It's clear that something unusual is going on in our commodity markets. Prices received by

farmers have increased 12 percent during the last 3 months. Retail food prices have surged up at the fastest rate in history. The futures markets change from day to day and even from hour to hour in price fluctuations that would formerly characterize the change from month to month, or longer. No one knows this better than you people, who deal in the most volatile of all prices: The oil seeds, the vegetable oils, and the high protein feeds. Our analytical supply-demand models seem quite incapable of explaining what has occurred, let alone predicting it in advance.

Anyone who tries to explain what is going on should do it orally. Or, if he writes it down he should use paper guaranteed to self-destruct in six months or less.

Lacking the customary professional caution, I shall set forth my explanation of what is going on, and try to anticipate what may lie ahead.

We are experiencing a combination of diverse and largely independent events that were for the greater part unpredictable and unavoidable. The statistical probability of all these things happening at the same time is very slight. But nevertheless they have. I shall list them and comment briefly on each.

#### A Poor World Crop

The world crop of cereal grains (excluding rice) in 1972 was 829 million tons, compared with 866 million in 1971. Crops were disappointing in

Eastern Europe, the USSR, India, China, Australia, and Argentina. Exports from the United States were increased sharply to meet the resulting demand.

Crops in the United States were good, an all-time record, but our increase did not offset the decline elsewhere. Poor harvesting conditions in the U.S. resulted in delay, damage and loss of part of our crop.

The increase in the price of food during the last year has been worldwide, not just in the United States.

#### Strong Demand

In the U.S., employment rose and take-home pay increased. We are running a large Federal deficit. The volume of money and credit has been expanding at a rapid rate. Disposable income in the fourth quarter of 1972 was 9 percent above a year earlier and in constant dollars was up more than 6 percent. In addition, categorical public assistance benefits increased by \$2.7 billion, bringing additional demand into the market for food, especially for meat.

#### The Cattle and Hog Cycles

The cattle and hog cycles chanced to be in the same phase, with females being withheld from the market in order to expand future production. This reduced current marketings below where

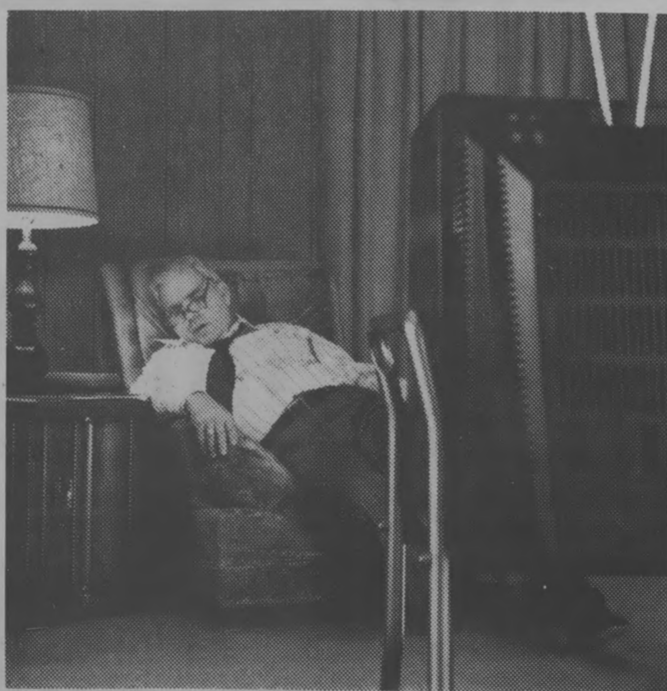
The main objective is for each 4-H'er to grow plants of his own and take care of them. Tomatoes produced are to be used for home use.

The track is located 3 miles west of I-75 on the North Valdosta Road.

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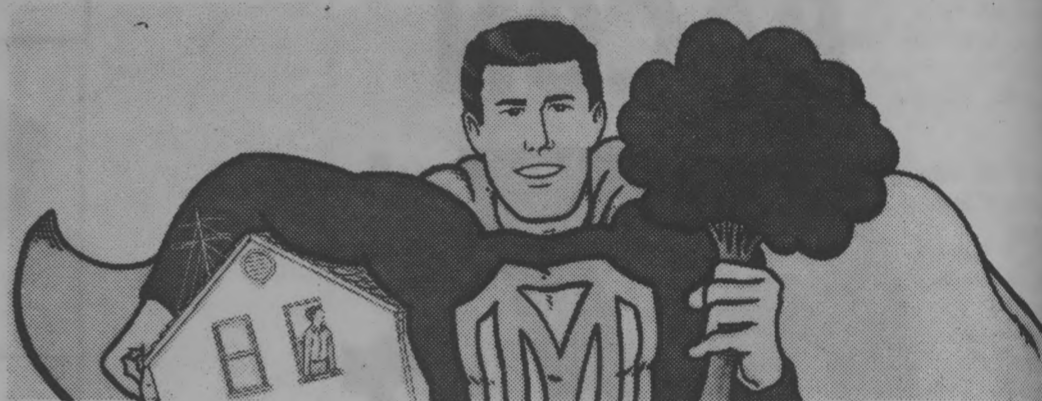

# Spring brings increase in scout camping

As Spring comes, more Scouts in this area head out for hiking and camping.

Bill Strickland, camping chairman, of the Alapaha Area Council, Boy Scouts of America, explains that for Scouts, camping is the great adventure, and most troops plan a year-round camping program that culminates in a week-long camping experience -- often at Camp Patten, the council's Scouting training center.

Why is camping so important as a feature of the Scouting program?

Strickland says, Scout camping provides opportunities

for Scouts to develop leadership skills, to take part in relevant advancement activities, and to be involved in decision-making. They acquire desirable personality traits and improve themselves in the areas of physical, mental, moral, and emotional fitness.

The Alapaha Council that serves 12 South Georgia Counties also provides sites for short-term camping at several privately-owned sites made available by generous landowners, where troops may camp for short periods.

For the summer of 1973, Scouts from this area will also

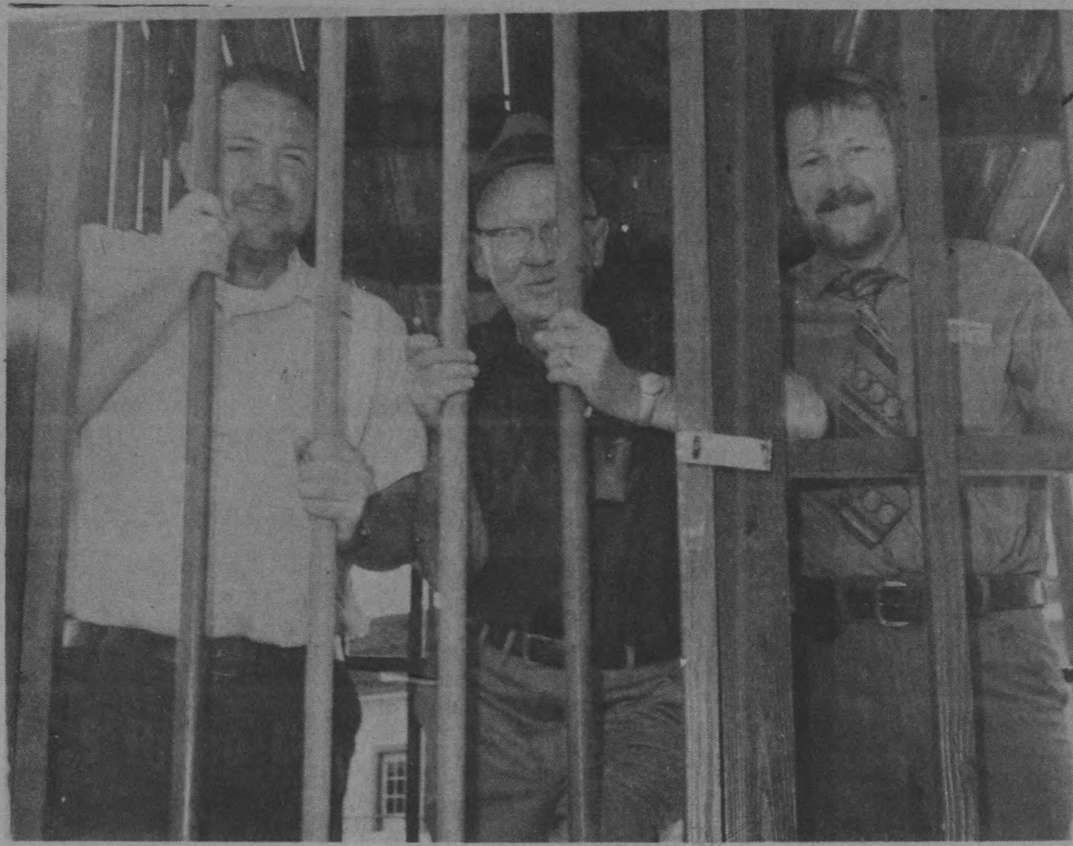

## Opening night to unveil results of Braves' trades

Nearly all baseball fans know the Atlanta Braves did not stand pat after last season's fourth-place finish and sub-par record.

The Braves traded, traded and traded some more. The results of the bartering sessions between vice president of baseball operations Eddie Robinson and manager Eddie Mathews and other major league clubs can be inspected by the general public for the first time April 6. That's Opening Night at Atlanta Stadium, when the Braves start 1973 against the Houston Astros.

The Braves made no less than three significant trades during the winter and early spring months in a concerted effort to strengthen the club. On Nov. 1, 1972, the Braves sent reliable second baseman Felix Millan and pitcher George Stone to the New York Mets for pitchers Gary Gentry and Danny Frisella.

A month later, on the deadline for inter-league trading, Atlanta exchanged catcher Earl Williams and minor league infielder Taylor Duncan for Baltimore Oriole pitchers Pat

Dobson and Roric Harrison, second baseman Dave Johnson and catcher Johnny Oates. Then, this past Feb. 27 the Braves traded pitcher Pat Jarvis to the Montreal Expos for pitcher Carl Morton.

The Braves' trade with the Mets should be one of those classic deals that benefits both teams. An old baseball saying states that you have to give up quality to get quality and both clubs did just that.

"We were looking for pitching and that's where we focused our attention in our trade talks," Robinson said. "We had discussions with every club and at that time the Mets had the most to offer. They needed a second baseman. We hated to lose a player like Millan, but there was an age factor involved. We knew we had Larry Blanks and Rod Gilbreath, two youngsters, who might have been able to step in and there was always the possibility of another deal. We gained a starter and a reliever with youth."

Gentry, who was particularly sharp in his initial spring outings, comes to Atlanta with

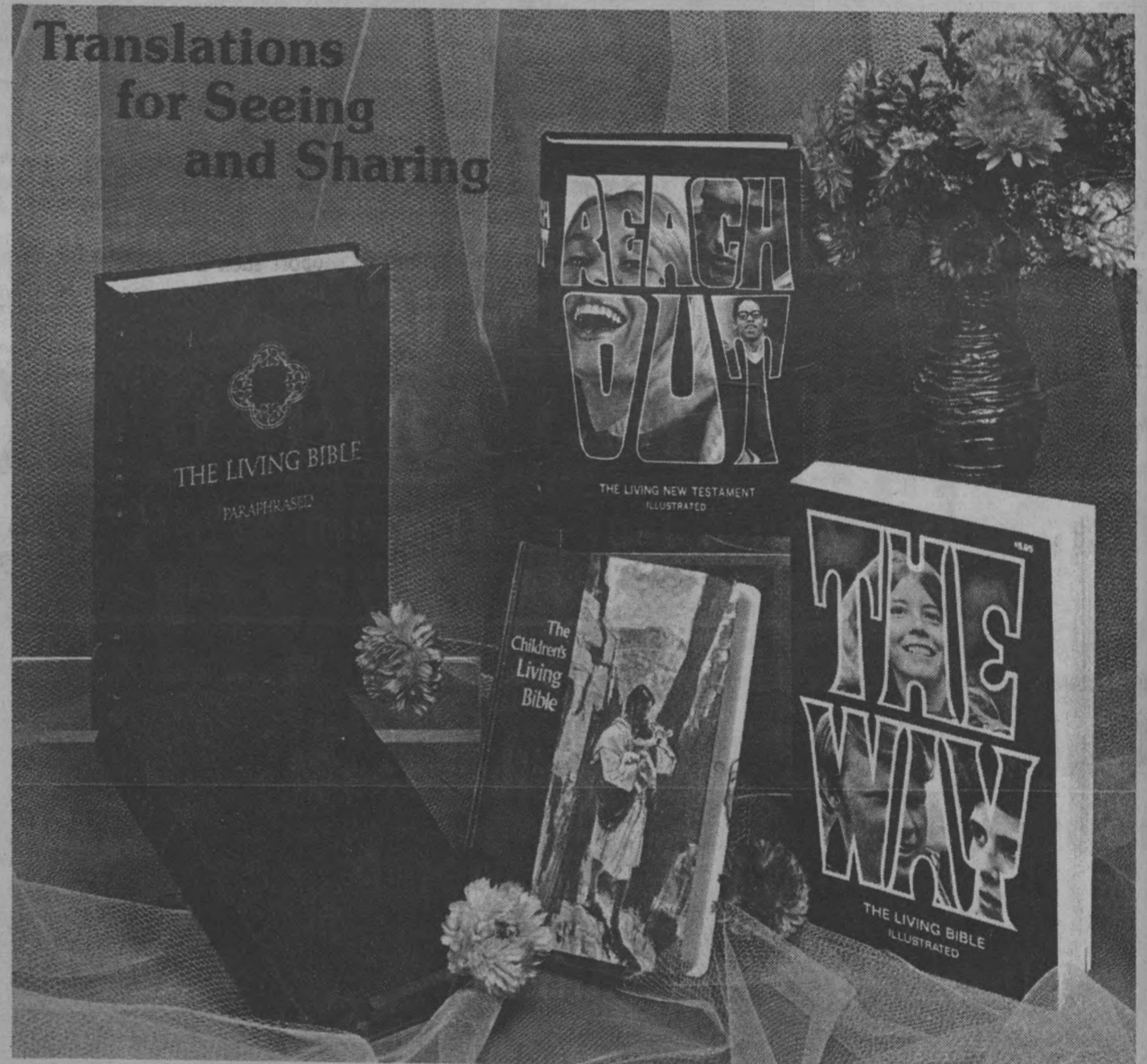
impressive credentials. The 26-year-old righthander was 7-10 with a 3.56 earned average last season while his four-year major league totals read 41-42 with a 3.56. Gentry, a fierce competitor, has two one-hitters to his credit, won the Eastern Division clinching game for 1969 "Miracle" Mets, and a third game of the World Series over the Orioles that fall.

Frisella, 27, has mastered forkball to become one of National League's premier relievers the past few seasons. Two years ago he led the staff in appearances with 53 saves with 12, while recording 1.98 ERA. Frisella was 5-8 with a 3.36 ERA and nine saves in 1972.

So Gentry and Frisella are two of the many new Braves who may be making their official Atlanta debut April 6. Tickets for Opening Night, an 8:05 game time against the Astros, are available at Gate of the Stadium, at all Ticket locations and at all Braves ticket outlets.

they would otherwise have been. Thus per capita supplies of red meats declined 2 percent in 1972, though breeding herds increased. Only about one year in four would it be likely for the two major livestock cycles to coincide in this fashion.

**Devaluation**  
The devaluation of the dollar in November of 1971 caused prices of internationally-traded commodities to increase relative to prices in those countries that did not devalue. The February 12, 1973, devaluation had a similar effect. The currency float in prospect for various countries can be expected to have an additional effect. Commodities chiefly affected were the cereal grains, soybeans and beef.

**High Feed Prices**  
High feed prices, the consequences of forces described above, resulted in a cutback in production of those commodities for which output can be quickly changed.

These are the conventional explanations. But they do not account fully for the vigor of the price increase. Many people suspect, and I am one of them, that a kind of self-fulfilling inflationary psychology has been at work, building a speculative bubble on top of an already buoyant price structure.

Events of this kind are not new. We had something like it in the mid-sixties, when there came a series of poor crops in India and we thought American agriculture would get rich by sending free food to Asia. Such proved not to be the case.

Non-agricultural prices and wages tend to rise, to pause, and then to rise again, ratcheting themselves upward. Farm prices, on the other hand, have been more volatile, falling as well as rising. I would think farm prices would decline during late 1973 and into 1974. The recent past probably is not the new normal.

We are on the threshold of a number of major policy questions: A new farm bill, the beginning of multilateral trade negotiations, decisions regarding the Economic Stabilization Program, and a new series of wage settlements. It would be good to go into these with sober judgement as to what lies ahead rather than with the mood that comes from the chance conjunction of a number of independent events.

REPORTS FROM THE UNITED STATES SENATE

**OUR TROOPS IN WESTERN EUROPE** have created an intolerable situation. For more than a quarter of a century, since the end of the Second World War, we have maintained several divisions there. Each year it costs us more and more while our ability to support such a force dwindles.

General Eisenhower himself 15 years ago recommended that most of these units be sent home. We now have 4 1/2 divisions over there to honor our NATO commitment. I support that commitment. I think we must stand by our European allies in the event of Communist aggression. But the evidence is that the job could be done at much less cost to the American taxpayer.

**WE ARE SPENDING** about \$17 billion a year to keep 300,000 troops plus their dependents on European soil. That is over \$46 million every day!

At a time when we are having to tighten our belts everywhere because of a weakened economy, it seems very foolish indeed to continue pouring such an utterly fantastic sum of money abroad. One of the main reasons that the American dollar has fallen on harder times internationally is that there are already too many of them in foreign hands.

Further, I doubt the necessity of keeping such a force in Western Europe. Our 4 1/2 divisions are only an expensive token when the strength of the Soviets' European divisions are taken into consideration. We cannot possibly match those numbers; there is no need to try.

And our troops are costing us good friends, not making friends for us. Even among the military, it is recognized that American troops often are a local irritant. They speak a foreign tongue. Their customs are different to those who live nearby. And the natives frequently can see no apparent reason for their presence.

**I SEE NO REASON** either. When there are grumblings among our allies to tax the U.S. bases supposedly protecting them, something is amiss. These bases constitute a continuing drain on our budget. They contribute to our trade deficits and detract from our balance of payments.

Western Europe has more monetary reserves than we do. They have more available manpower and lower unemployment. Their rate of inflation is less than ours. It is appropriate that they should assume more of the burden of their own defense. I hope we can cut our troop strength there by at least half in the near future.

## Thought For Food

Beef cross cut shanks are made by cutting the fore shank perpendicular to the bone. The cross cuts, varying in thickness from 1 to 2 1/2 inches, contain considerable connective tissue as well as a round bone. Because they are a less tender cut, long and slow moist heat cookery is recommended. Cross cuts make a meaty soup. Brown 3 to 4 pounds of cross cuts in lard or drippings. Pour off drippings, add 2 quarts water and seasonings, cover and cook over low heat for 2 hours. Add vegetables such as potatoes, carrots, celery, rutabaga or turnips and simmer, covered, about 30 minutes longer or until the meat and

vegetables are tender.

The most popular vinegars in the United States are cider vinegar and white distilled vinegar.

Cider vinegar is made from pure apple juice and white distilled vinegar is made from dilute alcohol.

Malt vinegar and wine vinegar also are seen on many supermarket shelves in this country.
