin's "Mighty Mites" (the tallest player was 6-5) were a clutch team. The six players that carried the load—Pete Smith, John Trimnell, Jimmy Dorsett, Paul O'Brien, Joe Brogdon and Marty Lehmann—came through time and again when the chips were down. Of these six players, three—Smith, Trimnell and Dorsett—were named to the all-conference team. Smith, who set a new rebounding record at VSC, was the district's Most Valuable Player and an honorable mention All-American.

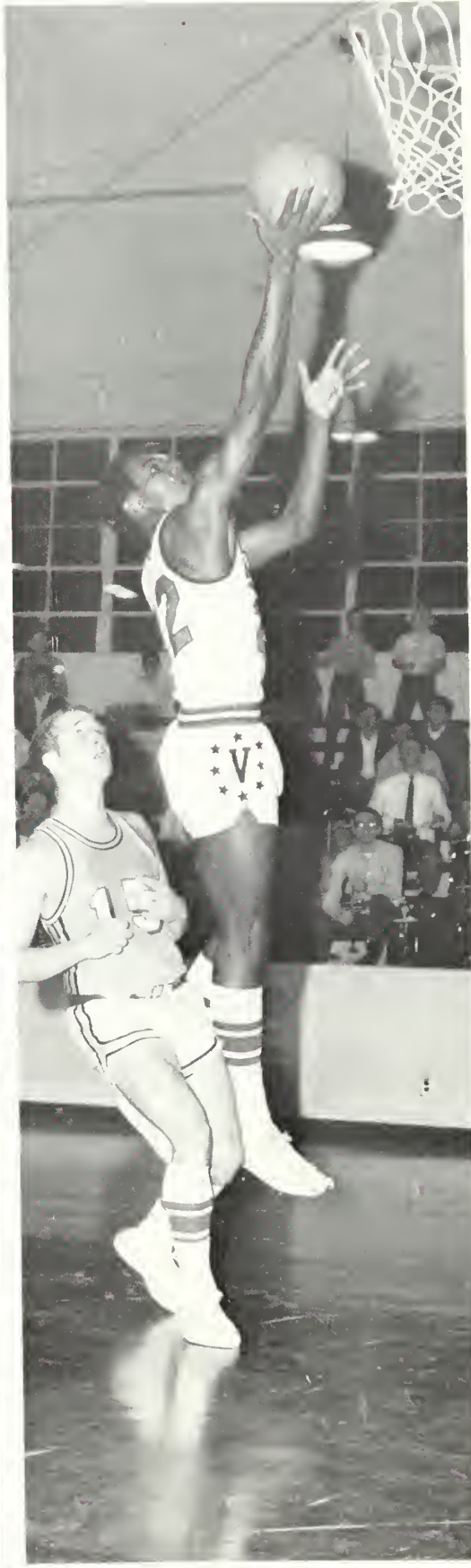

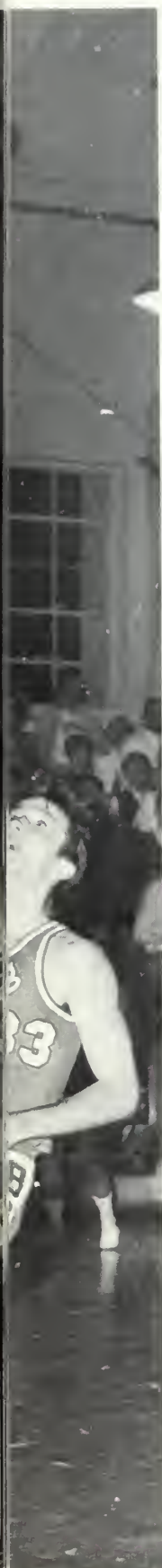

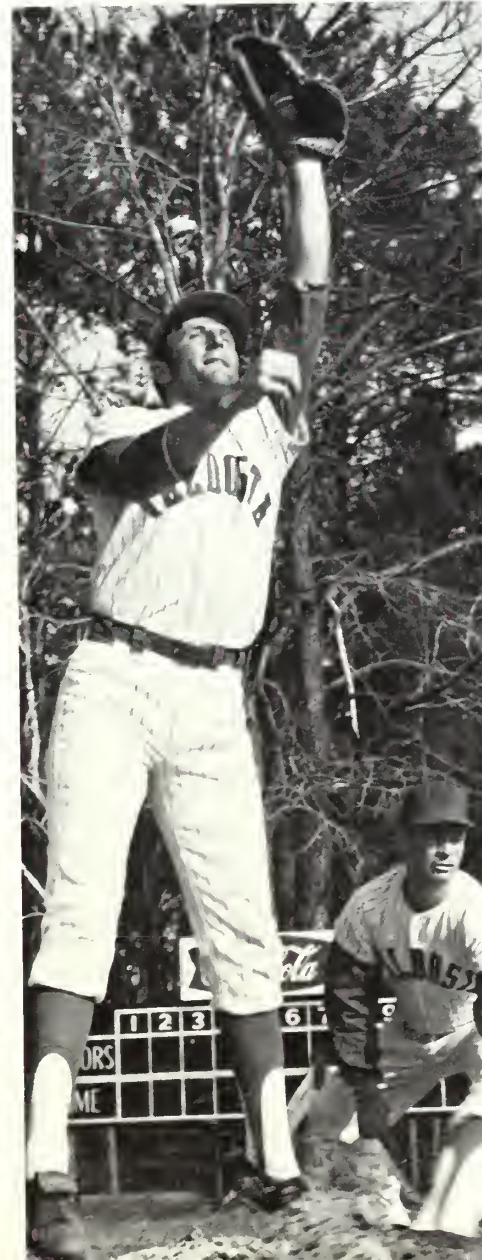


The 1969 edition of Valdosta State College baseball can be simply described as the best in the school's history. Coach Tommy Thomas' Rebels posted the best regular season record (24-8) in history, won the school's second Georgia Intercollegiate Athletic Conference championship, captured VSC's first NAIA District 25 crown and at the time of this writing were vying for the NAIA Area V title and a possible trip to the national tournament in St. Joseph, Mo.

Many factors led to the successful season. Great pitching, clutch hitting and the ability to come from behind were possibly the most important components. No less than five Rebels were named to the all-conference team. Pitchers Eddie Fisher and Danny Petrovich, first baseman Craig Courtney, right fielder Steve Crawford and team captain Larry Meredith made the elite squad.

Fisher entered the area playoffs with a perfect 11-0 record, and Petrovich was 8-3. Courtney led the team in every offensive category and was hitting almost .400 following the district title victory. Coach Thomas, in only his second year as Rebel baseball boss, was named Coach of the Year in the conference.





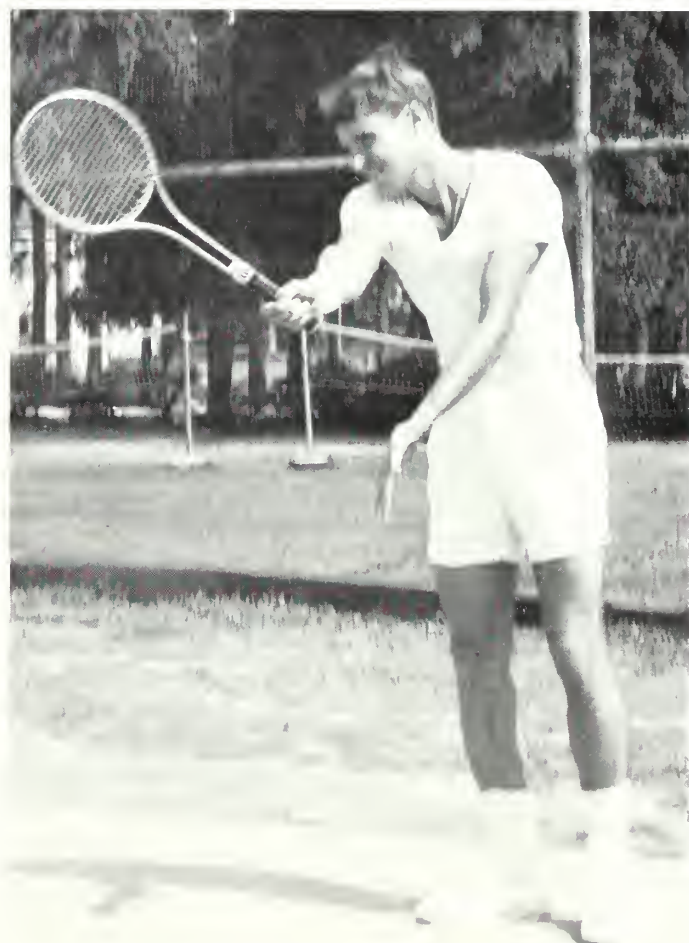

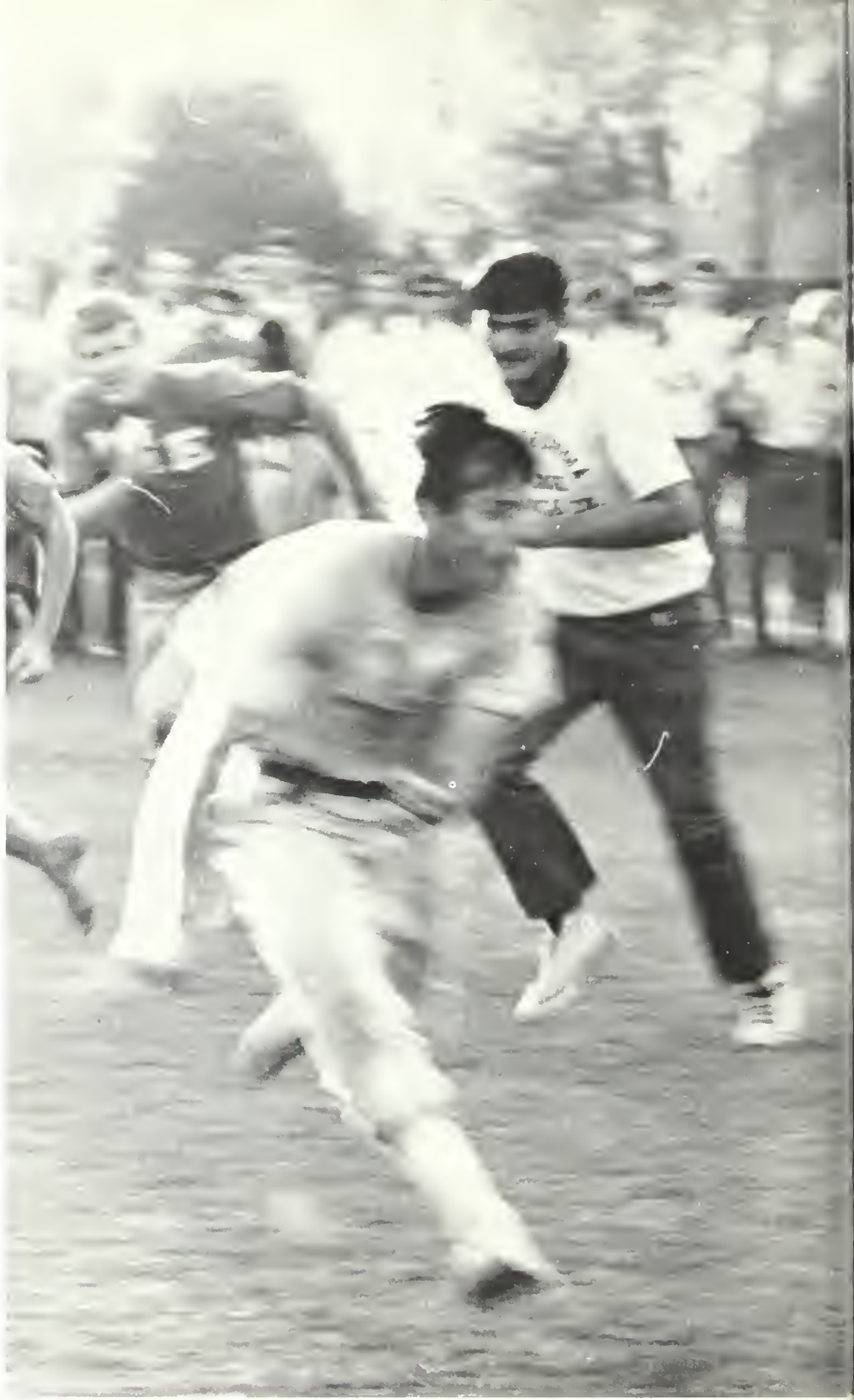
Rebel tennis this year was highlighted by outstanding net-jumpers John Romain and Charles Dennis, who won the GIAC tourney number one doubles championship. Dennis, last year's singles champ, went on to the final round this year, but after a tough fight wound up in second place. 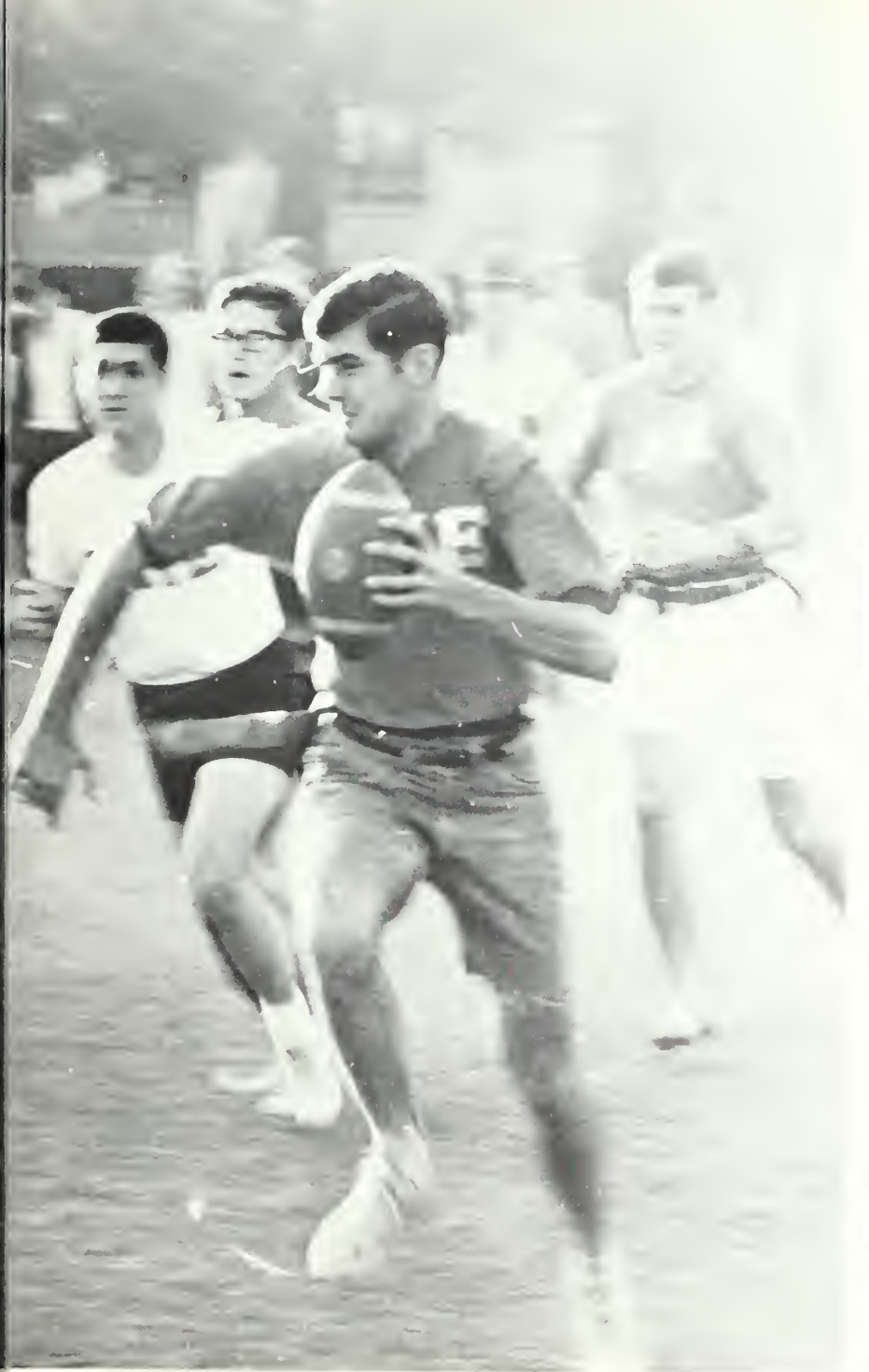

WILLIAM M. GABARD, HEAD OF DEPARTMENT OF HISTORY AND POLITICAL SCIENCE: I just want to say that the death of Dr. Majorie E. Carter, whom I knew at Valdosta State College for many years, leaves a void in the intellectual and academic life at Valdosta State College. During her long tenure at the college, Dr. Carter earned the undying respect and admiration of both colleagues and students for her insistence upon high standards in academic performance. She was one of those rare individuals who was an idealist and who held to her principles, often in the face of adversity and difficulty.

STUDENT: There's so much you could say. She was hard as hell.

RUTH MAXWELL: I worked for her over a year. She was a dedicated person, not only to biology but also to people. She had interest in students not just as students, but as people.

COED: She was nice, a lot of help.

DR. CONNELL, HEAD OF DEPARTMENT OF BIOLOGY: The principal thing about her was that she served thirty-three years as a teacher. She was very loyal, devoted to students and school. The really outstanding thing about a person like Dr. Carter was that she was well trained and competent in her professional field, and she gave her life to her profession. She loved animals. I kept her black dog Julie when she had to be away. Dr. Carter always said she wanted me to have Julie if anything ever happened to her. I can truly say she exemplified the finest ideals of a teacher, scholar and lady.

MR. FAIRCLOTH, BIOLOGY TEACHER: When I came to school here, she was the house director of Ashley Hall. I remember when she bought her first car. Some of the senior boys taught her how to drive that summer after dinner, before it got dark. If a student was interested in biology, she had a way of making him study in spite of himself. She was one of the finest ladies I ever knew.





SUZAN I. LOGSDON: Mac G. Grigsby was not only my boss, but also my friend. Being his secretary throughout the months he acted as Financial Aid Director here at VSC, I had the privilege of working closely with him. His cheerful disposition helped brighten many days for all his co-workers as well as each student who stopped to see him. He had a certain quiet dignity that made people respect him, and a bright outlook on life which made everyone like him. He was a truly great man.

BRIGGS ARRINGTON: He was a very intelligent person. He knew the financial field thoroughly, but most of all he knew how to help people with their finance problems. He also *wanted* to help people.



MADAME BALL, FRENCH PROFESSOR: I wish to express my appreciation for the privilege of having known Mr. Grigsby. Both as a student and now as a faculty member I was always sure that his encouragement, his understanding, and his insight were available in the many moments they were sorely needed.

MAURICE HERRIN: Mr. Grigsby served in the right capacity as Financial Aid Director, because that seemed to be his complete life . . . that of giving aid to students. He was the harbor for lost students in the jungle of college administration.

MISS GRAY JOHNSON, HOUSE DIRECTOR OF ASHLEY: Mr. Grigsby was a rare combination of kindness, integrity, and regard for other persons' sensibilities. He performed his job, which dealt with numbers and figures, with the utmost capability but never lost sight of the human element for which he was always concerned.



MISS ROBERTA JONES, ASSOCIATE DEAN OF STUDENTS: Mr. Grigsby possessed many qualities, but his genuine interest in people was most outstanding. He was a man of intelligence, wisdom, and wit. The loss of Mr. Grigsby was not only the loss of a colleague, but of a true friend.
