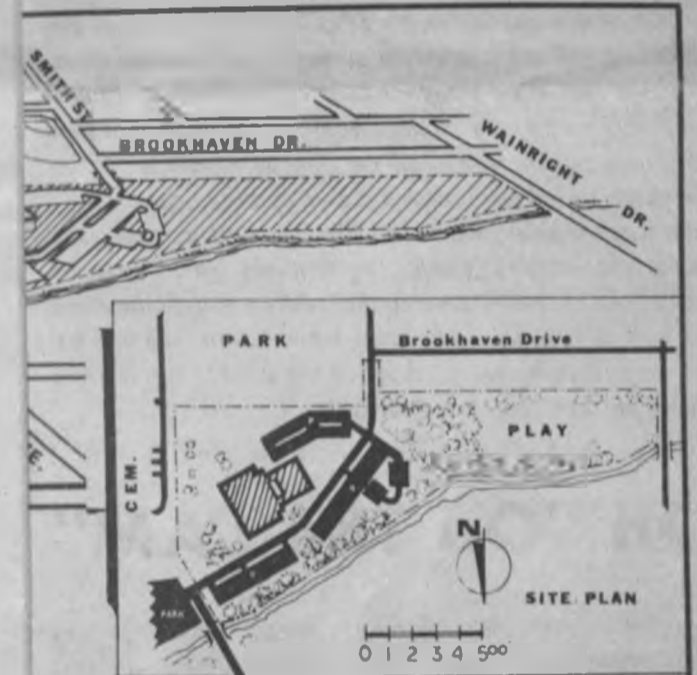

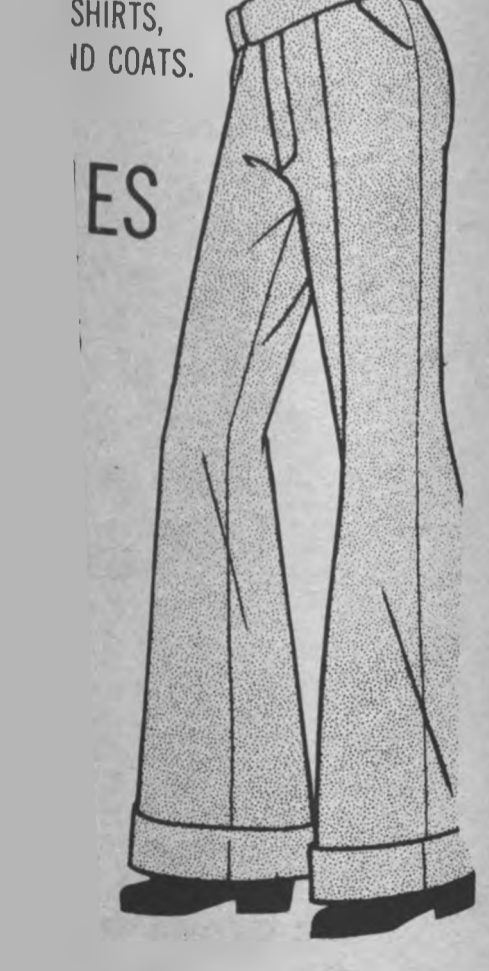

## President's Hotline

Why was the crosswalk built in the particular design that it was? What advantages are to be gained from its winding design? Couldn't a more efficient, step-saving crosswalk have been constructed at a lower cost to Georgia taxpayers?

No College funds or Board of Regents funds were used in the construction of the North Oak Street overhead crosswalk. The project was funded with Federal Highway Safety funds through

the Department of Transportation in Georgia. Both Federal and State engineers designed the bridge, and did so to meet requirements stipulated in receiving the funds. The pedestrian structure had to be built in the form of a ramp, rather than steps, so it could also be used by ambulatory patients and wheelchairs. In other words, if steps, rather than a ramp, had been erected, Federal funds could not have been received for its construction.

## NO Yearbook!?

In years to come, it is possible Valdosta State College could have no yearbook due to alleged student disinterest and lack of support from members of the Student Activity Budget Committee.

The S.A.B. Committee has appropriated \$10,000 for the production of the '74 annual. Sharon Smith, in her third year as editor of the Pine Cone, estimates total production cost of the 296 page yearbook to be "between \$13,500 and \$15,000."

This would leave a deficit of several thousand dollars to be met through sales of subscriptions and advertising.

"Last year, \$10,000 was also allocated for the production and sale of about 800 annuals which altogether cost \$11,700. According to sales at this time one year ago, we are expecting to sell over 900 annuals," Miss Smith reported.

While sales and production costs have increased in this one year period, the amount allocated by the S.A.B. Committee has remained the same.

Miss Smith said the Pine Cone Staff requested an allocation of \$25,000 this year and was denied probably because, "In 1971, \$25,000 was allocated for producing the yearbooks which were free to the students. It was not put together well and was mismanaged. It put us \$6,000 in the hole for 1972."

Since then, the yearbook staff has had to offer the yearbook on a subscription basis and is just beginning to "build the book back the way it should be."

For the staff's efforts, the 1973 Pine Cone was recognized at the Associate Collegiate Press Conference in Chicago as one of

the South's outstanding small-college yearbooks.

Melinda Chorn, a section-editor of the Pine Cone, says some students may object to the yearbook because "they don't feel it represents everybody on an equal basis."

John Albright, Assistant to the Director of College Relations and advisor to the Pine Cone, added, "Maybe people don't identify with their class group as much as they do with their fraternity or major group. The more students are involved with their school, the more interest there will be in the yearbook."

"In order for there to be future yearbooks," editor Smith says, "the Budget Committee will have to see a necessity of allocating sufficient funds on the amount of student interest and support."

Subscriptions to the 1974 Pine Cone are still on sale for \$6.00 in Room 12 of the College Union.

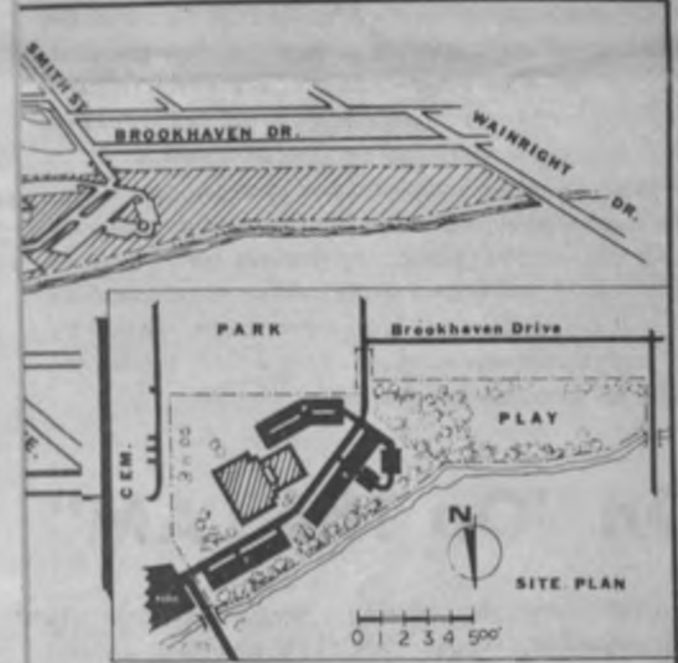

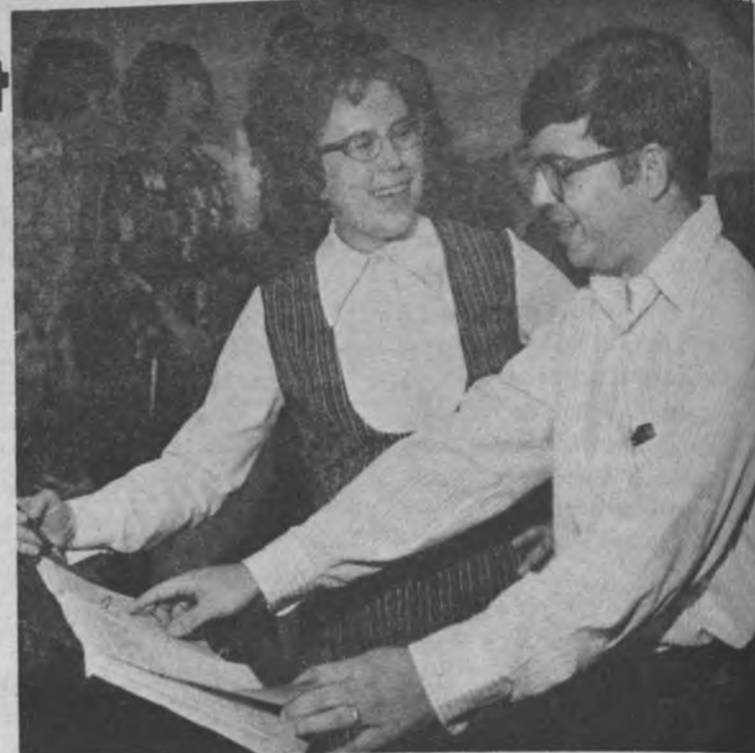

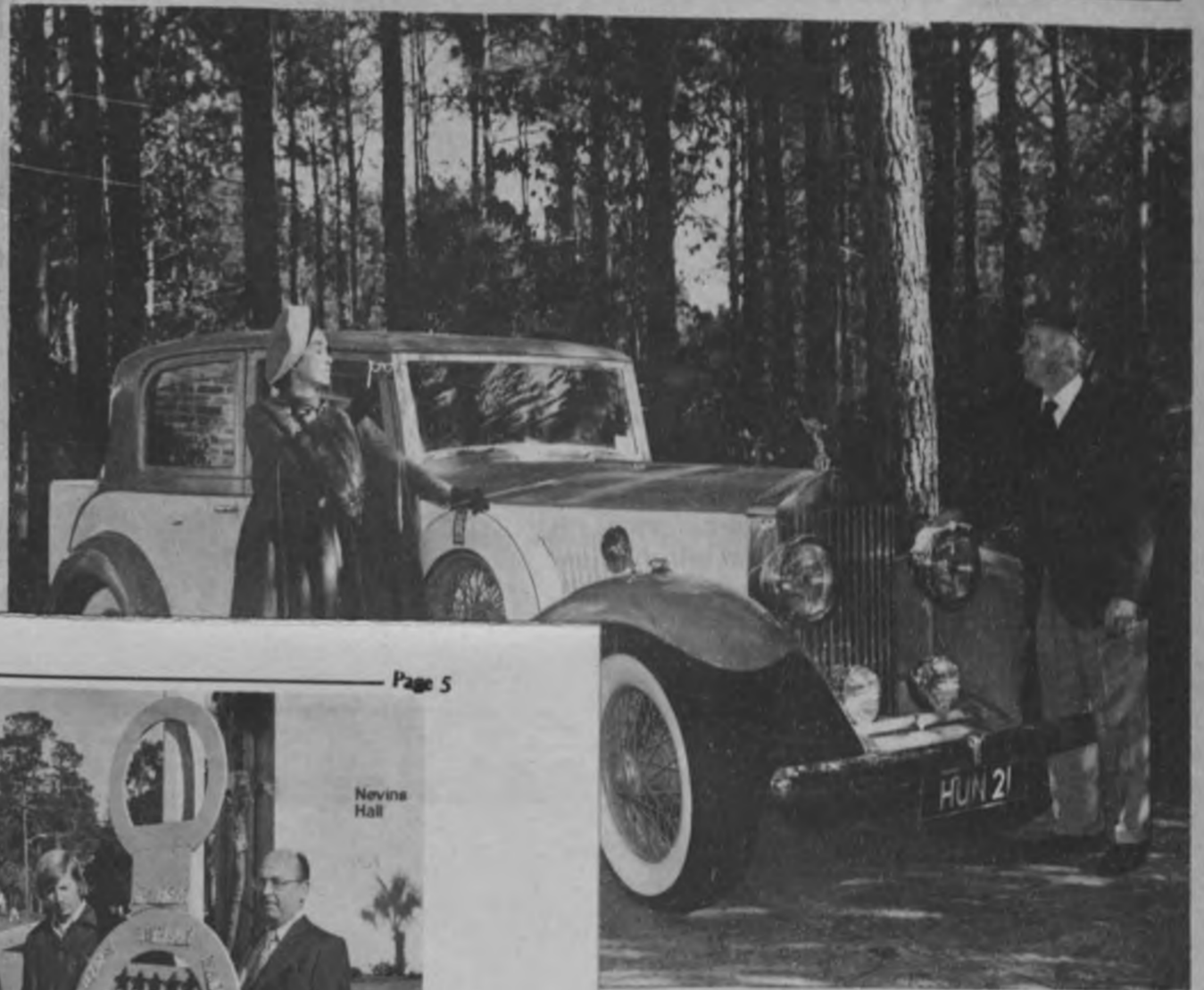

## Survey Results

On October, 24th, 3000 surveys were distributed to VSC students through the SPECTATOR. The object of the survey was to determine the opinions and attitudes VSC students have about vocational guidance services on the Valdosta State campus. The survey was a project of three graduate students in VSC's Guidance and Counseling program.

Some of the responses to the survey refuted long-time ideas about VSC students. The survey showed that the average student does not change his major more than once while at VSC. The survey also indicated that 63% of the students who answered the survey were satisfied with their academic advising.

The sample of students was most emphatic in expressing their impression of a need for an

automatically scheduled non mandatory appointment for vocational counseling.

Eighty-one percent of the students were in agreement with this concept. Another survey item indicated that 76% of VSC's students feel that they would personally benefit from such a service.

The complete results of the survey have been turned over to Dr. Ed Morton, Director of Student Development, as an aid in evaluating student opinion of vocational counseling. The Student Development Center has begun to contact students who indicated on their SAT profiles a desire for career guidance.

Vocational guidance is one of the major services provided by the Student Development Center which is located in the Powell Building on the north side of main campus.

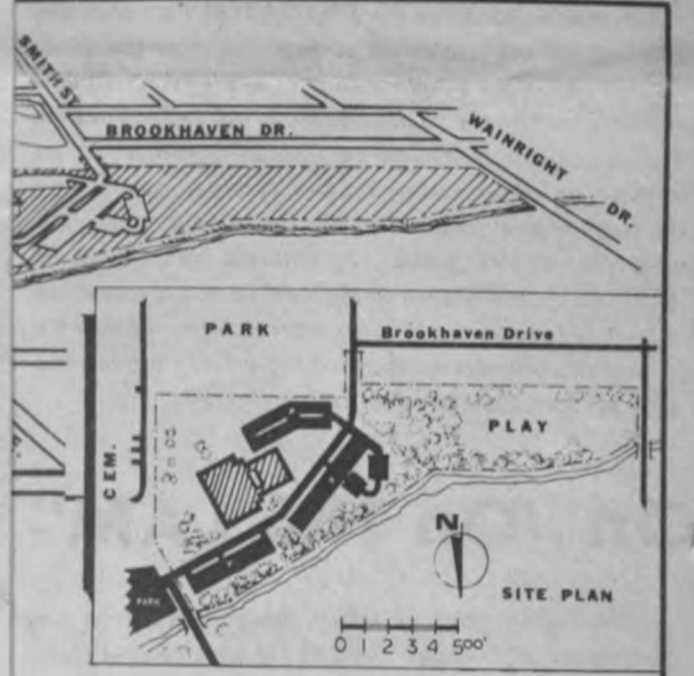

## Irene Dodd Paints For NASA

Bored by blast-offs? No longer thrilled by the miracle of men on the moon? Don't tell artist Irene Dodd of Valdosta State College about it!

Officially commissioned by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) to record on canvas her impressions of the buildings, the preparation, the excitement preceding and following the Skylab III blast-off, she's been space-struck since her unofficial trek to Cape Kennedy last December to paint the Apollo 17 launching.

"It was spectacular, the only night shot they've had and the first I had seen," she said of the Apollo launch. "The impression I had was really such a totally spiritual experience that I could not express it for awhile, but I finally did it in the spring."

The canvas hangs now in the offices of Valdosta State's art department, which Miss Dodd heads. It bears dramatic witness to the fact that the vivacious young artist is following in the footsteps of her father, Lamar Dodd—for many years head of the University of Georgia art department and an official NASA artist since the early days of the space program.

"I can tell you tangibly what the colors were at one point, as seen through the eye of the camera—gold, white, orange and brown," she said. "But at the point I was standing, the overall color was something more brilliant, like that of the sun—bright white. There were also cool greens, silvers and deep intense black—the black of night."

"A blast-off is almost too big to record," she reflected.

"The thing the artist, or any sensitive person, has to combat is that the experience can't be contained totally within the eye

of the person. When you see it on television, you say, 'Isn't it beautiful!' but you're bigger than the television screen and you seem to dwarf it. However, when you're standing there at the Cape, the whole experience changes everything in what we term the tangible world.

"The ground shakes, there's electricity in the air, and all the wildlife changes. The birds that have been asleep there in the marshland feel the electricity before blast-off, and they take to the air immediately.

It's as if the Universe comes to a halt momentarily, and you have a new light. It's not

daylight, and you haven't had a chance to become accustomed to it because this is happening at midnight.

It's this sense of being dwarfed by the experience, absolutely surrounded by it, that's difficult to put on a surface so many inches-by-so-many-inches."

Before the current Skylab III launch, both Dodds—father and daughter—sketched in the company of artists Alan Cober of New York, Bill Thone of Maine and William Shieds of Rhode Island, at the invitation of Jim Dean, NASA's deputy director of public affairs.

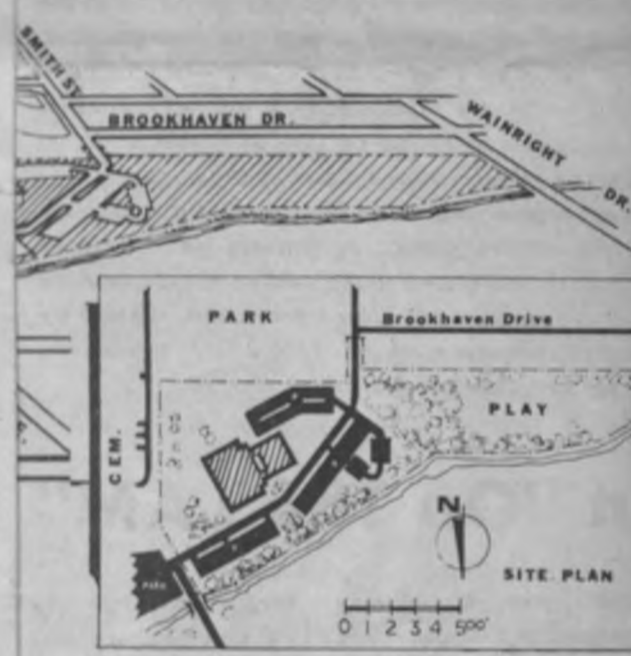

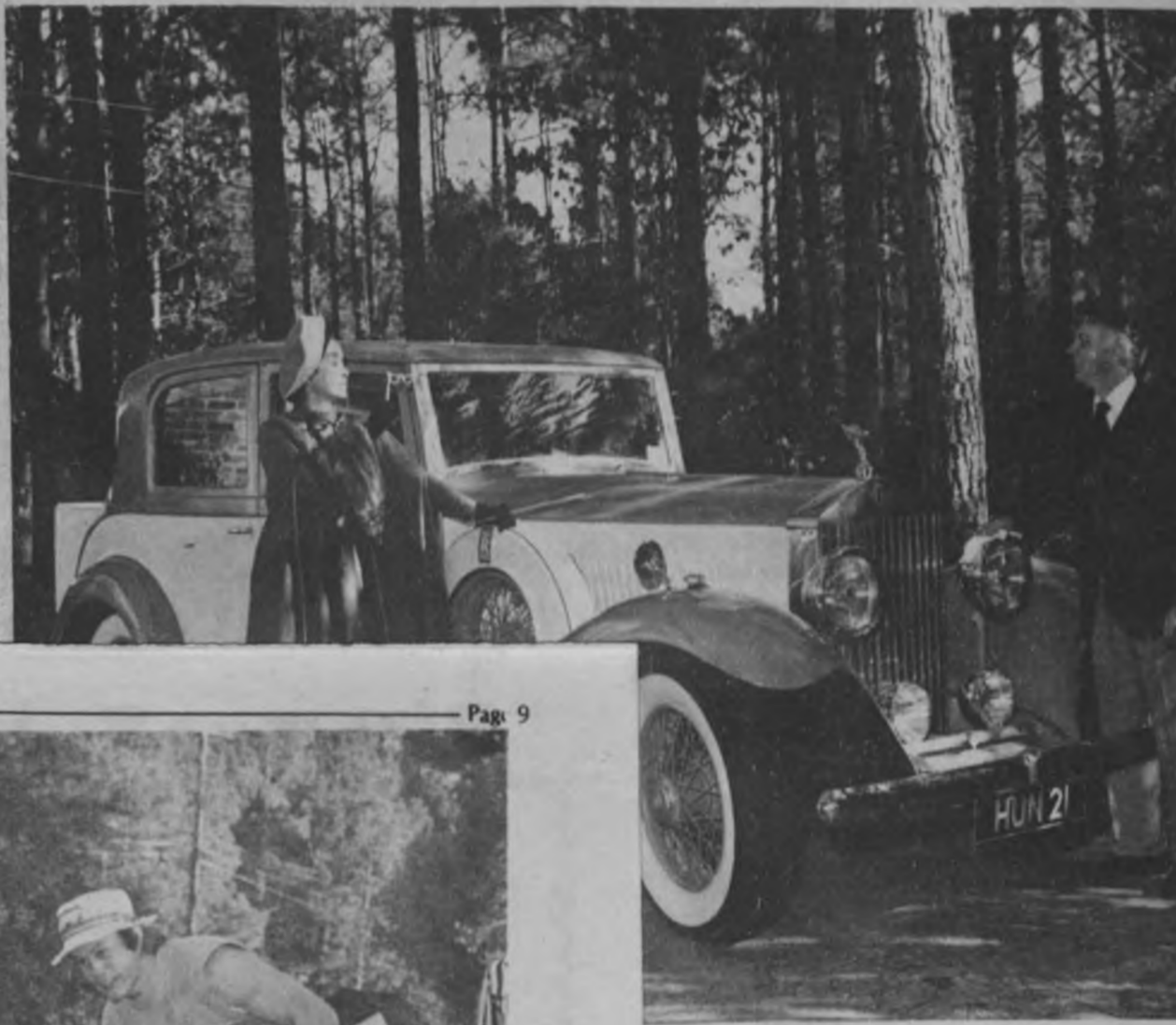

## Blazers Take Second In Shriner Tourney

The Blazers opened their 1973-74 campaign last weekend by placing second in the Shriner's Invitational Tournament held in Savannah.

Coach Dominey's charges got off on the right foot Friday night by beating the Mocaseins of Florida Southern 81-80 in a hotly contested battle. The Blazers were led by their junior All America candidate, Kenny Alston, who banged in 29 points and smashed nine rebounds.

The Blazers surged to an early 13 point lead, but lost their big men Reason and Hodge temporarily to foul trouble, and saw this lead diminish to five at the half.

The Moccassins came out smoking in the second half and the game turned into a see-saw affair with the lead changing hands eight times, and six times being tied.

With the Moccassins leading by two with three minutes to go, Valdosta lost Hodge via the foul route. The Blazers continued to battle the Moccassins until the scored tied at 78 and less than a

minute to play. Reason tapped in a missed free throw to put the Blazers ahead to stay.

With 30 seconds to play, freshman guard Larry Miller scored what turned out to be the winning tally, by sinking the first of two free throws to give the Blazers a victory in their opening campaign of the season.

Following Alston in the scoring parade was Don Reason with 18 points and 11 rebounds and freshman Miller and Barnett with 11 and 10 points respectively.

#### ARMSTRONG TAKES TITLE

Saturday night the Blazers fell victim to conference favorites Armstrong State 89-86 in the championship game of the Shriner's Invitational Tournament held in the Savannah Civic Center.

The error-plagued Blazers had victory seemingly in their hands several times only to see it slip from their grasps. Sloppy ball-handling, lack of rebounding, and the inability to hit the free throw were key factors which led to the Blazer's

downfall.

Valdosta jumped out in front by six, 26-20, early in the first half, but saw that lead fade away on costly turnovers. At the half the Pirates of Armstrong State had a 53-46 lead.

The Pirates threatened to run away with the game at the outset of the second half, leading by as much as 15 points (69-54) at one time. The Blazers, however, sparked to life and closed the gap to five with 8:00 left to go in the ball game.

With 3:05 left, Don Reason blocked his fourth shot of the night, drove the length of the court, layed it in, and the Blazers led for the first time

since the first half, 84-83.

At that point, a lid seemed to have been placed on the basket as the Blazers missed the front half of four consecutive one-and-one attempts with Hodge missing a crucial one at the 1:48 mark. Hodge made up for his mistake, however, by brilliantly stealing the ball and scoring to put the Blazers on top 86-85 with less than a minute to go.

Bob Hancock, who led the Pirates in scoring with 24, got the Pirates right back and the Blazers found themselves on the shortend of a 87-86 score.

The Blazers put the ball into play but with six seconds left

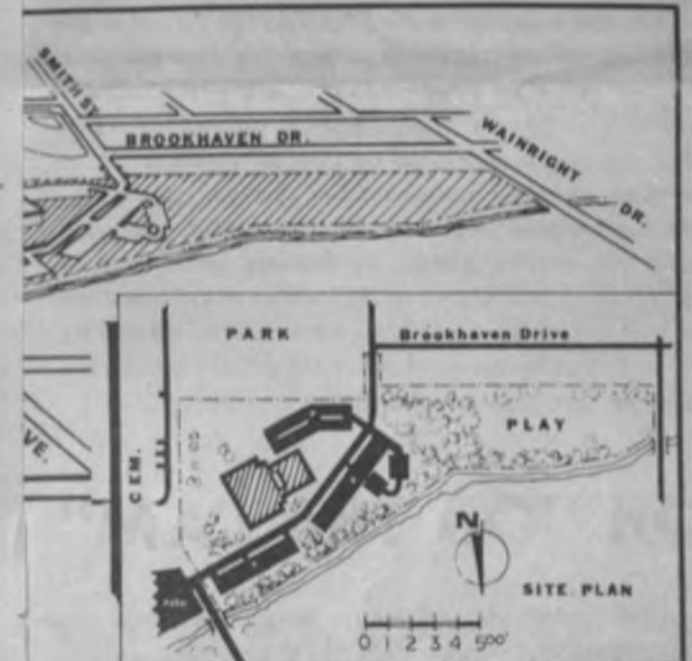
The duties of the Comptroller are to supervise the expenditure of all Association monies and

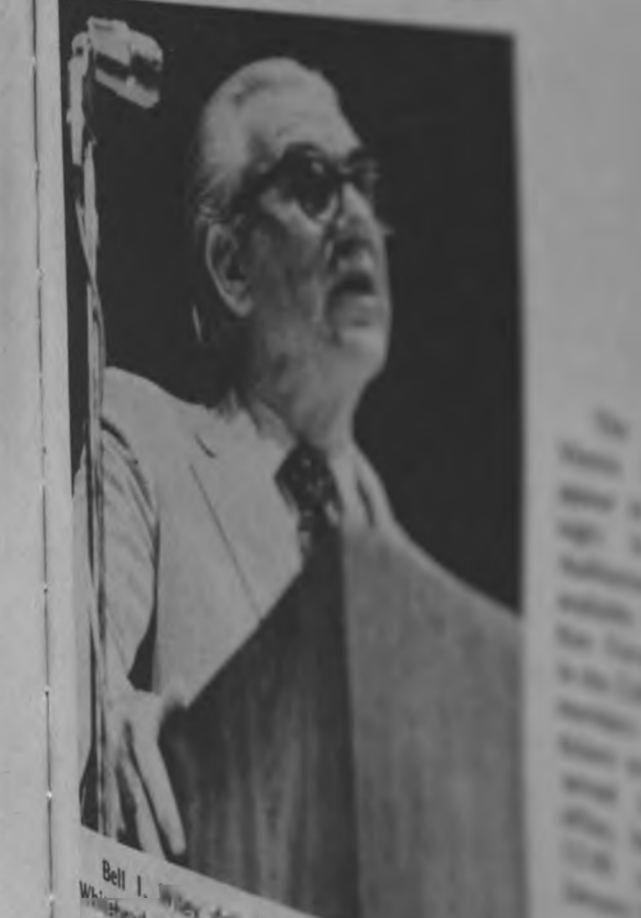
