Naval Store demonstrations will show experimental techniques

Gum naval stores producers will have an opportunity to learn the latest techniques in gum production at a series of meetings beginning on March 5,

according to County Extension Chairman John Strickland. Area naval stores demonstrations have been scheduled in Lanier and three other

counties located in the gum belt of south Georgia during the week.

The primary objective of the demonstrations will be to in-

crease the efficiency of gum production through the use of improved practices in the woods. The demonstrations are being conducted by the Cooperation Extension Service, University of Georgia, in cooperation with the Georgia Forestry Commission and the U.S. Forest Service.

The schedule for the demonstrations, as announced by C. Nelson Brightwell, Head of the Extension Forestry Department, is as follows: Monday, March 5, Lanier County, 2:00 p.m.; Tuesday, March 6, Coffee County, 9:30 a.m.; Tuesday, March 6, Montgomery County, 2:00 p.m.; and Wednesday, March 7, Telfair County, 9:30 a.m.

The demonstration project in Lanier County will be on the Willacoochee Highway about three miles from Lakeland. Signs will be posted giving direction to the designated

area. The demonstration property is owned by Robert Simpson, the largest gum producer in Lanier County.

In commenting on the demonstrations, Brightwell said that landowners can realize a good profit from working slash and longleaf pines for naval stores; and the trees are suitable for other products, such as sawtimber, poles, and pulpwood, after the gum has been extracted. Often, the value of the gum exceeds the value of the tree for these purposes, he said.

Brightwell estimated that up to 20 percent more gum could be harvested from the average tree if recommended practices were followed. These practices include proper installation of tins and cups, maintenance of adequate face widths, and the correct application of chemical stimulants including acid paste and acid solution.

Hahira's Georgia Power check said \$7,733.83

A check for \$7,733.83 was delivered this week to the City of Hahira by A.F. Beacham, Jr., District Superintendent, Valdosta, Georgia Power Company.

This check represents a percentage of the gross receipts received in 1972 by the company from the sale of electric power to commercial and residential customers in the city. The payment is made under the Municipal Partnership Plan. It is in addition to the company's property taxes, which on a statewide basis last year totaled approximately \$19,826,392.

More than \$8,300,350 in 1972 gross receipts taxes is being paid this year to the communities of Georgia. This is an

increase of approximately \$1,025,350 over the amount paid last year.

The company's total tax bill for 1972 was \$61,329,388. This does not include the sales tax the company collects from its customers for the State of Georgia, nor does it include the sales tax the company pays on materials used in its operation.

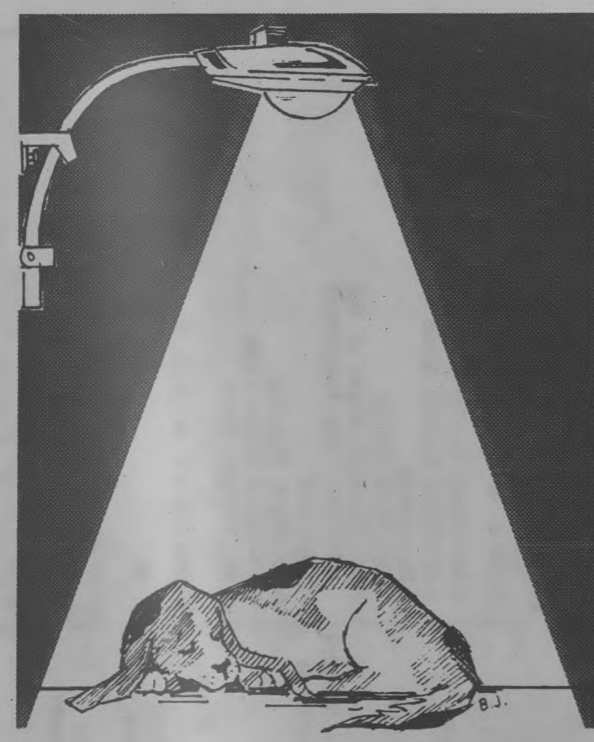

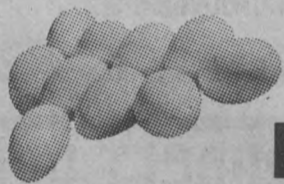

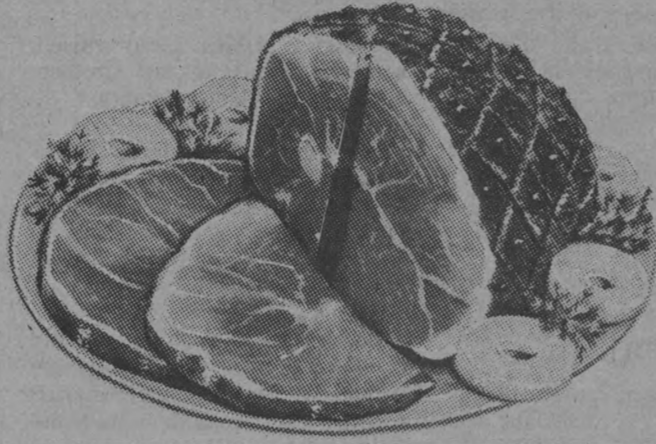

Hahira gas station robbers in Florida jail

Two men from Decatur are being held in the Hamilton County, Fla. jail after being identified as the suspects who allegedly robbed the I-75 Gulf Station at Hahira Wednesday night, February 21.

Kenneth Franklin Smith, 29, and George Wesley Hornbuckle, 37, both of Decatur, were arrested about 12:30 a.m. Thursday by troopers of the Florida State Patrol, and besides being suspected of the robbery, the two were also charged with speeding and possession of marijuana.

The Hahira Police Department answered the call from the station's night manager, Marion Duggan, who reported the armed robbery. He said the two men drove up in a blue Chevrolet pickup truck and one entered the station at approximately 10:30 p.m.

"He said he wanted some cash," Duggan said, "so I opened the cash register and he said he'd take all of it. Then he said he didn't want the \$1 bills." It was later determined that about \$140 in \$20, \$10 and \$5 bills were taken.

Cpl. Otis Camion and Ptl. Larry Carter of the local police

department responded to the call, but the case was turned over to the county law officials because the station is located outside the city limits.

Lowndes County deputies radioed a lookout to the Florida Highway Patrol, whose officers noticed a pickup of that description at the Hamilton County weigh station about 13 miles south of Jasper, Fla.

The troopers noticed one of the men throw two bags of a green leafy substance believed to be marijuana from the cab as they got out of the truck. The substance was confiscated for further investigation.

Deputies obtained a search warrant and found about \$350, but failed to find the small blue steel revolver allegedly used in the holdup, according to officials.

Cpl. Camion of the Hahira police department and Duggan accompanied two Lowndes County deputies to Jasper to identify the two men.

Chief David Webb stated that this was the first time since he has been with the local police department that an armed robbery had taken place in the Hahira area.

The Shilohs are home this weekend and will sing, possibly, in Valdosta the last of the week in revival.

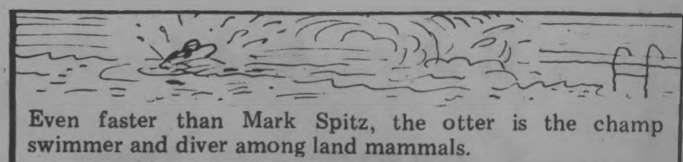

About your Social Security
Do you—or some member of your family—receive social security checks? Is the check coming to the right address?
These are some comments the people at social security receive from time to time: "I live on route one. I don't know my box number, but that's ok; the mail carrier knows me, and I get my checks without the box number." "I'm not sure about my route number; just send it care of the Post office—everyone around here knows me." "No, I live on a new route now, but my checks are forwarded to me. The mail carrier knows where I live."
The Social Security Administration is anxious for each beneficiary to receive his checks on time, and is concerned when a check is returned or delayed because of an incomplete or incorrect address. In this age of computers and mechanical operations it is more important than ever that exact information about your mailing address is furnished to social security.
Consider for a moment the comments above. What if the mail carrier became ill and not able to deliver mail for a prolonged period? What if he is replaced by someone who doesn't know the beneficiary? Would the check be delivered on time? Chances are it would not.
Sometimes the beneficiary may not have actually moved, but his address has changed. This could happen, for instance, when his route or box number changed because of new people moving into the area. Here again, the checks might not be delivered promptly if the correct address is not shown.
Avoid needless delay in the receipt of your checks. Report any changes in your address promptly to social security. You can do this by completing the change of address report form on the back of your check envelope and mailing it to your nearest social security office. Or if more convenient, you can give the information by phone. The telephone number of the office serving this area is WX6500. Just dial operator and ask for it.

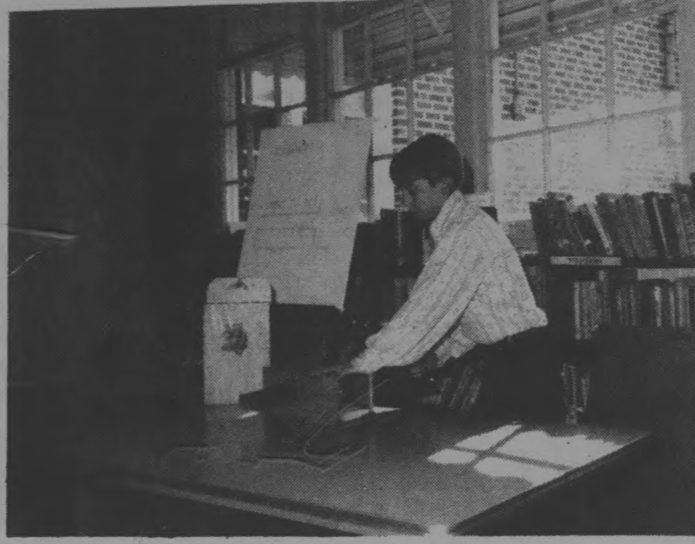

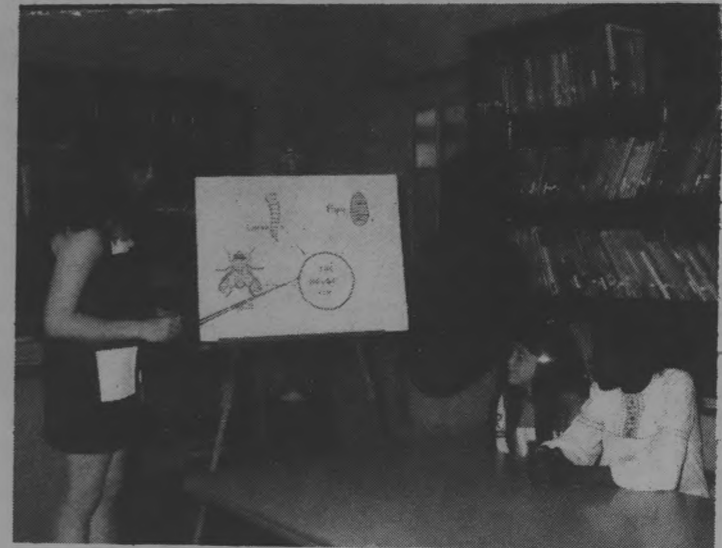

Gospel And Country Music Notes

BOBBY FARISH

Bobby Farish was born January 14, 1959, in Lynchburg, Virginia. He has light hair and blue eyes. Bobby is an only child, and he lives now in Madison Heights, Virginia.

Bobby showed an interest in country music at a pre-school age. With the help of many friends, Bobby began to play the guitar and sing quite well at the age of eight. He began to make public appearances with

many local bands. During this year Bobby became deeply interested in country music, and more determined to be a professional entertainer.

In July 1968, Bobby made his first appearance with an opera show, in Gattlinburg, Tennessee, with the Archie Campbell show.

Many people from both radio and T. V. have helped Bobby in his career. Among these are Homer "T" Thomas, manager

of radio station W. D. V. A. in Danville, Virginia and is also owner and operator of the "T" Bird Club in Danville, Virginia; Mr. Carlton Haney, country music promoter from North Carolina; Mrs. Kitty Tullis, President KCZT promotions and tape Club of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania; Manfred J. Vogel, D. J. in West Germany; and many others.

Bobby has made appearances on shows with Jack Greene, Loretta Lynn, Archie Campbell, The Osborne Brothers, Stan Hitchcock, Ray Pillow, George Jones, Harold Morrison, Norma Jean, Merle Haggard, Johnnie and Joanie Mosby and others.

In August 1969 a band started and advertised as "Bobby Farish and the Country Gentlemen." Bobby and the band have won many awards throughout the state of Virginia. His first record was released in December 1971, called "I'm Not The Boy I Used To Be," b-w "Don't It Make You Wonder Why".

More determined than ever to reach the top, Bobby continued to perform for both radio and TV and also for paid and charitable organizations. Many times he was very ill, but felt "the show must go on" and performed a great job. Bobby enjoys charity work very much, for he feels he must help those less fortunate. Many times he travels hundreds of miles just to perform for charity.

Bobby joined KCZT promotions and tape Club in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, in August 1972. This has been a great help to him in his career. Soon after this, a national fan

club was officially started for Bobby and this too has meant a great deal to him. He enjoys fan mail very much.

Even though Bobby is a young lad, he has his mind set on being a great country music singer.

VALDOSTA, Ga. -- If the 1973 EDUCATION-Funds Crusade Against Cancer of the American Cancer Society Lowndes County Unit is even one-half successful, the public will have been educated to the fact that one out of every four Lowndes Countians, or approximately 14,000 of the present population, will have cancer in their lifetime.

"And it's to meet the needs of the present through education and service and the future through research that we are conducting our current Crusade," said Lamar Cole, President of the Lowndes County Unit.

"The public is woefully uninformed, though we try to tell our story in a number of ways of the many services available locally to local cancer victims and their families.

Cole pointed out the Lowndes County Unit stands ready to help through "our Service-Rehabilitation program," headed by Georgia Hodges of McRae and Hodges Drugs.

"However, it is necessary to 'go through channels,' as in every large organization, and our hands are tied unless help is requested by the family or patient," he said.

"A 7-year-old Valdosta boy,

whose family appealed to the local ACS unit when he was three and suffering from newly-diagnosed cancer of the bone marrow, has received ACS assistance for four years with special drugs, transportation to Eugene Talmadge Memorial Hospital in Augusta, and even special shoes."

Now the lad's doctors are talking about a possible cure in his case, Cole said. "This is one of our success stories, and it could be repeated over and over, if families of cancer victims would come to us for help," he said.

"Of course, we are also delighted when local clubs aid cancer victims, but we want to emphasize that such help from clubs never needs to be a 'last resort.' The local ACS unit stands ready to help in the first place!"

What is available? "Hospital type equipment to be loaned to the patient, such as hospital beds, wheelchairs, portable commodes, can be arranged through our unit office, Cole replied.

"We also can supply all sizes and types of bandages, which are made by volunteers who donate their time for this purpose. We also have pain-relieving drugs and special treatment drugs for victims of leukemia, lymphoma, myeloma, Hodgkins' Disease, Wilms' Tumor, Neuroblastoma and Retinoblastoma, with approval and prescription of the patient's physician."

A gifts and loan closet at the unit headquarters at 115 E. Hill Ave. stocks sickroom supplies, such as cotton, foam rubber seat cushions and colostomy bags.

"We can even supply artificial limbs, eyes and mastectomy prosthesis," Cole added.

Two rehabilitative clubs sponsored by the local unit are the "Reach to Recovery Club," founded with the help of the Pilot Club of Valdosta, and the South Georgia Ostomy Association. The Reach to Recovery membership is

limited to post-mastectomy patients, and the Ostomy group is made up of those who have had stomas created.

Cole stressed no person need suffer from cancer because of a lack of funds to pay for treatment.

"The services are available locally and are here to be used," he said. Hospital and doctor bills are not paid locally, because patients transportation to and from 23 free cancer treatment centers across the nation is provided by ACS, he added.

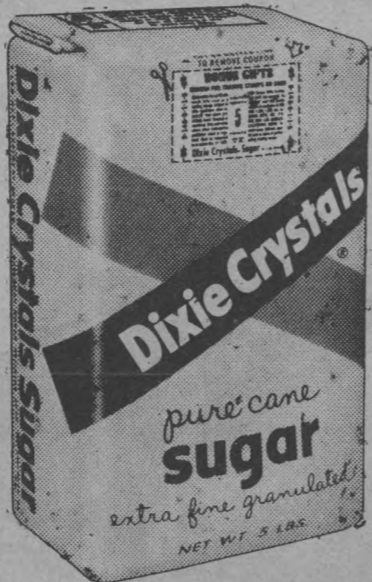
